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# South by Simplicity

#### March 2008: **Our Story Thus Far**

This year's South by Southwest Film and Interactive events have been enormously successful. This issue goes to press on Tuesday, a day earlier than usual. Wednesday evening, the Austin Music Awards at the Austin Music Hall mark the beginning of the onslaught that is the SXSW Music Festival. Each new SXSW evokes memories of times past.

Still, in many ways it all runs together, getting bunched up in memory. Certain incidents stand out - many, in fact - but there is no chronologically ordered bone structure holding them together. Some of the following definitely happened in different years, while others might have happened the same year or in different ones. It is a mosaic, not a history. This is Part I in an irregular series of reminiscences.

#### SXSW Part I: Birth to the Early 1990s

Early March, late 1980s: The Chronicle offices are on a corner of 28th and Nueces. There are two days before the beginning of the third or fourth year of South by Southwest. Eighteen- to 20-hour days, day after day, for weeks, with ever-heightening intensity rushing your brain while blowing out your nerves. There is a fear in the pit of your stomach that becomes almost a panic with every day the event grows closer. The fear/ panic haunts and surrounds you, but you can't acknowledge or let it out in any way. It is maybe 3am; the dark, wide sky is littered with shining stars as I walk around the block and then walk around it again. Hands buried in pockets, I'm caught in a very dark mood. Where it comes from or how it comes about I'm not sure, but gradually my vision is filled with the night and an even greater sense of the dark and the stars. Listening to the night, I start to feel it, or maybe to just imagine it, but the quiet and empty has faded away. There are the highways of America, filled with vans, trucks, cars pulling rented trailers, refitted school buses, panel trucks, and two or three car caravans - all filled with musicians who will be playing SXSW and heading toward Austin. There is something epic about it, not nearly a fleet toward Troy, nor an army of elephants coming over the Alps, but more something out of a Roger Miller and Waylon Jennings song.

# Thanksgiving and After, 1986, Through March 1987

In early November, Roland Swenson and Louis Jay Meyers came to Chronicle Publisher Nick Barbaro and me to suggest we put on a music conference and festival. Roland had managed bands and music clubs, as well as run a record label, but was then working for the Chronicle. Managing bands and booking clubs, Meyers didn't work for the Chronicle but was tight with all of us. Over the course of a couple of weeks, we talked about what this event might be and whether or not we should do it. I was the most reluctant about the event. The Chronicle, first published in September 1981, was then a biweekly (every other week) but planned to go weekly in September 1987. Launching an event and going weekly in the same year caused me any number of concerns. Still, by Thanksgiving, we had decided to go ahead with it.

What followed were hours and hours of talk among the four of us. Early on, we decided on the name South by Southwest but spent those weeks and weeks of meetings talking about every related detail. If memory serves, it was after working hours nearly every day that Barbaro, Swenson, Meyers, and I would sit around the office talking and talking. Now, Nick loves a long meeting that entails going over everything in infinitesimal detail. On the other hand, I have the attention span of a gnat, as Nick once so descriptively pointed out (though several staffers suggested this was an insult to gnats). Often I just walked back and forth. The constant between November 1986 and March 1987 was the four of us in an office, sitting, lying on the floor or on desks, standing, walking, shuffling, and talking, constantly talking. Regularly, we returned to the central scenario of an individual landing at the airport, renting a car, driving to the hotel, and then registering at SXSW. Operating from that point of view, we tried to anticipate every detail.

#### March

2008: The Chronicle regularly throws a Monday-night party during SXSW Film Conference and Festival. Last night it was at La Zona Rosa. Two guys came over to talk to me, as they were very interested in the history of SXSW. They asked how we started it. I answered that we decided to do it, announced it, and then sent out press releases and letters. They kept waiting for the curtain to be pulled back, to hear that there was some major, concrete maneuver or decision involved. Instead, we basically said SXSW would begin on Thursday March 12, 1987, and then set about making that happen.

????: It was one of the early SXSWs. We had gotten into an intense dispute with a club owner - over what I can't remember, except that it wasn't terribly important. The club owner got more and more worked up. Oddly,

the combination of cocaine and steroids he was obviously on didn't really have a calming effect. When he whipped out a pistol and threatened us, we had any and all SXSW staff vacate the building.

1989 or 1990: For the first and only time, because of scheduling issues, SXSW did not take place during spring break but the week before. The students were still in town. The reason we never again strayed from spring break was that they showed up in large numbers. Way too many clubs filled up far too fast. Attendees started complaining that SXSW had gotten too big, with clubs being too difficult to get into, the second year. This was something else.

1994: By this point, for a number of years there had been weekly meetings of as much of the staff as could be there in the month and a half leading up to SXSW. Roland ran these meetings, where he would remind us several times, "Remember, SXSW is not for you." Translated, it means your job and responsibilities come first by a long shot; don't take a break and disappear because there is some band you want to see. Staff had been called on the carpet for this.


Except this year Johnny Cash was playing Emo's. This is the only time that I remember seeing most of the staff breaking the rule by showing up for a set. Good thing that Roland was there, as well. Before the show started, I ran into Sterling Morrison, who seemed in an unusually good mood. We chatted for a while. I didn't know it at the time, of course, but this was the last time I would see him. Less than 18 months later, he died.

#### At Some Point in the Future: Part II

SXSW is about an idea or a series of ideas that most everything we've worked on has in common. The question has to be, however, "Would you let me walk down your street/ Naked if I want to?" The issue is, "What is the answer?"







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#### Lazy Thinking and Lazy Journalism

Dear sir.

Richard Whittaker's recent review [Books, March 7] of my new book, Gusher of Lies, has me riled. Please allow me to address a few of his fallacious claims.

He claims the book has "a disturbing amorality, like telling readers to 'adapt' to global warming." I've been called plenty of names during my two decades in journalism, but "amoral" is a humdinger. My book argues that we will have to adapt to a changing global climate regardless of the cause. The reasons for this are obvious. and I point them out, including the huge energy-demand growth in China and India. In 2006 alone, China added more than 100 gigawatts of new electric power plants, 90% of which are coalfired. Only a handful of countries who have signed on to the Kyoto Protocol have even come close to meeting their carbon-dioxide reduction targets. On p.271, I point out that in 2004, Japan, the home of Kyoto, was exceeding its reduction targets by 19%. Spain was exceeding its target by 31%. So are the Chinese and Indians "amoral" for wanting electric power? Are Japan and Spain amoral for continuing to grow their economies and their energy use?

Whittaker claims I erroneously conflate energy use and wealth creation. Yet he doesn't offer one counterexample. Why? He can't. Statistics from any reliable source show the correlation between energy consumption – and particularly electricity consumption – with higher living standards. His only counterargument is that the U.S. has a higher infant-mortality rate than it should. Gee, no kidding.

Whittaker excoriates me for daring to point out, in his words, that "the merits of any energy source seems to be price per watt."



Not to put too fine a point on it, but here goes: duh. Why are alternative-energy companies investing so much in new technologies? The answer: Energy prices are rising. The world - and particularly the developing world - will only quit using fossil fuels when other forms of energy are cheaper and/or more convenient. Google is getting into the solar-power business and claims that it wants to make solar power cheaper than coal-fired power. Good for them. Last year, the best-performing U.S. stock - according to The Wall Street Journal - was First Solar Inc., which rose by 795.2%. First Solar and the investors who bought its stock believe that price matters. It's astounding that Whittaker doesn't.

When discussing energy and global warming, it's apparent that Whittaker prefers political correctness to reality. My book was written as a rebuke to the know-nothing rhetoric about energy being espoused by all of the presidential candidates, the left, the right, and far too many journalists. Rather than focus on my thesis about the broad implications of America's interdependence with the rest of the world on everything from energy and mineral commodities to carbon dioxide and global warming, Whittaker takes a bunch of cheap shots that ignore the myriad facts that I used to support my arguments. Whittaker's review is a prime example of lazy thinking and lazy journalism.

#### **AFP Is Anti-Government**

Re: "Naked City," March 7 [News]: The Austin Chronicle got the correct bottom line regarding the Americans for Prosperity lawsuit against the Texas Association of Counties: TAC has a constitutional right to lobby the Legislature regarding county issues, so long as dues money from counties is not used to lobby. The case is over, without Peggy Venable, Texas director of AFP, getting what she sought - which was to cut off communication between counties and legislators.

AFP is an anti-government organization that seeks to cut government services by having the Legislature take away the authority of locally elected officials to make budget and taxation decisions, thereby doing away with local control in our representative system of democracy. Ms. Venable is a registered lobbyist herself, lobbying against government regulations, such as smoking bans in public places. However, Ms. Venable does not want counties to have the same rights as she and her corporate sponsors do.

When Ms. Venable once again lobbies the Legislature in 2009 to take away local control, TAC will be there, lobbying on the other side of the issue - and against unfunded mandates that

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
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#### Two Thumbs Up for Villa Muse





- And there's another election on the way! Monday was the filing deadline for the May 10 city of Austin municipal elections (and Austin Independent School District and Austin Community College), so the campaigns are trying to find some airspace amid presidential hoopla, spring break festivities, and March Madness.
- Last week City Council declined to allow the Villa Muse film studio/residential development project, proposed for the State Highway 130 corridor, to leave the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction. The feathers are still flying. See "Point Austin," right, "Beside the Point," p.16, and "Developing Stories," p.28.

#### NAKED CITY

The fight over **McMansions** in Central East Austin has spawned a takeover attempt by the "Council of Five," which is lobbying the city to become the area's officially recognized contact team for neighborhood planning and zoning. The team already in place - the Organization of Central East Austin Neighborhoods - has long been considered a model of an integrated and involved neighborhood group. In January, however, City Council unanimously denied a proposal by OCEAN; its members sought an amendment to the McMansion Ordinance to require smaller houses on the small lots prevalent in their neighborhood. Fighting OCEAN's proposed change was property owner "Hollywood" Henderson; he's now seizing the political advantage in an attempt to displace OCEAN. Other Council of Five members include Byron Marshall (chief executive of the Austin Revitalization Authority), real estate investor Eric Shropshire, and several investor-developers. They propose to add just one OCEAN representative to their group. Alarmed by the challenge to OCEAN's authority, President Rudy Williams urged each neighborhood association within OCEAN (and others) to draft a resolution in protest: "Developer takeovers of neighborhood associations is a real problem."

# Villamusing

#### Have we got a deal for you!

Among the elementary principles of buying a used car is this one: When the salesman says, "This deal is only good if you accept it right now!" it's time to get up and walk away.

That was essentially the position the City Council found itself in last Thursday, as representatives of Villa Muse – the colossal film studio, concert venue, and film set as residential development proposed for eastern Travis County – insisted that unless the city immediately releases the land from its extraterritorial jurisdiction, the project cannot go forward. Faced with those terms – and the reluctance or inability of those same representatives to explain exactly why those are the terms – council quite properly said no.

Nobody opposed the project. Instead council voted, 4-3, to keep the conversation going, but to try to negotiate a solution that would keep the project in the ETJ, on terms satisfactory to the developers as well as the city.

How did the developers respond? The next day they released a broadside denouncing council in language that seemed calculated to burn any remaining bridges, even shamelessly pandering "the kids of Del Valle" as the real beneficiaries of this yet-to-be-financed wannabe studio mogul's pipe dream. "What a terrible message to send on the eve of South by Southwest, that the creative industries in Austin aren't worth creative policymaking by the city," declared Villa Muse CEO Jay Podolnick. "Moreover, this is a huge blow to neighboring communities, like the residents of Webberville and the kids of the Del Valle School District, who stood to gain enormously from building Villa Muse outside of Austin's ETI."

That was followed by an echoing screed from District 46 state House Rep. Dawnna Dukes (who began shamelessly flogging this project last spring). Dukes informed the four council members who voted to keep the development in the ETJ that they had failed their city and acted *imprudently*. Yet Dukes, too, abjectly failed to explain why the project can't go forward under Austin's purview. "Your decision ... takes certain financing options off the table, thus making the project financially unfeasible."

One might think Dukes, at least for a few months, would *prudently* refrain from giving financial advice to anybody.

#### **Give Us Our MUD**

Dukes' utterly vague language echoed that of Michael Whelan, who presented the Villa Muse case to council, beginning with photos of fields and cows, and ending with ... not much else. The developers argue the land is "a hay field in the middle of a floodplain," and therefore their grandiose Hollywood-in-a-cow-pasture project is essentially a no-strings-attached gift to Austin

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– that is, if only they can be guit of Austin for a 'temporary" 30 to 40 years.

The Muse presentation was full of rhetoric about "creativity" and "job creation" and "stimulating industry growth" and "Facilities + People = Sparks" – yet the project team could not answer direct, fairly simple questions posed from the dais. Mayor Will Wynn asked, if the problem is Austin's potential annexation, "Why not make these exact same proposals in our ETJ with an agreement not to annex?" The response referred vaguely to "timing" and the "marketability of the bonds." Trying to help the Musers, Brewster McCracken (who supported the release) asked more than once, "What would be the [financial] impact" of being inside or outside the ETI? "We've been asked to look at quantifying that," was the response, "and we're just not prepared to do so at this time." An attempt by Betty Dunkerley to elicit an explanation of the bond timing also got nowhere.

There were all sorts of winks and hints about "charter amendments" and "past litigation" and "minimizing risk" (to investors, not to Austin) but no straight answers to be had. The real gist of the problem seems to be: After a year of very big Villa Muse talk, unnamed and mysterious investors still do not want to risk \$300 million upfront on a massive, extremely speculative project, if potential municipal oversight might get in the way of a quick buck - or as the Muses put it, "The investor is looking for the most effective, fastest way to get that reimbursement." That means external, unregulated municipal utility districts - and if there's one thing this city knows from bitter experience, it's the consequences of runaway suburban MUDs. If this deal goes forward as is, with no municipal oversight, there is a real possibility the city would eventually be left to clean up an unholy and perhaps literal mess left for it by a herd of starry-eyed, foolhardy, and bankrupt "creatives" - who are already throwing a shameless public tantrum because they didn't get exactly what they want.

#### It Ain't About the Landfill

By the time the environmental issues that have generated most of the public comment were raised (by Jennifer Kim and Lee Leffingwell), the unanswered financial questions hung as thickly in the air as the odor of manure. The Musers plan to move tons of aggregate into the floodplain for construction base (vowing to push future floods ... elsewhere). They insist Austin can trust them to follow the city's environmental standards (although the only regs will be those of the stickless county and the feckless state) and that the whole faux Titanic won't simply slide into the Colorado in the next big gullywasher. Yet they don't return that trust - and the staff, which very circumspectly noted the contradiction, recommended against releasing the land, since the project overwhelmingly fails to meet the city's standard criteria for such a release.

Council narrowly agreed - and bully for

In the wake of this quite rational decision, Dukes, County Commissioner Ron Davis. and other officials who should know better are loudly complaining that since council proposes, several years hence, to put a landfill and wastewater facility near Webberville, it should also submit immediately to the unreasonable and utterly unjustified demands of the Villa Muse developers to get their own enormous, private playpen near the same site.

If they think the Webberville facility is a bad idea, then oppose the Webberville facility. But the last thing they should do is use one bad idea to justify another, and on a much more colossal scale. Nobody in western Travis County would accept this Technicolor and CinemaScope pig-in-a-poke on pure speculation and promises. Nobody in eastern Travis County should be expected to do so either.

The Muse presentation was full of rhetoric about "creativity" and "job creation" ... yet the project team could not answer direct, fairly simple questions posed from the dais.

# **South by Solicitation**

With a recession-bound economy, and winter weather spurting into spring, just when you think Austin's homeless can't have it any worse, the City Council comes up with a bright idea: Let's send a bunch of UT School of Social Work undergrads to stick surveys in their faces!

So, uhh, what's it like begging for change on the side of the highway? Fulfilling, or

While such questions obviously aren't at the forefront of council's mind (or the researchers' either, hopefully) you have to ask - what is? Last Thursday, March 6, council entertained a morning briefing on the solicitation (né panhandling) survey. Last seen late last year, it became the third way out of an increasingly untenable move to overhaul the city's solicitation laws, and one could be excused for thinking it died a politically expedient death. Instead, council voted to spend the summer accumulating data on Austin's panhandlers. Health & Human Services director David Lurie said the survey's goal is two-fold: to determine "who is soliciting and why; what are the reasons for that activity?" To get to the bottom of this vexing question (hint: They want money), the department plans on developing a questionnaire and sending those aforementioned students into the field - or overpass or intersection - to get answers, from July to August. In return, they'll deliver paltry cash payments or food certificates to the participants.

How will they know what corners to hit? H&HS has been working with the Police Department to pinpoint panhandling hot spots and to provide "overall logistics." That alarmed some council members, with Jennifer Kim voicing concern about the cops' mission. "I just want to make sure the APD is not going to try and get that information to arrest them," she said.

But to worry about this narrow enforcement capacity misses the forest for the lean-to in the trees. Could the entire exercise simply be an excuse to revisit Austin's solicitation laws - which currently prohibit

most of the roadside solicitation council so disdains - this time under a scientific veneer? As Lee Leffingwell pointed out. the city had a lot of information on the homeless: "We know there's 4,500 or so citywide. We know that there's about 600 that are considered chronically homeless. ... We know that there's about 1,500 home less veterans. The point is we know a lot."

Given what we already know, it seems the survey is mainly designed to prove that some solicitors aren't homeless - thereby making it politically correct to enact tougher laws. (It's not surprising that leading the survey charge was Brewster McCracken, who led the previous push to revisit the ordinances.) But is it worth the time and money? As Lurie told council, "I think it's going to be ambitious for us to accomplish everything we've discussed within the \$48,000 [budget]." And as two other items on that day's agenda made clear - a \$108,000 grant to keep the Salvation Army afloat and upcoming conversion of the 15th Street Ronald McDonald house into a sorely needed mental-health halfway house - if council truly wants to help, isn't a more effective use of dollars painfully obvious?

Trust us - we're movie producers! When have we ever screwed anybody over?

states: "In most metropolitan areas, only 5 to 10 percent of the housing stock is located in walkable urban places. ... Yet recent consumer research by Jonathan Levine of the University of Michigan and Lawrence Frank of the University of British Columbia suggests that roughly one in three homeowners would prefer to live in these types of places."

- City Council approved a new incentive for film, TV, and video productions: Austin will waive facility use and rental fees and provide police officers for traffic and crowd control. Creative types will stoke the economy and make us feel hip and cool (in keeping with MovieMaker magazine naming us the No. 1 city for makers of indie films). Meanwhile, Austin Studios is preparing to make multiple improvements to its stages in the coming months, funded by the city of Austin bond program.
- Austin Police say they have arrested the man who "directs" the Austin operations of the infamous prison gang the Mexican Mafia. On March 4, the APD Gang Suppression Unit – working with the FBI, the Texas Department of Criminal Justice, and its Office of Inspector General – arrested alleged Mexican Mafia Austin honcho Benny Martinez and alleged underling Richard Salazar, in connection with an ongoing cocaine-trafficking investigation. Police confiscated roughly 13 pounds of coke, two pistols, and approximately \$73,000 in cash during the arrest. APD says the Mafia is responsible for distributing roughly the same amount of

coke each week in Austin, and police believe pinching Martinez and Salazar will "put a significant damper" on the group's area coke-distribution network.

Here's the straight poop: Unless pooch-paraders clean up their act - and their pets' waste before it reaches the water - the public may lose cherished swim privileges along Bull Creek. A new city water study has documented that pathogen levels in the creek often exceed the state-recommended limit for contact recreation, with readings soaring eight times higher on weekends, corresponding to increased visits by dog-walkers to offleash areas. Moreover, the study shows that 100,000 dogs drop 50,000 pounds of waste daily in Austin. Even small amounts of excrement reaching city waterways can cause serious human illnesses - such as dysentery, hepatitis, typhoid fever, and ear infections - as well as imperil the pets' health, said Kathy Shay of the city's Watershed Protection and Development Review Department. So Austin is launching a scoop-thepoop campaign at Bull Creek. "The city is asking Austinites to help by cleaning up pet waste, in order to preserve all uses of the park, including swimming, wading, and the off-leash dog areas," announced Shay on March 7, urging visitors to bring bags from home or pull mitts from park dispensers, then scoop, seal, and shuck waste in cans. During spring break and beyond, city staff will distribute pertinent information and "doggie" bags, and police will issue warnings and citations for waste code violations. - Patricia J. Ruland

Spay Austin Coalition is calling on conscientious objectors to gather from noon to 2pm, Sunday, March 16, to protest the new Southpark Meadows Petland. located at 9900 S. I-35. The boycott announcement claims Petland is not welcome in Austin and says animal lovers should not buy a pet

from the national chain. "We'll be gathering outside, hopefully for a very visible protest," promises SAC's Calene Summers. According to SAC, Petland patronizes "factory-style" puppy and kitty mills, which reportedly mass-produce and neglect animals, then fail to disclose medical problems. SAC alleges most Petland puppies come from Hunte Corp., the largest puppy dealer in the U.S. and the target of a national protest. And since the Lady Bird Lake shelter is killing 1,000-plus pets a month. "Why do we want to bring in more animals to Austin from out of state?" Summers asks. Lest anyone presume that poorly run pet mills are a faraway atrocity, "I know there are some in Central Texas," says Summers, noting that last year dachshund and terrier rescue groups squired animals from possibly illicit mass breeders in the Central Texas area who were closing their doors. Petland spokesman Elizabeth Kunzelman denied the allegations. "We do not buy from puppy mills. We purchase only from 'hobby' [local] and USDA-licensed breeders that have a good history of clean kennels and meeting all the proper requirements. Our biggest concern is the welfare of our puppies.'

World peace is being declared in Austin during SXSW. A group of local anti-war activists (and that's all wars, not just current conflicts) is circulating what they call a worldwide referendum on ending wars and promoting goodwill toward all. Locals and visitors are being asked to sign the declaration as "a physical manifestation of humanity's increasing desire for peace," then collect more signatures around the world. The declaration will not be online: In its accompanying explanation, the declarees say, "We believe a person-to-person connection will best honor and give respect to this document." Spokesman Paul Thrailkill said he hopes the influx of international musicians for the Festival will help jump-start the plan globally. For more info, e-mail paulthr@gmail.com. Richard Whittaker

Pondering the children imprisoned at the internationally scorned **T. Don** Hutto Residential Center in Taylor – an immigrant detention facility funded by U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, operated by Corrections Corporation of America, and administered by Williamson County - often brings Terlingua resident Adrienne Evans to tears. Last week, Evans organized last Saturday's International Women's Day peace rally at the center. "I'm ashamed to say that I'd known about this prison since August and had done nothing about it but cry," Evans told Naked City. "I couldn't sleep unless I fought what Homeland Security and crony CCA is doing to innocent people for profit, and God knows what other bad reasons." Evans reported that seeing children in the prison playground upset activist parents and offspring alike. "It was very emotional for us to witness such a horrible prison." #### BEYOND CITY LIMITS

Drugs in the water! That's what a five-month Associated Press study found in 24 major metropolitan areas but not in Austin. Drugs including antibiotics, anticonvulsants, mood stabilizers, and sex hormones were detected in small

amounts, passed through people's bodies into wastewater and then on to the drinking water supplies of at least 41 million Americans. Although the individual amounts are minuscule, scientists worry about the long-term consequence es of such exposure. According to the AP, the federal government doesn't require any testing and hasn't set safety limits for drugs in water. Of the 62 major providers contacted, drinking water for only 28 is ordinarily tested. Bottled water, some of which is simply repackaged tap water, is not typically treated or tested for pharmaceuticals, the AP notes. Recent lab research found small amounts of medication caused breast cancer cells to proliferate too quickly, kidney cells to grow too slowly, and blood cells to appear inflamed. David Foster, director of Clean Water Action's Austin office, said the synergistic impact of various drugs is of concern, as are Bush administration plans to cut \$10 million in funding to the U.S. Geological Survey, which monitors water quality. Austin's water is believed to be largely drug-free mainly because we're not downstream of any other major cities. - Daniel Mottola


Who's more qualified to say whether we're breathing an unsafe amount of pollution, a panel of doctors and scientists or industry lobbyists? The U.S. Environmental Protection Agency is finalizing its decision on changes to federal smog standards - specifically how much ozone pollution ought to be allowed. Ozone is linked to asthma, bronchitis, and heart attacks and acutely impacts children and the elderly. The EPA concluded last year that the current ozone standard of 80 parts per billion isn't protective of public health. Industry lobbyists representing automakers, utilities, manufacturers, refiners, and cement plants have increasingly visited the White House and Capitol to argue that tighter standards will cost too much - although the


Supreme Court has ruled twice that air-quality standards cannot be based on cost. An EPA review panel of more than 25 scientists and physicians was "unanimous in recommending that the primary ozone standard should be no greater than 70ppb." Dr. John Balbus, a physician with Environmental Defense, said a change to 75ppb would result in a 10-fold decrease in ozone-related deaths. Rick Perry joined 10 other governors in a letter last year opposing stricter standards, citing "uncertain health and environmental benefits." Tighter smog standards would likely make Austin a federal air-quality violator. On Tuesday, the Lone Star Chapter of the Sierra Club and the American Lung Association of the Central States called on the EPA in a statement "to follow its own Science Advisory Committee's recommendation and establish a new National Ambient Air Quality Standard for ozone pollution that will truly protect public health."

Punctuation Man saves serial comma! The **serial comma**, which goes just before the connecting word in a list of three, got a powerful defender last week. Grammar experts have been arguing over the serial comma for several long, brutal centuries, and the debate had threatened to break out into armed conflict in recent years. They fought over whether the punctuation was an affront to tradition, the most natural way to write, or just an extra speck on the page. But this week, punctuation man, aka Jeff Rubin, the founder of National Punctuation Day, assured the world that the serial comma will never have to slink off the end of a sentence in shame. "I recommend the use of the serial comma," thundered Rubin (in a press release), "because it helps make clear the meaning of a sentence." Thank you, Punctuation Man! [Ed. note: Chronicle style is to use serial commas.] - Michael May



Travis Co. was pretty lopsided for Barack Obama. Of 210 voting precincts, only eight went for the former first lady, and unless you lived in the southeast corner of Travis or east of Marble Falls, it was less a matter of, "Did your precinct go for Obama?" but rather, "By how much?"

Overall, 62.58% of Travis residents voted for Obama; for our purposes, that percentage is the dividing line between "heavy" and "light" pro-Obama. The Illinois senator went as high as 84.9% in Precinct 121 (LBJ High School), had four precincts go more than 80%, and many more more than 70%. Clinton, on the other hand, could do no better than 58.2% in Precinct 403 down in **Creedmoor**, and one precinct she won by a mere plurality of 49.9%: Precinct 427 (Allan Elementary in East Austin), which she took by only three votes.

#### Millions of Democrats

Austinites love their democracy - as usual, Travis County had a higher voter turnout than the state as a whole: 41% vs. 33%. They are also more sold on the idea of early voting than other Texans: Contrary to the norm in most places, Travis residents casting ballots early (116,055) outnumbered election day voters (111,438). Statewide, it was the reverse: 1.8 million voted early, and 2.4 million waited until the big day. In Travis. 186,426 Democrats went to the polls, compared with 41,067 Republicans. Statewide, it was 2.9 million Dems vs. 1.4 million Republicans.

Don't read too much into those state numbers, though. It's doubtful they represent a shift of Texans to the left. The Dem turnout was driven by the hotly competitive presidential primary; since the GOP nomination was all but sewn up for John McCain, it should be presumed that many Republicans didn't feel motivated to turn out. And let's not forget that Austin's borders now stretch up into Williamson County. WilCo recorded 78,521 ballots cast, including 49,490 in the Democratic primary and 28,848 in the Republican one.

#### Still Counting the Caucus Vote

So who won the 67 national Democratic presidential delegates up for grabs from those crazy precinct caucuses on election night? Sorry, but we (and you) won't know for certain until after the state Democratic Party convention in Austin,

June 5-7. Part of the problem is that precinct captains weren't required to report their results until the county (or in the case of large urban counties, senatorial district) conventions are held March 29 - so the results shown on the Texas Democratic Party website (www.txdemocrats.org) were those that were voluntarily reported, and by Thursday, the volume of results called in had slowed to such a trickle that the party stopped updating the website. So the tally shown there is unofficial and very incomplete, but we at least know that Obama has picked up 23.918 of the 88.074 precinct delegates available, and Clinton has 18,620. Assuming substantial numbers of those delegates don't flip their votes - they can but usually don't - then once those delegates are winnowed down at state, the percentages likely mean Obama has secured roughly about 18 of the 67, and Clinton about 14. The remaining 35 we'll just have to wait and see.

#### Noriega on Victory

It was a nail-biter, but it's finally official: With all of Texas' 8,247 precincts reporting, Houston state Rep. Rick Noriega did indeed avoid a run-off in his race to be the Democrats' U.S. Senate nominee. Candidates need 50% plus one vote to win outright, and clearing that bar was by no means certain for Noriega on election night. He started with a bare 50.26% of the early votes and for a while dipped



under 50% as counting continued but finally finished with 51.01%. His main hurdle was that recurring problem for Democrats, San Antonio retiree Gene Kelly, a perennial candidate for whom many people vote either out of whimsy or confusion with the dead dancer. Kelly took 27%, Corpus Christi schoolteacher Ray McMurrey (the only opponent Noriega and the media took seriously) got only 12%, and San Antonio security guard Rhett Smith took less than 10%. But Noriega says he wasn't sweating: "In all honesty, we had prepared for a runoff given the number of candidates in the race and given the number of voters that were turning out that we didn't know who they were," Noriega told the Chronicle a couple of days after the election. "Given that [I'm] just a state representative, one of 150 in the state, we had to get out and introduce ourselves ... so quite frankly, we were pleasantly surprised. We're very humbled by the vote of confidence." But if he had this much trouble winning the primary against two names and one pseudo bigname, what does this say about his chances against Republican incumbent John Cornyn? "It means it'll be a tough fight, and I'll win the general election."

#### D.A.'s Race Public-safety PACs weigh in

Union representatives from Travis County's five public-safety entities gathered last week in Wooldridge Square Park to announce their endorsement of Mindy Montford in the April 8 run-off race for Travis Co. district attorney. The four-way field of primary candidates - assistant district attornevs Montford. Rosemary Lehmberg, Gary Cobb, and Rick Reed - was whittled to two on election night, leaving Montford, a trial court prosecutor, and Lehmberg, the office's first assistant D.A., to battle it out for the top spot. The political action committees of the county's two largest public-safety unions - the Austin Police Association and the Travis County Sheriff's Officers Association, which represents the D.A. office's correction officers - had endorsed Cobb, who pulled a third-place finish on election night. Last week, however, those two joined with the Austin-Travis County Emergency Medical Services Employee Association, the Austin Firefighters Association, and the Travis County Sheriffs' Law Enforcement Association (which had already thrown its weight behind Montford) to announce their combined support for Montford. "This is a historic day," said Brett Spicer, TCSLEA PAC chair. "This is the first time I can remember in 10 years that every public-safety organization [has] united behind one candidate. That speaks volumes about Mindy Montford." Wuthipong "Tank" Tantaksinanukij, APA vice president, said the public-safety groups were looking for a candidate interested in working with and communicating more with each group. Whereas Lehmberg represents the old guard - she has worked in the office six months longer than 30-year veteran D.A. Ronnie Earle - he said Montford is the candidate that best represents the future and is whom the police union believes will "bring fresh eyes to a 30-year institution." - Jordan Smith

#### Travis Co. Constables Danny Thomas returns

Never underestimate the power of prayer – or name ID – in a low-profile constable race. "I'm a praying man," Precinct 1 candidate Danny Thomas acknowledged before last week's Democratic primary election. Thomas is also a well-known figure in his East Austin community, which forms the greater share of Precinct 1. A former Austin City Council member, he is also an ordained minister and a retired Austin police officer who now serves as an Austin Police Department community liaison. And he came in first in a three-way race, advancing to an April 8 run-off against Janie Serna. Third-place candidate Willie Joe Madison entered the race as the presumptive frontrunner - he serves as the precinct's chief deputy constable, and he had the endorsement of outgoing Constable Luke Mercer and several Democratic clubs. But Thomas apparently had prayer and a higher profile on his side. He got almost 42% of the vote.

#### **CD 10** Endorsements don't vote

Something in which we won't be placing too much stock in the future: Democratic club endorsements. After Dan Grant just rolled Larry Joe Doherty on the endorsement front, one might figure he was a lock to become the Democratic challenger to Rep. Michael McCaul in the Congressional District 10 race. One would figure wrong.

The most important battleground for the Democratic primary in this Austin-to-Houston district, obviously, is Austin. The Travis County portion of the district accounted for more than half of the votes cast, which is why Doherty moved from Washington Co. to Austin to run for the seat. We were pretty sure that at least Travis would break for lifelong Austinite Grant, but no: Doherty took 57% here. And that turned out to be his weakest county. Back home in Washington County, Doherty took 76%, and in the other major population center of the district, Harris County (where Doherty built his successful legal malpractice career), he took 65%.

At a party for campaign volunteers two nights after the election, Doherty said his dominant win was what he expected, because he had something better than endorsements - he

had polling data (the same poll that had drawn accusations of push-polling from Grant supporters).

'That inappropriate accusation of push-polling was a ruse to try to get a free look at a poll that we paid serious pollsters to do for serious reasons," Doherty said. "And after that poll came in, we knew which direction to take the message in this campaign, and we knew why. It wasn't a push poll, and it wasn't a campaign that was going to be won with negatives. Our message was solid, it was responsive to what the voters were interested in, and it was positive."

That's a reference to Grant's negative TV ads, which ridiculed Doherty - who starred as Judge Larry Joe in the Texas Justice television series - as a mere "TV personality." Doherty's ads, by contrast, made no mention of Grant and instead talked about "cleaning up Congress."

"[Campaign consultant] James Aldrete just did a magnificent job of analyzing the polling data and sculpting the message to fit my strengths," Doherty said. Losing the battle for Democratic club endorsements didn't matter, he said, because "Travis County is so much more than what it used to be that the voters that determined the outcome of this election are not part of an old system."



A consolation prize for Grant: As he campaigned outside of Gullett Elementary in his home precinct - with Doherty's wife campaigning just a few feet away - he said, "I have to win this precinct." He did. Precinct 239 went 68% in his favor. Great campaign line, as he greeted voters going into Gullett: "Hi, I'm Dan Grant. I'm running for Congress, and I went to - L.N. school here."

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






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In the other constable races, there were few surprises. In Precinct 2, incumbent Republican Bob Vann handily beat challenger Carl Joiner, while in a nasty race on the Democratic side. Adan Ballesteros edged Paul Labuda by 52-48%. In Precinct 3, incumbent Democrat Richard McCain took more than 55% to beat challenger Robert Eller, currently a deputy constable in Precinct 4. And in Precinct 4, incumbent Maria Canchola got more than 60% against Alonzo "Al" Reyes, currently an officer in the Precinct 3 constable's office. - Amy Smith

#### Stealth to the Right?

The high primary turnout of Democrats is being seen as a good sign for House Democrats in November. But with so many seats in the Texas Lege uncontested in November, the removal of several incumbents during primaries could in fact signify a shift to the right and to reps even more friendly to House Speaker Tom Craddick.

El Paso Republican Pat Haggerty, first elected to House District 78 in 1988. a GOP rebel who led last session's anti-Craddick walkout, was defeated by well-funded party establishment (endorsed by Gov. Rick Perry) candidate Dee Margo (who now must face popular Democratic Assistant District Attorney Joseph Moody). And two conservatives lost their seats for not being conservative enough. In Houston's HD 130, ex-cop Allen Fletcher defeated incumbent Corbin Van Arsdale. blasted for the sins of supporting tax bills and sponsoring a failed journalism shield law. Up in Dallas (HD 101), freshman Thomas Latham lost to Mesquite Mayor Mike Anderson, who ran on a platform attacking the evils of taxes, illegal immigration, and sexual predators. He faces a November contest against Democratic lawyer Robert Miklos.

The bloodletting was even more brutal among Democrats. In Houston, defrocked veteran Al Edwards got his revenge on freshman Borris Miles by taking back HD 146 - the seat Edwards held for 26 years before being ejected by Miles in the 2006 primary. While Edwards gained a reputation for grandstanding - for trying to place his own likeness on the Juneteenth Memorial Monument and for his "booty bill" to ban overly suggestive high school cheerleading - he was also one of the longest-serving Craddick Ds. (Miles' brief tenure had produced its own controversy.)

In El Paso, Haggerty wasn't the only anti-Craddick rep ousted in the primaries. Dem incumbent Paul Moreno lost HD 77 by 3 percentage points to Marisa Marquez. Moreno

had attacked Marguez for taking \$49,000 in contributions from the anti-tort Texans for Lawsuit Reform PAC, a big contributor to Craddick-friendly campaigns. In another rough race, two-time HD 43 Rep. Juan Manuel Escobar lost 54-46% to South Padre Island board Alderwoman Tara Rios Ybarra, Like Marquez, Ybarra was attacked for being a "Craddick D in waiting" and endured a Texas Ethics Commission complaint for spending campaign contributions before she had a campaign; in turn, she alleged (without naming names) that a break-in at her campaign office in November was politically motivated.

Anti-Craddick Dems could take some solace in the ejection of noted Craddick D Kevin Bailey in HD 140 (Houston), to be replaced by Armando Walle.

#### And They're Off! ... Again


Campaign managers call run-off elections wasteful drains on resources. They also seem inevitable, and that holds true this primary season, with several congressional and legislative races statewide coming back for another vote on April 8. For Congress, there's one Democratic run-off, with neither Steve Loven or Eric Roberson getting the 50%-plus-one needed to decide who takes on Congressional District 32 Republican U.S. Rep. Pete Sessions in November. The Republicans have one rerun as well: After a crowded first round to face Democrat Nick Lampson in CD 22. Tom DeLav's old seat. Pete Olson (former staffer to Sen. John Cornyn and, before him. Sen. Phil Gramm) and Shellev Sekula Gibbs (former Houston City Council member who finished DeLay's final unexpired term but lost to Lampson in 2006) elbowed past eight others, but neither sealed the deal.

The GOP could waste most time and money in Texas House races, with four undecided slots remaining. Three are to replace retiring Republican incumbents: In **House District** 112 (Dallas), Angie Chen Button and Randy Dunning compete to replace the retiring Fred Hill, with no November challenger. In HD 144 (Pasadena), Ken Legler and Fred Roberts will face off before taking on Democratic hopeful Joel Redmond to fill veteran GOPer Robert Talton's seat (which he abandoned to become one of the also-rans in the CD 22 race). In HD 55 (Temple), either Ralph Sheffield or Martha Tyroch will face Dem Sam Murphey to succeed retiring Diane White Delisi. The most brutal race looks to be in HD 81, where eightterm incumbent George "Buddy" West ran second in a four-horse race, to former District Judge Tryon Lewis.

#### WilCo's Hottest Races

Birkman clears primary. Williamson Co. Precinct 1 Commissioner Lisa Birkman may have fended off a Republican primary opponent in her bid for a second term, but judging from last week's turnout, the county's fledgling Democratic Party could give Birkman and other GOP stalwarts a run for their money in the general election. Birkman collected 2,480 votes to challenger Steve Laukhuf's 2,163. But Precinct 1 Democrat Mike Grimes netted larger numbers than Birkman and Laukhuf combined, with 6,611 votes. (Similarly, Barack Obama and Hillary Clinton each garnered more votes than Republican winner John McCain in this GOP-entrenched county.) As with most contested WilCo political races, the Birkman-Laukhuf contest wasn't pretty. In one debate, for example, Birkman, who has the backing of the GOP party bosses, made personal attacks on her opponent and several times called him a liar. Birkman's main platform was that she had built roads and trails, while Laukhuf countered that of the half-billion dollars allocated for roads during Birkman's term, only a fraction benefited Precinct 1. In his campaign push, which involved visiting 5,000 homes, Laukhuf showcased his community service - he's the current head of the Round Rock Chamber of Commerce - and promised to work toward building bridges between warring factions in the controversy-torn county. But another hurdle for Laukhuf was that a pro-Birkman political website, sponsored by GOP officers, essentially trashed Laukhuf's character and accused him of un-GOP behavior.

Griffin loses to Lotto winner. Lottomillionaire Robert Chody defeated three-time incumbent Precinct 1 Constable Garv Griffin by a vote of 2,500 to 1,923. The Griffin-Chody contest was a study in contrasting personalities. During the campaign, Chody spoke humbly of his family and his faith while trumpeting his support from county officials. Chody ran on a platform of enforcing handicapped parking and underage drinking laws. Griffin also professed a love of God, family, and country but fiercely defended his determination to rid the county of pervasive cronyism and corruption. Griffin, who sued the county after commissioners slashed his budget, had few well-placed allies in the Republican Party. In winning the race, Chody managed to overcome negative publicity surrounding a lawsuit filed against him when he was an Austin Police officer. The suit, filed by the mother of an East Austin teen, alleged that he used excessive force on the teen in a 1998 incident, and he left the Austin Police Department shortly after the city settled. – Patricia J. Ruland



#### Peace at the Tax Assessor?

Given the carpet-bombing nature of his rhetoric against incumbent Nelda Wells Spears, former state Rep. Glen Maxev was positively gracious to her after she shot down his entire squadron with 74% of the vote last week. Ever loyal to the Democrats, Maxey said in a statement that whatever shortcomings he felt Spears had: "I hereby pledge my full support to Ms. Spears and have this race as my number one priority in Travis County. Don Zimmerman [her Republican opponent in the fall] has a long history of political work that few of us could even charitably say has been constructive. ... On just about every issue where I've seen Don Zimmerman take a position, he's been wrong. I intend to help Ms. Spears in every way possible to send him packing."

Maxey also said he intends to continue his Democratic organizing work. "I'm working with the Obama campaign to help him win the maximum number of delegates at the Texas Democratic State Convention." Still, that wasn't quite good enough for ardent Spears supporter Bill Aleshire. In a March 7 reply to the Chronicle Newsdesk blog (austinchronicle. com/newsdesk), the former county judge - and tax assessor previous to Spears - wrote: "You need to know that Glen Maxey has yet to place a phone call to Nelda Spears to congratulate her. Perhaps he realizes that he also owes her an apology for the deceitful campaign he ran against her."

## Muni Filings Race to May under way

Consider the die cast, the Rubicon crossed, the pooch screwed. As of 5pm Monday, March 10, your municipal candidates - for City Council, Austin Community College board, and the Austin Independent School District board sealed their respective fates by applying for a spot on the ballot (or failing to do so). At right is a list of the May 10 candidates: while there are no huge surprises. late-filers popped up in Place 1 and in AISD, 21-year-old Trevor Titman and his platform of relaxed bar hours didn't make the cut in Place 3, and over at ACC, the incumbent board chair decided not to run.

# **New Fed Drug Budget, Same Blindness**

The numbers are in – and, once again, drug treatment and prevention programs are the big losers in the annual federal drug budget. Conversely, and not at all surprisingly, federal funding for narco-interdiction and other programs that focus on drug-supply reduction continue to be the big budget winners.

In other words, new year, same shit - and no progress, especially because supply-reduction is both really expensive and doesn't work very well. If the goal is actually to reduce drug availability and drug use, then wagering on supply-reduction to that purpose is a terrible bet. According to the government's own annual survey of drug use in America, the number of adults who admit to using drugs hasn't changed since 2002. That's right, we're holding steady: Annually, 20% of young adults (that is those 18-25) use drugs, as do 6% of adults 25 and older. (The number of addicts in need of treatment also remains steady, at just more than 22 million.)

But, hey, maybe this time, next year, all those billions in taxpayer funds will finally win the War on Drugs - right. Yet onward through the fog we go.

Among the highlights of President George W. Bush's proposed 2009 drug war spending: the **Drug Enforcement** Administration will receive \$2.2 billion in funding (up from \$1.9 billion in 2007); while \$902 million will go to fund international anti-drug efforts - including \$475 million proposed for the absurdly militaristic Plan Colombia. The plan includes aerial spraying of coca and poppy crops, which is tied to official assurances that the herbicides will be used "in accordance with **Environmental Protection Agency** label requirements." (I wish I were kidding.) To complete the vicious circle, Bush's budget offers a \$50 million bump to expand federal prison capacity.

By bitter contrast, things aren't looking flush for drug treatment and prevention programs. The Substance Abuse & Mental Health Services Administration is facing a \$198 million budget cut (overall, Bush has proposed cutting discretionary spending at the Department of Health & Human Services by \$2.2 billion). The Center for Substance Abuse Treatment is budgeted to lose \$63 million, while the Center for Substance Abuse Prevention would lose \$36 million.

To be fair, Bush's budget does add \$40 million for drug courts (cost-effective programs that divert low-level drug offenders from the criminal justice system); \$56 million for emergency room and other health-care-system-initiated drug screening, "brief intervention," and treatment referrals; and an additional \$98 million to "expand" drug-treatment capacity. These moderate increases sound like progress - until you consider that the prez has also seen fit to allot a whopping \$204 million to fund "abstinence-only" sex education, which has

proven about as effective a public health strategy as cocooning yourself in Saran Wrap against the flu.

#### A SINKING SHIP

The proposed Bush budget again undercuts programs that might actually contribute to better public health - instead perpetuating the practice of treating drug use and addiction as primarily a law enforcement problem best addressed with handcuffs. After nearly 40 years of the War on Drugs, it remains true that simply punishing drug users does nothing to diminish drug use.

Drug-policy expert John Carnevale served in the White House budget office before moving over to the Office of National Drug Control Policy in the late Eighties. For years Carnevale was responsible for composing federal drug policy, including under President Bill Clinton, when he helped shift ONDCP policy toward more emphasis on demand-reduction. Carnevale says the gains made in the Nineties have slipped away under the leadership of current Bush czar John Walters. The prevention and treatment ship, "I think [is] sinking right now," Carnevale says. "I feel like we've gone back 30 years."

In the Eighties, he said, the office heavily emphasized stopping the importation of cocaine, "because we thought that would be the answer. It took awhile, but we learned that as long as there is a demand for illegal drugs, there will be a supply." By the time Clinton became president, there was an attempt to increase treatment and prevention efforts - but those efforts didn't take hold in Congress. Yet focusing primarily on supply-reduction is about as sensible as stoking a campfire with dollar bills.

In a recent policy paper, Carnevale notes that since fiscal year 2002, the federal drug budget has reverted to the Eighties approach, increasingly emphasizing funding for the "least effective ingredients" of drug policy. "For the federal drug control policy to be most effective, it must both be evidence-based and supported by a budget specifically designed to implement it." Carnevale writes. However, in the current decade, the feds have "not funded programs that research suggests would be more effective in reducing drug demand and its associated damaging consequences. Simply stated, the federal drug budget trend runs counter to what research would otherwise suggest is necessary for an effective drug control policy."

#### **MONEY FOR NOTHING**

Drug control policy is made up of five key ingredients: treatment, prevention, law enforcement, interdiction, and "source country" supply-reduction programs (for example, trying to reduce economic reliance on coca growing in Colombia by

helping develop viable agricultural alternatives). "The art of developing the most effective drug policy," Carnevale writes, "involves taking the evidence that research has to offer regarding each of these main ingredients and applying it to come up with the best" budget mix.

Which of the five ingredients does research suggest are the "truly most effective" elements of drug policy? If you said "treatment and prevention," you are now, officially, smarter than your government. Carnevale's review of federal drug-policy funding since Fiscal Year 2002 reflects that government spending has overwhelmingly emphasized the funding of the least effective policy ingredients. Funding for interdiction – programs that seek to stop drugs from entering the country - increased 100% from FY 2002 to FY 2009, from about \$1.9 billion to \$3.8 billion; funding for international source-country supply-reduction programs increased nearly 50%; and funding for domestic drugwar law enforcement grew by 31%. Conversely, spending for treatment (and treatment research) has grown by just 22%, while funding for drug-use prevention programs (and prevention research) has actually declined by more than 24%. Overall, funding for supply-reduction programs is up 57% since FY 2002, while demand-reduction funding has increased just 3%. Indeed, supply-reduction programs eat up more than two-thirds of the entire federal drug policy budget.

Carnevale remains hopeful that things may change - once Bush leaves office and Walters is out the door. Carnevale's goal now, he said, is to be more vocal about the way things could be: "Realizing that this administration is leaving, I am trying to say things to get the next administration thinking about what to do about drug policy," he said last week. But "there's no silver bullet in this business," he said. "We've all learned that."

## Frontera Residents Blast 'Frankenfence'

As Democratic precinct caucus results trickle in from all along the Texas-Mexico border, a couple of things beyond candidate preferences are becoming clear: Hatred of the federal government's planned fence/wall hybrid for the region is bipartisan, and it stretches in patches all the way from the Gulf of Mexico to the New Mexico border. Democratic and Republican party leaders in Cameron, Starr, Webb. and Presidio counties, as well as a Sierra Club Rio Grande chapter leader in the El Paso and Brewster County areas, confirmed this week that voters in their precincts passed anti-wall resolutions. That sentiment could possibly filter upward, as Texas will hold its county and district conventions on March 29, at which point precinct delegates will vote on the resolutions.

"[I'm] 99.9 percent sure the county will pass a resolution opposing the border wall. ... I don't know of an individual that supports it ... not from South Texas, at least," said Cameron Co. Democratic Party Chair Gilberto Hinojosa. "We value our relationship with Mexico. It's a slap in the face to that relationship. Not only is it a bad idea in that respect; it's an environmental disaster."

The resolutions that pass will go to the Democratic and Republican state conventions - June 6-7 in Austin and June 12-14 in Houston, respectively – where both parties' resolutions committees will vote on them, followed by the entire conventions. Logically, the process will become more unpredictable away from the border. Any resolutions that do get approved by



their state conventions, however, will be incorporated into the parties' state platforms, making them national-convention bound - although there the odds of adoption get much longer. The Democratic National Convention is Aug. 25-28 in Denver; Republicans gather Sept. 1-4 in Minneapolis. - Cheryl Smith

#### ANTI-BORDER WALL RESOLUTIONS

El Paso Co. (El Paso area): Two Democratic precincts approved resolutions calling for a moratorium on construction.

#### **CHOOSING A VEEP**

The nation's political pundits have spent weeks trying to tell us who will be the presidential nominees. From the lowa caucuses forward, however, these Beltway prognosticators have been proven wrong again and again, but that is not stopping them from turning to the next major political question facing America: Who will be the vice presidential nominees?

Back in the 1930s, Vice President John Nance Garner described the office as "not worth a bucket of warm piss." Since then though, the No. 2 has shown an ability to be the de facto No. 1. For example, the present incumbent. Buckshot Cheney, not only chose himself to be the VP after serving as head of George W.'s search committee, but he even asserts that his office is not a part of the executive, legislative, or judicial branches the vice presidency, he claims, is its own branch of government!

So pundits are on the prowl, trying to be the first to uncover the next Dan Quayle. There are obvious suggestions, such as Huckabee or McCain. But, does a McHuck ticket really sing? Better yet, let's have a national lottery. Anyone who can comb their own hair pretty much meets the qualifications for VP. Besides, here's a chance for just a regular American to get a seat at the table. That's more likely to improve the national political dynamic than anyone the pundits can name.

#### THE DELIBERATE DECEIT OF DRUG ADS

Four out of five doctors recommend you not believe any advertising that makes claims based on the opinions of four out of five doctors. Or, for that matter, ads based on the opinions of even one well-known doctor.

Take Dr. Robert Jarvik, one of the pioneers in the development of the artificial heart. You might have seen him on TV throughout the past couple of years touting the healing power of Lipitor, a cholesterol drug made by Pfizer. The pharmaceutical giant has paid the doctor \$1.3 million to shill for the drug. In one of the ads, Jarvik is depicted as an athletic rower, skimming in his boat across a mountain lake. The implication is that he is full of vigor, thanks to the cholesterol-clearing power of Lipitor. Jarvik's endorsement of the drug oozes credibility - until you realize a few facts not mentioned in this \$250 million ad campaign. One, that's not Jarvik rowing so robustly across the lake. It's a stuntman posing as the doctor, who apparently doesn't row at all. Second, while Jarvik touts the cardiovascular benefits of Lipitor, he is not a cardiologist. And, even though he has a medical degree, he is not licensed to practice medicine. What he is is a marketable medical name, having been, as the ad put it, the "inventor of the artificial heart."

Oh, and that's the third hickey on Jarvik's testimonial. He is not the inventor. A large team at the University of Utah worked on the heart device back in the early 1980s, and they credit two others as deserving of the "inventor" honor - not Jarvik.

A top Pfizer executive says the corporation regrets that the ad led to any "misimpressions." But that's exactly what this direct-toconsumer ad campaign was designed to do. Drug companies spend some \$5 billion a year on ads to "misimpress" us - and it's time to rein in their deceit.

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## **Biodiesel Industry Fumes Over State's Heavy Hand**

Has the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality finally found an industry it doesn't like?

The entrepreneurs who built Texas' biodiesel industry believe so. They began feeling the heat Jan. 1, when the TCEQ imposed the most complex and specific emissions-related standards in the nation on popular blends of biodiesel and petroleum diesel. The new rules, which preceded action by the federal government and even air-quality-obsessed California, rendered many blends either illegal or economically unviable for local retailers. Austin-area suppliers view the TCEQ's actions as a hypocritical counterattack on a fledgling industry in an oil-dominated energy world - especially after the agency largely ignored air-quality consequences in rubber-stamping permits for five new coal power plants since 2005.

At issue is the TCEQ's Texas Low Emission Diesel rule, or TxLED. It was introduced in 2005 to limit nitrogen oxide (NOx) emissions, a central ingredient in smog pollution in 110 counties (including Travis). The rule requires that biodiesel/petrol diesel blends emit no more NOx than TxLED-approved diesel (a slightly cleaner burning formulation of regular diesel).

To market blends legally, producers must fund costly testing at accredited labs - using standards they say are antiquated - to demonstrate NOx reductions. Since 2005, the TCEO has twice delayed TxLED's compliance deadline for the biodiesel industry, while studies by the EPA and the Deptartment of Energy have reached conflicting conclusions on biodiesel and NOx.

"There is quite a bit of evidence that biodiesel does increase NOx," said Morris Brown, a TCEQ technical specialist for the TxLED program. "To the TCEQ, this is an air-quality issue versus a renewable-fuel issue." Two biodiesel blends have met TxLED approval - a B20 blend (20% biodiesel, 80% petrol diesel) that employs a chemical additive to reduce NOx and a B5/TxLED diesel blend.

For retailers, such as locally owned Signature Austin Shell stations (which partnered with Austin Biofuels in 2006 to offer B20 at 31 stations), the cost was too high, and Signature sells only a B5 blend. Austin Biofuels and DieselGreen Fuels have focused on selling high blends like B99. A 50 cent-\$1 IRS blending rebate helped them offer competitive pricing, but no B99 additive has vet been approved by the TCEO. Local indie suppliers are doubtful they can turn a profit using an additive and are uncertain customers will pay nearly \$5 per gallon for pure biodiesel without the IRS credit.

"I'm now in a desperate bid to save my business," said Jason Burroughs, DieselGreen's managing partner. "The

whole TxLED issue is a comedy of errors. ... Biodiesel use has been mandated by Congress, meanwhile TCEQ is handcuffing us." He argued that TCEQ test criteria simulates unrealistic engine loads, which result in more NOx, and that emissions features in newer vehicles nullify supposed NOx increases. Burroughs recently decided to sell a B99.99 blend as B100 (pure biodiesel), supported by a written opinion he solicited from the comptroller's office - a move that could prove pivotal for the

statewide industry, B99.99 still qualifies for the IRS blending credit, although he contends that its composition doesn't differ fundamentally from B100 as far as the TCEO is concerned.

Jeff Plowman, co-founder of Austin Biofuels and treasurer of the Biodiesel Coalition of Texas, said the group is in "shock and disarray" over the TxLED rule. Skyrocketing costs for common feedstocks like sovbean and cottonseed oil have also impacted the industry causing at least three of Texas' 10 plants to halt production, shrinking supplies. And Plowman stressed that the federal government didn't direct the TCEO to include biodiesel in its diesel regulations.

Pressed to explain the biodiesel rule's origin, Brown said the decision "fell under the purview of the executive director's office and the office of the chief engineer." Concerns that policies from TCEQ Executive Director Glenn Shankle's office are more political than scientific are nothing new. Last year, Shankle issued an unusual memo actually arguing against his staff that more, not less, NOx emissions should be permitted from the Oak Grove power plant, which is expected to be among the dirtiest power plants in the U.S. "It's very disappointing that the TCEQ is targeting such a niche industry while giving a pass to coal plants," Burroughs said. Plowman noted that in-state biodiesel sales last year totaled 20 million gallons, compared to 13

> billion gallons of petrol diesel sold. Bob Okamoto, an air-pollution specialist for the California Air Resources Board, said California doesn't currently regulate biodiesel NOx emissions but that the state agency is beginning an expansive study to quantify biodiesel's emissions compared to California's state-mandated ultra-low-emissions petroleum diesel formula. Okamoto agreed that previous tests yielded "conflicting data" on NOx.

Earlier this month, Gov. Rick Perry awarded a \$4 million grant to a Texas

A&M-related program to develop algae-based biodiesel, something the city of Austin has also expressed interest in. "If there's no first generation of biodiesel to prove the concept, there will be no second generation to test its sustainability," Burroughs said, referring to the development of new feedstocks that don't compete with cooking oils or encourage tropical deforestation like the palm-oil-based biodiesel sold widely in Europe. "No one will make the first generation of algae biofuels if there's no market for biodiesel today," he said. 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


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
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

# If You Believe in Villa Muse, Clap Your Hands

Last week, the Austin City Council delivered an unwelcome rejection to Villa Muse - the grandiose entertainment-industry complex (with its own New Urbanist small town) proposed for a 2.000-acre site in eastern Travis County. In a 4-3 vote, council turned down the developer's request for some very special treatment: a "temporary" release from the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction and from its development and environmental oversight.

Was that decision wise or expensively shortsighted? Is Villa Muse economic manna from heaven or too good to be true?

Council directed staff to come back within five weeks with a counterproposal, one that would accommodate the project but keep it within the city's extraterritorial jurisdiction. But Paul Alvarado-Dykstra, a local film producer serving as the project's vice president for strategic development, said competitive time pressures make the project simply untenable if it's subject to Austin's extraterritorial jurisdiction. The homegrown development team – Austinites who say they prefer to keep their project in Austin - announced Friday that Villa Muse now will begin negotiating with other Texas cities.

"We'd be very disappointed to have to take this outside the greater Austin area," said Alvarado-Dykstra. "But we're committed to moving forward in Texas, and our goal remains to break ground this year. Right now, the odds do not favor Austin."

He believes Austin would kick itself for losing Villa Muse. The development team proposes to privately finance and build an infrastructure worth \$2.5 billion - without direct public subsidies - that eventually would be annexed by the city of Austin. That represents a potentially juicy addition to the tax base, indeed. A developer-commissioned economic development study projects that Villa Muse could generate up to \$20 billion annually in Central Texas spending while adding up to 110,000 desirable jobs. The proposed studio

and full-spectrum production center (for the movie, music, gaming, interactive, animation. and advertising industries) represents precisely the kind of "creative class" growth that the city, the Greater Austin Chamber of Commerce, and many locals fervently desire.

Villa Muse is thinking big, big, big. Conceptual sketches show 1,100 of the 2,000 acres being sustainably developed (in phases, potentially over decades) with 1,850,000 square feet of top-notch facilities, 9,300 residences, a mixed-use "main street district," even schools, a hospital, and helipads. But in small print at www.villamuse.com is this key disclaimer: "All details approximate and subject to change."

In part, doubts about the grandiose scale of the unproven project discouraged some council members from bending over backward to accommodate its demands for a hasty decision. "There are times when we, as council members, feel like we are being threatened with deadlines and proposals," noted Mike Martinez, who nonetheless spoke in favor of the project and voted against the resolution to keep it in the extraterritorial jurisdiction. Council members have grown weary of developers who claim a state of emergency as a tactic to pressure council for hasty variances.

"No one could assure me that we could ever get that land back into our ETJ, let alone inside our future city limits," said Mayor Will Wynn. "The lack of environmental regulation, and then potentially compromising our utilization of Austin Energy's tract to its east, forced my 'no' vote."

Alvarado-Dykstra countered with frustration that council and staff had known of the ETJrelease request since last October. On Jan. 31, council promised Villa Muse an answer by March 6. But last week, the still-undefined nature of the complex private project - for which no business plan or financial pro forma has been provided to the city - and the many unknowns represented by an ETJ-release killed the resolution to move forward. In the end, only Sheryl Cole and Brewster McCracken joined Martinez in voting to approve Villa Muse's terms.

Among other cities to which Villa Muse has talked is Bastrop. "We certainly would welcome them!" said Joe Newman, president and **CEO of the Bastrop Economic Development** Corporation. The town is aggressively pursuing movies growth - and it's far less picky than Austin about the fine points. Asked how far discussions have gone. Newman laughed. "I wish I could talk to you about that!" Villa Muse is not officially disclosing the other cities it's pursuing. But Alvarado-Dykstra conceded that both Bastrop and Fort Worth are "very interesting." Said Newman, "We're looking forward to talking to them some more."

The scale of Villa Muse - and its projected \$300 million debt to private investors - would put it under tremendous financial pressure to attract a huge volume of business right away. Some observers question whether the required level of entertainment business would move to Austin, forsaking established industry centers like Los Angeles and New York. Gaining state-of-the-art facilities would certainly help, but Texas remains hampered by its lack of competitive incentives at the state level. (We've reportedly lost some 20% of our movie business to Louisiana and New Mexico, which compensate productions for 25% of their local spending; Alvarado-Dykstra believes a sufficiently competitive 15% incentive will pass the next Lege.) If Villa Muse got partially built, then failed, council could live to regret its loss of development and environmental controls - and setting a bad precedent for ETJ-release demands from other developers along State Highway 130. As state Rep. Mike Krusee put it, we could feel like River City being taken in by the Music Man.

But Alvarado-Dykstra is exasperated by such doubts: "If this doesn't happen, what does Austin lose? Nothing. Right now, the land's a cow pasture that's generating no jobs or revenues." He added. "There's a lot of money coming into Austin right now. A lot! Why not consider the possibility that extraordinary things could happen here?'



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# **Fishing for Change**

#### Hightower and DeMarco on the powers that ought to be

Life is more fun when you're swimming

That's one lesson to be learned from Swim Against the Current: Even a Dead Fish Can Go With the Flow, the latest book from Austin's populist agitator Jim Hightower (and longtime Chronicle columnist) and his longtime collaborator, co-organizer, and life partner, Susan DeMarco. Released this week, Swim is the first of Hightower's six books for which DeMarco gets an author credit ("with" Susan DeMarco), and the initial concept for the book was in fact hers.

"People are always asking us," she said last week, "how do you two always stay so positive? It's because we know all these stories. So we asked ourselves, 'Couldn't we write a book that tells all these stories?"

The stories of Swim Against the Current are gathered from Hightower's travels all over the country, watching, supporting, or joining various efforts to make positive political and social change, or, as Hightower likes to put it, working against the "powers-that-be" (corporate and political elites) and in favor of the "powersthat-ought-to-be" (regular working people, everyday citizens). "We have learned literally hundreds of these stories," said DeMarco, "and the most difficult part was simply winnowing them down into those that would fit and make sense in a single book. We could have written a whole book of Austin stories alone.'

DeMarco persuaded Hightower that a book should be built upon those stories, organized here broadly into three categories: business. politics, and life. Under the business rubric, the book recounts the story of the Minneapolisbased fair-trade coffee cooperative organized by "a terrific organization with the wonky name of Institute for Agriculture and Trade Policy" and follows that with tales of organic farms, groundbreaking microlenders, grassroots health-care operations (Hidalgo County), a unionized co-op taxicab company (Madison, Wis.), and so on. Under politics, the Oregon Bus Project, an innovative progressive outreach effort to rural areas and small towns, begins changing the face (and faces) of state politics. Life reaches most globally, noticing in particular the story of one evangelical minister, the Rev. Rich Cizik, who has broken with the fundamentalist orthodoxy on environmentalism and global warming and is accordingly breaking down the lines between previously polarized communities.

That quick summation only scrapes the surface of the book, which is an encyclopedia of exhortation, complete with section-ending "connections" listing numerous organizations all over the country for newly inspired readers to ... connect. "The people we highlight," the authors write, "are not only enriching their lives, but creating a new, deeply democratic model for America, edging our country back onto the long road toward egalitarianism and the common good. Join them!'

#### **Tomatoes and Armadillos**

Hightower and Associates, the local headquarters for all this enthusiasm, is now located in an elegantly converted early 20th century Nazarene church on San Marcos Street, just east of I-35 and south of Cesar Chavez. The former sanctuary is now a big, open, sunlightfilled main office, with a decorative fountain where once stood the altar. In the rear is a warren of remodeled offices, and beyond the big informal garden is what must have once been the rectory. We talked at one of the long wooden tables that center the main hall.

Hightower, 65, and DeMarco, a year younger, have been co-workers since the early Seventies, when they met in D.C. at the Agribusiness Accountability Project, which Hightower had co-founded as one of the various "Nader-like" (DeMarco called them) groups springing up at the time. Their first project together turned into Hard Tomatoes, Hard Times, Hightower's first book, an analysis of the failures of landgrant colleges to share the wealth in agriculture. ("Hard tomatoes" get a cameo in Swim, as exemplary of the abuse of agricultural research to benefit corporate agribusiness at the expense of small farmers and consumers.) Hightower, who at first had gone to D.C. in the staff of Sen. Ralph Yarborough, returned to Austin in 1976 to edit The Texas Observer. A skeptical



DeMarco tagged along. "I once made a northeastener's mistake of describing Austin as 'a real good two-year town," she recalls. "It took me a long time to live that down."


They soon became a familiar item around town, personally and politically, working together on his campaigns, first for railroad commissioner and then for agriculture commissioner (elected 1982; defeated by Rick Perry in 1990) and on various projects, in and out of office. In addition to the books, says Hightower, "My biggest success is 'The Hightower Lowdown,'" a monthly political newsletter with a national circulation of 125,000. Together Hightower and DeMarco represent and promote an almost personal brand of grassroots populism, distinguished by his ubiquitous 10-gallon hat and the social values the two authors celebrate: "fairness, justice, equal opportunity, stewardship, democracy." The whole of it is characterized by a cracker-barrel, cornball humor that still plays broadly after all these years.


The titles carry the jokes and the purpose: Hard Tomatoes, Hard Times (1972); If the Gods Had Meant Us to Vote They Would Have Given Us Candidates (2001); Thieves in High Places: They've Stolen Our Country and It's Time to Take It Back (2003); Let's Stop Beating Around the Bush (2004); and not to forget the 1997 grandaddy that really distinguished the Hightower brand: There's Nothing in the Middle of the Road but Yellow Stripes and Dead Armadillos. DeMarco says Armadillos still delights their current publishers at John Wiley & Sons, so they were told to come up with something similar. "We must have gone through 50 animal titles - bears? coyotes? wolves? - before we found this one." The cover features the two authors up to their waists in splashing water amidst a crowd of Austinites and a couple of flying fish provided by the art director - although Hightower swears the base image is an actual photo taken in Barton Creek, just above the Barton Springs dam.

"This book is different," says Hightower. "There's less of my usual anti-corporate screeds - although there's plenty of that in there. The focus here, as DeMarco framed the idea, is that we've been meeting all these people across the country, and there is just a lot of progressive work being done that is not being addressed, or even talked about, in the corporate media. We saw this book as an opportunity to tell some of those stories."

DeMarco says that the first problem became winnowing all the stories into a usable, readable book - "You don't want it to be Pollyannish, and you don't want it to be just a list" - so they worked to find a balance between long, illustrative narratives of major projects and shorter tales in the same general vein. "We're sort of opposite, day-and-night people," DeMarco said, "so Hightower would write a section and get it typed up by afternoon, and then I would pick it up in the evening and edit and rewrite and add notes

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
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– and something like, 'Don't panic when you see all the remarks.'" And so it went, until they had a manuscript they believed told the story.

"The hardest part was getting it short enough," says Hightower. You wouldn't believe the amount of material we had to leave out," echoes DeMarco. "We had reams of material on progressive publications, and in the end we just couldn't cover all that."

#### Riding the Wave

In the end, the book provides plenty of fodder for the coauthors' inveterate political optimism, and their renewed sense that the country is changing for the better - as they say is currently embodied in the presidential campaign of Barack Obama, whom Hightower officially endorsed just before the Texas primary. "I think the country is changing," Hightower insisted, "and the sudden political expression right now of the Obama campaign shows that the change has been there all along. ... This yearning for change is pretty broad in the public, and yet it never has any support from our media, politics, or education."

DeMarco is quick to add that she sees the Obama campaign as more a reflection of the change than its instigator. "Obama is an expression of this movement in the country," she says. "People were disappointed and angry that they threw the Republicans out of Congress [in 2006], because of the war in Iraq, and yet the war didn't end. But they didn't give up. They've taken that anger and tried to turn it into something positive.'

"All we're saying," argues Hightower, "is that there's another way. And the Obama campaign is not the wave - the Obama campaign is riding the wave."

DeMarco and Hightower consider their book another attempt to record, spread, and sustain that wave, one they say must continue not just for a campaign, or a year, but for decades. "That's life," said DeMarco. "These things don't just happen overnight."

"It doesn't happen in any one election," continues Hightower. "It takes generations to make these changes." And they don't claim that such rebellious transformations are easy, as they write in Swim Against the Current's coda: "As you've seen from the folks in our book, alternative paths have their own potholes. But they also open up exciting and enriching possibilities. And just being able to wriggle free of the traps and fetters of the imperious corporate order is its own joyous reward. So, cut loose a little, dare the dangerous, and take a chance on that glorious, uproarious human spirit that is within each of us.'

## There Has to Be a Better Way'

Chris Johnson is a 35-year-old pharmacist in Austin, Texas. He had worked for nearly a decade in chainstore pharmacies and was doing well, pulling down nearly \$100,000 a year and gliding along an upward career path. But, he said. "It made me sick to my stomach."

He was sickened by the outrageous prices being charged and by the burden this put on folks who had no insurance coverage, and he had this to say


"These drugs are bankrupting people. I saw too many instances where people had to make hard decisions between keeping on the electricity and keeping their hearts in the right rhythm. Too many instances of patients walking away from the counter because of the simple fact that they could not afford their medications. And my hands were tied by the corporations for whom I worked. I couldn't lower the prices for these people, even though I knew how much the drugs really cost us and that the profit margins were obscene."

Another sickening factor was that he did this twelve hours a day, putting in six-day weeks. Yeah, there was a nice paycheck, but he came home to a dark house every night, with all of his family asleep. He barely saw his wife, Bryna, and their two sons. Inside the corporate system, he could neither do what he wanted to do nor be who he wanted to be. "There has to be a better way," Chris said to himself at the time.

And now there is, because he created one. In April 2005, Johnson opened what he calls "our unique little pharmacy," naming it MedSavers.

Unique, indeed. "Now," said Johnson, "I'm back doing what I went into pharmacy to do - helping people." MedSavers caters to those who have no health insurance or whose meager plans don't

cover the cost of prescriptions. He dramatically lowers the prices for his customers by selling only generic drugs and by cutting overhead to the bare-bones level. He and Arturo Herrera, a medical technician, are the only full-time employees. Plus - and it's a big plus -MedSavers does not deal with insurance corporations, so Johnson saves time and money, and agony by not having to wrestle with the paperwork of those enormous, nay-saying bureaucracies.



Even though this is only one small pharmacy, with none of the wholesale buying clout of, say, the five-thousandstore Walgreens chain, MedSavers delivers serious savings, typically charging only half as much as the big boys do.

Johnson noted that he sells 90 capsules of the generic version of Prozac for \$15.80, while CVS charges \$58.99 for the same thing. "I could add another \$20 on my price and customers would still think it's a good deal, but I'd be getting the same mind-set as the chains.

There's a business model of 'charge as much as you can,' but I like the business model of 'charge a fair price' - what you need to keep yourself in business and take care of your family. I'm all for making a profit - and we do - but I have a problem with obscene profits, whether it's a pharmaceutical company, a retail drugstore, or a shoe-repair shop."

The price that Chris pays for ethics is that he no longer makes \$100,000 a year. "But, you know, people don't really need as much as they think they do," he said. "It's a matter of aligning your work with your values."


Even though he works hard, Johnson deliberately set the hours of the pharmacy at ten to six on weekdays and nine to two on Saturday, so that he and his employees can have a life. "I can now have breakfast every morning with our two boys, and I'm home in time for dinner and bedtime with them," Johnson explained.

Also, work itself is more of a pleasure. He's come to know the people he serves, not by their prescription numbers but by name. He shoots the breeze with them, learns about them and their families, and builds community right into his business.

Then there's the satisfaction of knowing that your work matters. MedSavers not only has customers, but ones who are deeply appreciative that someone gives a damn whether they can get the medicines they need at an affordable price. "To go home and feel I made a difference in somebody's life is a huge, huge thing," said Johnson, beaming.

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# Love Is a Dog From Hell

A fantastic tabla drummer. Marcus Wise (check him out, and see for yourself if he ain't fantastic) cut red paper into a heart and wrote upon it: "Love Is a Dog From Hell." Then he tied string to that red-paper heart and hung it around my neck. No, he wasn't making a pass, and it wasn't Valentine's Day. Marcus just thought I should wear that truth around my neck, and I did, in a public situation, for the remainder of the evening. (It hangs as we speak from a doorknob in my apartment.) Neither Marcus nor I could guess, at the time, that in 2008 Jo Carol Pierce would release her first album in 12 years, Dog of Love, addressing in song those very truths and issues which Marcus hung around my neck, to which she added inflatable dolls, carnivals, cars, drunken rain, nudity, barbed wire, a baby smiling over her mother's shoulder as Mama's on the cell phone, prayer, a rock in one's shoe, the nature of truth, and the Blessed Virgin Mary Magdalene. For instance:

Parts of Dog of Love are spoken, and in "Criminal Thinking" Jo Carol says: "That night I dreamed a new grammar rule: Any personal pronoun could be replaced with the phrase 'a pair of your panties.' The example given was: 'A pair of your panties just robbed that liquor store."

Wearing a "Love Is a Dog From Hell" heart would hardly impress a woman who did this bit, expressed in dialogue on Jo Carol's album Bad Girls Upset by the Truth (on many a Top 10 list in 1995). The guy (David Halley) says, "Jo Carol, I heard you drove through the Hi Dee Ho take-out window naked today after school!" High-school-age Jo Carol answers: "Oh, God, I'm so relieved! I was afraid I'd made that whole thing up in my head and was turnin' out crazy like Mama. ... I'm so relieved that somebody besides me thinks that happened!"

Dog of Love (spoken by female people who are maybe 7 years old): "We're carnival girls even when there's no carnival."

There's often no carnival. But a real carnival girl doesn't let that stop her, which is a problem Jo Carol's dealt with the hard way (same

wistful "Naked and Home" tells the story of more married carnival gals than I know how to count: "Took my vows and went to sleep/ so deep so I could keep them. ... Naked and home/I find you in the music. ... I'm naked and home/in a world of my own/with you." How many carnival girls have had to put themselves into a waking sleep to keep their wedding vows? Jo Carol's song makes how many husbands shiver?

Now we need the take of a woman, the writer Jazmin Aminian Jordán - knocked out by Dog of Love, she wrote an e-mail to Jo Carol, copied to me: "All your songs are NAKED and I listen to you sing and I can't believe Eve ever wanted to put clothes on. And something inside it all tells me Eve's God is alright with her having other boyfriends cuz you sing and make music that goes back before woman was virgin or mother, wife, angel or queen - this is music that is before wild. ... It's woman waking up with Dog-of-Love ability, the see-you-in-me ability, it's woman that sings east, west and smack inside of Eden. It's a woman who knows the ins and outs of Paradise that can write music like this. Ending with 'Barb Wire Crown' is perfect - who else but the Blessed Virgin Mary Magdalene can hold all the shattering after Mary has shattered too?"

You need to hear Dog of Love to make sense of that, but, believe me, Jaz talks true.

How's this for "Love Is a Dog From Hell" paradox? From *Dog of Love*'s contemplative "You're So True": "You're so true/not that you don't lie, you do/But you're like a door always flying open/You're so true/like a story in a book/for truth mistook/though it probably never happened/Truer than true/as opposed to/ the merely agreed upon."

This woman should be a legend. Among some of us, she is - and has been for years. There was a "Jo Carol" in my mind before I ever met her, instilled in me by many a story told by mutual friends. Surely she's had one of the stranger careers in music. For instance, she didn't exactly participate in her first album, though that album won the Austin Music Awards' Album of the Year in 1992, when she also won Best Songwriter. The album was Across the Great Divide: Songs of Jo Carol Pierce, on which (except as songwriter) Jo Carol herself is absent. Led by Michael Hall, Austin musicians rallied 'round Io Carol and cut an album of her stuff. Some of those artists were famous (Terry Allen, Joe Ely), some weren't but deserve to be (Lisa Mednick, David Halley), and many are forgotten now; even though the album displays many styles and conceptions, its remarkable consistency results from Jo Carol's unique style.

Her rhythms, timbres, and shadings are pure Americana, especially when delivered in her

music says: Go the

distance, baby, and

find out - find you.

breathy, sexy Texas accent. Melodically, however, Jo Carol takes big risks (like she does in most things): She'll sing long lines of many syllables, or short lines of clipped syllables, which don't always scan but always work. Melodically, in many songs her clos-

est equivalents are European art and cabaret music, as in Bertolt Brecht and Kurt Weill or Jacques Brel or even (amazingly) Noël Coward. I don't know if she's listened to these people, but sometimes she writes in forms they use.

From Across the Great Divide, as sung by Michael Hall: "Heaven on earth was made in a minute/but anything can happen in it/Heaven comes and goes/When I'm living in heaven, sometimes I know/that hell's as close as my own shadow."

Often she doesn't exactly sing a song - she does a song. It's just as good.

Her second album was 1995's Bad Girls Upset by the Truth. A spoken-word, sungfrom-the-core, spiritual-sexual, coming-of-age account of a daring woman realizing herself in Lubbock, Austin, and points unknown (unknown, that is, to the rest of us – until Jo Carol explains). For instance:

"Loose Diamonds": "And I know that God means well/Will you please tell Him/I've been to paradise/and I'm amazed that I survived."

"I Blame God": "He's the only one original enough to make a mess like this/and even He can't clean it up/I didn't do this by myself/I had divine assistance/You'd have to be a deity to be this mean/You know that's just not me.'

And the song with one of the best song titles ever, "Vaginal Angel": "Prepare a place for another bad girl/to grow up and do what bad girls do/They give their bodies to the

Give her the almost-last words: "Holy nights like this/are meant for burning down.'


Burning down to what? What Jo Carol's music says is: Go the distance, baby, and find out - find vou.



Krachey, Ivan Lozano, Rell Ohlson, Jill Pangallo, Corkey Sinks, Laura Turner, Kate Watson, Lee Webster, and Jamie Wentz came together to make a compilation DVD of shorts they had made, ironically titled Failure. The DVD cover looks like a self-help instructional tape that you would find at a thrift store, the title in big, bold yellow letters communicating that maybe this tape could help you overcome

Like any mixtape, Failure contains pieces that you want to keep rewinding and ones you want to fast-forward through. Each video has a tinge of loneliness in it, with characters who are presented as removed from the rest of their environment or in their own constructed narrative/reality. Most of the videos actually have the maker as the main performer, which allows the shorts to be read as part documentation of a performance and part video short.

Lozano's "21st Century Machines: A Technodrama for Future Generations" happens to be the most cinematic of the group and is much more a surreal narrative construction about what the planet would be like with male-bodied machines. The voice-over and space-age sound transport your imagination into Lozano's proposed future. Pangallo's kitschy video/performance was filmed in Paris, where she wanders the streets trying to give out "free hugs" - although her T-shirt could also be translated as "free intercourse." The performance really reads like an SNL skit, except the sincerity of her outfit and expression makes you really feel bad for the character. Pangallo doesn't receive any hugs from strangers, and most people give her the look of some awkward individual they are somewhat afraid to go near. I found Watson and Webster's collaboration combining animation, performance, and narrative to be one of the most compelling. The two, dressed up as men with large mustaches, narrate the story of two men going down the river on a steamboat. The use of sound and paper animation creates a well-crafted video short. In the spirit of saving the best for last, Wentz films herself as an American Idol contestant who gets rejected and proceeds to cry after she hears the news. Shot against a green screen, Wentz superimposes herself over the contestant re-enacting her awful performance. How fitting that the final video shows such a literal failure.

As a cohesive themed DVD, Failure falls a little flat. While some of the videos are rather intriguing in their exploration of failure, others don't really fit into the theme. However, it's a valiant first effort for the Video Bee, and as a sampler of video art being made in Austin and an idea for a collective, this could not have come at a better time. AVB has the potential to become an integral part of Austin's growing arts community. - Rachel Cook

**Austin V-Day** 

#### Victory over violence with the 'Vagina' and its author, Eve

If you've ever known a woman or a girl who has been a victim of violence, or vou're ever worried about a woman or a girl you know being a victim of violence, or you've hated the thought of violence being perpetrated against women or girls, whether you've known them or not, keep reading. V-Day is coming and with it a chance for you to join the campaign to end violence against women.

V-Day is one of those annual events where folks all over the world take part in the same event in their individual communities as a way of focusing attention on a global effort in a global way. With V-Day, it's the fight to stop violence against women and girls, whether that means rape, battery, incest, female genital mutilation, or sexual slavery and whether it's in the U.S., Europe, the Middle East, Asia, Africa, or any other corner of the globe. It arose in part from the phenomenal response to The Vagina Monologues and the realization on the part of playwright Eve Ensler that she could use that lever to move the world. She worked with Feminist.com, an organization also concerned with violence against women, to produce special performances of The Vagina Monologues that would benefit organizations working to end violence against women. Choosing Valentine's Day as an apt spot on the calendar to coordinate these benefit shows, they gave birth to V-Day - the "V" stands for Valentine, Vagina, and Victory.

Over the last decade, V-Day events have raised more than \$6 million, and in 2007, more than 1,150 communities around the world hosted V-Day benefits. For this year's 10th anniversary, Ensler is visiting 20 communities across the nation to take part in their local V-Day events, and Austin is one of

the fortunate cities. For the local V-Day event this Friday, March 14, she will not only speak about the V-Day vision; she'll also read a new monologue written especially for Austin. Local organizers have cho-

sen to draw special attention to women in the U.S. military who have been sexually abused by their fellow soldiers. To that end, taking part in the event will be retired Col. Ann Wright, coauthor of the book Dissent: Voices of Conscience; April Fitzsimmons, former Air Force intelligence analyst and author of the play The Need to Know; the Rev. (Capt.) Dorothy Mackey, founder of the organization Survivors Take Action Against Abuse by Military Personnel; Sara Rich, mother of Suzanne Swift, who endured sexual harassment

while serving in Iraq; and actress Liz Mikel, from the cast of the TV series Friday Night Lights. The program begins at 6pm with musical performances by Carolyn Wonderland and Patrice Pike, followed by The Vagina Monologues at 7:30pm.

All profits from the Austin V-Day event will benefit the Service Women's Action Network, a group providing support for military servicewomen and women considering military service; the Settlement Home for Children, which provides 27 beds for girls ages 7 to 17 in need of 24-hour therapeutic care; and the Katrina Warriors Network, a diverse body of individuals, affinities, organizations, and institutions supporting the well-being of women and girls in New Orleans and the Gulf South.

Think about all the violence out there, then think about one day when you can help stop it. Join the "V." - Robert Faires

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
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## Show and Sell

#### Austin art is getting national buzz, but is anybody buying it?

Austin is a city proud of its talents and wares, and we try to buy accordingly. There are many among us who take a kind of twisted pride in spending our last dollar on concert tickets or music by local musicians. Food from local farms, coffee from local coffeehouses, clothes from local designers - the prevailing attitude is that it's all cooler, tastes better, and is good for the local economy, not to mention the culture. Shouldn't the same go for art? Is it too much to ask to enter someone's house - or new condo Downtown – and want to see local artists or galleries represented on the walls?

After all, the energy generated by Austin galleries and artists over the last few years has grown from cool hum to high-frequency buzz. The East Austin Studio Tour, started by three young artists six years ago, has become one of the most popular art events in town. It was a group of Austinites (from Bolm Studios, Camp Fig, Gallery Lombardi, Eastside Coop, and the Dougherty Arts Center) that launched the Texas Biennial, a multiple-gallery show of emerging Lone Star contemporary artists. Okay Mountain, a nine-member art co-op, has managed to pool resources and bring in artists from Tokyo and Egypt, run a store, and publish first-rate books of their members' tag-team drawings. Austin Art Alliance's Art Talk Austin, a series of discussions by

artists, collectors, and curators, has helped people learn more about art-collecting. The visual-arts scene has seen better-attended openings; friendlier relations among artists, galleries, and museums; and a larger and more involved public.

Even the national media has noticed. A December 2007 article in Art in America, "Report From Austin: Art by Southwest," suggested that the visual arts might no longer be this city's neglected child, outshined by our longstanding love for music and film. Earlier in the year, readers of AmericanStyle Magazine voted Austin eighth best art destination in the U.S. For a 2006 article on Texas style, New York Times fashion writer Cathy Horyn visited Austin gallery Art Palace and became smitten, writing that she "felt an exhilaration seeing the work" and that "it was exactly what I'd hoped to find." Since its reopening two years ago, the Blanton has boosted Austin's presence on the international art radar, as has the hard work of Dana Friis-Hansen, the much-praised director of the Austin Museum of Art since 2002. Austin art is on the rise.

Nonetheless, when I tell an art collector friend that I'm writing an article on the Austin art market, he replies, "It must be a very

short article." This sentiment - that the art market here still lags behind the quality of the art being made - is prevalent. In talking with gallerists, the words "untapped potential" were used more than once to describe art sales here. And only one of those gallerists and not a single artist I spoke with for this story felt that things have improved remarkably in the art market here over the past three years, despite the buzz. More people are open to more types of art, but the

new joy is not reflected in sales. Not yet.

Not that *nothing* is selling. You only have to spend time within the white walls of Art Palace to see that some collectors are snatching up local art. By the time Eric Zimmerman's show opened at Art Palace on March 1, almost twothirds of his graphite drawings were already sold. Jonathan Marshall's December show, "The Book of Lenny," made at least \$38,000 - pretty remarkable for a 24-year-old artist and a 2-year-old gallery. Even better is the fact that one of Marshall's pieces was bought by a private collector and then acquired by the Blanton, and AMOA bought another two: an unprecedented success for a young Austin artist. Another piece, still unsold at the time of our interview, was a 7-foot-bear, but the Palace's Arturo Palacios was confident: "I will sell that bear."

Gallery Shoal Creek, Wally Workman Gallery, and Stephen L. Clark Gallery, all of which have been selling art in Austin for more than two decades, are also seeing good sales not a boom but steady growth. Workman, for example, set a goal to improve her 2007 sales by 25%, and she did. Still, she doesn't think that the new energy in the Austin art scene and attention in the media are necessarily changing the way that Austinites buy and sell art. "I

thought it was quite interesting that some artists from L.A. called to tell me they hear Austin is a good place to sell art." In Workman's case, it seems that improved sales have more to do with her hard work and persistence than with Austin's increased visual-arts brio.

Still, many in the local art scene are optimistic about the growth of the art market. One is Meredith Powell, director of Art Alliance Austin, formerly the Austin Fine Arts Alliance. It has been supporting the arts locally for five decades, beginning with the Fiesta arts festival at Laguna Gloria, which has moved Downtown and was recently renamed Art City Austin. Powell said that sales at the 2006 event were underwhelming, but 2007 was a record year: "The artists were very happy with results." When we spoke, Powell was particularly enthusiastic; in the first days of the recently opened exhibition for the organization's new office and gallery Downtown, they had sold several pieces, mostly to young people, some even to walk-ins off the street.

But it's still ebb and flow, and while there are signs of growth, it's still too early to get cocky and throw a party. Any line graph of art sales here would look like a landscape of the Hill Country. For example, Okay Mountain

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is one project that you'd think would be pulling in the sales. Their work is strong, fresh, affordable. They work hard and are the creative darlings of the Eastside, the ones that everyone loves to love. And yet, according to their talk at the Creative Research Laboratory in late January, not a single piece from their latest show, "Gold Rush," had sold to anyone in Austin. They had seen a notable increase in international

sales via their website, just no sales to the locals. Sales were never their motivation, but at CRL, the group made it clear: They don't earn a dime with Okay Mountain.

Workman, who works almost exclusively with local artists and has a largely Texan collector base, believes that sales tend to fluctuate with the local economy. In the glory days of the late Nineties, art sales in Austin were booming, she says. But after 9/11, people stopped buying, just like in the rest of the country. So, despite the Austin arts' growing reputation, she hasn't noticed any really remarkable changes or trends in the past few years, just the same ebb and flow she has seen throughout her 25 years as a gallerist.

Inconsistent sales are to be expected, however, in a city that is still young, as Austin is in many regards. It only began to outgrow its identity as a strictly university-and-government town 30-odd years ago. Compared to Houston and Dallas, there is a short history of art collecting here. Peat Duggins, artist and Okay Mountaineer, characterizes it this way: "The recent energy/attention given to the emerging art scene is great, but we need to retain the stress on 'emerging.' A developed art scene has insightful writing, numerous types of galler-

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
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


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ies, respectable institutions, and strong individual creators, as well as a collector base. The city has had some of those things at different times in the past, though I think we are just now starting to develop them all in tandem."

While few gallerists had their sales broken down into buyer demographics, several said younger people are now buying, a good sign that this art scene will keep growing. The day before I stopped by Stephen Clark's West Sixth Street gallery, two women in their early 20s, both former photography students at St. Stephen's Episcopal School, came to the gallery to buy name photographers. Clark says: "Art collecting is now happening at different levels. I've seen many people in this town as they make that first step, buying what they can afford. My generation was a poster generation, but now I see the children of my generation, children who went to good colleges, have traveled, and have been exposed to art in ways that earlier generations in Austin were not. They know what they like and want to buy name photographers. This didn't use to happen."

This mindset is explained by Salvador Sosa, a 42-year-old art collector I met at a recent gallery opening. He and his partner, Chric McKoy, invest in local artists and would like to see their peers do the same. "About six years ago, I looked at what was happening in Austin, and it really drew me in," Sosa explains. "I had been buying from galleries in New York and Santa Fe, but what I started to see in Austin felt more

like what you'd see in New York. I used to buy when I traveled, but now I buy in Austin." Furthermore, Sosa sees how art collecting can be contagious: Some of his friends have admired the art in his home and now are buying original works of their own. Besides, as Sosa told a reluctant-to-buy relative, "If you are a grownup, you can't have fucking posters on your wall." McKoy, 48, an art teacher at St. Andrew's Episcopal School, put it this way: "The art happening in Austin is fresh, young. And it's a mirror of who we are right now, a reflection of our culture. It's not like going to Dallas and buying something that matches your couch.'

And because the market here is still emerging, it's also still very

affordable; there is great work here that's accessible to a wider swath of the population. This helps attract the younger collectors. "The buyers here have been mostly people in their early 30s excited about the work," says Powell. "They are buying what they love, and they can because it's affordable."

Of course, money isn't everything. It doesn't seem to be even a significant factor to many – they consider other positive factors much more important. Judy Taylor, who opened Gallery Shoal Creek in 1965, says more Austin collectors are now open to a wider range of contemporary art, far beyond the landscapes and still lifes that once dominated local art sales. Lora Reynolds has found a welcoming audience here for the cutting-edge international work she has brought to town since opening her gallery three years ago - and her fun, well-attended gallery openings prove it. Many gallerists see a fresh energy here. As Anastasia Colombo, the associate director at D Berman Gallery says, "I am incredibly optimistic about the Austin art scene. People are really sitting up and taking interest in being more supportive."

And yet, there is a big difference between "taking interest in being more supportive" and actually buying art. Many strong artists and galleries still have to scrap and juggle to survive, as Colombo sees in her position as treasurer for Art Austin, a 24-member gallery alliance. "There are galleries in town that are not a part of Art Austin [any longer], not because they didn't want to be but because they couldn't pay the dues, which are very moderate. Galleries still close because they are losing too much money. It is a fact that in Austin it's crushingly difficult to keep a visual-art space open. You can go look at the art, think it's beautiful, but if the artists don't get paid, they can't afford to be artists. I would like to see more artists be able to support themselves with their art instead of taking second jobs.

Sterling Allen, an Okay Mountaineer who has had successful independent shows as well, has a similarly sobering view: "I can count on two hands the people that are out there supporting our contemporary art scene," he says. "They are also the people who support the nonprofits and museums by funding special projects and exhibitions. I don't have any friends who can consistently work on art. Everyone I know goes through cycles of work/art if they are lucky. ... Everyone at Okay Mountain works almost full time on other stuff besides art.

As Stephen Clark put it, "The only way to really support an artist is to write a check." He and several other gallerists said that one of the best parts of owning a gallery is exactly that: paying the artist when works sell. And they all would like to see it happen more, not just for the gallery's sake but because they genuinely love the work they sell and want to see their artists thrive.

If more people buy Austin artists' work, the quality of art will improve. Not to reduce art-making to monetary terms, but an artist getting paid for his work translates to more

studio time and other resources for making better art. No artist I contacted would stop making art for lack of sales - no one is an artist for the money - but having someone buy work can be the ultimate compliment and motivator to keep on working. And as your career gets more serious, it helps you pay for supplies, studio space, rent, life. As Sterling Allen explains: "[Getting paid] didn't used to matter. I liked showing, and it was a bonus to sell. In the past few years, it has become more important. I respect my own work that much more, and it simply isn't enough to have someone like it. I want to be rewarded for it. I also would like to get to the point where I wouldn't have to go to work and sit at a

computer all day and instead just focus on art. I will always make stuff no matter what, but it is very encouraging to sell work. It keeps you going. As we get more mature and ambitious in our practice, the cost of making work also goes up. I didn't used to need a studio. I also didn't used to worry about safely shipping work. The more serious and dedicated you become, the more expensive life gets.'

Emily Hoyt, abstract oil painter at the Pump Project Art Complex, agrees but also believes the positive effects from increased sales will stretch beyond individual artists to the entire scene. "I don't think money could ever improve my attitude about creating. It's something I have done out of necessity for some time," she says. "Although the fact remains that money won't change my reasons for making art, it's still obvious to me that if I sold a larger piece, I would jump at the chance to quit my day job and focus on art for as long as the money kept me going. In this very significant way, the art market in Austin can benefit from artists getting paid real money for their work. More artists selling means more time and thought going into the innovation of work. For artists who have been struggling to remain active, this boost could mean significant gains in the quality of art-making in Austin."

For a city that thrives on its individuality and seeks to stay weird, more sales of local art doesn't seem too much to ask. As Powell says, "Austin is known as a creative city, but how do you expect to sustain a creative culture if you aren't supporting the ones who make art?"





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## The Beat Goes On

#### Harry Ransom Center hosts the Kerouac scroll BY KATHERINE CATMULL

As curators in the Ransom Center Galleries unrolled the vellowing 120-foot manuscript, cameras popped and flashed. "It's like a movie star," murmured an amused security guard. But that security guard was leaning in to catch a glimpse just like the rest of us.

Why are relics so compelling? What made these few dozen feet of typewritten, handcorrected prose so much more riveting than the copies of On the Road, the book it later became, that were scattered on a nearby bench?

In 1951. Jack Kerouac taped together sheets of drawing paper so that he could type on a near-endless blank sheet, never stopping to reload, so that he could write the way a jazz musician improvises. Twenty days later, he had a first draft of On the Road.

(Now that most of us write on endless blank electronic sheets, do we write a bit like Jack Kerouac? And is that good or bad?)

Only 48 feet of the draft are unrolled at the Harry Ransom Center, where the scroll will be on display through June 1. But that's

enough to pull you into the heat and pace of Kerouac's jazzy prose. Here's the first line my eye fell on: "... ONLY mind you because of the fact that I absolutely, simply, purely, and without any whatevers have to sleep now ... ." That's all I caught before the scroll's keepers hiked it further down the long narrow table and out of my field

The scroll has no paragraph breaks and very little margin. Corrections in pencil and pen are evident throughout, although not as many as you might think - this book really was a piece of sustained improvisation. Also, deliciously, if you're interested in the period, the scroll uses real names - Neal and Allen and Burroughs, not the fictitious substitutes of Dean and Carlo and Old Bull Lee.

Relics engage us because we half-believe in the half-magic properties of an object touched by someone we revere - or in this case, in which someone we admire invested so much passion and sheer physical labor. But also, unlike many cultural creations of our Digital Age, a relic like this scroll cannot be replicated. Another source of the scroll's power is its status as an art object, the concluding (and oddly beautiful) artifact of a piece of performance art that has shaped our culture for half a century.

The HRC's "On the Road With the Beats" exhibit, a terrific setting for the scroll, includes several other textual art objects, including vibrant silk screens by Kenneth Patchen and two pages from the extraordinary graphic broadside Topolski's Chronicle. A listening station offers jazz music (including Dizzy Gillespie's "Kerouac"), interviews with beat figures like Herbert Huncke and Neal Cassady's ex-wife LuAnne Henderson, as well as readings performed by writers like Allen Ginsberg, Gary Snyder, and Kerouac himself. That's not to mention the scores of photos, letters, and journals from the HRC collection, rescued from a time when words were more valuable, in part because they were so easily lost forever.

### **GRAPHIC NOVELS**

#### **INCOGNEGRO:** A GRAPHIC **MYSTERY**

by Mat Johnson and Warren Pleece Vertigo, 136 pp., \$19.99

This graphic novel by writer Mat Johnson and artist Warren Pleece is a historical thriller



set during the Harlem Renaissance of early last century. Our protagonist, Zane Pinchback, is a young journalist, a black man who, pale enough to pass for white, sometimes leaves New York to go undercover in the Deep South and investigate and document lynchings. So: He's an intrepid young journalist, one lucky enough (so far) to have escaped violent situations without coming athwart a noose himself. This story's about what happens when Pinchback tries to uncover the tangle of deathstained secrets that have landed his older brother in jail for a murder he didn't commit, way down in the crackery sticks of Mississippi.

Pinchback's character was inspired by real-life "incognegro" (and former head of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People) Walter White, and this lends credibility to an idea that might seem too outlandish. Also upping the verisimilitude is the wealth of societal and racial details provided, in action and discussion, by Pinchback and his associates; the author uses these to form a solid human foundation upon which to erect a multileveled

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


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

plot, and the story trucks along briskly. The dialogue crackles, the situations compel, a few wacky bits of humor leaven the gallows atmosphere even while straining disbelief. Two-thirds through and a few revelations still uncovered, though you can feel the narrative's machinery falling into a sharp Hollywood pattern where each problem and its fallout will be as neatly resolved as a puzzle savant's Rubik's Cube.

Now, some people like that sort of thing; they must, or America's box-office favorites wouldn't be the ones they are. But we felt a bit cheated here, figuring such a gambit of tidiness more in line with less ambitious pop-culture offerings and not quite worthy of the thoughtful background and characterization Johnson's wrought here. Still, it rankles only near the end, and this is a tale worth reading. Also for the stunning, perfectly directed artwork of Pleece, had we mentioned that? A treat for the eyes, a marvel of illustration arranged in the service of narrative. - Wayne Alan Brenner

#### **FUNERAL OF THE HEART**

by Leah Haves

Fantagraphics, 120 pp., \$14.95 (paper)

Candidly morbid is perhaps the best way to describe Leah Haves' five fairy-tale-ish stories. hand-lettered in stark white against the black pages of her debut graphic novel, Funeral of the Heart. I say "ish" because Hayes' stories give little in the way of nicely wrapped-up morals, and even "The Hair," the only story that ends with what comes closest to resembling a happy ending, still induces a certain amount of shuddering. It's slightly ghoulish.

Funeral of the Heart is not a graphic novel in the traditional sense; it's not a comic book. Instead, eerie short stories are accompanied by equally eerie, albeit sparse, black-and-white illustrations produced using scratchboard.


In opener "The Bathroom," apologetic Mr. Paper lovingly gives apologetic Mrs. Paper a pool, which leads to



a tragic drowning, an immaculate bathroom, and the literal consumption of the Papers' hearts. In "The Change," again love engenders tragedy, bridged by a grim sequence of brutally slaughtered ducks. "The Needle" is easily the creepiest in the bunch and thus one of the finest: Two daughters are brought together by the resurrection of their grandmother and a deep fear of a nurse whose trademark accessories are mint-green pants and a needle.

It's actually somewhat disappointing Hayes doesn't employ sequential art to tell her tales, because her characters invoke such bizarre imagery in their appearances and actions that bringing them to comic-book life would bring a tear to the eyes of Robert Crumb, not to mention a tug at his groin at the sight of Hayes' scratchings of voluptuous, grotesque characters.

Hayes, ever the multitalentress at only 26, will be at Austin Books & Comics (5002 N. Lamar) Saturday, March 15, 7pm, signing copies of her gloomy yet sentimental Funeral and performing with her Brooklyn-based band, Scary Mansion, who is also promoting its thunderstick-infused debut album, Every Joke Is Half the Truth. - Sofia Resnick

#### **IRISH WHISKEYS I HAVE KNOWN AND LOVED**

I end most meals at restaurants with a glass of Jameson. The flavors and smells of Irish whiskeys make me feel like I'm back in Ireland, sitting at a bar on a meandering quay. But wouldn't it be nice if restaurants would carry whiskeys other than Bushmills and Jameson?

The Irish make so many wonderful whiskeys that most people never try. Thank goodness we have a wealth of great liquor stores in Austin that compete over the size and quality of their whiskey collections. Plus, they have passionate staffs.

Take Wiggy's on Sixth. Stephanie Bealart picked Knappogue Castle 1995 (\$36), which is a bargain price for a single malt whiskey. I agree. It's the Irish whiskey I buy most often. They also carry Knappogue's 1951 vintage for a mere \$643 a bottle. Off the top of her head, Bealart gave me great information on all eight of their whiskeys. When I told her I was amazed at the depth of her knowledge about the whiskeys, she laughed and said: "That's what's great about Wiggy's. We have so much weird stuff."

Tim Holloway, at the **Twin Liquors** on Balcones, also recommended the Knappogue Castle 1995 (\$34) but also liked the Clontarf Reserve (\$25) and the Redbreast 12-year-old (\$44). I haven't had the Redbreast, but Clontarf is a mellow, complex drink that will please people who love subtlety. They have 15 Irish whiskeys, so you have plenty of options.

Spec's in South Austin has 17 Irish whiskeys. The whiskey buyer, E. Carter Wilsford (love that name), is a walking encyclopedia about spirits. He sells a lot of Powers Irish Whiskey, a favorite in Ireland because it's made by Jameson but only costs \$25 per liter. His favorite is the Bushmills Malt 16 (\$58), which has a complexity boost by being aged in old bourbon, sherry, and port barrels. They also carry my favorite Irish whiskey of all: Midleton (\$140). I just wish I could afford to drink it.

#### **FUNCTION DRINKS**

Enthusiastic representatives of a young California drink company called **Function** will be all over Downtown this week sharing their product with the public. With South by Southwest and St. Patrick's Day happening in rapid succession, this is one product placement that could not be better timed. Function's premier product is a nutritional supplement water called **Urban Detox**, created specifically to combat the physical discomforts resulting from an evening (day, week?) of alcohol overindulgence. The drink is a blend of several antioxidants, most notably N-acetylcysteine (known as NAC) and prickly pear extract, plus vitamins and nutrients chosen for their ability to help the body both break down alcohol and fight dehydration. NAC works in the liver to break down acetaldehyde, the toxin produced when the body breaks down alcohol, and the main culprit in those debilitating hangover symptoms. The blend of nutritional supplements in Urban Detox can also aid the lungs in clearing the effects of exposure to cigarette smoke and air pollution. According to the promotional material, drinkers are most likely to benefit from Urban Detox if it is enjoyed before sleeping off the evening's indulgence.

Urban Detox and the other nine functional drinks in the company's line are the brainchild of 30-year-old Texas native Dr. Alex Hughes, currently the chief resident in orthopedic surgery at UCLA Medical Center in Los Angeles. Hughes put his educational background in biomedical engineering and his practical hospital experience to work in creating Function drinks and founded the company with two friends in 2005. While Urban Detox is currently their most high-profile product, the line also includes House Call (immune-system booster), Light Weight (to stimulate metabolism). Shock Sports (rehydration and muscle recovery after exercise), and Alternative Energy (energy and stamina booster), among others. Function's product claims have not been tested by the Food and Drug Administration, so the proof will have to be in the tasting. The company sent samples to the Chronicle office in recent weeks - I shared Urban Detox and House Call with the Food staff this week and kept the Light Weight for myself. We will share any results after we've had a chance to try them out, and we'd love to hear from readers about how (or if) these drinks have functioned for them. Function staffers will be at several venues this week, and they'll also be doing product demonstrations at the Whole Foods Market store Downtown, where Function products have been selling for about a year.

It's been a very long time since Texas Democrats felt as relevant to the national political picture as during the recent primary season. Debate watch and results watch parties were the order of the season at local watering holes, and political celebrity sightings at restaurants were pretty common. A professional audio-visual crew set up big-screen TVs at Güero's (1412 S. Congress, 447-7688) so that Sen. Hillary Clinton and her team could watch a debate retelecast with plenty of Mexican food and margaritas. And though former President Bill Clinton didn't make it into his favorite local Mexican restaurant on his quick trips in and out of town, his staff did order Güero's food to go for his plane rides. Meanwhile, daughter and champion campaigner Chelsea Clinton was spotted at El Chile Cafe y Cantina (1809 Manor Rd., 457-9900), and the dinner crowd at Hoover's Cooking (2002 Manor Rd., 479-5006) was all abuzz on primary eve when **Michelle Obama** and her guests enjoyed big platters of barbecue and cobbler... I can't wait to shake off the flu so I can get into Stortini (1917 Manor Rd., 391-9500) to check out the new pizzas they've recently added to the menu. Pastry chef Alex Manley developed the dough and chef Kristine Kittrell and her kitchen staff are responsible for such toppings as housemade sausage with roasted peppers and mushrooms, fresh mozzarella, and pesto. The pies are cooked in a vintage pizza oven purchased in Manley's former home of Marfa. We hear the new pizzas are a big hit with the clientele, especially in the Red **House Lounge**, where there is a half-price pizza happy hour every day from 5 to 7pm... And speaking of Eastside menu additions, Gene's New Orleans Style Poboys & Deli (1209 E. 11th, 477-6600) has added Soul Food Wednesdays, where you are likely to find braised oxtails, meatloaf, sweet potatoes, chicken 'n' dumplings, greens, blackeyed peas, and banana pudding... Ever since Curtis Clarke had a conversation about authentic Southern-style fried chicken with Chronicle contributor Claudia Alarcón last summer, he's been working on how he could put it on the menu at the Evangeline Cafe (8106 Brodie, 282-2586). Well, now he's got it going on. Try Clarke's bone-in, skin-on, light or dark fried chicken pieces at lunch or dinner.

- Amiable chef Jerry Pizzitola will present two free hands-on pasta-making workshops in the teaching kitchen at Faraday's Kitchen Store (1501 RR 620 N. Ste. A, 266-5666) this weekend. Students will learn how to make pasta dough, roll and cut it with the Atlas Pasta Maker, and cook it. Classes are free, but space is limited, so sign up in advance. Saturday, March 15, 9:30 & 11am.
- Way out Wineries (www.wayoutwineries.org) invite you to celebrate St. Patrick's Day with them this weekend, promising green wine (!), Celtic music, complimentary wine tastings, and plenty of blarney. This free event is one in their series of holiday and seasonal road trips. Saturday-Sunday, March 15-16, noon-6pm.
- ▶ Eastside Cafe (2113 Manor Rd., 476-5858) opened in 1988 and built its reputation as a pleasant oasis on the way to and from Austin's old Robert Municipal Mueller Airport. The airport moved a few years back, but Eastside is still going strong at 20, now the anchor tenant of one of Austin's busiest restaurant rows. Owners Dorsey Barger and Elaine Martin are throwing themselves a "Happy Birthday to Us" party to kick off a yearlong fundraising marathon to benefit their three favorite charities: Waterloo Counseling Center, AIDS Services of Austin, and the youth development gardening project Urban Roots. The big birthday bash will include food, beer, wine, live music, handmade chocolates, and plenty of fun. Tickets are \$50 in advance, \$60 at the door. Sunday, March 16, 5-8pm.
- A beloved Austin landmark will commemorate 60 years of continuous business this week with a somewhat smaller celebration. Arkie's Grill (4827 Cesar Chavez, 385-2986) will offer \$5 lunches with a choice of one of their popular entrées, three vegetables, dinner rolls, and corn sticks. Monday, March 17. 11am-3pm.
- ▶ Ty Phelps, head brewer at North by Northwest Restaurant & Brewery (10010 Capital of TX Hwy. N., 467-6969) has brewed a unique Irish Stout just in time for St. Patrick's Day, and chef George Powell is simmering a pot of Irish stew and baking fragrant loaves of soda bread. They invite you to spend the holiday with them. Monday, March 17, 11am-10pm.

The Great St. Patrick's Day Pub Crawl The Irish are renowned worldwide for their sly humor, love of a good brew, and kindhearted congeniality. On St. Patrick's Day, they manage to reign over the whole planet,

including Austin. We will have three big music events that day. Fadó and Dog & Duck are putting on their annual outdoor extravaganzas, described below. But the big-name event will come from the Celtic Cultural Center of Texas and B.D. Riley's, which will be hosting a huge, daylong event featuring Tommy Sands, whom the Irish think of the way we think of Pete Seeger. Sing Out! magazine wrote, "Tommy Sands is one of the most important songwriters in Ireland if not the rest of the world." The center is also bringing in one of the Celtic world's most revered singers, Andy M. Stewart, who will be accompanied by guitar whiz Gerry O'Beirne.

All day long, there will be events for everyone in the fam-

ily. The Cultural Center leaders are in negotiations with

the city over closing down Sixth Street, so you should take a look at its website (www.celticcenter.org) to see where it will finally land. Your \$12 entry fee goes to support the Cultural Center's work.

One time, after a trip to Ireland, I was feeling a little sad over being home. I had an assignment from the Chronicle to go check all the pubs in town with Irish aspirations. Austin was rainy and cold that day, and when I walked into B.D. Riley's, I felt like I was back on the west coast of Ireland. Friendly people, my favorite beer (Smithwick's), and tasty pub grub. I've had a soft spot for the place ever since.

Unless you are a true beer wonk, you may not notice the care they take with beer. They pour Imperial pints (20 ounces instead of the more normal 16 ounc-

es), and the glasses they use never carry anything but beer. So no soda pop, iced tea, milk, or margarita residues. Every beer is served at the precise temperature recommended by the brewery. Finally, someone trains the bartenders how to do a proper pull.

It bears repeating that B.D. Riley's makes the best fish & chips I've had outside the U.K., but there are other good things on the menu, as well. Both the shepherd's pie and corned beef and cabbage are worth trying. All their specialties are \$12.95 and give you plenty of food. The result is a joy for anyone who loves the Irish

On St. Patty's, they'll open at 10:30am, the music starts at 11:30am, and Floating Crowbar will finish the evening out starting at 9pm. Indoors, they'll be showing a continuous loop of one of

John Ford's greatest films, The Quiet Man. No cover, no green beer, and they have God's great gift to the world of whiskey, Midleton's, for \$24.75 a glass.



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
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#### **DOG & DUCK PUB**

The Dog & Duck is almost 18 years old now, and you don't get to stay in business that long in Austin unless you get almost everything right. They carry a generous assortment of beer (no liquor, though) including Guinness, Boddingtons, and Chimay Triple White. Prices max out at \$5 for a 16-ounce Guinness. They also serve a full menu, and their traditional pub food is well prepared and plentiful. How good is it? They've won the Chronicle Readers Restaurant Poll five out of the last seven years for Best Pub Grub.

Though it is really a proper English pub, on St. Patrick's Day the Dog & Duck's blood turns green, and it puts on one of the best parties in town. Their outdoor music is all free, and it starts at 11am and goes for at least 12 hours. All the usual suspects will be playing, like the Silver Thistle Pipes & Drums, Floating Crowbar, and Ed Miller.

The headliner will be local treasures lan McLagan & the Bump Band. For those of you new to the Austin music scene, McLagan was a founding member of the Small Faces, Humble Pie, and the Rod Stewart-era Faces. He's played with the Stones, Springsteen, Dylan, and lots more. He's usually playing South by Southwest, so this will be the first time they've been able to tempt him out on St. Patrick's Day.

Fadó Irish Pub has an Irish manager – always a good sign. It is part of a 14-location national chain, and though the decoration looks more like an interior designer's concept of an Irish pub than a real Irish pub, the traditional food and Irish drink are spot-on. They serve the correct Imperial pints only, and they know how to pull a proper Guinness. Whiskey lovers will be pleased to see a dozen Irish whiskeys on the wall, including Midleton for a mere \$22.

The traditional side of the menu includes some tasty choices, especially their corned beef and cabbage (\$12.95) and all-day Irish breakfast (\$10.95). If you're not hungry for Irish fare, try the big-enough-for-two bacon cheeseburger (\$8.95).

Fadó puts on one of the biggest St. Patrick's Day parties in the city. Besides the

regular indoor pub and patio, there are tents out front with music from noon until midnight. If you think of Irish music as the sedate, New Age-y stuff you see on Celtic CDs in Wal-Mart, think again. Fadó is bringing in some rocking musicians like Mysterious Ways, Blaggards, the Tea Merchants, and Black Irish.

Somewhere in your house, you have a comfortable spot. It might be a chair or a sofa or a window nook. It's a place where you relax and feel at home. A good Irish pub makes you feel like that. It's a home away from home.

Finding a bar with that gemütlich (if I can mix my cultures) feel is hard in Austin. But Opal Divine's fits the bill. It's a place that makes me happy every time I walk in. The furnishings are cozy, the staff is the right mix of friendly and competent, and they pay unusual attention to the quality of the food and drink. They have one of the nation's great collections of whiskey (the Scottish variety) and plenty of Irish whiskey, too. And they know how to pull a correct ale.

You won't find much traditional Irish pub grub, other than a good fish & chips (\$8.25), but they have big juicy burgers made from never-frozen Coleman's 100% Natural Beef and Cracked Pepper Fries (\$1.95) that vie for best in town.

So any trip to Opal Divine's is worthwhile. However, owner Michael Parker has decided to change his annual party on St. Patrick's

Day and just do business as usual. While I'll miss the extravaganza, with Mother Egan's right across the street, the dueling outdoor music venues were sometimes tough on the ears. If you want the Opal's experience and music, both of the other locations (Penn Field, 3601 S. Congress, 707-0237; Marina, 12709 MoPac at Parmer, 733-5353) will have music most of the day.

#### **BULL McCABE'S IRISH PUB**

This might be the only bar in town where St. Patrick's Gaelic name, Naomh Pádraig, is not only known but pronounced correctly, and pints are served in true Irish pub proportions: 20 ounces. Bull McCabe's was opened in 1999 by the Keogh brothers, Harry and Jimmy, a pair of fine Irish lads with serious accents who wanted a simple, laid-back pub where their friends and the local Irish community could feel at home. The setting is warm wood with low lighting, a couple of dart boards and pictures of famous Irish writers adorning the walls. Small patios front and back provide fresh air for the smokers or to escape the excellent jukebox.

For the true Irish, McCabe's will be the place to be on March 17, with 15 Irish whiskeys being poured, four Irish draft beers, and their famous continued on p.52



Irish Car Bomb, the tongue-in-cheek name for a half-pint of Guinness with a half-shot each of Jameson and Baileys. Expect to find bagpipers and a couple of Irish bands performing, free T-shirts and other assorted swag, and a crowd that celebrates St. Patrick as authentically as you can find in these parts. McCabe's only holds about 100 folks, so stake out a spot early, and remember to pace yourself throughout the night. McCabe's is the friendly type of pub where you'll always feel welcome, and you can expect some good-natured slagging (ribbing) whether you're a culchie (country folk) or a jackeen (urban sophisticate). - Mick Vann

The original founders of Mother Egan's, John O'Brien and Mick Morris, came from County Meath in eastern Ireland to re-create an authentic Irish neighborhood pub named after Morris' grandmother. Even under new ownership, at Mother Egan's craic is king: craic is an Irish term defined as "fun, enjoyment, abandonment, or lighthearted mischief, often in the context of drinking or music." This is not a green-beer joint, so raise your pints of stout and your expectations. You'll find Guinness, Harp, Smithwick's, Murphy's Irish Red, and Murphy's Stout among the 16 beers on tap (and at the proper temperature), alongside some 13 different Irish whiskeys.

Mother Egan's will be featuring foods on St. Patty's Day that would make an Irishman proud: shepherd's pie, fish & chips, corned beef and cabbage wrap, Irish stew, and smoked turkey leg (surely you've heard of the famous Irish turkeys that roam the hills of the Emerald Isle). The regular kitchen menu will not be offered due to the expected crush of celebrants. They will have Celtic bands playing throughout the day; expect the Tea Merchants

and others, rain or shine. The seating is comfy, whether you're inside or on the big patio outside. Generally the crowd here is older and more professional, but on the biggest Irish day of the year, all bets are off.

It's a great spot to get your Gaelic on, and there is no doubt that it will be even more crowded for St. Patty's than it is for the regular Tuesday night trivia fest. Open at 10am, and going "until we can't go any longer." \$5

For the last 20 years Crown & Anchor has been the go-to pub serving the university community, making everyone from effete professorial types and nerdy engineers to frats and punks feel like this is their own private spot, and all of the disparate groups blend seamlessly: a true haven for people-watching. It's

one of those places where the staff never leaves; many have been there for a decade or more. There is a huge selection of brews on the board from which to choose, with enough international selections and domestic microbrews to tease the true beer gourmand.

The burgers are legendary and cheap, and the fries rival any in town. When it comes to pub grub, Crown & Anchor always gets high marks. There is a big, sunny front deck ideal for lizardlike repose and perfect for the dogs (and they get their own water bowls).

The Crown will have green beer on St. Patty's Day, for that element seeking quaff in emerald hues, but more importantly, domestics and pints of Guinness and Harp will be at happy-hour prices all day long (\$3.75; one of the best prices in town). Other than that, don't expect much else to commemorate the death and feast day of Ireland's patron saint. This is a bar that doesn't let itself get too worked up about anything, but do expect a big crowd that night.

First things first. Bud Cort wants you to know that he does not have a bit part in Larry Hagman's 1972 magnum goopus Beware! The Blob. He is, in fact, nowhere to be found in the film, because he did not act in the film, despite decades of erroneous reports to the contrary. For those of us who, over the years and at the Alamo Drafthouse, have witnessed J.R.'s folly and occasionally whispered knowingly to each other, pointing at who's most likely some underpaid, ill-framed production assistant and/or boyfriend - "There he is, dude! 'Birthday Party Guest uncredited!' That's Bud Cort" - no, dude; it's not. (Now, that guy over there? The rotund, bald one in the scoutmaster getup? Hell, yeah. That's Dick Van Patten of TV's Eight Is Enough. He dies, or should.)

## The Long Shadow of Bud Cort

### From Ashby to Altman and emo boys everywhere BY MARC SAVLOV

Bud Cort, while not in that particular wipeout, is, to be fair once more, fucking everywhere these days. Seriously. Every time you see a mopey emo kid slouching down the street, all black Chucks and pegged Emericas, or, even better, a nattily dressed young lad-about-town toting Rimbaud in one hand and a mini-DV cam in the other, wearing a nonexpression that magnificently says everything in a superlatively existential manner but could, in the wrong light or from the opposite end of the cradle, be mistaken for mere scream-age ennui – that, my friend, is Bud Cort, right there.

Or, rather, it's the echo of Bud Cort's doleful perfection in the role of the morbidly self-attentive teen Harold Chasen in Hal Ashby's Harold and Maude. Think about it. Necktie-partying Harold, stick-thin, immaculately depressed, oppressed, unloved, yet still daring to die to hope to love someday, maybe, please? With Ruth Gordon, no less.

Harold was the proto-goth; he had the eyes.

"But, you know," says Cort, from his home in California, "a lot of that was also the costume designer on the film, Bill Theiss, who met me in New York and took me shopping. We bought this great black trench coat and then lined it in red,

and there's one little scene in the film where it kind of blows open in the wind and you see, just for a second, that little line of red. It's so subtle, but it's so cool."

Grave, chilling black masking warm, heart-beating red, with just a hint of innocence redacted. A lot like, say, Houston's airborne Brewster McCloud or M\*A\*S\*H's wide-eyed Pvt. Lorenzo Boone, both courtesy of the missed Robert Altman.

And then there's Maude.

"I saw [Ruth Gordon] in a play called The Loves of Cass McGuire with the wonderful Irish actor Donal Donnelly, and I just remember seeing this little Minnie Mouse in a miniskirt and stiletto heels, racing across that stage from left to right, and I thought, 'Good God almighty, what a torpedo!' And it was Ruth. So it was nice when I finally got to meet her, when we did our screen test together. I said, 'I'm playing this part,' and she said, 'Yes, you are!' And then I told her I'd seen her in Cass McGuire, and she says, 'You're definitely playing the part.' So it pays to go to the theatre."

#### **BI THE WAY**

D: Brittany Blockman and Josephine Decker; with Jonathan Caouette, Michael Musto, Dan Savage

What is most charming about this featurelength, beautifully shot documentary might just be the people who made it. Chronicling a road trip across America, co-directors/best friends "Britts" and Josephine ask the guestion "What is bisexuality?" They come out from behind the camera to create a poignant, intensely intimate energy within the film, capturing moments that explore the many different faces of sex and bisexuality from all over the country. "Hey, do you know any gay Mormons?" they ask while getting fast food at a drive-through in Utah. They talk to an African-American woman at a beauty shop: "Me being a woman," she says, "I do not want to smell your vagina." They're right there, high-def camera in hand, when the characters they've been following are kicked out of their houses; dumped by their beautiful, poly-amorous, underwear-clad boy-toys; even when a young black man defines deviant sexuality as being "the opposite of black." It's like everyone they interviewed forgot they even had a camera.

#### SECOND SKIN

There's an alternate reality living inside your computer, and to many gamers, it's no different – and oftentimes more agreeable – than the daily grind. Second Skin is the story of

seven hardcore gamers whose lives have been changed forever by massively multiplayer online role-playing games, be it love, friendship, or addiction. The 10 million World of Warcraft subscribers and the original EverQuest pioneers know that MMOGs smoke like fantasy crack, but Piñeiro equally illuminates the games' therapeutic roles, for disabled gamers and introverts alike. The doc is a car wreck in rush hour. even from a gamer's perspective: You can't look away no matter how depressing, unbelievable, or grotesque the story becomes. But this isn't just the pitfalls of the gaming industry; it's a hell of a lot of fun. Mixing expert opinion with amazingly true testimonials, Second Skin might just be the most accurate and entertaining glimpse of the economy and psychology of technology since Tron. - Darcie Stevens

#### ANIMATED SHORTS

Concluding with the Academy Awardnominated "Madame Tutli-Putli," the Animated Shorts program ends on a chilling note: With her wet, red-rimmed eyes, the madame undertakes a nightmarish train trip through darkness into light in this timeless stop-motion short. "Paradise" inventively uses antique tin-toys running on tracks to deconstruct Fifties-era falsity, the gears powering the action exemplifying tensions beneath the surface. "I Hate You Don't Touch Me, or Bat and Hat" is also veined with sorrow, as a hapless vampire bat faces a gruesome identity crisis. Decidedly brighter was the tumbling, kaleidoscopic "Jeu," a French import that dizzyingly shifts from geometric lines and forms into places and people without losing its painterly, expressionistic feel. The bittersweet "My First Crush" puts stories of unrequited early love into its cartoonish animals' mouths, for a few tender minutes. Finally, "Fish, but No Cigar" playfully reveals itself as a children's story for self-involved adults, as a lady constantly trumpeting "bigger fish to fry" has to contend with literal logistics - massive frying pans, specimens of exponentially bigger size, and rising levels of mercury contamination.

#### **EXPERIMENTAL SHORTS**

Always an underappreciated jewel, the Experimental Shorts collection again proves a heady mix of worry and whimsy. Thomas Helman's "df/dx" fills the bleakest stretch of the spectrum with dark washes of distortion obscuring his figures' intentions. Gavin Heffernan's "Grand Wheel" intercuts sweeping scenes of war protests and amusement rides, making the viewer re-evaluate his or her priorities. Mining Grand Guignol guffaws was Catherine Chalmers' "Safari," where an unflinching HD camera captures a largely insect ecosystem. Flies struggle in spiderwebs, only to get their heads excavated moments later - but in goosing the grotesque, Chalmers accentuates the absurdity. Nicholas Tayler's "Kupe and the Whale" uses an indecipherable Kiwi narrator to further the mystery and conspiracy surrounding its mythic money markets, only to explode in fractal bliss. Tipper Newton's twee "The Timebox Twins" uses garage pop and Gondry-style not-sospecial effects to tell an interdimensional afterschool special. And with alternately expressionistic and accelerated camerawork reminiscent of Wong Kar-Wai and Derek Jarman, "Upwards March" depicts a young girl's escape into a strange and wonderful carnival, set to an affecting score from Arcade Fire tourmates (and director Kaveh Nabatian's band) the Bell Orchestre. - Wells Dunbar

#### **BOOTLEG WISCONSIN**

Attention creates silence - when people are interested, they grow silent in order to absorb with every sense. But also, silence creates attention - when someone speaks to us softly, we tend to listen harder, try to pay more attention. In Linden's first feature film, which is set in Pleasant Prairie, Wis., known from Chicago to Milwaukee for its excellent outlet shopping, silence speaks the loudest. Bootleg Wisconsin is the story of Billy, a young man who works at an outlet store and is exploring the effects his newfound faith has on his life, and Katherine, a schoolteacher from Chicago who is spending her summer vacation shopping. The two meet and befriend one another, yet we never hear them speak to each other more than 10 minutes total. The strength of their relationship is portrayed through silence. The film is simple.

No special effects, no outrageous drama. It's a look into the lives of everyday people living in Pleasant Prairie and their relationship to the outsiders who continuously flow into and out of their town. Kristine Tofte

#### **NIGHTS AND WEEKENDS**



So close to the way things are in real life it's barely a movie, Swanberg and Gerwig's Nights and Weekends is the revealing story of two people during two discrete periods separated by the span of a year, first as long-distance lovers and then as long-distance ex-lovers. The narrative, in Swanberg fashion, is entirely improvised, and the co-directors' respective characters come off as extremely volatile and in-themoment. Several of the dialogue exchanges, overflowing with fumbles and hems and haws, surpass the penetration-inclusive love scenes in viewer awkwardness – erect nipples, cock. and all. But it's these scenes dissecting the irrational nature of human emotion that make this romantic drama worth watching among the hordes of rom-coms rehashing the same breakup scene time and time again. There is no breakup scene in Nights and Weekends, just ample nudity and graphic sex. - Sofia Resnick

#### **HALF-LIFE**

Half-Life, the debut feature from writer-director Jennifer Phang, pairs the tense relationships of a suburban Asian-American family with the specter of global environmental devastation, creating a world in which violence and destruction seem to forebode individual crisis. Timothy Wu (Agate) and his older sister (Lake) watch in quiet anger as their mother (Nickson) falls apart while attempting to face the reality that their father has abandoned them. With each familial confrontation comes another (often heavy-handed) reminder of violence in the Middle East or environmental catastrophe. Citizens must keep pets indoors. Warmer waters brought disastrous numbers of jellyfish into coastal areas. A local man drove a chainsaw through his skull. It's unclear, however, what Phang's ominous undercurrent is suggesting; it seems she wants the viewer to escape the duress through imagination. A good idea, but in the end the apocalyptic atmosphere, timely and true as it is, proves a distraction from the immediate, even poetic, challenges of the Wu family. - Yvonne Georgina Puig



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
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

climate. "I felt like it was a device to amp up the stakes," he said. "I don't think the movie has anything to say politically. It just uses the current political climate to make vagina jokes." Not that politics aren't lurking. Penn recounted how airport screeners pulled him aside because of his skin color once, while the pinker-skinned friend with him - who happened to have a large hunting knife in his bag - went through unfettered. Cho has also faced the wrath of screeners, including the last time he was at Austin-Bergstrom International Airport.

Meanwhile, Tambor used actors Greta

Gerwig and Kent Osborne to give an enthusiastic throng including a few actual thespians - a view into the craft as he urged the pair to overact, do monkey impersonations, and generally dig deep. Among his many words of wisdom: Character is contradiction, revenge is sweet, and there must be silences. "You can't get hurt in acting; you can only get better," he offered.

#### Speaking Truth to Power Harlan Ellison holds court

Harlan Ellison does not suffer fools gladly. Like the biblical adage against suffering a witch to live, indeed, the 73-year-old novelist, screenwriter, film critic, bon vivant, raconteur, and allaround tire iron in the side of the pompous, boorish, ill-spoken, and just plain idiotic has taken great pains to publicly eviscerate, debone, flense, fillet, and, in grand high style, often to the bewilderment of his target, expunge the wind from the tattered and tatty sails of the mediocre and the mundane, sending them crashing headlong against the rocks of their own hubris, crushed betwixt their own, just-deserved Scylla and Charybdis.

With some 60-plus books, more than 1,300 short stories and essays, and an absolute surfeit of intellect on all things cultural, literary, filmic, and virtually all else, Ellison is quite rightfully a living legend among those who still take the time to read for pleasure (a precious, dwindling group, as he is quick to point out) He speaks truth to power, and power cowers, rattled and bent.

Ellison's gleefully profane use of skillfully deployed oratorical ordnance, honed over the last six decades to a razored executioner's edge, was on display in his nearly two-hour conversation with Ain't It Cool News' Harry Knowles. What was ostensibly billed as a chat between the two old friends about, among other topics, director Erik Nelson's fine, smart, and long-overdue Ellison documentary, Dreams With Sharp Teeth, transformed very quickly, like Larry Talbot into his toothy, hirsute alter ego, into the Harlan Ellison Show, equal parts uproarious, scathing anecdotal evidence that the world is, indeed, going to hell in

a handbasket tended by illiterate, incurious imbeciles and a celebration of the joy of writing.

"I got in a lot of trouble when I was writing WITH HARLAN ELLISON Sunday, March 9, 3pm

my film reviews," explained Ellison of his critiques, which are collected in the book Harlan Ellison's Watching, "because, really, there were only ever five good directors in the history of film. Only five. Everybody else is a craftsman, or craftswoman, of varying degrees of talent, with somebody like the Coen brothers at the top and somebody awful, like Vincent Ward, the guy who butchered Richard Matheson's beautiful love letter to his wife of many years, What Dreams May Come, at the bottom.



"The five who are directors, or were at the time, were Fellini, Alain Resnais, Kubrick, Coppola, and Kurosawa. Those five, if you had no one else, if you had no other directors whatsoever, your lives would be so golden, so wonderful, so fine. As much as I like any number of directors, directing, in Bogart's words, 'is a mug's game."

Telling stories, with passion and heart, however, is still a sacred calling for Ellison, and as he deployed his enormously entertaining payload of anecdotal yarns, white-phosphoric in their ability to illuminate and/or defoliate the ever-current, frustratingly commonplace thickets of uninspired, Hollywoodbacked status quo that passes for mass-market, pop-culture entertainment, it was akin to hearing a prophet, a sage, a storyteller nonpareil gift his audience with golden gab and inspire them to be better than that, always and forever.

## Building Buzz How to flatter and cajole your way onto the Internet

BLOGS, BUZZ, AND BUDDY LISTS

Blogs are the changeling child of new media. Though they are not quite taken seriously in some traditional media circles, no one can deny that blogs and their bloggers earn rock-star status when they hit big. While the assembled panelists were specifically addressing filmmakers, their remarks could help anyone who has a project to promote. A few key tips:

Blogs are labor-intensive. If you're an artist just trying to get

your field is a good move. Be prepared when you approach them, said panelists Karina Longworth of Spout.com and **Alison Willmore**, editor of the film sec-

tion on IFC's website. "Prove to me that you're contacting me for a reason. ... Flattery always helps." Get past the "look, I have this film, book, game, album." "You're not just selling your film; you're selling your story," Longworth said. A succinct approach is always appreciated - a few enticing words along with a link to your project's website is a good rule of thumb. Just like in old-fashioned print media, know whom you're approaching. "I

spent a day on Karina and Alison's blogs before I sent to them,' said Victor Piñeiro, producer of the documentary Second Skin. A form letter approach is not going to pique interest and automatically labels you as an amateur at best, lazy at worst.

Be social! Besides hitting up well-known bloggers in your field, promote your project on several social networks (MySpace, Twitter, YouTube, etc.). Artists who want to start their own blogs your work finished, turning to well-known bloggers who cover should offer useful, up-to-date information. Voice is important.

:····· In fact, having a distinctive voice and becoming a source readers can trust are the cornerstones of any suc-...... cessful blog. Encourage comments.

Fear of flamers and other mean-spirited folk should not deter you from allowing visitors to comment on your blog or socialnetworking site. These conversations can take on a life of their own, encourage visitors to your site, and in the end, get more people to learn about you and your project. Like they say, all publicity is good publicity. Maybe you can't make buzz, but you sure don't want to stifle it. - Belinda Acosta

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## **War Stories**

#### Phil Donahue and Ellen Spiro document one wounded soldier's transformation into an 'anti-warrior'

It was probably inevitable that Phil Donahue, the father of the modern daytime TV talk show, would make an anti-war film. This war, that president, that bunch of rubber-stamping idiots in Congress – every minute of whose prewar "debate" Donahue had watched on C-SPAN, as they mouthed talking points scripted by the warmongers, before green-lighting the resolution and heading home for midterm elections. Donahue's last and short-lived gig on MSNBC had ended in '03 when the network became skittish that his bad prewar attitude was making them look unpatriotic. His eponymous, pioneering talk show had ended back in '96, after an award-winning 29-year run. So there was Donahue, sidelined and fuming, his mic turned off at a time when he had the most to say. In times like these, how long, really, could a 72-year-old talk-show host manqué be expected to sit on his hands?

Not too long. In late '04, Donahue accompanied his friend Ralph Nader on a visit to a seriously injured young war vet, Tomas Young, at Walter Reed Army Medical Center. Donahue was appalled by what he saw: a 26-year-old, soon-to-be-married young man paralyzed from the chest down, taken out by a shot just above his collarbone only five days after landing in Iraq. This, the tangible outcome of this ill-conceived, misguided war that we'd been duped in to by the Bush administration. (Young had enlisted with the intention of deploying to Afghanistan.) After seeing Young and his mother overwhelmed by his grave injuries, Donahue realized there was no way he could "simply tell this kid to have a nice day and then disappear; I knew that people needed to see this, and somewhere along the line, I nominated myself to try and make that happen."

Subsequent visits with Young, in which he observed Young's tragic struggle to adjust to the horrors of his new physical reality, cemented Donahue's resolve to tell Young's story. He got to wondering about Young's politics on the war. When he spotted a "Draft Republicans" bumper sticker lying on his dining-room table, Donahue realized to his delight that "what we had here was a warrior-turned-anti-warrior." At that time, he was thinking "book" as the likely medium for this message.

Enter Ellen Spiro, a documentary filmmaker (Roam Sweet Home, Atomic Ed & the Black Hole, Troop 1500) living in Austin and teaching filmmaking at the University of Texas. Donahue chanced to meet a friend of Spiro's in the alternative-media business, DeeDee Halleck, and they chatted about his book idea. Halleck suggested a film might be a better vehicle for making Donahue's political point and gave him Spiro's phone number. Although Spiro almost hung up on the guy "claiming" to be Phil Donahue, a few days later, she was on a plane to Kansas City to meet the wounded soldier. This meeting would allow Spiro to assess

both Young as a subject and Donahue as a codirector and executive producer (the money guy). Spiro, who works with producer Karen Bernstein, had never split a director credit with anyone, much less a former talk-show host who'd never made a film before, even if he was the guy who many credit with putting the "heart" in "bleeding-heart liberal" - in a

The first meeting convinced Spiro that she wanted in on this film. As she recalls, "Tomas was in really bad shape when I met him - on major morphine doses and pharmaceuticals and couldn't really form a sentence, but there was something about him that I immediately fell for. He was so charming and funny." Says Donahue, with signature verbal imagery, "Ellen grabbed hold of Tomas with both hands." She also grabbed her camera and proceeded to forge a relationship with Young and his family. The footage she subsequently delivered to editor Bernadine Colish was a three-pronged chronicle of Tomas Young's life: his evolving relationship with his new wife; his political awakening, which Spiro analogizes to an amalgam of the characters in Born on the Fourth of July and Coming Home; and his struggle to come to terms with his overwhelming disabilities.

While Spiro was off shooting Young, Donahue was hunched over a computer with an editor in New York, culling incriminating segments from more than 100 hours of the C-SPAN congressional debate footage, including the roll-call vote, that had so infuriated him when he'd watched it live in '02. She adds, "Phil pushed me in ways that made me a better filmmaker. He always said that it was important that we not sanitize Tomas' situation or the war but show the pain," which empowered her to shoot the delicate scene in which Young's mother helps him change his catheter in the back of his van.

With harmony restored in the editing room, there remained one more piece to fall in place – the soundtrack. That would happen a little later, through pure serendipity, when Donahue met Pearl Jam's Eddie Vedder, who then volunteered to write two original songs for the film. (Vedder also worked with Young to compile an ancillary promotional CD.)

Body of War premiered at Toronto International Film Festival to a standing ovation. It was short-listed for an Oscar nomination, though it did not make the final cut. And now it's beginning a limited theatrical distribution, for which Donahue is completely pumped and determined to expand nationwide. "We're off to the races on this one," he says.

Just goes to show you can take the talk show away from the host, but his mic won't stay unplugged for long.

was when began the spirited negotiation that threatened to sink the enterprise.

Call it differing artistic visions. Spiro presented her filmic story about Young, a masterful blend of the art of documentary and cinematography. A story whose politics emerged from the story itself - subtly. Donahue wanted to intercut - okay, interrupt - the flow of Spiro's "decisive moments" with the cuts he'd so painstakingly pulled from the C-SPAN debates: snippets of lawmakers grandstanding (some of whom are running for president), parroting the WMD panic that we now know was hype. And then the gavel-punctuated roll-call vote, in which all but 23 senators and 133 congressmen voted "aye," and the contrapuntal dissent of 90-year-old Sen. Robert Byrd, pleading for restraint and reconsideration.

"That tested us pretty good," Donahue admits. Other opinions were sought, notes solicited from the likes of Elaine May, Michael Moore, and Donahue's wife, Marlo Thomas. Pity poor Colish, says Donahue: "She really respected Ellen, but then she had to deal with this old gray-haired talk-show guy standing behind her waving his arms. About three weeks into this editing with Ellen and Phil on the 14th floor - I had a lock installed on the window." He laughs, as they all do - now.



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












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#### TV EYE

## Redefining TV

Most know that the cornerstone of the South by Southwest Festival is music. But this year's megamedia event may be taking on a new mantle: the place where new media TV folks are coming to meet, greet, and generate new ideas about TV. And even as I type that, it's becoming inordinately clear to my way of thinking that old terms, like "TV" itself, get in the way. There is nothing traditional about how many of these new TV folks are approaching the medium. What is changing is where TV is found, while still banking on the familiarity most have come to love (oh, come on, admit it!).

Look at a few of the new TV folks who have come to SXSW this year: ON Networks, blip.tv, For Your Imagination, Vuguru, Revision3, and Next New Networks. Austin's ON Networks has even gotten a slice of the awards portion of the Festival, when it announces the winner of its first Greenlight Awards, the "industry's first competition to recognize the next great, original and episodic digital series." Finalists were celebrated at a VIP party last Sunday, and the winners were announced at the annual SXSW Film Awards Ceremony on Tuesday (see p.59 for winners).

There are two categories for the Greenlight Awards: Best Original Digital Series Idea and Best Original Digital Series Production. The finalists for the latter include:

The Bobble Show: Semianimated show where entertainment journalists (who happen to be bobble heads) interview celebrities.

The Guild: A comedy that follows the offline lives of six role-playing-game addicts.

Small Bits of Happiness: A dark comedy about a mom-and-pop suicide-prevention business.

Wingmen: When the men behind a popular radio talk show are forced off the air by the Federal Communications Commission, they decide to launch a dating service, while a documentary crew follows their journey.

#### IT'S THE END OF THE **WORLD AS WE KNOW IT**

For those of you in town for South by Southwest who didn't get the memo, 2008 is the Year of Austin Music. Seriously.

Mayor Will Wynn made an official proclamation to City Council declaring such on Jan. 31. At first glance, this appears to be yet more local jingoism heralding the rise in national prominence of Austin (and SXSW showcasing) artists, ranging from Roky Erickson and Okkervil River to Grupo

Fantasma and the Octopus Project, perhaps even more pompous than Bat City's official slogan as the "Live Music Capital of the World."

Reality is quite the contrary. The past 12

months have been marked by tumultuous change here in the capital, led by the June formation of Transmission Entertainment. The Red River-born booking and event-production venture, responsible for the new, annual Fun Fun Fun Fest and Saturdav's Mess With Texas 2 free-for-all in Waterloo Park, has made tidal waves on the live music venue strip, acquiring punk staple Red 7 and renovating both Mohawk and neighbor Club de Ville, along with the Eastside's Scoot Inn, all

of which are official SXSW venues. Lollapalooza and the Austin City Limits Music Festival promoter C3 Presents, meanwhile, extended its booking empire to include 20 additional Harrah's Casinos and both Solider Field and the Congress Theater in Chicago, as well as our very own and revered Emo's.

Take a look around. The entire landscape has shifted, moving toward high-rise condominiums, like the Red River Flats towering over Stubb's or the sky-scraping 360 next to the newly renovated Austin Music Hall, (pictured far right), and highlighting the city's conflicted interest in both Downtown growth and a music-driven economy. If anything, the proclamation was a distress call, a fledging promise not to let live music fall by the wayside.

Of course, Austin isn't isolated in these issues. The entire music industry is struggling with the paradigm shift into the Digital Age, with revenue down across the board. Artists from Saul Williams to White Denim are experimenting with new distribution methods, while labels are increasingly emphasizing licensing agreements and 360 deals that blur the distinction between bands and brands. Now in its 22nd year and currently the most influential confluence of music, trade, and business. SXSW also continues to evolve.



#### BY THE NUMBERS

In 2007, SXSW was responsible for generating \$95 million for the local economy, more than twice the amount previously estimated by the Austin Convention & Visitors Bureau, according to an economic impact analysis conducted by Angelou **Economics** and commissioned by SXSW. The Festival also produced \$12.8 million in media coverage.

expanding into a record-high 75 venues, including the Bat Bar and Lone Star Lounge in the Austin **Convention Center for SXSW** Live on DirecTV.

"It's not like we have a lot of control over the growth," admits SXSW Managing Director Roland **Swenson**. "It's more so a question of how to manage it. A lot of people are coming here that aren't directly related to what we're doing. What are we supposed to do, build a fence?'

As the ratio between bloggers and musicians continues to level out, and in a culture where talk show hosts determine The New York Times' bestsellers, it's no surprise that celebrities like Rachael Ray and Perez Hilton are crashing the party and generating plenty of buzz in doing so. Likewise, L.A.'s Viper Room establishes its March headquarters at the Orchid. Hip radio stations like Seattle's KEXP and Santa Monica's KCRW broadcast once more from the front lines, joined on the airwaves this year by NPR and Minnesota's the Current, streaming continuous coverage

#### AMDB

You can't turn a corner in Austin, especially during SXSW, without confronting some remnant of its storied musical legacy, be it the Stevie Ray Vaughan statue near Auditorium Shores or the newly minted **Austin Music Memorial** at the Long Center for the Performing Arts, honoring Doug Sahm, Kenny Dorham, and Grey Ghost Williams, among others. For going on three decades now, the Chronicle has painstakingly traced the sound of Austin music, documenting its transition from a cosmic country and blues bunker to the glory days of Trance Syndicate and well beyond. Now there's something that ties it all together. The Austin Music Database (austinchronicle.com/amdb) is an online encyclopedia providing background information and select discographies for local legends like Janis Joplin and Daniel Johnston to the current toasts of the town (the Strange Boys, Black Joe Lewis). AMDB automatically links each individual artist with the respective features and reviews the Chron has published online since 1995. Nearly a year in the making, AMDB currently features profiles for 399 art-

ists, beginning with Randy "Biscuit" Turner of the Big Boys. From the birth of Texas psychedelia (13th Floor Elevators, Bubble Puppy, Shiva's Headband) through its current revival (the Black Angels, Horse + Donkey), no stoners are left unturned. There's even a few one-man bands thrown into the mix (Scott H. Biram, John Schooley, Possessed by Paul James) and a few outlaws we're claiming as our own (Buddy Holly, Waylon Jennings, Roy Orbison). It's the perfect, catchall study guide for the Rhino **Musical Aptitude Test**,

305 multiple-choice questions being administered on Friday, 3pm, at the **Austin Convention Center** in conjunction with annual **Flatstock** poster-art

presentation.

from the parking lot on the corner of Seventh Street and Red River.

Aside from the ever-increasing and noticeably better organized proliferation of coattailriding day parties and pirate productions, the biggest growth for SXSW has come from afar. Nearly one-third of the 1,500 showcasing artists this year are carrying visas, a record high on both fronts. (Scope the Chronicle's



"That's partly due to the weakening of the dollar," Swenson observes, "but it obviously means that people are still finding it of value to come here."

The success of SXSW, according to Swenson, however, still starts at home.

"I don't have any illusions about the Festival going on forever," he says. "It could easily collapse. This Festival was built on the cooperation of people in Austin and all over, and that cooperation is a little harder to maintain every year."

## Still a Good Day

#### Ice Cube didn't have to use his AK

Twenty years ago, O'Shea Jackson turned the rap world on its ear-hole with an eight-word lyrical missile announcing his arrival.

"Straight outta Compton, crazy motherfucker named Ice Cube!"

Nowadays, Cube, 38, spends more time a few miles and a world away in Hollywood, the same Hollywood he threatened to leave in ashes on Public Enemy's "Burn Hollywood Burn." Before he became a Hollywood leading man, Ice Cube was AmeriKKKa's Most Wanted.

N.W.A's Straight Outta Compton put 1988 West Coast hiphop on the map, bringing hood nihilism to white suburbia and making Middle America collectively piss itself. The album sold 3 million copies with zero airplay, boosted by the FBI's stern condemnation of "Fuck tha Police."

Demonstrating the business acumen that eventually helped Cube start his own film-production company, he quit N.W.A rather than sign a contract that raised suspicion. Instead, he launched his solo career with two stone classics, 1990's AmeriKKKa's Most Wanted and 1991's Death Certificate. The albums have the same "kill 'em all" mantra of N.W.A but a sharper intensity and sense of political purpose.

Released the following year, The Predator was the first album ever to debut at No. 1 on both the pop and R&B Billboard charts, a fact made all the more improbable because, with the exception of the lighter G-funk classic "It Was a Good Day," it's an album-length explosion of rage about the 1991 L.A. riots, not your typical pop fodder.

In 1991, Cube starred in Boyz n the Hood, a groundbreaking film that artfully translated gangsta-rap music onto the silver screen. Since then, he's had a hand in acting, writing, and producing dozens of films, including recent G-rated efforts like 2005's family road-trip Are We There Yet? For once, the "G" doesn't stand for gangsta.

Following a string of largely irrelevant albums over the past decade, Cube hints at a renewed focus on the forthcoming Raw Footage. Based on new single "Gangsta Rap Made Me Do It," Cube is jumping back into the rap game with a vengeance. Two decades after living the genre into existence, Cube's taking aim at those who scapegoat gangsta rap for society's ills. In the video, the rapper rhymes fiercely over a dark, minimalist beat as footage of Abu Ghraib, Donald Rumsfeld, and Hurricane Katrina scrolls by. The message is clear: Real gangstas don't rap; real gangstas run the government.

Do It," is the rawest and most political thing you've done since The Predator. What made you jump back into political rap? Ice Cube: In rap the styles change so quick, and political rap became unpopular for a time. The last thing you want in rap is to do songs that nobody's really checking. It started in the Death Row era when political rap went to the back burner. I believe places like Viacom and outlets for the music decided that we had to shy away from the political rap and go more with the gangsterism kind of rap. It was a shift in the taste of the public. Now I think we're past that, and people want to hear messages in the music. I think what's turned people off from rap in the last 10 years is the fact that it's filled with nothing. It's time to go back.

Austin Chronicle: Your new single, "Gangsta Rap Made Me

**AC**: And the political climate of today has something to do with that? IC: Of course. When the Republicans are in office, everything gets a little more tense. It's a little harder, and you can really feel the pressure of government on top of the people. People want solutions or outlets, so ultimately people want you to say through your lyrics what they can't say.

AC: Are you backing any presidential candidates?

IC: I like Obama. He's a breath of fresh air. He wants to unify the country and not divide it. He just seems like the right guy. **AC**: Musically, the new album also seems like it's back to basics. It's

dark; it's rugged; it's really raw. Is that a response to what's happening in hip-hop or in the wider music industry?

IC: That's just how I do it. That's how I like it. I like it raw, and that's the name of my album, Raw Footage. That's just my take. AC: A lot's changed since you did Straight Outta Compton. You're almost 40 years old, you're a father now, and you have a lot more money than you did back then. Does that change the way you approach making music?

IC: Not necessarily, no. All those things are true, but I never think about that when I'm writing lyrics or when I'm in the studio. I'm not thinking about my kids or money or any of that stuff. I'm thinking about being the greatest MC I can be. I think people might perceive things as changing, but I had to roll with the times, the tide of the hip-hop audience, to still be relevant as an MC after all these years. Now I'm at a point where people really want to hear the type of rap that I really love to do. So I'm back in my comfort zone when it comes to making music.

**AC:** Who do you think dictates what audiences want to hear? IC: Things change. When Lawrence Taylor played linebacker, he changed the way the position is played. Whenever a new rapper comes out and is as big as Snoop or Eminem, they change the tone or the flavor of the audience. Sugarhill Gang and Grandmaster Flash came out and changed the tone. Run-DMC changed the tone. Beastie Boys came out and changed the tone. Public Enemy came in and changed the tone. N.W.A, Ice-T, and Eazy-E changed the tone. It's always going to be like that.

AC: Do you see any contradiction in recording a raw gansta track one day and shooting a G-rated family film the next?

IC: Music and film are totally different. As far as my music, I don't have A&R or anything like that, so my music is totally self-inspired. Movies are put together by hundreds of people, so it's not one man, one thought. It's a whole different thing. Me acting in a movie is not what I'm becoming; it's a job. Records is what I love to

do. I've made a lot of money, and as far as me and my family, we're fine. If I was thinking about that, I wouldn't even be doing records. I'm more concerned with people who ain't got it like me and still live in South Central L.A., like friends and family who are still caught up in the day-to-day grit and grime of life. They don't have a voice. No one speaks for them.

AC: You've been a savvy businessman ever since a contract dispute back in the N.W.A days. What advice would you offer young artists on how to navigate the industry?

IC: You've gotta get someone you trust as far as legal representation. That's the most important thing to have, because you're not going to be able to navigate through this business without having a legal adviser. I think what a young person needs to do is make sure everything makes sense. Sometimes lawyers can talk the way lawyers talk, and you've got to tell them to make it make sense to you. You've got to tell them what you want, because he works for you. **AC**: Your new single has a really poignant line: "Look at my life;

Ice Cube is a miracle." What do you mean? IC: It means coming from nothing and turning it into something. To me, everything about my life is a miracle. It's an example of what you can do with yourself. Recognize your opportunities, and don't be scared of failure or what your limitations are.

**AC:** Do you find that you're more focused on music or film right now? IC: I go back and forth. I love music, and I love films. That's what I do; my career is carved up between music and movies.

AC: You wrote the screenplay for movies like Friday and Barbershop. Can you talk about the difference between writing songs for an album and writing a screenplay?

IC: Writing a song, especially rap, you can pretty much do freestyle; there are no rules, no boundaries. You have to rhyme, but there's no template. You can go where you want to go. With a movie, you really have to lay it out, and it has to all connect. You have to have your major story and plotlines and subplotlines. It's a more thought-out process. It's more tedious, but having a movie come out is way more satisfying than a record, because it's so much harder to make.

## **Waiting for** the Man

Lou Reed revisits 'Berlin'

Lou Reed should need no introduction.

As I sat waiting for our phone interview, however, I would've been happy for any introduction. Our appointment had already been rescheduled once that afternoon by Reed. Now, I'd been on the phone for more than 30 minutes with his assistant while we waited for Reed to tap into the call. His phrase "waiting for the man" never seemed more profound.

There's hardly a rock band of any worth that hasn't been influenced by the Velvet Underground, Reed's band of the late 1960s, which included John Cale, Sterling Morrison, and Maureen Tucker among its members. His solo career, currently in its fourth decade, continues to flourish and evolve, although it's had its highs and lows over the years. One example remains 1973's Berlin, a song cycle about doomed lovers plagued by their addictions, domestic abuse, adultery, and suicide, among other things. The album, which both the public and press widely dismissed at the time as being "too depressing," was a provocative follow-up to the success of Reed's Transformer and its improbable Top 40 hit, "Walk on the Wild Side."

Thirty-five years later, Lou Reed's Berlin is a concert doc having its U.S. premiere at the South by Southwest Film Festival. Directed by The Diving Bell and the Butterfly's Julian Schnabel, the film also includes material lensed by Schnabel's daughter Lola. Reed is also the keynote speaker for the SXSW Music Festival. We finally spoke to "the man" by phone, one week before his trip to Austin.

**Austin Chronicle:** Let me start by wishing you a belated happy birthday. I noticed while preparing for this interview that you turned 66 a couple of days ago.

Lou Reed: Thank you. That's very kind of you.

AC: Speaking of birthdays, I'm searching for the right term; elder statesman of rock or godfather of punk doesn't do it for me. How do you deal with that kind of pigeonholing?

LR: How about master musician?

AC: That's good. So much of your career has been about being an outsider, making outsider art. Now you're a keynote speaker at South by Southwest. How do you reconcile those two activities?

LR: I've always been me. And they are what they are. Sometimes, for whatever reasons, it goes the other way, but it's not anything I'm doing particularly.


AC: Can you give us any previews of what your keynote will be? LR: I'm going to have a discussion with the great producer Hal Willner. We're going to discuss Berlin and other topics. [At this point Reed asks about the Texas primaries, which had occurred the day before and in which he expressed much interest. Then, suddenly, he segued back to the question I had asked earlier.] What I was gonna say about the elder-statesman thing: What would you call B.B. King?

AC: God?

LR: Yeah, there you go. You know, you would think rock is at the point where people would have a little respect for the people who do it, and not just for 14-year-olds. Just like the blues are the blues and always will be, there will always be classic people who do it. And classic songs.

AC: We live in an era where there are so many great master musicians. I recently saw Martin Scorsese's Rolling Stones movie, Shine a Light, which is a pretty straightforward concert film that plays like a tribute to the band's longevity. Then there's Berlin, which is also a concert film, but the songs combine to tell a dark story. I've always loved the album and feel like the film really captures it.

**LR:** One would hope.



**AC**: What do you feel?

LR: I think it's perfect. I can't imagine improving it. On a big screen, with a real sound system, it's really amazing, I must say. And it's also 100 percent pure.

**AC**: What do you mean by that?

LR: What I mean is, it's exactly what it is. It's very pure. It's music and visuals, and that's that.

**AC**: The album is so inherently visual. The movie brings the material to its full potential, filling out images I've had in my mind for so many years. How did Julian Schnabel come into this project? Were the concerts already set up?

LR: He and I have been friends a long time. And he's very much in love with that album and always wanted to do something with it. And then Susan Feldman from St. Ann's Warehouse [in Brooklyn] said, "Why don't you just come in and play Berlin." I said OK. I was talking to Julian about it, and he said, "Well, "You know I've never understood all this business about Berlin being so depressing. It's like these people haven't seen A Streetcar Named Desire? These people haven't read Othello?"

you know, it should have a set. I should direct this, and it should have a set." And me and [Bob] Ezrin, who produced it in the first place, we had always had an idea. We never got to do it, but the original idea had been to stage it, and we had ideas what the set would be. It was very much like what Julian had in mind.

He put together a set in a warehouse in Brooklyn and said, Come look at this, and tell me what you think." It was amazing. I just loved it. So there was that. Then Schnabel's daughter Lola is a terrific filmmaker. She and I would sit for hours and hours talking about Caroline [Berlin's tragic central character]. Where does she live? What does she look like? I didn't want to put together something that crushed a listener's visual version of it.

**AC:** By making it real specific?

LR: By making it be something you can't associate with. However you pictured her, [the film's visual stand-in] Emmanuelle Seigner should satisfy the way a Caroline can look, the kind of person she is, et cetera, et cetera. Anyway, we tried. Putting everything together reminded me very much of Warhol years ago, using lights and film and this and that. We had all that, and this killer set that Julian made. And Steve Hunter, the original guitarist, was there, and Ezrin was there for the first couple of shows to make sure everyone came in where they were supposed to. The choir - the choir of Brooklyn kids - was wonderful. So that was it. Then the thing is: Will the lyrics hold up? When I write, I try not to write something that'll sound dated So, if it didn't sound dated, the question then becomes: Is it good enough? Could it hold up? And if it couldn't hold up, we wouldn't do it.

AC: Obviously you believe it did. One of the things I've always found so compelling about Berlin is that, at least in my mind, it made so clear your creative writing abilities, that your songwriting wasn't just autobiographical as so many people have claimed.

LR: Well the thing is, even if I had, so what. Right? You know I've never understood all this business about Berlin being so depressing. It's like these people haven't seen A Streetcar Named Desire? These people haven't read Othello? What? Are you joking? Who are you talking to when you say things that are so incredibly restrictive? So there's nothing to even talk about with people like that.

AC: I think it's part of your style, with the conversational tone of your singing and the clarity of your images, that gives people the idea that it's all actual.

LR: Well, also, you know, the thing is, you have to believe it's real, or the thing's no good in the first place. It has to

**AC**: One of the things that strikes me while watching the movie is the strength of your collaborations: The Schnabels we talked about some, the way you light up while watching Antony perform his solos. Working with others seems to be very satisfying to you. You work here with Steve Hunter again. Can you talk a little bit about what pleases you about collaborating with other people?

Given the group's renown for also backing Neko Case, Jon Langford, and Andre Williams, the Sadies are the proper inheritors to the legacies of Crazy Horse and the Band. Citay specializes in campfire psychedelia, the type of peyotefueled, nomadic noodling that causes hazy visions of des-



ert sky. Led by San Francisco-based guitarist Ezra Feinberg of Piano Magic and the Fucking Champs' Tim Green, the largely instrumental collective's second effort offers nine such enchanted phantasms. "First Fantasy" develops the blueprint for what follows, acoustic meditations organically unfolding into larger, electric soundscapes, like Six Organs of Admittance without the Eastern accent. This pattern becomes mundane in the title track and "A Riot of Color," but harmonized leads throughout Little Kingdom twist and turn in stunning unison, at times recalling Ratatat and post-Dark Side Floyd. The hammer of the gods finally strikes on "Former Child," a thunderous, sevenminute suite that sounds like Led Zeppelin's "No Quarter" performed by Glenn Branca's 100 guitar orchestra. In the Future (Jagjaguwar)

Coming down from the, er ... mountain, well, British Columbia, bandleader Stephen McBean and his cohorts sound logiammed in the past on In the Future. Not that Black Mountain doesn't deserve mad props for impersonating

Relapse Records grinds to a halt. Yours. High on Fire's fourth alarm, Death Is This Communion, leaves craters deeper than even 2004 predecessor Blessed Black Wings, airplane-hangar sonics courtesy of Seattle soundman Jack Endino. Des Kensel's turbine drums power Matt Pike's locust swarm, the guitarist's threshing gargle war-torn by Roman legion riffs. "Fury Whip" flogs apocalyptic steeds into dog meat, "Turk" fires catapults, and "Rumors of War" drums along the Mohawk. "Return to Nod" closes like SF 1906. Communion earns the Oakland trio its deluxe edition DVD album doc. Kentucky trio Coliseum rips a seat from their labelmate's ringside, No Salvation encasing hardcore tendencies in metallic body armor (45rpms of "Defeater"). Guitarist Ryan Patterson's ability to cauterize vocal polyps without compromising either melodic cadence of verse or firewall riffs ("The Fate of Men," "Seven Cities") distinguishes their sophomore LP: 13 tracks in 31 teeth-bearing minutes. What's in a name? Philly trio Genghis Tron crowns theirs with epic electro-metal, synthesizers layering emotional progressions out of hard Floyd and ELP on sophomore sacrifice Board Up the House. "Things Don't Look Good," death/doom/Benedictine vox overlording 31/2 minutes of urban overpopulation on a grid of guitar/synthesizer, clashes in contrast to 1:45 of "Endless Teeth" gnashing. Ambient instrumentals ("Recursion"), NIN meets Tangerine Dream ("I Won't Come Back Alive"), and nearly 11 minutes of track 11 bring a tolling "Relief" and pinging ascension to this death House. Vverevvolf Grehv, Omaha one-man Dapose, transforms Genghis Tron's video gaming into an ear-splitting industrial caterwaul on debut Zombie Aesthetics. Looping, soundtrack splatter, and processed, malevolent vocals equal a jackhammer cavity fill by Laurence Olivier. Getting through Zombie Aesthetics once, or just the seven-minute title track, warrants the Purple Heart. Pin me. (Thursday, March 13, Emo's Annex, 9pm-1am.)





#### **BOBBY WHITLOCK & COCO CARMEL** Lovers

Thirtysomething years ago, Texan Boz Scaggs invented adult contemporary radio by moving millions of Silk Degrees. Bobby Whitlock and wife CoCo Carmel's studio debut, Lovers, transforms silken Left Coast murmurs of the heart into gritty Southwestern declarations of ardor. Her tart saxophone and his thick, rich, deep grain delivery pledge the title track, singers entwined at the chorus never to unclinch. Equally hewn comes "Dice of God," seven-minute heavyweight rumble between Whitlock's preacher command and God's own truth. Austin axe brigade Stephen Bruton, David Grissom, and Eric Johnson carve up both sides. If 18 strings weren't plenty, Willie Nelson's guitar work on Carmel's "True Love," flushed and fluttering with its writer's vocal, courts divinity. The album's centerpiece, "Best Days of Our Lives," plays out as epic at the 1946 Best Picture of the same title, inflamed by Whitlock's Hammond organ. Carmel's gritty harmonies, and its downand-dirty, three-guitar weave. "Dear Veronica," begun by Eric Clapton and Whitlock in the aborted sessions for Derek & the Dominos' never completed second album, lands Willie again to stylize Veronica Lake's cinematic allure into sonic senia tones. That would close most LPs, but Lovers ends with Whitlock tearing out a piece of his heart to match his past, "Layla" slowed and saxed, built from comfort not for speed, and attacked with gusto by its guitarists forgoing the song's majority coda for fireworks its original guitarist has favored for decades. Clapton never reworked a love like this. (Saturday, March 15, Cedar Door, 8pm.) - Raoul Hernandez

There's absolutely nothing wrong with the art of imitation, so long as it's done correctly. Evidence stands by







"Like moths we get confused ... and we dance like sparks from a muzzle," sings frontman Yan, urging on second guitarist Noble, who's learned a thing or two since 2005's Open Season. There's a palpable sense of urgency with these young, loud, naval insurgents: The screws are turning, the music churning. Occasionally becalmed, as on borderline Iullaby "No Need to Cry" and eerie soundscape "We Close Our Eyes," Rock Music proves BSP can hold their course. (Saturday, March 15, Maggie Mae's Rooftop, 1am.)

#### **BODY OF WAR**

7pm, Stubb's Co-written and co-directed by Austin's Ellen Spiro and Phil Donahue, SXSW Film documentary Body of War is a postwar portrait of Tomas Young, paralyzed from the chest down on his fifth day of service in Iraq. Kimya Dawson, System of a Down's Serj Tankian, Tom Morello of Rage Against the Machine, Brett Dennen, Brendan James, and RX Bandits are all featured on the Young-curated soundtrack, whose proceeds benefit Iraq - Austin Powell Veterans Against the War.

#### **HORSE + DONKEY**

8pm, B.D. Riley's Somewhere in the fourth dimension, where space and time intersect (aka El Paso), local trio Horse + Donkey erupted with reverb and darkness, as delicious as Echo & the Bunnymen without Ian McCulloch's ego. The desert setting nurtured H+D's psych, but the energy onstage is all city lights. Three years after the initial tease, H+D's killer sophomore disc revs up eponymously. - Darcie Stevens

#### THE BLACK

8pm, Dirty Dog Bar Fortunately for Alan Schaefer and Dave Longoria, the World's Greatest Record Collection hasn't yet sold. Come to think of it, Austin quartet the Black, anchored by those two, probably doesn't need any more vinyl, seeing as 2005 debut Tanglewood and 2007's Donna 12-inch pull from their already-astounding collection of country, Delta blues, and classic rock, blending them into a Texas-sky hue. - Darcie Stevens

#### **ELENI MANDELL**

8pm. Ale House 2007 was a career-making year for singer-songwriter Eleni Mandell. The Los Angeleno's Miracle of Five (Zedtone), her sixth disc, won over audiences and critics alike with its after-hours ambience, lush lyrics, and melodies that drew comparisons to P.J. #### LI'L CAP'N TRAVIS

8pm, Bourbon Rocks It's too easy to wrap Austin's Li'l Cap'n Travis up in a tidy little package. They're the perfect hybrid of the Beach Boys' "Don't Worry Baby" and the Rolling Stones' "Far Away Eyes." When a cosmic cowboy lap-steel lead from Gary Newcomb flashes



In the 25 years since his opening agit-folk cri de coeur "A New England," lovesick balladeer Billy Bragg's risen to "national treasure" status in his native UK, penned a book (The Progressive Patriot: A Search for Belonging), and released his first studio album in six years, the disarmingly brilliant Mr. Love & Justice, which he's proclaimed his "career-defining statement."

Where does the time go? He was 21 when he wrote that song, and he's 50 now. He didn't want to change the world, and he wasn't looking for a new England. He was just looking for another girl. In June, he found her:

"They were reopening the refurbished Royal Festival Hall last year with a performance by 1,500 amateur choristers and the London Symphonia performing Beethoven's Ode to Joy," recalls Bragg. "Well, they wanted someone to write a new lyric, so they called upon me!"

That Bragg, a confirmed socialist and vehement anti-Tory whose resurrection of Woody Guthrie via his Mermaid Avenue collaborations with Wilco redefined modern folk, would be chosen for such a momentous undertaking says everything about the former "one-man Clash"s current status in his beloved Britannia. This is, after all, the man who sang, "Take down the Union Jack; it clashes with the sunset."

"We performed it once for the reopening ceremony, which, let me tell you, was a trip. ... But then they told me they were going to do it again, for the queen, and that's when it all started getting a bit 'through the looking glass.'

"The queen and I don't often cross paths," Bragg dryly notes. "But we actually met in the lineup after the show, and she gave me a look like: 'What the bloody hell are you doing here? Of all people, you, Braggy?'

"The really weird thing was that an hour or two later, they got a call at the South Bank from Buckingham Palace: 'Could the queen possibly have a copy of the score ... signed by Mr. Bragg?

"If I'd've known she was coming for that, I'd've brought a T-shirt!" - Marc Savlov

#### **Hotel Cafe**

7pm, Parish Hollywood's Hotel Cafe is considered one of the premier singer-songwriter venues in the United States. For the past five years, it's sponsored a tour of the U.S. and UK with the goal of sharing a communal vibe between acts and audience. The 2008 version features a dozen slots and offers a wide variety of sound from electronic to folk rock. Highlights include the decidedly modern bluesrock of Long Beach's Rocco Deluca & the Burden; San Diego's Greg Laswell, whose 2006 debut, Through Toledo (Vanguard), broke a few hearts; and L.A.'s quirky Jim Bianco, who mixes blues and swing reminiscent of Tom Waits and has just released Sing on the Hotel Cafe label. Nashville-born Cary Brothers is actually a singersongwriter and one of the founders of the Hotel Cafe tour. Brothers brought anthemic underpinnings to stately chamber folk on his 2007 release, Who You Are. The sweet vocals of NYC's Ingrid Michaelson and L.A.'s Sara Bareilles end the night on an upnote. - Jim Caligiuri



# THE BLACK & WHITE YEARS

(Brando)

The Black & White Years hearken back to a simpler time - 1977 to be exact. The local quartet's eponymous debut sounds like an updated version of the Talking Heads, with angular post-punk guitar carefully structured over jittery synths and polyrhythmic beats. Probably not coincidental, then, is the LP's production by former Talking Head keyboardist Jerry Harrison, who ensures that every layer of sound has its own space to breathe, particularly in opener "A Wetter Sea" and Technicolor ballad "My Broken Hand." Like David Byrne, vocalist Scott Butler seethes with cynical, hyperintellectual lyricism, most evident on



"Power to Change," which reads like a summation of God, Germs, and Steel. The disco-glam of "Everyone" and closer "Zeroes and Ones" lean closer to Of Montreal circa The Sunlandic Twins, while "Hysterical Sickness" and "Evil Ape" add hot flashes of surf guitar, the latter boasting a psychedelic organ and mariachi trumpets. Everything sounds familiar, but it's rarely ever sounded better. (Thursday, March 13, Maggie Mae's Gibson Room, 9pm.)

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Notes From the Underground (Pop Detective)

Rare is the power-pop act that doesn't allow veneration to sap vitality. Led by former Blue Ash/Stiv Bators bassist/guitarist Frank Secich and ex-Backdoor Men guitarist Terry Hartman, Youngstown, Ohio's Deadbeat Poets intertwine Byrds/Tom Petty jangle with strategic swatches of Dead Boys mayhem to create a whole new balloon animal. Whisking fellow travelers from the back roads of Ohio to the streets of Paris, Secich and Hartman create a palpable, Ray Davies-style sense of place both strange and wonderful. "The Truth About Flying Saucers" recasts space aliens



as restless miscreants on the prowl for Coca-Cola, drive-in movies, and girls, while "No Island Like the Mind. No Ship Like Beer" celebrates the sweet release of introspective carousal with a bumper-sticker-ready refrain. Secich's "The Stiv Bators Ghost Tour" is a ringing, acoustic journey through Bators' life and death that achieves poignancy without having to cloy. With no filler in earshot, Underground is a living, breathing exemplar of power-pop's most endearing qualities. (Thursday, March 13, Lamberts Patio, 9pm.)

Not that Liam Finn copies his dad, but there are similarities in their obvious love of simple melodies, hooks aplenty, and the Beatlesesque production on I'll Be Lightning, Liam's solo debut. What's striking about this set is that except for some drum parts and Neil playing bass on one tune, Liam's Lightning is bottled in his own one-man band, old-fashioned studio tricks and tape manipulation filling the gaps since he proudly proclaims that no computers were used in the making of the album. An imposing concoction of mixed moods, from the roof-lifting "Lead Balloon" to the psychedelic fog of the title track and energetic skiffle of "Energy Spent," Lightning's uplifting and imaginative vision is all Liam Finn's. #### **KAKI KING**

Dreaming of Revenge (Velour)

Whether plumbing the instrumentalism of her first two discs or moderately vocal - 2006 breakthrough ... Until We Felt Red - Kaki King's complex emotional tangle breathes through the pores of her guitar. On the 28-year-old prodigy's fourth LP, the mostly instrumental Dreaming of Revenge, musical and vocal virtuosity, songwriting, and King's ever-expanding sonic palette of feminine pop and pang rally on "Pull Me out Alive." That instrumental cityscape "Montreal," a monorail of sightless buoyancy, follows it up only enhances this dish best served chilled. Sung or not, Revenge intimates the same: diary entries both intimate and extroverted. Opener "Bone Chaos in the Castle" thumbs outer guitar harmonies, while the plaintive appeal of "Life Being What It Is" bobs as jaunty as the wordless "Sad American" weaves. Ideas thin at the end ("Can Anyone Who Has Heard This Music Really Be a Bad Person?"), but when blithe builds to a six-string gallop on stilling closer "2 O'Clock," Revenge kills. 8pm. Soho Lounge Once home to underground legends Dead C, Guided by Voices, and Brother J.T., Philadelphia label Siltbreeze tests positive as integral to indie rock's DNA. The 'Breeze was resurrected in 2005 with Columbus, Ohio, trio Times New Viking's racket Dig Yourself, and

now it's birthing a

new generation of

weirdness. It takes



two to make noise: Montana twopiece Ex-Cocaine brings the wobbly swell from last year's Esta Guerra; NYC duo Blues Control - Lea Cho and Russ Waterhouse - make mood music, but the kind Siltbreeze's familiar with. Lilting piano and guitar-effect wizardry melted third ears on last year's self-titled debut on Holy Mountain; their third album drops on Siltbreeze later this year. Australian duo Naked on the Vague's The Blood Pressure Sessions sounds about as dark as their music, and on vinyl it's primitive and witchy. xNoBBQx, another duo from Down Under, does the drone, as well. Portland, Ore.'s Eat Skull steps on the fuzzbox; former Wisconsonite Kevin De Broux, aka **Pink Reason**, sorts through art savagery, punk. and drone on last year's vitriolic Cleaning the Mirror; and Ohio legend Mike Rep does whatever the hell he wants. Proprietors of the "shit-gaze" movement, Columbus' Psychedelic Horseshit doesn't care about pesky chords on last year's Magic Flowers Droned. Times New Viking brings it all back around. #### Zizek Urban **Beats Club**

**8pm, Ninety Proof Lounge** Like tango in its infancy, Colombian-born cumbia has long been snooted at in Argentina as music of the lower class. What do you get when talented Argentine DJs start mashing up the genre with every beat-based music they can scrounge up? Call it electro-cumbia, because the Buenos Aires-based Zizek Urban Beats Club, named for Slovenian-born philosopher Slavoj Žižek, cooks up some of the most exciting dance music in the Southern Hemisphere. Its loose collective of artists has turned the sound experiment into Buenos Aires' hottest weekly dance party and counts Diplo as one of its biggest cheerleaders. Tremor mixes traditional music of the Argentine pampas with glitchy found sounds from zippers and dot-matrix printers, while the classically trained Axel K Soundsystem spices his dubbedout big beats with live percussion



and accordion. The only American on the lineup is Oakland's Oro11, who got hooked on cumbia while living in Buenos Aires and serves up blistering hip-hop with dancehall beats. El Remolon and King Coya & el Trip Selector plug into the cumbia prior to Frikstailers' frenetic fusion of high-energy baile funk and reggaeton saying good night. - Thomas Fawcett

#### **RETRIBUTION GOSPEL CHOIR** (Caldo Verde)

When Low's Alan Sparhawk and Red House Painters/Sun Kil Moon guru Mark Kozelek formed the Retribution Gospel Choir in 2005, it seemed mostly an outlet for the slo-core pioneers to rock swelling guitar anthems that would ring incongruous in their primary projects. With Kozelek receding to a production role for the Choir's eponymous debut,



the remaining trio, including Low bassist Matt Livingston, seems little more than an amped-up alternative and extension of Low's The Great Destroyer. Rehashing "Take Your Time" and "Breaker" from Low's 2007 Drums and Guns, the latter, especially, supplants the mellow drone of the original with some Crazy Horse. The sludgy guitars of opener "They Knew You Well" balance 1990s alt-rock with the Sonic Youth melodic fuzz and psychedelic jam of "Somebody's Someone," while "What She Turned Into" and "For Her Blood" pump pure power-pop. Although somewhat gratuitous, Sparhawk levies Retribution with a welcome force. (Thursday,

#### **BON IVER**

For Emma, Forever Ago (Jagjaguwar)

Justin Vernon's Bon Iver (bon ee-vair) and his fragile and resilient debut, For Emma, Forever Ago, were wholly unexpected. After severing ties with girl and band, Vernon retreated to an isolated hunting cabin in the woods of Northwestern Wisconsin to recuperate, and that obvious chill and blinding whiteness swirl throughout the outcome. It's an emotional journey from



strum one of the simple "Flume" to the accepting nouveau soft-rock closer "Re: Stacks." Bon Iver is as disparate as his falsetto is strong, highlight "Skinny Love" enveloping TV on the Radio and "The Wolves (Act I and II)" closing with a dose of near-electronic supertracked vocals. His pain is so visceral it provides warmth, the therapeutic definition of music. When the slide guitar and horns meet "For Emma," mind and ears meet her, too, and languish in her presence. Finding those unsung heroes of East Austin and Houston's 3rd and 5th wards can take as much luck as persistence. While Stout was doing an interview and photo shoot in Houston with a local musician. Joe Doucet walked in and pronounced, "I can play that guitar you got there." That was no lie, and Doucet's swampy zydeco blues bless one of Dialtone's strongest efforts. Houston guitarist Lil Joe Washington was homeless when he first hooked up with the label and has since recorded a gutbucket blues testimonial. Legendary saxman Spot Barnett and the Texas Eastside and Northside Kings represent for CenTex, while barrel-chested Fort Worth guitarist Ray Reed, whose Where the Trinity Runs Free is Dialtone's latest release, shouts out gritty originals and standards. - Thomas Fawcett

The Digital Age has sparked the globalization of indie pop, heard in everything from Beirut and Gogol Bordello to Vampire Weekend and M.I.A. Not since Doug Sahm's Texas Tornados, how-



ever, has an act so uniquely coined its own multicultural currency as Denver's Devotchka. A Mad & Faithful Telling, the quartet's Anti- debut and first full-length since producing the Grammy-nominated score to Little Miss Sunshine, unsheathes a musical realm without boundaries, beginning with opener "Basso Profundo," which blends Eastern European folk with Morriconestyle spaghetti Western noir for Cirque du Soleil acrobatics. Stunning Spanish bolero "Undone," instrumental Russian suite "Comrade Z," and elegantly stringed "The Clockwise Witness" perfectly balance transcendent moments like "Transliterator." Still (He and He) Sam Llanas and

Kurt Neumann remain a musical marriage for the ages. Two decades on, and Still comes as



a declaration: BoDeans are still with us, still rocking stellar lyrics and great harmonies. The pair reunites with producer T-Bone Burnett, who produced its captivating debut, Love & Hope & Sex & Dreams, in 1986. The result is a dozen inimitable tracks that veer from suburban psychedelia to folk-rock, taking off on "Pretty Ghost," a swirling, guitar-based meditation on celebrity and fantasy; the second track, "Round Here Somewhere," makes the droll observation that what makes a relationship special can be as easily misplaced as your wallet. "Willing" and "The First Time" reiterate romantic themes in contrast to murder ballad "Breathe." Long before that - about the time the radio-ready "Everyday" arrives - it's clear these vets are ready for the prime time all over again. **NO AGE** Weirdo Rippers (Fat Cat)

L.A.'s experiencing a renaissance, and it's hard to pinpoint iust what the

Drummer Dean Spunt and guitarist Randy Randall, formerly of the Wives, take matrimony to the next level with Weirdo Rippers, 11 songs from five previous vinyl-only EPs on five different labels. Songs are brief but flow seamlessly, skate thrash ("Everybody's Down") into melodic distortion into fuzz pop, instruments cranked to the max on "Boy Void" and "Neck Escaper." "My Life's Alright Without You" sounds tailor-made for a 1960s girl group, except the guitar dirties it up: highlight "Dead Plane" lures vou in until drums and guitar suddenly detonate. With No Age dropping its Sub Pop debut this year, it's not hard to imagine them on the roster circa 1989. Cemented around core duo Brian Borcherdt and Graham Walsh, Holy Fuck runs the gamut from electronic dancefloor antics to the most pseudo-symphonic instrumental pop this side of Iceland. Their sophomore LP appropriately titled LP, follows 2005's self-titled debut with a whirlwind of color and sound, whipstarted on live rocker "Super Inuit." From there, it's a wondrous ride, this crew pulling hard through mind-melding, livedrum loops ("Frenchy's") and lo-fi analog distortion ("Royal Gregory"). There's no joy greater than the Owen Pallett-touched gem "Lovely Allen," making the machine seem organic at rising tide. This showcase spotlights singer-songwriters from the Great White North. Rebekah Higgs is a 24-year-old from Halifax, Nova Scotia, with a folk-rock heart that's drawn comparisons to Feist, though she tends to infuse her work with vocal loops and electronic flourishes. Toronto's Matthew Barber, who just released his fourth disc, Ghost Notes, is a bit more introspective. Matt's sister, Jill Barber, also from Halifax, mixes folk, country, and the occasional torch song into an idiosyncratic whole on her 2007 release. For All Time. Perhaps the best known artist of the evening is Toronto's Oh Susanna, aka Suzie Ungerleider, whose career is entering its second decade. ## **Vampire Weekend**

#### 11pm, Antone's

In typical Ivy League fashion, Vampire Weekend coined its own genre: "Upper West Side Soweto." It's a combination of traditional Afro-pop, Trinidadian calypso, and slick art-punk, leaning heavily on the lush orchestration of Paul Simon's Graceland. The quartet of Columbia University grads craft concise pop about French architecture ("Mansard Roof") and linguistic imperialism ("Oxford Comma") without ever sounding overly verbose or contrived. "One (Blake's Got a New Face)" even incorporates elements of the Mighty Sparrow's "Obeah Wedding."

'We're very conscious of what we're doing both musically and visually," stresses drummer Christopher Tomson. "We want to create a whole aesthetic. We've seen people use Vampire Weekend as an adjective. At some level, I think that means we're successful."

Navigating the band's van outside of Columbus, Ohio, Tomson randomly engages in Trivial Pursuit on everything from Harry Belafonte ("He gave Bob Dylan his first chance to record on the harmonica on one of his records") to the best barbecue in Lockhart ("Kreuz Market"). His casual demeanor carries over into discussion of the group's selftitled breakthrough debut.

"When we wrote the album, there wasn't any pressure there," he says. "We weren't signed to a label. We didn't have management. We were just four friends that wanted to write good songs and get good recordings of them."

Demo versions of Vampire Weekend's now-infamous blue CD-R found their way online through blogs like Music for Robots and Good Weather for Airstrikes, beginning on Valentine's Day 2007. Less than a year later, XL Recordings released the album, and already Vampire Weekend and Upper West Side Soweto are working their way into common diction.

"The idea of actually releasing is quite vague," Tomson says of the blue CD-R. "We literally burned maybe 70 copies and sold them at only like two or three shows. It was like someone released them for us, and then it took on a life of its own."



#### VAMPIRE WEEKEND

(XL)

As if on cue amid the recent critical hemming and having over indie rock's cultural appropriations drops Vampire Weekend's official debut with enough justified buzz to render the entire debate moot. It's not simply that the New York quartet dices Afro-pop rhythms throughout that skitter across any number of musical inflections in service of pop perfection, as is the case with the classical harpsichord and strings buttressing "M79." No, it's that the songs are so undeniably catchy and aware of their pretensions as to deflect inevitable deconstruction. The Ivy Leaguers transcend simple irony through an almost absurd self-consciousness, "Oxford Comma" wrangling Lil Jon and Buddhist lamas to reveal an exploited authenticity anyway. As Ezra Koenig softly trembles, "Can you stay up to see the dawn in the colors of Benetton?" on "Cape Cod Kwassa Kwassa," the postgrads emerge as knowingly distilled products of privileged enculturation, sincerely attempting to forge identity from the ruins of an inherited global appropriation rather than propagate it. 



Instrumental indie rock remix albums are a rite of passage. For Austin/Phoenix-based duo Lymbyc Systym, comprising brothers Michael and Jared Bell, the honorary process rightfully follows last year's stellar Love Your Abuser and includes contemporaries like San Marcos' This Will Destroy You

With Shelby Lynne's career at a stalling point eight years after the breakthrough success of I Am Shelby Lynne, her digging deep into her Southern roots on a Lovin' tribute to Dusty Springfield makes perfect



sense. Springfield may have been British, but her interpretations of classic soul via Dusty in Memphis remain an all-time great listen. Lynne doesn't mimic though, taking nine tunes Springfield sang, along with one original in the spirit, and interprets them in a manner that's elegant, if not always satisfying. Legendary producer Phil Ramone keeps the leash loose with minimal backing of drums, bass, piano, and the guitar of Dean Parks. Lynne's sultry voice out front means hearing tunes like "The Look of Love" and "You Don't Have to Say You Love Me" for the first time. Her ice-cool reimagining of the Rascals' "How Can I Be Sure" is a perfect exhibition of Lynne's vocal ability and this project as a whole: bright and sunny one moment, sexy as hell the next. 
## **SXSW - KUT Artist Showcase** Friday, March 14th at Momo's

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8pm, Parish It might not be widely publicized, but Merge Records' 2008 showcase is being sponsored by the FBI's Federal Witness Relocation Program. Maybe the easiest target is opener Portastatic, which is just the nom de rock of label poobah Mac McCaughan of Superchunk. He's still working off of 2006's stellar Be Still Please, but hey, it's his label. While not actually aliases, Baltimore duo Wye Oak jangles banjos on debut If Children, and the Radar Bros. do a wonderful imitation of the Silver Jews masquerading as a Beachwood Sparks cover band. Meanwhile, Shout Out Louds have been harboring either Robert Smith's evil twin or his doppelgänger in their cold Swedish climes. She & Him is the vaguely named collaboration of Portland, Ore., bard M. Ward and actress Zooey Deschanel, and their also vaguely titled Volume One is utterly charming. After eight albums, it's no secret that Destroyer is really Dan Bejar, but epic latest Trouble in Dreams totally blows his cover. - Michael Bertin



Funkier tunes such as "Dialect" and "The 9" are reminiscent of the late-1980s M-Base sound and find Scott blowing more assertively. Christian Scott's time is coming. 
#### Mint



#### You Are Here (Young American Recordings)

South never quite regained the critical attention afforded them for their 2000 debut. Overused, which paired the London trio with UNKLE's James Lavelle to sometimes frustrating effect, although they've released three LPs in the interim. You Are Here finds them eschewing their early, postelectronica sound for a sparer, more organic, and ultimately melancholy one that never sounds less than insistently intimate. "Wasted." with its meshing of a repeated piano/guitar motif, recalling Ennio Morricone at points, and Joel Cadbury's whispery, haunting vocals ("Is it time to make a start? #### **DESTROYER**

Trouble in Dreams (Merge)

The cover of Trouble in Dreams, a painting of a veiled, sneering, drunk woman, telegraphs upfront that Dan Bejar's ninth album as Destroyer hasn't strayed in lyrical content. His twin obsessions, art and the opposite sex, continue to intrigue and allude him, as he nasally addresses on "Plaza Trinidad": "What devilry the source of this screaming? You and your dress: fair game." Trouble follows the critically lauded 2006 masterstroke, Destroyer's Rubies, and Bejar's band, returning from those sessions, makes it feel like a solid rock album. He's comfortable being frontman, too: the Band-ish sway of "The State" and vertiginous shimmer of "My Favorite Year" reflect a new confidence. Midalbum misstep "Shooting Rockets (From the Desk of Night's Ape)" sounds more like a Pernod-fueled journal entry than a song, but gorgeous closer "Libby's First Sunrise" continues the dream cycle. In the Vines (Asthmatic Kitty)

Brooklynite Ray Raposa flirts with the darker side of human emotion; 2005's First Light's Freeze was wintry in its ethos, to say the least. With his third release as Castanets, Raposa emerges on new songs set in the key of fear. In the Vines is a spare, unhurried blend of raw instrumentation and experimental electronic noisemaking serving as a chronicle of crippling depression and death's imminent domain. Raposa wrestles with the elements on opener "Rain Will Come," evoking thunder with his guitar, thrumming portentously until an electric squall thrusts itself to the fore. And if it's possible for music to be onomatopoeic, "Sway" certainly does the job, the slow plunks of the reverb-soaked strings emulating the rhythmic movement of hips, although the effect is more menacing than sexy. We all eventually return to the earth; we can only hope to do it as gracefully as In the Vines. (Friday, March 14, Central Presbyterian Church, 1am.)

1pm-9pm, Auditorium Shores Hip-hop takes center stage to bless Lady Bird Lake, capped by a rare performance from gangsta-rap pioneer Ice Cube. Twenty years after N.W.A's Straight Outta Compton, Cube's back to the basics, spitting politically charged lyrics over a brooding stripped-down beat on "Gangsta Rap Made Me Do It," lead single from the forthcoming Raw Footage (Lench Mob). Bay Area scene staple Lyrics Born brings his progressive funk and sing-song rap, Everywhere at Once due out in April on Quannum. Meanwhile, Jay-Z flowed it best when he rapped, "If skills sold, then truth be told, I'd probably be, lyrically, Talib Kweli." Kweli's latest, Eardrum (Blacksmith/Warner Bros.), is uneven but shows why he's considered the game's best lyricist. Kweli will be ioined by former SXSW leading lady Jean Grae. ## **David** Banner

#### 1am, Austin Music Hall

"A friend of mine was in Jamaica," starts a confident David Banner, "and he said the only thing people in Jamaica knew about Mississippi was Mississippi Burning and David Banner."

Banner is to Mississippi rap what Pete Maravich is to the no-look pass, the Jackson native repping his state for the past decade.

"I think I breathe Mississippi now," Banner boasts. "When people see me, they know what I stand for. Whether I'm drinking, out partying, in church, in front of Congress, people know where I come from.'

The Magnolia State is rich with musical history, but one chapter often looked over is hip-hop. Sandwiched between Atlanta, New Orleans, and Houston, Mississippi hip-hop now sits squarely on Banner's shoulders. Coming up in the no man's land of these various regional styles resulted in a brand-new animal.

"We're a synthesis of everything that's been thrown at us, good and bad," he says.

Banner has a high-top in both Atlanta and Houston movements, working closely with T.I., Killer Mike, Devin the Dude, and UGK. He went to school in Baton Rouge, La.



"All my songs are underlined by bounce music," Banner says, referencing New Orleans beats.

After 10 years of carrying Mississippi, though, he's ready to pass the torch to the next generation. "I threw it up for Mississippi enough for people to know what comes outta here," he says. "It's up to the people who come after me to hold Mississippi down."

That's not to say Banner's done making Mississippi music. In fact, he recently made

some hard decisions about The Greatest Story Ever Told, the album he planned to release this spring.

"My record sounded like everyone else's record," admits Banner, "so I scrapped it and started over the next day. I've got a song called 'The River,' and it's an old Negro spiritual. It sounds like slave music, but up to date. Nothing's been done like this before in the whole world of rap."

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
#### Brazil, **Electrified**

8pm, Club 115 Brazil isn't all samba rhythms and breezy bossa nova. Some musicologists argue that a version of the electric guitar was developed in Brazil around the same time Les Paul was fiddling with the knobs on his axe. And never doubt the rocking-out ability of a country that produced metal-maniacs Sepultura. Nobody on this lineup is shredding quite that hard, but São Paulo power trio **Debate** pounds out rock full of slashing guitars, heavy drums, and screaming vocals. Telerama, a Fortaleza fourpiece, describes itself as "roots nerd rock or the world's next pop delight." Perhaps it's not an either/or question as these indie rockeros serve up pop ballads with a lovely female vocal. Same goes for **Nancy**, a lady-led fivepiece from Brasília that's catching considerable stateside blog buzz. Fruet & os Cozinheiros is



a fivepiece whose moody art-rock shifts joyful to brooding without warning, while Buenos Aires native Valerio Rinaldi serves up earnest, adult contemporary pop-rock en español. The mellow rock of Norton makes them Portugal's answer to the Postal Service.


#### MARK PICKEREL & HIS PRAYING HANDS

Cody's Dream (Bloodshot)

Although remembered as the drummer for Seattle punkers Screaming Trees, Mark Pickerel's solo career has taken some interesting turns. Cody's Dream, his second album under his own name, builds on his previous work of evocative moods and lucid melodies. Inspired by a solitary car trip through the South without a working car radio and only his imagination to keep himself company, Pickerel writes of shady characters and a ghost or two in an inviting way that draws the listener close while occasionally asking for a dance. While his dusky vocals recall Nick Cave at his most tuneful, they lend the proceedings a necessary darkness: he even turns Dylan's "One More Cup of Coffee" into dirge. It's not all funereal, though. The jangle pop of "Cherokee Grove" and the bright beats of "She Sleeps Through Sirens" lighten the air tremendously. While not for everyone, Pickerel's visions are slices of heaven for those with a taste beyond the mundane.

#### NO KIDS

Come Into My House (Tomlab)

Indie pop and contemporary R&B have often flirted but never progressed much beyond heavy petting. The former waxes fey and too sunk into Morrissey's hopeless romanticism to saddle up the latter's gritty lust. No Kids certainly don't consummate the affair but they get further than most, like the Boy Least Likely To seduced in the basement stacks. Call it Twee&B: Songs like "The Beaches All Closed" and "Bluster in the Air" manage to meld slow-jam pulses with indie sentimentality, surprisingly maintaining the integrity of both. Like the Vancouver trio's former work together in P:ano, No Kids' debut is diverse and intensely layered behind Nick Krgovich's trilling vocals. "Great Escape" gently intertwines piano, strings, and horns, while other tracks unload Jens Lekman pop ("I Love the Weekend"); slinking, loungey brass ("You Look Good to Me"); and acoustic aloha harmonies ("Four Freshman Locked Out as the Sun Goes Down"). 



Ryan Sambol's compressed vox leads the fourpiece through a dark tunnel of love on 2007 7-inch Nothing and an upcoming LP. - Darcie Stevens

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#### LEAD STORY

In February, a Mississippi judge released two convicted rapists of children, who had each been in prison for more than 12 years, based on DNA. The men had been convicted primarily by the "bite mark" analysis of since-discredited dentist Dr. Michael West, who used iridescent lights and yellow goggles to demonstrate that scratches on the victims were bites by the two men. Subsequent independent analysis identified the scratches as scratches, perhaps even made by West himself, according to a director of the Innocence Project. West is a favorite colleague of medical examiner Steven Hayne, who always seems to find evidence of guilt of anyone charged by District Attorney Forrest Allgood, according to a Reason magazine investigation. West's bite "technology," in particular, has been widely ridiculed by forensic professionals.

#### THE CONTINUING CRISIS

• A 25-year-old woman was arrested for assault in Bremerton, Wash., in December after fighting with her boyfriend in the shower over whether the man's dog could join them. The woman objected and said the arrangement would be a deal-breaker for their relationship, to which the boyfriend replied that he hoped his next girlfriend would appreciate the dog more. At that, according to police, she punched him several times in the face, and in their struggle, he dislocated his shoulder.

- Female Muslim medical students at several hospitals in Britain are objecting to a campaign that demands more rigorous hand-washing (to stop the spread of dangerous bacteria), complaining that being forced to bare their forearms above the wrist is immodesty prohibited by their religion. Doctors cited in a February Daily Telegraph story said washing up to the elbow is crucial for safety. Some women at Birmingham University said they would change careers rather than comply.
- In January, the state medical board in Sydney, Australia, admonished psychiatrist Yolande Lucire for testifying in a court case about her belief that Ritalin and similar drugs had produced residual organic hallucinosis in children that might explain their violence later in life. The board said it disagreed with her and ordered Lucire to make an appointment with a senior psychiatrist for therapy, to help her deal with her problem of making unconventional diagnoses.

#### LEAST COMPETENT CRIMINALS

• A 16-year-old boy was arrested in Toronto in February after he emerged from a CIBC bank with about 150,000 Canadian dollars stuffed in a sack. Despite numerous Hollywood movies emphasizing the need for speed in a bank robbery, the kid had dawdled inside for more than 45 minutes after the silent alarm had been pressed, collecting cash not only from the vault and tellers, but from customers, and by the time he walked out, the bank was surrounded by cops.

• Pat Dykstra, 51, of Fox Lake, Wis., was persuaded by bar patrons, including her boyfriend, that she was too drunk to drive and so took responsibility by calling 911 from her truck to ask that the sheriff send someone to follow her home, according to a January Milwaukee Journal Sentinel story. (Dykstra then ended the call by telling the dispatcher how dangerous it is to drive while on the phone.) When deputies caught up to Dykstra, she registered a .14 blood-alcohol reading, well over the maximum permitted.

#### CSI: CATS

1) Luis Jimenez, 24, was arrested in Austin in January and charged with having child pornography that police say he left behind when he moved. The subsequent tenant has a cat, which, in the process of exploring the new digs, got caught in a gap between a pantry and a ceiling, where the DVDs had been hidden. 2) Police testifying in the murder trial of David Henton, 72, in Swansea, Wales, in January said they made recordings (in his home, with hidden microphones) of Henton confessing to killing his longtime domestic partner. Since Henton lives alone, the wordy confessions were apparently to his cats, to whom he spoke frequently about a range of matters.

#### NO LONGER WEIRD

Adding to the list of stories that were formerly weird but which now occur with such frequency that they must be retired from circulation: (87) The person arrested for drunkdriving who decides to contest the charge but is drunk again when arriving in court, as was Joseph Longfellow, 35, who blew a .32 bloodalcohol reading (four times the state driving limit). (88) People who live in airports, like Iranian Merhan Nasseri, who lived at Paris' Charles de Gaulle airport for 18 years because of passport problems and who inspired the Tom Hanks film The Terminal (and among others, Anthony Delaney, who was arrested at London's Gatwick airport in February after nearly four years' residence).

#### YIKES!

- In early January, when a national deep freeze extended even to the Florida Keys, iguanas fell into their natural hibernationlike torpor, and some compassionate Floridians, unaccustomed to seeing iguanas that appeared nearly dead, took them indoors to warm them up, which is a mistake. The owner of the veterinary clinic in Marathon said one "sweet lady" called him about the 5-footer she had dragged inside. "When it woke up," said the vet, "she couldn't understand why it seemed to be coming after her." "When they warm up, they go back to being a wild animal."
- Construction worker Brian Persaud's malpractice lawsuit is scheduled for trial in March against the New York-Presbyterian/Weill Cornell Hospital based on a 2003 incident in which he was taken there (after being clobbered on the head by a plank at work) and given a rectal exam. Persaud was alert when informed of the imminent exam but then went nuts, resisting the doctor, and was sedated so that the test could be performed. The doctor defended the exam, citing the need to check for spinal cord injury.

# day TRIPS

C.B. "Stubb" Stubblefield

Capt. Day Trips' magical musical tour. Music has been a major export of Texas for generations. Very few states have contributed as many sons and daughters to American popular music as the Lone Star State.

Thomas Kreason, director of the Texas Musicians Museum in Hillsboro, agrees with that sentiment, and his collection of memorabilia is a great place to get an overview of the state's musical history. A former purchasing agent for Hard Rock Cafes, Kreason has assembled a unique assortment of musical souvenirs and recordings going back to the "race records" of the 1920s and 1930s. The best part of the tour is his encyclopedic knowledge and interesting stories.

A short detour off I-35, Hillsboro is a quaint little town, where, legend has it, Elvis spent a night in jail. The museum is a couple of blocks north of the courthouse near three Mexican-food restaurants and an Italian cafe.

Among Kreason's musical exhibits is J.P. "the Big Bopper" Richardson's coffin.

A Beaumont native, Richardson had a 1958 hit with "Chantilly Lace" but died in a 1959 plane crash. When his grave was moved a couple of years ago, he received a new coffin. His original casket became a piece of Texas history.

Also on that airplane with Richardson was Lubbock native Buddy Holly. The gallery at the Buddy Holly Center in Lubbock tells the story of Holly's life and career and showcases a pair of his signature horn-rimmed glasses that survived the crash. You can have your picture taken behind the oversized glasses in front of the building. The center serves as an art gallery, hosts traveling exhibits, and has an excellent gift shop.

If you want to have your picture taken alongside the Buddy Holly statue, it's a couple of blocks north of the museum at Eighth Street and Avenue Q.

While you're in Lubbock, stop by the former home of C.B. "Stubb" Stubblefield's barbecue joint at 108 E. Broadway. The building where many area musicians got their start is gone, but his friends bought the property and turned it into a park with a statue of Stubb serving a plate of bronze ribs.

One guy who didn't get on the airplane with Holly and Richardson on that February day was Waylon Jennings. His hometown of Littlefield, about 40 miles northwest of Lubbock, renamed the main drag through town Waylon Jennings Boulevard.

Waylon, Willie, and the boys made Luckenbach, Texas, famous, but the village south of Fredericksburg is more than just a store with cold Shiners.

The town also sports one of the oldest dance halls in Central Texas.

The oldest dance hall in Texas would be Gruene Hall on the northern outskirts of New Braunfels. Opened in 1878, the open-air hall has hosted a wide variety of talent. The historic district around the dance hall boasts a collection of shops and restaurants and is worth a visit. The second-oldest continuously operated dance hall in Texas is two years younger than Gruene Hall. Schroeder Hall is about all that is left of a once prosperous German farming community between Victoria and Goliad. The hall attracts a great mix of bands, from the Subdudes to Pat Green.

If you want authentic Czech music, stop by the Moravia Store on any Saturday night. It's not much of a store anymore, mostly cold beer and hamburgers, but it's still a great little bar. Not on most highway

maps, Moravia is on FM 957 southwest of Schulenburg.

While you're in Southeast Texas, you've got to stop by Janis Joplin's hometown. Besides great seafood restaurants, Port Arthur has the Museum of the Gulf Coast. The exhibits in the museum cover everything from dinosaurs to sports heroes, but Joplin's psychedelic Porsche and a note she wrote to her mother are featured in the music section. You'll also find the lighter, comb, and a pair of dice that the Big Bopper had in his pocket on that fateful airplane ride.

It was Tuesday night at Dart Bowl, which means it was gay, lesbian, bisexual, and transgender bowling night. I had no idea how gay bowling or bisexual bowling might be any different than any other kind of bowling, and I'd come to find out.

From up where you get your shoes, I surveyed the lanes. Nobody looked particularly gay. Nor did they look particularly straight. What they looked like were, simply, bowlers. Which is not to say they looked like particularly good bowlers. You can be throwing gutter balls all night long - it doesn't matter. As long as you're wearing those shoes, you're a bowler. It's not a choice. It's not a lifestyle. It's who you are - a bowler. It's how God made you.

Anyway, the first two guys I approached sort of schluby, middle-aged guys just like you'd expect in a bowling alley – weren't singing show tunes or anything. But something told me they were probably gay. It may have been the cards they were playing between frames that gave them away: On each was a picture of a beefcake with an enormous erection. You know, like from the pages of Inches.

Still, that's gay gin rummy, not gay bowling. What exactly is different about gay bowling?

"I don't know," said Mike Strano, who had impeccable form and was clearly a cut above the rest, with an average of 218.

But Strano plays in the league all the same. What happened was, he was looking to join a league when he and his wife had moved to Austin eight years ago. One night, he showed up at Dart Bowl, got invited to sub for somebody, and had a good time. He didn't know that it was a gay league until somebody told him.

Truth be told, until then he probably had some homophobic stereotypes.

"But I said, 'Well, I might as well try it.' I'd met some good people and had a good time, but I still wasn't sure what to expect. I guess there's a lot more affection - a lot more kissing and hugging and holding hands than you're going to see in a straight league - and, at first, that kind of threw me off. But mainly it's just a lot more relaxed, a lot more social. You're not out to win. You're here to have fun."

The league – they call it the Austin Gamblers - currently has 18 three-person teams, and it's open to anyone. They keep stats, but sexual orientation isn't one of them. Chances are it'll never come up. However, there is one thing that sets this league apart from more competitive leagues: It's okay to suck. At bowling, that is.

"I never thought I would be a bowler," said Cynthia Brown, who has been in the league the longest, since 1987. "When I first started, my handicap was higher than my average. I've improved, but if my average starts to go down, I'm like, 'Whatever!' For me, it's about having fun. And here I am, 20 years later, still bowling."

A series of huge upsets on the weekend left Portsmouth as the lone Premier League team in the semifinals of the English FA Cup. Portsmouth won 1-0 at mighty Manchester United in the quarterfinals, while second division Barnsley and Cardiff knocked out the Premiership's Chelsea and Middlesbrough. respectively. Second division West Brom rounds out the semifinal lineup. - Nick Barbaro



### Crimes of the Heart

City Theatre, through March 16 Running time: 2 hr, 10 min

Few plays in the canon of American theatre can make a claim of ubiquity, but Beth Henley's Crimes of the Heart is one that can. Ever since it earned Henley a Pulitzer Prize back in 1981, the play has been a con-



stant presence on stages all over the country. The reasons for its omnipresence are many: one set; a small cast, primarily female; black humor; and that rarest of commodities in contemporary theatre, a warm and loving heart. That the play is set in Hazlehurst, Miss., five years after Hurricane Camille (circa 1974) probably doesn't hurt either.

Tennessee Williams, one of the icons of American theatre, made a great living parodying and dramatizing the lives of those living in the general vicinity of the Gulf Coast, the Big River, and/or the Crescent City, because the Southern Gothic style, with its ironies and contradictions, is ripe for such dramatic examination. Consider the Magrath sisters, who populate Henley's play: Their mother hung herself, along with a cat, when they were young, leaving the sisters in the care of their grandmother and grandfather. Lenny, the oldest sister, is a spinster with a bad ovary, living on the largesse, such as it is, of her granddaddy. Meg, the middle sister, is a chronic liar who abandoned her lover to the hurricane and has everyone convinced that she makes her living as a singer when she actually clerks at a pet-food company. And Babe, the youngest sister, has

just shot her well-known husband because she "didn't like his looks." The shooting of Zackery, a state senator, reunites the Magrath sisters at their childhood home

Let me say straight up: I enjoyed this production at the City Theatre more than anything else I've seen this vear. Despite knowing the script well before I walked in, I laughed often and cried once, and who could ask for more than that from a play? Henley's script practically shouts out loud for a quick tempo, and director Jennifer McKenna has her actors breeze through the three acts in just slightly over two hours. The three leads - Rachel McGinnis as Lenny, Melissa Rentrop as Meg, and Briana McKeague as Babe - make it look easy. Easy as well is the rapport among the three; you believe they're sisters, and McKeague and Rentrop look enough alike that they could be sisters. The show's other three actors - Michelle Cheney as Magrath cousin Chick Boyle; Derek Jones as Meg's sometime lover, Doc Porter: and Gabriel Smith as Babe's attorney, Barnette Lloyd - lend ample support, especially Cheney, whose Chick the Stick puts the "vass" in "vivacity."

Because I enjoyed so much of the production, its flaws stand out as well. While McKenna has her actors take ample time to play many of the script's more dramatic moments, some moments that need similar time get blown by like the hurricane that took out Biloxi. Other choices – for instance, the considerably fewer than 30 candles on Lenny's birthday cake, Babe's making of the lemonade, and the gaping hole where the kitchen sink should be - indicate a lack of care, cash, or effort that should have been somehow addressed. But you'll overlook a lot here, because these Magraths deserve your good will, as does any family so focused on forgiveness, caring, and love. - Barry Pineo





"Always leave 'em wanting more," goes the old showbiz adage, and you could have accused Tapestry Dance Company Artistic Director Acia Gray of violating this sacred precept with her revised edition of The Souls of Our Feet: The program boasted eight new re-creations of classic rhythm-tap routines from the vaudeville stage and silver screen, adding up to four more numbers than the honored original had. But the show itself proved no less rousing than before. Even with the expanded bill, when the exhausted Tapestry company took its bows, the audience was on its feet, cheering and clamoring for more.

Sixteen months after its premiere, The Souls of Our Feet continues not only to astonish but to reveal itself as both a testament to the vitality of tap as an American dance form and the catalyst that has propelled Tapestry to new levels of skill and artistry. Getting to experience in one sitting the contributions - make that inventions - of dancers from vaudeville legends Ford Lee "Buck" Washington, Bill "Bojangles" Robinson, and the Nicholas Brothers to Hollywood hoofers Fred Astaire, Eleanor Powell, and Gene Kelly and on to contemporary practitioners Sarah Petronio, Dianne Walker, and our own Acia Gray is to get a sense of rhythm tap's rich tradition and deep place in the culture, as well as its range of expression. We may be quick to associate the form with the rapid-fire tattoo of the flashiest dancers - which can be stupefyingly grand, as in the Condos Brothers' "Somethin' Like This?" an explosive blast of sweet anarchic fury recreated with breathless verve by Jason Janas and Matt Shields - but it isn't always about how many clicks you can cram into a second. It can be leisurely finesse, as shown by Brenna Kuhn and Jaqueline ..... Coleman in their breezy, blissful recreation of "Honi" Coles and Cholly Atkins' "Takin' a Chance on Love" or Dianne Walker in her "In Tribute to the Masters," an improvisation with respect and affection for her honored predecessors in every gentle, light-footed step. It can be about making music from the everyday, as in Robinson's "Swanee," wherein Tasha Lawson, Katelyn Harris, and Janas turned the simple act of walking into a percussive symphony Gray's smart, artful choices let us see tap's breadth, and the Tapestry dancers got us feeling it by investing in these historic routines all the passion and pizzazz, spark, and showmanship of their creators. Which says a great deal about how much the members of the company have risen to the formidable challenge of this show. They have always been fine dancers, but to move like Bill Robinson, Jeni LeGon, Eleanor Powell, Gene Kelly, or Ann Miller is demanding on a completely different

level, and they've managed it to a degree that is at times startling. In the new number "Pick Yourself Up." Coleman and Shields assumed the personas of Ginger Rogers and Fred Astaire, and while neither dancer bears a strong physical resemblance to either star, their moves so closely tracked the originals - the way Rogers' left arm is extended just so when they dance close, the way Astaire crooks one leg just as he's executing a turn that the young dancers appeared possessed by the Tinseltown duo. You could almost see their ghostly images superimposed on the pair dancing in the flesh.

And the fact that we were seeing this dance, all these dances, in the flesh is significant - indeed, may be the supreme achievement of The Souls of Our Feet. For the show not only rescues and preserves pieces of our past that might easily have been lost or left to us only as flickering shadows on a screen; it keeps them alive, reminds us in every exquisite kick, step, shuffle, buck and wing, and rat-a-tat tapped out by this exuberant troupe that tap is a living form, that it always has been and always deserves to be. The importance of this could not have been communicated more clearly than when the company was joined by Arthur Duncan, the 74-year-old living legend whose tap skills brought an unconstrained zest and vivacity to the somewhat staid atmosphere of The Lawrence Welk Show for 18 years. Duncan showed himself to be as animated and cheery as a schoolboy, and you wanted that spirit – and the form that it gives itself to – to keep going and going and going.

As the crowd wanted the show to do. Thanks, Acia Gray and hardworking Tapestry crew, but was it enough? No. We wanted more, - Robert Faires more, more!

# Jesse Burke and George Schroeder'

4 Walls Fine Art, closed March 8

How does proximity affect your perception of two separate but related objects? The question came to mind upon visiting 4 Walls Fine Art's recent dual solo shows.

Photographs by Jesse Burke hung on most of the gallery walls. At first glance, they all seemed like run-of-the-mill, glossy-magazine photography. The black backgrounds were a deep shiny black, white backgrounds were a brilliant white, and the colors were well saturated. The compositions were laid out so that textures were even and portraits were well-cropped, but there was still vibrancy. With this language of commercialization, one expects the camera's subjects to be presented in the utmost positive light.

And yet there was no flash in the empty stares of such photos as Nectar Impérial, Nils, and Nectar Impérial, Carlo. In short, they were pathetic. Moving through familiar masculine tropes, like hunting and sports, did not elevate them into hero territory, and the Abercrombie look limited how much pity you could give them. So you were left looking with indifference at these spectacularly average images. Are



they average because the setup is spectacular, or is the setup spectacular because the subjects are average?

Although not distinctly a separate show, George Schroeder's sculptures were integrated throughout the gallery. As you entered, you were confronted with a piece of large, black, balled-up steel in the round. The rivet elements described a steel construction beam. and the multiple points elicited a blackened flame. Along the far wall were other, smaller pieces. The rounded elements were definitely safer than sharp points, and the layering of elements gave them something of a modernist look. Kind of a pathetic one, at least when compared with the paintings on the wall.

The four paintings shared a lot of the same elements as the sculptures. Circles, tubular lines, and a number of layers were present within the frames. But where the metalsmithing gave the sculptures an industrial character, the more fluid shapes of the paintings allowed for freer association. Dare I say it? They looked urban, almost like graffiti. The steel was hard, cold, and close to being mere decoration, while the painted lines plotted out the shapes with zippy energy.

There didn't seem to be any connections between the two bodies of work. So taking the dual solo show as such denied the correlation of Burke's figures with Schroeder's sculptures. 

# New Reviews

# BODY OF WAR

D: Phil Donahue, Ellen Spiro. (R, 87 min.) One of the most affecting and certainly the most intimate of the cinematic arguments against the war in Iraq yet made, this documentary from former talk-show host Donahue and Austin-based filmmaker Spiro (Troop 1500) follows the post-battlefield life of Tomas Young, who took two rounds from an AK-47 (one in the knee, one just below his left collarbone) that left him a paraplegic, permanently immobilized below his chest. An impetuous Young joined the Army two days after 9/11 "to go to Afghanistan" but ended up in Iraq, where he was shot just five days into his tour of duty. Aided by his mother Cathy and his fiancée Brie Townsend, the tribulations of Pvt. Young drive home the human costs of war: This is a film about surviving the Iraq war, and as such it seeks to open not only hearts and minds but eyes as well. It helps Body of War immensely that this former soldier and current member of Iraq Veterans Against the War is a forthright, well-spoken, occasionally rueful but also remarkably levelheaded in light of his catastrophic injuries. He's able to ponder, via the Internet, what must be the single most undiscussed ailment to frequently befall wounded servicemen - erectile dysfunction brought on by paralysis and other penilespecific injuries - while simultaneously gearing up for his wedding (which opens the film) to the similarly pragmatic Brie. To its immense credit, Body of War does

not shrink from showing what most people would perhaps rather not see: At one particularly graphic juncture, Cathy changes her son's external catheter in the back of the family minivan, wryly noting, as only a mother could, that "this isn't the first time I've had your pee on my hands." Cannily, Body of War edits the Youngs storyline alongside that of Democratic Sen. Robert Byrd as he inveighs, in 2002, against the run-up to the war ("My hands may tremble," notes the oratorically profound Byrd, "but my heart still throbs."). By the end of Body of War, Young has met with Vietnam-era, paraplegic veterans' activist Bobby Muller (who tells his younger comrade in no uncertain terms that the VA has given him a scandalously raw deal); seen his own kid brother off to war (much to his mother's understandable dismay); and, finally, met with the elderly but no less fiery Sen. Byrd in his Washington, D.C., offices. All of which makes for a good anti-war doc, to be sure, but an even finer - and painfully accurate - portrait of the former soldier as a young man. # **COLLEGE ROAD TRIP**

D: Roger Kumble; with Martin Lawrence, Raven-Symoné, Kym Whitley, Donny Osmond, Eshaya Draper, Will Sasso. (G, 83 min.)

College Road Trip is that movie rarity these days - a G-rated film that isn't a documentary or an animated feature. A Disney production that would seemingly be more at home on the Disney Channel than in the local metroplex, this formulaic family

comedy about father-daughter relationships follows a predictable path from start to finish, although some silly business with a hopped-up pig high on coffee beans provides some unexpected comic relief about halfway through. The film's script (credited to four writers, no less) pits university-bound Melanie (Raven-Symoné) against her overprotective father (Lawrence) in the selection of her future alma mater. Daddy wants his baby girl to attend nearby Northwestern University so that he can keep an eye on her, while she wants to attend faraway Georgetown University to pursue her educational dreams. A college road trip ensues, during the course of which daddy learns

to trust his daughter, who in turn learns to appreciate a father who loves her so much. It's enough to warm the cockles of your heart, except for the fact that none of this mawkishness feels real in the least. Like other film and television productions of this ilk, there's a glossy sheen to College Road Trip that constantly reminds you the world it inhabits is one of make-believe. What this film needs is some off-the-chain comic relief to temper its mediocre storyline, but unfortunately, most of the film's energy is expended by Lawrence and Raven-Symoné in a contest to see who can out-mug the other. It's a dead heat between the two, with the dark-horse winner being a supporting player whose idea of being funny is to make a complete fool of himself: As a show-tunesinging and perpetually upbeat father also accompanying his equally annoying daughter on a college road trip, Osmond is all teeth and no talent. You'd think that his presence here might provide an opportunity for some tongue-in-cheek humor at his expense, but Osmond plays the comedy so darn straight that it's painful to watch. Somebody get this guy a job doing dinner theatre, where he can do no harm. ★ → Barton Creek Square, CM Cedar Park, Hill



### DR. SEUSS' HORTON HEARS A WHO!

D: Steve Martino, Jimmy Hayward; with the voices of Jim Carrey, Steve Carell, Carol Burnett, Seth Rogen, Will Arnett, Isla Fisher, Dan Fogler, Amy Poehler, Jaime Pressly. (G, 88 min.)

It would be pretty hard to muck up this Dr. Seuss story and its kid-friendly parable about the rights of all beings, no matter their size or shape, to the basic freedoms of life and liberty. It's perfect for the little ones, who might feel pushed around by siblings, bullies, and various elders and are sure to identify with all the wee beings whose innate desires are crushed by those larger (and, therefore, more powerful) than they. "A person's a person, no matter how small," retorts Horton the animated elephant (voiced by Carrey) when he's mocked by his jungle cohorts for his protection of the entire town of Whoville, a tiny speck

of a world that resides on the head of a single stalk of clover. Horton becomes the laughing stock of the jungle for claiming to hear little voices that no one else hears and for believing there is microscopic life that we can't see. No less an object of ridicule is the Mayor of Who-ville (voiced by Carell), whom the Whos call a boob for his complicity with the unseen Horton to save their community. For my money, I've never seen anything much wrong with the animated Chuck Jones version of this Seuss tale made for TV in 1970. But everything needs an update, I suppose, and this new animated feature does the job nicely, staying true to the playfulness of the Seussian rhymes and messages while ably adding in new bits of business to expand Seuss' verse to feature length. Carrey's general tendency toward comic mania is gently




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

There's nothing funny about what happens to the Farber family. Ann (Watts), George (Roth), and their adolescent son, Georgie (Gearhart), while off to their upscale country house on summer vacation, fall prey to a pair of immaculately dressed, disarmingly polite psychopaths (Pitt and Corbet), who proceed to mess with the heads of their victims - and the audience - in a very sick way. The result is, well, horrifying. And it's a remake. It's tempting to simply quote, verbatim, my review of Haneke's original, German version of Funny Games, which blew like a bullet through my skull (and ricocheted just as fast, although with less impact, throughout American theatres) when it was released stateside in 1997 (you can read it here: austinchronicle.com/gvrobase/Calendar/ Film?Film=oid%3A138006). But although the games are the same, the arena in which they are played - the world, as viewed through an increasingly skewed, surreal media lens - has changed. If anything, this shiny, new, Americanized take on Haneke's original themes is more effective, more visceral, and far more apparent in its intentions than the original. This "U.S."-tagged doppelgänger is very nearly a shot-for-shot do-over and as such it raises the question: "Why?" The answer, once you see the new film, is brutally, disquietingly obvious: Both versions of Funny Games comment on the cinematic and, as underscored by Haneke, particularly American conceit of filmed entertainment as substitute for reality and takes it beyond the pale. You can thank the explosion of reality television; the implosion of "real," nonscripted, television news (see Fox News' "fair and balanced" imbalancing act); and our new, best friend the Internet for that. Today's media-saturated "reality" is inching, for the average American, alarmingly close to what Canadian filmmaker/provocateur David Cronenberg predicted with 1983's Videodrome (not to mention 1999's eXistenZ) and which Haneke echoed, from a pre-EU perspective, via Funny Games. As a media-dominated (or decimated, take your pick) society, we've rocketed way past A Face in the Crowd, beyond Haskell Wexler's

Medium Cool, and into some creepy, white-

hot, prechopped, overshot, stage-managed

hyperversion of world and national events.

Haneke punctuates his bloody screed with

some very freaky exclamatory points -


Funny Games is not for the faint of heart, or those content with their weekly dose of "Must See TV." It's an (arguably) nonexploitive, nightmarish vision of random violence that goes exactly where you don't want it to go, and then goes even further. Watts and Roth are maybe bourgeois archetypes of a sort, but that's part and parcel of Haneke's mission. The utterly soulless performances of Corbet and Pitt will sear themselves into your mind and, with any luck, melt off some of the prefab, mundane media muck from your cerebral cortex in the process. You can take a page from Wes Craven before he went flat and keep repeating, "It's only a movie; it's only a movie; it's only a movie." But is it? I told you we'd be discussing this - Marc Savlov



# **JIMMY CARTER: MAN FROM PLAINS**

D: Jonathan Demme. (PG, 125 min.)

The title is as deceptively folksy as the man in question, who quotes the New Testament as easily as decades-old statistics on national oil consumption. Welcome to our 39th president - you know, the peanut farmer - who continues to reside in his family home in Plains, Ga. (population 600), in between touring the globe as our most esteemed elder statesman. Demme - who throughout his career has hopscotched from narrative features like The Silence of the Lambs to documentaries like Stop Making Sense - settles on a narrow scope here as he follows Jimmy Carter on his 2006 book tour, in which he promoted, and more frequently defended, his most recent title, Palestine: Peace Not Apartheid. Yup, them's fighting words, quite

intentionally; as Carter explains again and again in radio, TV, and print interviews, his goal was to spark an international debate. Some debate he gets, along with a whole lot of public outcry, especially within the Jewish community (including a war of words with celebrity lawyer Alan Dershowitz). By dint of the film's structure - the camera goes from airport to airport, interview to interview - Man From Plains suffers somewhat from a feeling of sameness (which provides a not-uninteresting lens on what book-tour fatigue must feel like), and when controversy is injected late in the film accusations of plagiarism and a closeddoor meeting with a council of Phoenix rabbis - Demme treads too lightly. Still, it's an intriguing historical document, not attempting a completist portrait of Carter but rather a series of candids: This is the former president recounting a long-ago ride in a Rolls-Royce; there he is kneading his forehead with exhaustion. In the film's most strangely affecting moment, we watch a make-up artist for the Tavis Smiley show devotedly rub lotion into Carter's hands: It is a sight to behold. Demme and his small team of camera operators have a special talent for zeroing in on moments such as this, moments that are bolstered by a typically spot-on and internationally flavored soundtrack (including Gillian Welch, Brother Ali, and original music by Alejandro Escovedo). Perhaps Man From Plains' most lasting impression: The pain of watching a president who, in addition to being trained as a nuclear physicist, actually knows how to pronounce the word, too. - Kimberley Jones

### NANKING

# 10,000 B.C.

D: Roland Emmerich; with Steven Strait, Camilla Belle, Cliff Curtis, Mona Hammond. (PG-13, 108 min.)

Willis O'Brien did it first; Ray Harryhausen did it best. No one is ever going re-create the lands beyond beyond or the times before before better than those twin titans of stop-motion Jurassitude - not even Raquel Welch's legendarily skimpy loin-cloth couture, circa one million years B.C. (AD 1966). Emmerich comes to the prehistoric party considerably late in the Hollywood timeline, and he arrives bearing neither the spark of creativity nor anything resembling even the flimsiest glimmer of originality. 10,000 B.C. is a stunningly ham-fisted paste job of a caveman flick, directed with all the subtlety of Eegah, woefully acted (those Geico advertisements are considerably more nuanced), and sporting some awfully shoddy CGI effects (the woolly mammoths are up to par, but that saber-toothed tiger seems like a hastily created digital afterthought). Strait, seen to much better effect in the upcoming, Austin-shot Stop-Loss, is D'Leh, a (possibly) Paleolithic hunter with abandonment issues who crosses continents (maybe) to rescue his blue-eyed beloved (Belle) after she and others of their tribe are captured by a equestrian raiding party in the employ of (who knows?) some wigged-out Egyptian proto-pharaohs. Emmerich's narrative is maddeningly vague on plot specifics such as epoch, land mass, and niggling little irritants such as why D'Leh's people resemble a tribe of Stone Age supermodels while the bad guys all look suspiciously Semitic. But most egregious of all is the insurmountable fact that this film is just plain dumb. From its introductory voiceover (by Omar Sharif, no less), which manages to explain nothing while simultaneously eliciting the first of many "What the ...?"s, to the cacophonous, Bizarro World, not-quite-but-sort-of-Egyptian finale, which involves all manner of uninspired thievery from Conan the Barbarian, Pamplona's Running of the Bulls, and even Terry Pratchett's Discworld novel Pyramids (!), 10,000 B.C. is asinine on an grand scale. Emmerich, the director of Independence Day and The Day After Tomorrow, has been styling himself in the mold of master-ofdisaster Irwin Allen for some time now, and with 10,000 B.C. he has finally superceded the retro-cheese meta-cool of his apparent stylistic mentor and created a boneheaded mock-epic that's so bad it verges on - but never achieves – some sort of desultory mad genius. The only evolution in question here is that of Emmerich's skills as a director of motion pictures. - Marc Savlov Alamo Drafthouse Lake Creek, Alamo

What's it all about, Alvin? Apparently it's about rebranding a musty old comic conceit for a whole new generation of proto-Willards. # ATONEMENT

Imagination typically should be encouraged in children, but an excess of it leads to tragedy in this more than worthy adaptation of Ian McEwan's novel. Thirteen-vear-old Briony (the wonderfully unnerving novice Ronan) is indulged, but also largely ignored, by her family, which includes her headstrong 19-year old sister, Cecilia (Knightley, seductively husky, wincingly angular). One day in 1935, Briony witnesses a bewildering act that involves Cecilia and the housekeeper's son, Robbie (McAvoy). Only later does she realize how one person's vantage, one person's truth, doesn't always square with another's. But that epiphany doesn't arrive until the film's second of three sections, when a now-18-year-old Briony (Garai) attempts to write a novelization of that day in 1935. (The film's epilogue takes place in modern times.) Atonement is a work consumed with the nature of storytelling and the moral responsibility of the storyteller. The film is not quite as brutalizing as McEwan's brilliant source novel, but it ravishes nonetheless in its grand exploration of the sins of the daughter and a lifetime spent making reparations. She and her friends are simply bored to death in Bet Hatikva and are therefore happy to take in the band members, if for no other reason than to experience something different. But writer/director Kolirin isn't interested in cultural differences: he's concerned with loneliness and human detachment, two issues that transcend borders and language barriers. 

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

It's Blair Witch meets Godzilla, with the audience allowed only as much information about what, exactly, is happening as the characters have themselves, and it works fantastically well. There's a wishy-washiness to the title – which references a woman's answer to one of several marriage proposals that political strategist Will Hayes (Reynolds) pops over the course of the film - and it's indicative of the film's frustrating effect: For long stretches, it definitely works as an erazagging retelling of Hayes' overlapping love affairs with three women. But then it gives in to some generic romantic-comedy frippery that punctures a hole in its own believability. Writer/director Brooks has written himself the romantic-comedist's dream: endless meet-cutes, as Hayes meets and remeets these women over the years (even his daughter Maya, played by Little Miss Sunshine's Breslin, has a bang-up entrance). The problem is, with so many meet-cutes, there's less time for actual, you know. character development. It's still all likable enough the cast is spot-on, and it's easy for the audience, like Maya, to shift allegiance throughout (Weisz and Fisher are effortlessly charming, in very different ways). ### GEORGE A. ROMERO'S **DIARY OF THE DEAD**

Diary of the Dead cuts right back to the beating, bleeding heart of Romero's original Night of the Living Dead and does it with as much of the same fast, cheap, and out-of-control guerrilla panache as is likely possible four decades on. If 1968's Night of the Living Dead was Romero's visceral rejoinder to the Vietnamethadrine paranoid freak-outs of the late Sixties, then Diary of the Dead is his no-lessdisturbing cri de mort in the wake of Abu Ghraib, Guantanamo, and Bagram-based black-and-blue ops - all of which, as Romero's nightmare repeatedly underscores, we now discover, watch, and absorb at an orders-of-magnitude rate far higher than old-school 24 frames per second, thanks to the near-instantaneous digital-media saturation that is the blogosphere, YouTube, and 24-hour cable news networks. Diary of the Dead is rough around the edges, dirty in the middle, and stained through with a sort of nihilistic humanism that ultimately unsettles more than the lurching undead themselves. The older Ken finds the ancient town calming and contemplative, while the younger and more antsy Ray regards it as a "shit hole." A pretty girl who deals coke (Poésy) and a racist dwarf (Prentice) become some of Ray's new companions. In Bruges is at its best when it's just passing the time. The idle dialogue is often priceless. When the action kicks in, however, In Bruges starts to go off the rails. The film's light comedy and dark morality make for an unsettling mix, and various scenes cry out for a prudent editor. The courtship of the forward-thinking Jalaluddin Mohammad Akbar (Roshan) and Jodhaa (Rai Bachchan) doesn't begin until about an hour into the movie and at times resembles a Hollywood screwball comedy. 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





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

### PERSEPOLIS

Satrapi's story, which she and Paronnaud adapted into an animated film from her graphic novels, is both specific and universal, and therein lies a large measure of its appeal. "I had survived a war, but a banal love story nearly killed me," she comments sardonically at one point. The film's flat, mostly blackand-white animation helps convey some of the sense of a graphic novel, but moreover, the visual look complements the story's moral sphere, a realm governed by absolute rights and wrongs and lots of gray in-between areas. No question, there is a perverse satisfaction in watching Stallone the actor shoot, stab, and strangle his way to victory, and Stallone the director handles those scenes well. But even as the body count rises, you're left to wonder whether there can ever be anything more. THERE WILL BE BLOOD

D: Paul Thomas Anderson; with Daniel Day-Lewis, Paul Dano, Kevin J. O'Connor, Ciarán Hinds. (R, 158 min.)

Opening at the dawn of the 20th century, this film epic is a compelling portrait of capitalism gone mad and the collective shams we hold on to as truths. Anderson's saga is one that rivals films like Giant and Citizen Kane in our popular lore as stories about how we came to be the people we are. Ambition

and greed drive the ascent of Daniel Plainview (Day-Lewis in, hands down, the most gripping film performance of the year), a gold-prospector-turnedwildcatter-turned-oil-tycoon. Anderson, the director of such culture-rattling films as Boogie Nights and Magnolia, here tones down his signature visual and narrative flambovance in favor of a more classically composed story while leaving intact the trenchant omniscience of his storytelling. The film also tackles America's reliance on faith and the gnarled intersection between pragmatism and belief. At its most forthright, however, There Will Be Blood is a rich character study of a fascinating individual who is by turns likable, loathsome, admirable, monstrous, and driven. Those 27 dresses mark the time Jane (Heigl) has spent, as one character puts it, in the taffeta ghetto of bridesmaidery. When Jane's boss and secret object of her affection (Burns, forever toady) falls in love with her sister (Akerman), Jane is stuck planning their wedding while simultaneously dodging the dogged attentions of Kevin (Marsden), a cynical journalist covering the wedding beat. Heigl anchors the film with a spaz-tastic charm, but the real star-making turn here belongs to Marsden, as a mixed-drink of frat boy and existential downer (or is it tall drink of water?). The jokes only hit about half the time – the best bits have an off-the-cuff feel - and the film is pocked with the kind of rom-com clichés that are practically written in stone, including the well-worn, improbable group singalong - albeit this one, hinging on Elton John-inspired malapropisms, is pretty cute, and what validation to know others have mistaken Bennie's electric boots for electric boobs. Like Akira Kurosawa classic Rashomon, Vantage Point replays a single event – in this case, the assassination of the United States president from multiple points of view. The views include those of an onsite cable-news producer (Weaver), a camcording tourist (Whitaker), a mystery man (Noriega) and an equally unknowable femme fatale (Zurer), a Secret Service agent (McGill), and, the key to it all. Thomas Barnes (Quaid), a recently rehired Secret Service agent who previously took a bullet for the prez and now enters and exits every situation with a panicky grimace. Quaid does what he can with a role that appears to be little more than a cheap carbon copy of Clint Eastwood's similarly embattled presidential protector from In the Line of Fire, but after watching him dash hither and yon, searching for the truth in a plaza of lies, it's just not enough to make Vantage Point anything other than another pre-election also-ran. If you had told me before I walked into the screening of Welcome Home Roscoe Jenkins that hyperactive comedian/actor Lawrence would be the quiet center of the movie, I probably would have laughed in your face. Though Roscoe Jenkins is hardly what you'd call subtle, most of the film's most boisterous, most scatological moments are left in the hands of other actors. Lawrence, meanwhile, is actually the soul of endearing insecurity (with exceptions made for the occasional overblown sex scene or desperate fist fight). He plays Jenkins, a successful professional who returns home to rural Georgia only to discover that, despite his fame, fortune, and newfound urbanity, around his family he'll always feel like a petulant teenager. Jenkins suffers from an epic and disappointing case of schizophrenia; it's capable at times of real subtlety and warmth and humanity but not confident enough in itself to stay away from fart jokes or empty acts of sassiness for very long. ### **AIR BAGS HAVE YOU COVERED EVEN IF THE CAR IS OFF**

Dear Tom and Ray:

Will an air bag deploy if the vehicle is running but not moving? For instance, you are waiting at a red light minding your own business, and a vehicle plows into your grill. Will the air bag deploy? What if the car is turned off? Let's say you're sitting at the side of the road, out of gas, and you get hit. Will the air bag work even if the ignition is off? Thanks for knowing the answer.

TOM: The answer to your first question is yes, Patrick. The air bag is designed to work even when you're not driving.

RAY: If you're at a traffic light with the engine running, the air bag is absolutely powered and ready to deploy if necessary. It's ready anytime the engine is on or your ignition key is on (even if the engine is not running).

TOM: In a situation where the engine is turned off - even if the key is removed - the air bag will still have enough stored battery power to deploy for at least a few minutes. That covers you if you park the car and get hit while you're collecting your Sleepy LaBeef CDs and getting ready to go into your girlfriend's house.

RAY: In fact, when we do work on a steering wheel or steering column at the shop, we're always advised to disconnect the battery and let the car sit for at least half an hour to be sure that the stored power is completely depleted before we start monkeying around in the vicinity of the air bag.

TOM: The number of minutes of reserve power varies from car to car, so there's no way for us to tell you exactly how many minutes your car's air bag will remain ready after you turn it off. But it's probably closer to five or 10 minutes than to 60 or 90 minutes

RAY: But just to be safe, even after we leave the battery disconnected for half an hour, we still send my brother in first. Why should those of us who still have passable faces take that kind of risk?

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

OK, let's do this. Cue the intro vocals to Starship's "We Built This City." You feeling that? Are you ready to throw hair and pump fist? Is the fist wrist accessorized with a colorful bandana? After all, this is the Starship we're talking about, not Axe. Otherwise you'd be rocking something in stainless-steel spiked leather, right? Let's pump it up, yo - take this thing to the next level. This is Austin, Texas, baby: Home of South by Southwest - the largest music festival in the known universe. Instead of a couple thousand bands fighting a chain-link grudge match just to get booked in a handful of venues for low/no pay (after all, Austin is the "Live Music Capital of the World" every day of the year and not just the four days in March when the weather's actually tolerable) this week there are like a zillion bands scratching and clawing to play anywhere they can for anyone at any time: the street, back yards, living rooms, tailgates, parking lots ... and sometimes in actual SXSW venues ... which are basically any place you can run an extension cord and hang a banner whose names and addresses appear out of thin air on the SXSW schedule. Habana Calle 6 Annex Backyard? Creekside EMC @ Hilton Garden? Sure, we know where Habana is, but where is the annex? And the annex has a back yard? What does EMC stand for? Entirely mentally constructed? WTF SXSW? There are thousands of musicians all over the world with fond memories of playing in an Austin club that never even existed. "Hey dude, if you ever get down to Austin you need to book a gig at the Habana Annex Backyard. I don't remember the address, but they have really ass-kicking mojitos.' Of course, if you think the folks at SXSW are the only ones crapping venues out of midair, think again. Pretty much every place in town with something to sell seems to clear out a space to put a crappy PA and daylong lineup of desperate musicians. It's certainly OK to try to hack off a piece of Austin's biggest cash cow, but as usual, the musicians are usually the ones who end up getting chumped. No matter what the owner tells you, having a "showcase" at an antiques store in Kyle during SXSW is not the same thing as having a SXSW showcase. Sure, you could argue the dubious merits of either but the former only has a highly tangential relationship to the latter - similar to the way Dwight Schrute is "assistant to the manager" rather than "assistant manager." Whatever. Part of becoming a playing musician is getting played every now and then. Still, as often as not, the users get used as well. It's hard to say whether providing free music, barbecue, and booze to several hundred slackers, musicians, and SXSW volunteers during a day party provides any real boost to a company's long-term viability, but it sure makes for a nice buzz that day. The same could be said of the free SXSW concerts at Auditorium Shores. Those big-name sponsors may not be feeling it on the back end, but the locals seem to appreciate the fact that SXSW is giving them a reach around. If the word gets out, this Saturday's concert should be one of the bigger ones in recent years. The lineup features big name acts like Lyrics Born, Talib Kweli, and Ice Cube. SXSW might have built this city on rock & roll, but Saturday night they're definitely going to burn it up with some rap.
