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
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
















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### The Problem With Prop. 1

When someone is lying to you about something, it is usually best not to endorse and empower them

The Chronicle has been aggressive about its issues with Uber for a while now, but I don't much share in those sentiments. I've used Uber both within this country and abroad. Mostly it has been a terrific experience, though the quality of the service is already noticeably deteriorating. Still, the recent controversy has been intriguing. Austin does not go easily into anything, which is probably not as terrible a situation as some would have you think.

The pushback against Uber, Lyft, and Airbnb as well as other collaborative civilian-based innovations where businesses are integrated into the community (renting rooms in houses we live in, chauffeuring passengers in our family car) has arisen from a number of sources - notably and most aggressively, from the established industries that are

being threatened. The integrity of neighborhoods and progressive, pro-labor practices are rallying points in this changing economy. And of course there's been the predictable Luddite pushback against any change.

Certainly in our world in weekly print media, Craigslist took away much of our classified advertising, and a number of online alternatives gained the long-lucrative Personals business. The web also proved far more inexpensive and effective for what I like to refer to as the non-licensed massage therapist trade. I was party to both those disturbing developments, and by the time we noticed what was happening it was far too late to do anything. Maybe if we had been doing a better job or were more on top of evolving technology, we might have improvised and improved those areas. Although what we might have done differently I really can't suggest. Even if we had aggressively switched to new online models, it wouldn't have helped much because many of those services still generate no real revenue.

But my current dislike, nay revulsion, at the pro-Prop. 1 campaign is neither sour grapes nor a deeply held distrust of Uber and Lyft. Instead it is because the campaign is so completely dishonest. When someone is lying to you about something, it is usually best not to endorse and empower them.

> Let's be clear: Political opinions different from one's own are not inherently lies, though in the current charged political atmosphere one often hears that accusation hurled. The lies here are blatant as they state, if you don't like Uber and want to mess with them. vote yes on Prop. 1. On social media and in traditional media there is a concerted

effort to mislead and deceive as to the crafters' purpose and intent with the proposition. I don't even have that big an issue with a private company upset by public policy initiating a petition drive to get a proposition on the ballot. But a deliberate campaign of deception is self-condemning. If they just told the truth, are they concerned that voters might not approve Prop. 1? Instead they are all things to all people. You like and support Uber and Lyft, then vote yes. You don't like and don't support them, vote yes.

When theirs is a coordinated campaign lying to you, it is because they don't trust you, and they think you are easily manipulated. Why on Earth would anyone vote to endorse that view?

It has to be noted that there are many individuals in favor of Prop. 1 (and it is also tiresome when the anti-Prop. 1 people accuse anyone who holds a differing view of being a company shill or paid proponent) for a wide variety of reasons. A number believe that regulations are inherently destructive to a free market, ultimately costing beleaguered taxpayers even more. This is not just simplistic but demonstratively false. There are all kinds of regulations that do create more problems than they solve some happening from misunderstanding a market dynamic, others from overly aggressive consumer groups, and many because ever-evolving businesses and services render once-reasonable restrictions meaningless or inappropriate or both. It's important to keep in mind that many regulations are driven by the very businesses they concern as a way to get the government to limit competition. But every day in every way there is a huge catalog of legislated regulations, requirements, and specifications that improve our and our communities' lives.

Some complain about almost all government. I suspect a majority of Americans feel overtaxed and underserved. The reality is most Americans don't pay enough taxes to cover the services they get from the government. Admittedly believers of all political stripes wish that government offered a serveyourself buffet. Liberals feel too much of their taxes go to military spending, certain fiscal conservatives remain outraged at welfare and extensive social services, and others bitch about public education, including those that feel almost any government service would be better served by the private sector.

If we really believe in a functioning democratic (small d) republic, then the elected government inherently represents all of us. It is not supposed to express the will of every individual voter or even the rule of the majority. But ideally our elected leaders do what they think is best for our country and community.

Obviously, there seem to be several rather vast political movements that believe our current government at all levels is everything but functioning. Even the most diehard supporters of representative government get up in arms when they don't like government actions. Lately this is very rarely attributed to differing opinions, misguided impulse, or legislators doing what they believe is best. Almost always, a legislator voting differently from a constituent's desires is regarded by that individual as corrupt and mendacious, with the most benign description being stupidity.

Rather than accepting our ownership of our government, it is explained that this government is no longer ours. Obviously there is great cause for concern over conscious, widespread voter suppression and disenfranchisement. These areas demand investigation.


But though we may not like the government, we vote for it. Incumbents are responsible for current governance. The electorate is unhappy with the government. But more often than not they return these incumbents to office (and term limits are anti-democratic exiles that will create far more problems than they solve). There is not some hidden alien force hidden away that emerges on election day to elect the least qualified.

Certainly, a pronounced pessimism over the current political scene is warranted. Cruz vs. Trump among the Republicans, and the vitriol between the Clinton and Sanders camps make politics seem more like the WWF, as my friend Fab Five Freddy observed, than any kind of campaign of ideas, dignity, and mutual respect.

I personally despair over Sanders and Clinton supporters saying they will sit this election out or vote for a third party candidate if it isn't their candidate - a recipe for disaster.

Here in Austin, the electoral situation is clearer. An enormous amount of money and media persuasion is in the mix, but ultimately rather than trusting the voters and just making their case, supporters are pretending that regardless of your specific concerns, voting for Prop. 1 will achieve them. Even if you support the argument in its favor, you have to be concerned about the dishonesty of the campaign.

### Chronicle Endorsement

### **PROPOSITION 1: NO**

PROPOSITION 1: "Shall the City Code be amended to repeal City Ordinance No. 20151217-075 relating to Transportation Network Companies; and replace with an ordinance that would repeal and prohibit required fingerprinting, repeal the requirement to identify the vehicle with a distinc-

tive emblem, repeal the prohibition against loading and unloading passengers in a travel lane, and require other regulations for Transportation Network Companies."

First, defy the laws. Second, rewrite the laws. Finally, buy the elections.

The "transportation network companies" - i.e., Uber and Lyft - began operating without adhering to existing Austin ordinances; they drafted and then accepted a temporary, pre-"pilot" ordinance they now insist was permanent; and they're in the midst of the massive funding of a petition campaign and vote-buying, combined with threats of departure and extremely dishonest promotion and advertising to persuade Austin voters to confirm their domination. Despite all claims to the contrary, this campaign has little to do with "fingerprinting" (the public safety standard) and nothing at all to do with either libertarian principles or the "free market." Uber and Lyft want a playing field heavily tilted to their advantage, so they can eliminate the local competition and monopolize the ride-hailing market - after which they

will resume squeezing drivers and riders as they have persistently done elsewhere.

> We believe ride-hailing is here to stay. But the exact shape it will take should be determined by the whole community in collaboration with our elected officials. A vote against Prop. 1 will not "ban" Uber and Lyft; should they choose to leave, that will be short-sighted and self-defeating, but other compa-

nies (likely to include a drivers' co-op) will soon take their place. The May 7 election, against the staggering amount of money and disinformation campaign of the TNCs, will be an uphill battle. But in the end, Austinites will either be governed by ourselves or by carpetbagging billionaires. We urge our readers to defy their extortion and vote against Prop. 1.

In his April 24 article, "More Strong-Arming From Uber and Lyft," Michael King reports that Joshua Baer, executive director of Capital Factory, posted the U.S. Chamber letter as "one more reason to Vote for Prop. 1." The Chamber fights regulations on behalf of companies that don't want to be publicly associated with the positions they are advocating" (U.S. News & World Report, Oct 22, 2015). Since it constantly opposes Obama on major policies and is a heavy contributor to far-right Republicans, the U.S. Chamber will have about as much impact on the Obama administration as "a snowflake on the bosom of the Potomac."

#### **START SMART NOW**



### **EADLINES**

**POLICY BEFORE NUMBERS:** City Council began its annual budget process with a Wednesday work session, with staff placing emphasis on structural "cost drivers" and policy choices over financial detail at this early stage. See "City Budget," p.16.

LAST THURSDAY. COUNCIL moved to include displaced mobile home residents in the Tenant Relocation Program, and entertained a mini-tirade from CM Don Zimmerman - the target this time: climate change. With only a budget work session scheduled this week, Council won't have a regular chamber meeting until May 5.

YET ANOTHER RECORD-SETTING month at **Bergstrom Airport**: SXSW-related traffic led to the busiest March in the airport's history (up 6% from 2015), its third-busiest month ever, and the 42nd straight month of consecutive growth in passenger numbers.

THE SEARCH FOR a new Austin Energy general manager narrows. City Manager Marc Ott picked four contenders this week: Terrance Naulty; Jacqueline Sargent; Deborah Kimberly; and James West. Kimberly is currently VP of Customer Energy Solutions at AE, and Sargent previously worked there. Ott plans to announce his pick in mid-May.

### NORTH CAROLINA'S TRANSPHOBIC so-

called "bathroom bill" could creep up next Lege session. This week, Lt. Gov. Dan Patrick signaled his support for statewide legislation that would ban residents from using bathrooms that align with their gender identity, and has started a petition on his website to "Keep Men Out of Women's Restrooms" by boycotting Target, which recently welcomed transgender employees and guests to use the restrooms/fitting rooms that correspond with their gender identity.

TEXAS HEALTH AND Human Services Commission Chief Chris Traylor is quitting after less than a year on the job. Traylor took over from previous commissioner Kyle Janek last June as the agency became immersed in scandals over no-bid contracts and nepotistic hiring; now the crumbling foster program at the **Department of Family and Protective Services** is under similarly heavy fire.

**BERNIE TIEDE WAS** resentenced to 99 years or life in prison on Friday, despite supporters flocking to Henderson, Texas, to act as character witnesses. The former mortician, who shot and killed Marjorie Nugent 20 years ago, had sought to have his life sentence overturned.

REP. DAWNNA DUKES, D-Pflugerville, is now under investigation by the **Texas Rangers**. DPS spokesman Tom Vinger confirmed Tuesday that the Travis County District Attorney's Office has requested the Rangers join the investigation into allegations that Dukes forced her legislative staff to work on non-state business.



### **Unlearned History**

### VIETNAM WAR SUMMIT RAISES GHOSTS AND QUESTIONS

I'm uncertain now whether, to many or even most Chronicle readers, the Vietnam War seems little more than ancient history. To the generation now aging out of public

consciousness (my own), it was the formative experience of our young lives along with the 1963 assassination of President John F. Kennedy, an event with which it's all tangled up in the mind. (Recent evidence: Stephen King's 2011 novel 11/22/63, and its Hulu adaptation, a strenuous attempt to reimagine stopping the assassination primarily as a

way to prevent the Vietnam War - a fond illusion also beloved of Oliver Stone.)

These musings are prompted by the LBJ Library's Vietnam War Summit, a three-day program reconsidering the events of the war, almost exclusively from the U.S. perspective. I note the latter because the war didn't happen to us. We chose it as a country, via a political class that valued Western imperial continuation and U.S. military "credibility" above all other international values. The

> people we waged war upon - Vietnamese, Cambodians, Laotians, and others - had no say in the matter, and paid in the millions of lives, for a militarist adventure that cost us tens of thousands, and eventually the national and international "credibility" of U.S. motives that was allegedly the war's political justification. "After such knowledge,"

math of World War I, "what forgiveness?"

afternoon, while the first panels of the program are taking place, and they have already brought very mixed emotions. The first - "Commanders-in-Chief" - featured historian H.W. Brands with a couple

of presidential aides (Nixon's Alexander Butterfield, LBJ's Tom Johnson) who thought it their business still to defend their bosses' sanguinary decisions and the war itself as a holding action against international communism. Brands was a bit more nuanced - not swallowing entirely the political mythologies offered by the others - but one was left with the impression, once again, that the central narrative of the war was the difficult moral predicament of Western officials.

### **NO SANCTUARY**

That was followed by a panel of U.S. Army veterans, who told soldiers' stories like those of soldiers always and everywhere. As very young men, they endured terrible and terrifying hardships, lost many of their fellows, did what they could to survive, and now live with the physical and psychic burdens of what happened to them. Many years ago, I visited a small museum

### The Only Way Is Abolition

### THE DEATH PENALTY IS TOO FLAWED TO BE SAVED

This week, Chase Hoffberger digs into the story of death row inmate Louis Perez (see "Reasonable Doubt," p.22). While I know that plenty of people won't come away believing Perez is innocent of the crimes for which he was sentenced to death, I would hope most would be given pause by just how scanty the evidence is that he's guilty.

There are so many arguments against the death penalty, but the fact that we're not always certain that the people we (as citizens of the state) kill are guilty - that, in fact, it seems pretty close to certain that a few of them are innocent - is the one that gets me

the most. There's a commonly cited legal principle that, as William Blackstone put it, it's "better that 10 guilty persons escape, than that one innocent party suffer." But I'm not sure that the U.S. justice system operates according to that principle, or that it ever has. It was, after all, just last month that the Chronicle published the latest installment of the saga of the Kellers, a couple who each spent 20 years in prison for crimes that almost certainly did not occur (see "Learning From Our Mistakes," March 11). And as Chase notes in his story about visiting Perez in prison ("On the Inside," posted online with this week's cover story), Texas' death row also currently houses Rodney Reed, a man whose guilt has been widely and compellingly

We have to ask ourselves, just what principle are we operating under? Is it that it's "better that 10 innocent parties suffer, than that one guilty party escape"? If that is the principle, can it ever be put into practice? Because if Louis Perez is innocent, then the murderer of three people has never been held accountable for those crimes.

questioned (see "Rape Victim Believes Rodney Reed Is Innocent," April 30, 2014).

In 2009, the late Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia baldly stated that "actual innocence" wasn't a reason on its own to keep someone off death row, writing that

"this court has never held that the Constitution forbids the execution of a convicted defendant who has had a full and fair trial but is later able to convince a habeas court that he is 'actually' innocent. Quite to the contrary, we have repeatedly left that question unresolved, while expressing considerable doubt that any claim based on alleged 'actual innocence' is constitutionally cognizable." Those lines are taken from a dissenting opinion, and, of course, Scalia no longer sits on the Supreme Court.


But Scalia is far from the only jurist who is less concerned about the execution of inno-

> cent people than those of us who value our lives might wish. That dissent of his concerned the granting of a new trial to Georgia death row inmate Troy Davis; after being tried again, Davis was executed in 2011 despite the fact that a good many people believed he was innocent of the crime for which he died

In the end, the only way that we can ensure our own safety - that you or I can make sure we're not the next one locked up or executed unjustly – is by insisting that other people don't get convicted because someone thinks they're guilty. It is inevitable that holding our justice system to its stated standard for criminal guilt - proof beyond a reasonable doubt will mean that some guilty people go free. But that hap-

pens anyway, and we would at least be preventing guilty people going free because the innocent have taken their place in prison.

It will take a lot to get to that point, Ending the death penalty isn't going to be enough. It won't fix whatever it is that's allowing people to lose years of their lives to convictions obtained on thin or faulty evidence. But however we might feel about the morality of the death penalty in a vacuum - where the only people executed are those who actually "deserve" it - in practice, the probability that we're killing innocent people is high. One innocent person killed by the state is too many, and the only way to guarantee none is abolition.

on the border of England and Scotland, containing a few mementos and letters of the Roman soldiers who sojourned there centuries ago, at the furthest extremity of the Empire. They missed their families, they feared the resentful or rebellious locals, they wanted warm socks. War is an experience of endless tedium irregularly interrupted by terror.

The U.S. veterans also complained of a supposed North Vietnamese "sanctuary" in Cambodia - where North Vietnamese Army soldiers allegedly could not be pursued over the border. They failed to mention Richard Nixon's "secret bombing" of Cambodia (secret to U.S. media, no secret to the Cambodians), which from 1969 to 1973 dropped more munitions on that largely rural country than were used in the entire Pacific theatre of WWII. Nixon and his Joint Chiefs were convinced an imaginary NVA headquarters could be destroyed in Cambodia - instead, they destroyed much of the fabric of Cambodian life, creating a vacuum that was filled by yet another U.S. legacy, the deranged and murderous Khmer Rouge.

The Summit recruited as its Tuesday night featured guest one of the architects of that mass bombing, Henry Kissinger, notorious for transmitting his version of Nixon's order ("I want them to hit everything") concerning Cambodia. "Anything that flies," echoed Kissinger, "on anything that moves."

### **REVERBERATIONS**

And so it was done – just one massively vicious episode in an extraordinarily irrational and unjust war. I have no particular stomach to hear an un-indicted Kissinger explain himself again, recalling instead one of Christopher Hitchens' more sensible judgments: "Kissinger should have the door shut in his face by every decent person and should be shamed, ostracized, and excluded. No more dinners in his honor; no more respectful audiences for his absurdly overpriced public appearances; no more smirking photographs with hostesses and celebrities; no more soliciting of his worthless opinions by sycophantic editors and producers."

This appearance has been billed by the LBJ School as possibly Kissinger's "last time addressing his role in the Vietnam War." I very much doubt that he will be begging for forgiveness, the only posture that could possibly begin to retrieve his humanity - for crimes of realpolitik in Indonesia and Chile as well as Vietnam.

Wrenching back to the present: John Pilger, among others, has pointed out the contemporary echoes of Cambodia in the Middle East. "Like Pol Pot and the Khmer Rouge," he wrote in 2014, "ISIS are the mutations of a western state terror dispensed by a venal imperial elite undeterred by the consequences of actions taken at great remove in distance and culture."

I wish I could say that, as Americans, we learned our necessary lessons from the Vietnam War. I see precious little evidence that is so.

### Learning to Share?

A FULL WEEK OF PROPOSITION 1

### The Truth of the Matter

Just time for a quick recap of the week (as John Oliver would say), and we begin where last week left off, with City Council blasting Ridesharing Works for Austin's "deceptive campaign" regarding who will conduct background checks under the terms of the current ordinance. At an April 21 press conference, CM Delia Garza, joined by other members of the council, said "Uber and Lvft are running a deceptive campaign in a blatant attempt to confuse the voters and allow the corporations to write their own public safety rules. ... After finding the 'Vote for Prop. 1 to

keep Uber and Lyft in Austin' line was not enough, Uber political consultants have created a new campaign based on false statements about a city takeover of background checks and city taxpayers left holding the bag. Both claims are false."

But RWA must be hearing good polling data on those claims, because they've doubled down rather than backed

down, denying the "deceptive claims" accusation, holding their own presser, and sending out multiple mailers insisting that the city would have to take over the background process, and pay for it. I've gotten one every day this week (and two on a couple of days), all stressing some version of the "city takeover of background checks" storyline.

The truth of the matter, which no one is saying directly: The exact mechanics of the background check system, with fingerprinting, are indeed yet to be worked out. But for that to happen, the city would have to be cooperating with a willing partner, which Uber and Lyft have thus far made it clear that they are

not willing to be. So again, as with the "the city is making Uber and Lyft leave town" narrative, this is true only if Uber and Lyft make it so. That unwillingness to compromise is a recurring theme that plays into the endorsements, below.

### **Nobody Is Safe**

Then there are the **safety statistics**. A recent guest viewpoint in the Statesman claimed that TNCs "are literally saving lives. Since ridesharing came to Austin, the city has seen a 23 percent drop in DWI crashes." Except of course, that's not true, either. Uber

> and Lvft both started operating in June of 2014, ramping up within a couple of weeks of each other. So, comparing the 16-month period directly before that, with the period directly after, APD recorded 746 DWI accidents from Feb. 2013 through May 2014, compared to 639 from July 2014 through Oct. 2015. That's a drop of 14%, which isn't 23%, but it also doesn't

tell the whole story.

Of course, one of the first rules of statistics is the correlation does not mean causation. What RWA has tried to obfuscate is the fact that there's not really much correlation in the first place between TNCs and DWIs. The much-repeated "23% drop" statistic is only arrived at if you compare 2013 with the full year 2014, when DWI accidents were already dropping for six months before the TNCs began operations. In fact, the most direct comparison, taking into account possible seasonal fluctuations, might be the last months directly before TNCs came to town, compared to the same months a year later,

when Uber and Lyft were operating fully "at scale." By that measure, Jan.-May of 2014 vs. Jan.-May of 2015, both saw exactly the same number of DWI-related accidents: 224 for each period. Meanwhile, by other measures, traffic fatalities are up significantly, and aside from a five-month dip in the second half of 2014, DWI arrests are essentially back in the same range they were before the TNCs started operation. (Sorry if that's confusing; if you want more explanation, see this story online for all that data, plus a recent study of the matter by Dr. Matt Hersh, a lecturer and statistician in UT's Department of Statistics and Data Sciences, which concludes that "taking into account that DWIrelated accidents were on the decline before Uber started operating in any meaningful way, there is no evidence of a correlation between TNCs and DWI-elated accidents or DWI arrests in Austin.")


### **The Endorsement Tally**

On Friday, April 22, the League of Women Voters of the Austin Area issued a rare endorsement. The public service group "does not support or oppose any candidates or political parties," but saw fit to take a stance on Prop. 1: "The Austin League has studied this issue, compared the ordinances (laws) that are in effect now from our city government and the ordinance (law) proposed by the TNCs. We hosted a forum and attended numerous forums and debates. We have come to the conclusion that the city rules which are now in effect are the best alternative to govern the TNC operations. ... The

... Frankly, it is a little suspicious that they will not accept the fingerprinting regulation when all the law enforcement organizations recommend it as the safest way to vet the drivers. Fingerprinting is a very commonplace procedure for a myriad of occupations, like Realtors, engineers, social services workers, and many others."

TNCs were not interested in compromise.

That same day, the anti-Prop. 1 forces announced endorsements from Texas

Women's Political Caucus, AFSCME Local 1624. Black Austin Democrats, and Central Austin Democrats, adding to their previous roster of some 20+ local Democratic clubs and safety organizations including the Police, Firefighter, and EMS employee organizations. (Meanwhile, RWA robocalls citing Police Chief Art Acevedo as a supporter of Prop. 1 had to be pulled last week, after city officials called RWA to "assure them that that is not the case.")

Notably, RWA picked up their third endorsement: the U.S. Chamber of Commerce, which sent a letter of concern on April 21 to U.S. Department of Transportation Secretary Anthony Foxx, warning of "City Council's illadvised regulation" that "would be a setback to the Smart City approach." (See "More Strong-Arming From Uber and Lyft," April 24, online at austinchronicle.com/daily/news.) But don't mistake the U.S. Chamber for the local version, or any other actual business organization. As described by The Hill, the largest-circulation publication on Capitol Hill: "Fueled by funding from billionaires like the Koch brothers, the U.S. Chamber is pursuing a different, deeper ideological agenda - limiting government regulation and oversight, keeping all levels of government from regulating wages, benefits, health and safety standards, and promoting the bottom line interests of the corporations and their allies. ... In this instance, you can clearly see the state chambers being told how to align their lobbying agenda against their members and the

majority of the American people and with other Koch-funded groups, like the American Legislative Exchange Council (ALEC)." As such, the U.S. Chamber is following the lead of other far-right groups, such as the Kochfunded **Texans for Accountable** 

Government (see "Public Notice: Mobility and Affordability," April 8), who see ridesharing as a possible wedge issue to sway young voters to their anti-government agenda.

And they may be succeeding. On Wednesday, April 27, **UT Student Government** became the first and only non-right-wing group to endorse Prop. 1 (again citing the fallacious 23% drop in DWI-related accidents).

The biggest shoe to drop came this Monday, April 25, when Mayor Steve Adler held a press conference and issued a statement arguing at length that, "only an 'Against' vote will allow Austin to find the right solution," and that "such a vote puts Austin and the rideshare companies constructively back at the negotiating table." (See "Adler to Vote 'Against' Prop. 1," April 25, online.) He also addressed the U.S. Chamber's letter directly in his statement, saying, "I just had a great week traveling with the Secretary of Transportation, and I'm not worried about the letter."

And this just in: Lyft is offering free rides to the polls. Of course they are.

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### Mobile Homes and Climate Change

### COUNCIL REVISITS TENANT RELOCATION AID; ZIMMERMAN STILL HATES SCIENCE

Last Thursday, April 21, City Council cleared its 40-Item agenda before 5pm: Council members agreed to include mobile home residents in a proposed relocation assistance program; provided funds to help clear APD's backlog of rape kits; passed through a handful of water-related measures, and sat through the latest rant from resident science skeptic **Don Zimmerman**.

Referred from the Housing and Community Development Committee, Item 35 directs the city manager to include mobile home residents in the Tenant Relocation Program, a proposed plan that asks developers to assist the often vulnerable and low-income residents of multifamily structures they displace by new projects. Cosponsor  $_{\rm CM}$ Pio Renteria pointed to Cactus Rose Mobile Home Park, where more than 50 households are on the verge of being pushed out to

make way for the proposed Lenox Oaks apartment complex (the public hearing on that rezoning was postponed until May 12). Renteria's office has monitored negotiations between the developer and tenants; the CM argues tenants would greatly benefit from city-backed protection. "There are some families in there that are paying right now for a lease to own, these two- and threebedroom mobile homes, and they're in such dire conditions that they will never be able

to move them. So we need to really focus on helping these families," he said. "I would hate to ever see that we're not going to help these families and make them homeless. We just passed a resolution about compassion."

But somehow, Zimmerman found a way to disagree with the plan, saying the lack of a fiscal note implies "unlimited" spending. Co-sponsor CM Greg Casar responded that the item is simply a way to include mobile

> home residents in the larger ordinance that is still being worked on. In defense of his "no" vote, Zimmerman said, "I wanted to express some compassion for the people who are struggling to pay their taxes and water bills and electric bills. When we talk about compassion, it seems to be limited to those who are potentially slated to receive additional benefits, and I guess I'm resentful of that because I think about having some compas-

sion on the taxpayers who are forced to pay even more higher taxes and fees to pay the additional subsidies."

CM Sheri Gallo voiced concerns of her own, saying she "just can't support the addition of that community at this point because they've not been included in the stakeholder process." CM Ora Houston explained that when Council passed the initial resolution in November, they didn't realize how dire the situation was for mobile home residents. In the end, CMs decided staff would start up a new stakeholder process that includes mobile home residents. That means the relocation program could come back before Council in two parts (one for apartment dwellers, the other for mobile home residents). The Item passed 8-1-1, with Mayor Steve Adler off the dais, Zimmerman against, and Gallo abstaining.

One day shy of Earth Day, Zimmerman renewed his charge against climate change science. Council passed an Item authorizing a \$116,000 contract with a research group led by Dr. Katharine Hayhoe, a respected Texas Tech University climate scientist, to evaluate how climate change impacts the city's water. Zimmerman criticized Hayhoe last April when she delivered a climate change presentation before Council, angrily informing her that the "the government [is] in charge of climate." (An interesting sidenote offered by CM Leslie Pool: Hayhoe is an evangelical Christian who tries to connect with the very people who most doubt her research.) He again attacked Hayhoe on Thursday: "She referred us to SkepticalScience.com ... a website dedicated to slandering and attacking world-class scientists who disagree with the political agenda of man-made global warming .... It speaks very poorly to somebody's professional credibility to refer me to a website that attacks world-class scientists with political activists," said Zimmerman. The Council message board had indicated that he would bring up an amendment proposing to give half of the funds to "a climate scientist who has expertise in evaluating the accuracy of climate predictions," such as climate change skeptics Dr. Richard Lindzen or Dr. John Christy. That didn't happen, but Zimmerman did try and fail to delay the Item until May 19. "We have some real issues with flooding in our community and in central Texas. And if there is even one small piece of this study that can help us try to make better plans and mitigate, we need to get started on it, and we need to do it with all due haste," said Pool.

The cutest moment of the day came when Gallo entered council chambers cradling a puppy. While we'd like to think the pup was meant to allay the tension at the dais, Gallo was actually trying to promote Austin pet adoption, as May marks Austin Pet Month. In other actions, Council:

- Authorized a roughly \$1.2 million contract with Sorenson Forensics to help APD with its sexual assault backlog elimination program.
- Directed the city manager to explore the feasibility and cost in the FY 2016-17 budget process of extending Meadow Lake Blvd., which would help bring greater connectivity to a Habitat for Humanity affordable housing project in Southeast Austin.
- Accepted \$100,000 from U.S. Department of Transportation as one of seven finalists of the Smart City Challenge.
- Authorized agreements with the Austin Fire Department and the University of North Texas to research the use of robotics in emergencies and with UT-Austin's Cockrell School of Engineering for aerial robotics (drone) research in support of fire and water search and rescue.
- Approved a \$309,000 contract with Aleon Properties Inc. for graffiti removal services.
- · Approved a one-year \$350,000 contract with Capital IDEA to assist underemployed adults in workforce development services.
- Voted to apply for \$80.2 million in loans from the Texas Water Development Board to implement its smart meter program for Austin Water customers, and also apply for an \$87 million loan for multiple capital improvement projects associated with AW's two wastewater treatment plants and reclaimed water system. - Mary Tuma



### CITY BUDGET PREVIEW REMAINS STRONG, WITH NOTES OF CAUTION

More income, more costs.

That's the extreme thumbnail version of the city budget forecast presentation delivered Wednesday morning by the city of Austin's financial services staff. It's also the pattern established over the last few years. since the 2011 end of the nationwide recession. It's traditional for the budget staff to present "conservative" income projections that is, the lowest estimate of increased funding for city spending priorities that seems reasonable.

So it was on Wednesday, although overall economic projections, as delivered by consultant Jon Hockenyos, remain rosy. Hockenyos noted that the Austin region remains the national "economic star," with continued growth and persistent overall prosperity. His undertone of caution amounted to "what goes up, must come down" - despite low to no inflation (especially in underlying energy

costs), there are some signs of retraction in the national economy.

Before Hockenyos began, City Manager Marc Ott briefly noted an overall change in approach to budget preparation, attempting to highlight structural "cost drivers" and potential council policy decisions that will be heavily influenced by those cost drivers. His cover memo to the financial forecast emphasized that the drivers (staffing, wages, insurance) are in part based on decisions made by Council in 2015 and 2016, and more will hit this year. "I want to close with a note of caution," Ott wrote, emphasizing that these previous decisions are likely to constrain budgetary flexibility in FY 2017 and beyond.

That said, only a budget staff could describe Wednesday's presentation as more policy-focused than numbers-focused. Once Deputy Chief Financial Officer Ed Van Eenoo got rolling with his forecast, the (admittedly

somewhat speculative) numbers were flying fast and furious. Overall, the projected income numbers (from rising property values and new construction, and sales taxes) are positive - but staff reiterated that decisions already made (Austin Fire Department cadet hiring, wage increases, and a projected 12% jump in insurance) will definitely affect the funds available for spending.

The numbers daunted at least a couple of council members, most notably Don Zimmerman, whose persistent suspicion of staff and their procedures surfaced in hostile questions implying that they were trying to hide the ball on necessary vs. discretionary spending. He indirectly accused Hockenyos of misleadingly mixing regional vs. municipal numbers - implying that regional prosperity was disguising Austin profligacy - and was not mollified by the consultant's explanation that the forecast was compiled from the best

available statistics. It was a curious claim, since when Zimmerman is relentlessly opposing raises for city employees, he invariably uses regional wage averages to insist that those city employee increases should be limited to regional averages.

The peppering of questions from Zimmerman and other CMs did mean that the presentation slowed beyond the three-hour limit, and staff was unlikely to complete all its Wednesday goals, including most notably a request that Council review, edit, and approve a list of policy discussions that should proceed over the next couple of months. That plan is intended to replace, to some degree, the annual departmental budget presentations that are also numbers-heavy but can obstruct the larger policy discussions that in fact determine the overall shape of the budget. Whether that policy discussion can effectively proceed amidst an ideologically divided council, we'll begin to see over the next few - Michael King

When Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) announced at the beginning of this year that it would be intensifying its efforts to deport certain undocumented immigrants, Hilda Ramirez decided it was time to seek sanctuary.

Ramirez and her son Ivan came to the U.S. from Guatemala in August 2014. Until recently, Ramirez had been unwilling to reveal her identity to reporters; she previ-

ously told the story of her time in Karnes to the Chronicle under the condition of anonymity (see "Choosing Detention Over Death," Dec. 25, 2015). As detailed in that story, the Ramirezes were detained for 11 months in the for-profit Karnes family detention center. Upon her release from Karnes, Ramirez was outfitted with an ankle monitor that she cannot take off until her case is finalized.

Before seeking refuge in St. Andrew's, the Ramirezes had been staying in an Austin shelter with other refugees.

When Ramirez asked St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church in Austin for help, the church did not hesitate to offer sanctuary. "For us, it was a wonderful gift," said St. Andrew's Pastor Jim Rigby. He explained that it was an opportunity for the church to do something practical instead of feeling helpless. "Without social justice, I don't think religion has much to offer to

It is against ICE policy for agents to raid churches. U.S. Secretary of Homeland Security Jeh Johnson reiterated this in a recent statement: "[W]hen enforcing the immigration laws, our personnel will not, except in emergency circumstances, apprehend an individual at a place of worship, a school, a hospital or doctor's office, or other sensitive location."

The recent ICE raids, as explained by Johnson in a press release, target: "adults and their children who (i) were apprehend-

> ed after May 1, 2014 crossing the southern border illegally, (ii) have been issued final orders of removal by an immigration court, and (iii) have exhausted appropriate legal remedies, and have no outstanding appeal or claim for asylum or other humanitarian relief under our laws." (See "Women and Children First," Jan. 15.)

Ramirez, who fled Guatemala in fear of her life, has been

denied asylum. Her appeal of the initial denial was also rejected. Yet there is still hope that Ivan, who is now 10, will be granted asylum on appeal, explained Alejandro Caceres, immigration organizer at Grassroots Leadership and coordinator of the ICE Out of Austin campaign. Additionally, Ramirez's attorney plans to file for a stay of removal, which would prevent the Department of Homeland Security from carrying out an order of deportation. Through "prosecutorial discretion," ICE has the authority to suspend deportation cases that are not priorities, such as immigrants who do not pose threats

to national security, border security, and public safety. "We want Immigration to use the power they have to withhold Hilda's deportation because, clearly, she is not a priority," said Caceres.

"When you look at Hilda and Ivan, you know they are not the criminals. Anyone who has studied the history of Guatemala knows that we [Americans] are the criminals there," said Pastor Rigby, noting Americans' role in Guatemala's current instability.

"Can we listen to Hilda's painful story of escaping from the violence of her nation, and not take responsibility for the role our own nation played in producing the violence from which she is fleeing?" Pastor Rigby asked in a press conference.

The Sanctuary Movement started in 1980 with a Presbyterian church and a Quaker meeting in Tucson, Ariz. The two congregations began legal and humanitarian aid to Salvadoran and Guatemalan refugees.

Nationwide there are 50 churches willing to offer sanctuary to immigrants who need protection from deportation, six of which are in Texas, explained Amy Beth Willis, national sanctuary organizer in Tucson. Since May 2014, the Sanctuary Movement has won 10 cases, getting some kind of relief from deportation for immigrants.

The previous sanctuary campaigns have won through public pressure and calling immigration to use prosecutorial discretion to suspend deportation orders of immigrants like Hilda. Last year Sulma Franco, a Guatemalan immigrant who had sought refuge in the First Unitarian Universalist Church in Austin, was granted a stay of removal and was able to stay legally in Austin. (See "Sulma Is Welcome Here," Aug. 18, 2015.)

Caceres explained that many immigrants lost their asylum cases because they did not have access to legal representation. "They did not show up in the courts because they were not provided any information after their release from detention."


Since being in sanctuary, Ramirez and her son have not left St. Andrew's. Ivan is only allowed to go to school, and cannot participate in extracurricular activities. "It is hard to explain to a child that he cannot play soccer because he can be picked up by immigration in a soccer field," Caceres said.

Deportation to Guatemala is something Ramirez is desperate to avoid: The country has the third highest rate of femicide (gender-motivated killing of women) in the world, according to the Center for Gender & Refugee Studies. Stories of immigrants from Central America who were killed a few days after being deported from the U.S. have been retold.

When asked by the Chronicle if the church should rally behind an immigrant who some would call "illegal," Pastor Rigby said, "Moses was illegal, Jesus was illegal; unlike the worldview of people as classified by the rich and powerful, every human being is legal in the spiritual realm.'




### **Longtime Death Row Inmate Dies**

Max Soffar passed away Sunday under medical supervision at the Polunsky Unit in Livingston, after spending 36 years on death row. Soffar, 60, had long suffered from liver cancer. In Aug. 2014, and again in Aug. 2015, the American Civil Liberties Union and his attorney unsuccessfully filed appeals asking the governor to grant Soffar clemency, so that he could return home and die by his wife's side. At the time of the first appeal, Soffar had been given eight months to live.

Previous efforts to keep Soffar from the gurney argued that Soffar was innocent of the crime for which he received a death sentence. In 1981, he was convicted of capital murder for the killing of three teenagers at a Houston bowling alley. A controversial, three-day police interrogation - of which there was no audio recording – produced a confession from Soffar. However, Soffar, who at 24 had long been impaired by brain damage and chemical dependency, has said publicly that he didn't confess; he intended to accuse a friend of the murder in order to receive the \$15,000 award Houston Police were offering. Not a single shred of physical evidence connected Soffar to the murders.

Soffar was granted a second trial in 2006 after an appeals court ruled that he'd had ineffective assistance at his original trial. (Soffar's original attorneys had declined to call a fourth shooting victim, Greg Garner, who lost an eye but was not killed, to testify.) But when Garner took the stand in 2006, he said that the killer he remembered looked somewhat like Soffar (even though he couldn't pick Soffar out of a lineup six weeks after the murders) and the Harris County D.A.'s Office was able to convince the jury that Soffar knew details about the murders no one else could provide. Soffar was once again given a death sentence. - Chase Hoffberger




### **Ott Takes** on Acevedo

City Manager Marc Ott issued Austin Police **Department** Chief **Art Acevedo** a written reprimand on Tuesday, April 26, and docked the chief five days' pay - roughly \$4,000 - for insubordination after Ott received the results of a third-party investigation (by a former city executive in labor relations) and decided that Acevedo used "poor judgment regarding comments made during a pending IA investigation" - the review of Officer Geoffrey Freeman's fatal shooting of teenager David Joseph - and regarding his handling of the fallout. Acevedo called the accusations "a series of misunderstandings" in a four-page statement issued Tuesday evening that the Chronicle was just beginning to pore through as this week's paper went to press. Expect more in next week's issue. - Chase Hoffberger

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### Lee Renaming Brings Out Butter-Knife-Sharp Wit

The political sage **Homer Simpson** once mused, "When will people learn democracy doesn't work?" Austin Independent School **District** trustees may be regretting soliciting proposals to rename Robert E. Lee Elementary, after the most nominated name turned out to be **Donald J. Trump**, and there was some real nastiness further down the list. As AISD board president **Kendall Pace** tactfully responded to the public input, "Keep Austin weird, right?"

It seemed like a good idea at the time: After community protest, on March 28 the board voted to start the process of renaming the campus after someone or something less controversial than the Confederate general (see "Lee Elementary No Longer Lee Elementary," April 1).

Careful what you wish for. When the list of names suggested by the general public was released on April 22, it was reminiscent of 2011. when there was a push to rename Solid Waste Services the Fred Durst Society of the Humanities and Arts (see "City Hall Hustle: Solid Waste Rocks!," Feb. 11, 2011), or the more recent fiasco in the UK, with overwhelming public support for naming a \$300 million research vessel Boaty McBoatface. In fact, the long list submitted via the AISD website contained Boaty McBoatface, Schoolie McSchoolface, Schooly McSchoolerson, and

However, just as the UK rejected Boaty McBoatface, the Lee Campus Advisory Committee swiftly whittled the list down to eight names for further consideration:

- Barbara Smith Conrad, opera star and UT graduate
- · Bettie Mann, Lee's first African-American teacher
- Elisabet Ney, sculptor
- Harper Lee, author
- Kenneth Ragsdale, former AISD director of music
- Russell Lee, UT photography professor and Depression-era photojournalist
- Waller Creek, which runs near the campus
- Wheeler's Grove, the original name of nearby Eastwoods Park

The CAC will further narrow that list to their top three choices, to present to the board for a final vote on May 23.

But efforts are still afoot to prevent the name change from taking place. On April 25, the Historic Landmark Commission mulled zoning the school historic, at the request of a couple of applicants who want to keep the original name. The Commission postponed making any decision until June, and asked that AISD and the city write a memorandum of understanding that any name change be delayed until that - Richard Whittaker June vote.

### What Is **Fueling Hurricane Donnie Trump?**

### AISD Proposes a Budget

If you're angry about your next property tax bill, don't blame the Austin Independent School District. Blame the Legislature. On April 25, trustees received the draft budget for the next school year, and it contains a 49% increase in recapture payments to the state under the "Robin Hood" system.

The recommended budget, as laid out by Chief Financial Officer Nicole Conley, proposes increasing general fund spending by \$145 million, from \$1 billion in the current year to \$1.15 billion in FY 2017. However, \$133 million of that \$145 million increase is going straight to the state, as the district's calculated recapture payments soar from a budget-busting \$273 million to a crippling \$406 million.

AISD board President Kendall Pace had a very simple response to the numbers: "Ouch." She described the district's plight as "a unique example of the brokenness of the school funding system." It could not come at a worse time: While recapture rises, AISD faces decreasing overall enrollment (meaning less state and federal money) but an increasing number of students who are poor, or English-language learners, or both, which means extra costs to give them a quality education. Yet recapture only focuses on property values, not need, so out goes the money.


The district has no control over recapture; that's up to the state. And House Appropriations Committee Member Donna Howard, D-Austin, said it is highly unlikely that lawmakers will act until after the Texas

Supreme Court rules on the current school finance lawsuit. Moreover, the Legislature that will convene in 2017 will be as or more conservative than the 2015 Legislature that demurred on meaningful education investment. However, Howard said there's an increased understanding that Austin is unfairly hit by the current system, which "never meant for a district to be subjected to recapture worth half a billion dollars."

Pace described the situation as untenable. and said, "AISD is already the biggest contributor, and when we start paying \$400 million, we'll be the biggest contributor by far." And unless something changes, the bill will only continue to rise: Under current forecasts, Pace said, by FY 2018, "Over 50% of all the tax will go back to the state."

### **VOTE NOW!** Early Voting April 25-May 5

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t was 3am on Thursday, Sept. 10, 1998, when Melvin Jones called the police. He hadn't heard from his girlfriend Cinda Barz all day. The last time they talked was on Wednesday, at 5pm, and that wasn't like her: The two spoke all the time. Jones had been trying to reach her house all night. Stranded without a car at his home in Northeast Austin, Jones asked police to run a welfare check on Barz's house in Barton Hills.

Three officers arrived at 2810 Rock Terrace Dr. at 3:40am. They got no response at the front door, saw no lights or movement other than the blue flicker of a television left on in the living room. The front door was locked; so was the sliding door around back. In the driveway were two cars: Barz's and her roommate Michelle Fulwiler's.

Officer Scott Perry would later testify that he first saw Barz's body through a living room window. She was buried under a blanket and couch cushion. Staci Mitchell, Barz's daughter, could be seen through a bedroom window, her lifeless body slumped across a bed. Unable to open a door, the officers broke a window to get inside.

"We could see puddles or blotches of blood and smears," testified Perry. "There was an iron skillet, frying pan, with the center knocked out of it sitting on the floor." Investigators could tell that the skillet - a comal - had been used to bludgeon Barz. She suffered "multiple incised wounds and lacerations," as well as defensive wounds and a skull fracture, reported Elizabeth Peacock, a forensic pathologist with the Travis County Medical Examiner's Office.

Police found Fulwiler's body wrapped in a blanket on the south side of her bedroom. She, too, had cuts and defensive wounds, said Peacock, but she also had strangulation marks around her neck. Nine-vear-old Staci Mitchell's hand had been tied to the bed by a pair of pantyhose; she had a second pair tied around her neck. The blue shirt she wore to school that day lay beside

Close to Barz's body, officers found a broken plant stand and a large knife with its handle wrapped in a torn white towel. There were bloodstains on the couch: more bloodstains on the bathroom tile and floor. Police found cocaine on a plate and an empty dime bag. They found a telephone cord that didn't belong to any of the house's phones draped over a chair. In the weeks that followed, APD would find a blue towel on the ground outside the house, and the sole of a Nike shoe.

Investigators learned later that Thursday morning that Fulwiler had called in sick to work on Wednesday at 8:15am and hadn't answered any calls from co-workers. Barz. who worked with Fulwiler at the Gardner-Betts Juvenile Justice Center, spent the day working, but left abruptly after 5pm when she didn't receive an expected phone call from her daughter. Mitchell walked home at 3:30pm, her teachers told investigators. Nobody heard from her after that.

# Reasonable Doubt Louis Perez has spent nearly two decades on death row. Does he deserve to be there? RER

### **A LIKELY SUSPECT**

Louis Perez was the last person known to have left 2810 Rock Terrace alive. The 36-year-old had been dating Fulwiler casually, and authorities knew he had slept over at her house the night before.

Perez, a carpenter and occasional bouncer, was divorced, the father of three boys with his ex-wife and a daughter with an ex-girlfriend. Large, smiling, and affable, Perez liked to party - at Downtown bars and Carnaval - and would spend his off days drinking and smoking at Campbell's Hole in the Barton Creek Greenbelt. He had an affinity for social drugs – cocaine particularly. He would often serve as a middleman in casual deals for friends. Perez had a strong relationship with his young daughter but admits he wasn't there for his sons. He'd gone to jail twice for failing to pay child support.

Perez knew Fulwiler through his brother, but it wasn't until a court hearing at Gardner-Betts after one of Perez's periods of incarceration that the two began dating. They were off-and-on for months while Fulwiler allowed another relationship to play out. On Sept. 8, Perez and Fulwiler got together, and on Sept. 10, she and her two roommates were dead. Perez was arrested on Friday, Sept. 11, at a South Austin 7-Eleven.

At Perez's trial the following year, prosecutors were unable to tie Perez to the DNA found on any of the murder weapons. There were no witnesses from the scene. Instead, the Travis County District Attorney's Office relied on circumstantial evidence - like the presence of Perez's fingerprints and DNA throughout the house, including one palm print next to Barz's body - to get a conviction. Perez was sentenced to death on Oct. 20, 1999.

Perez has maintained his innocence, saying that although he was the last person to leave the house before the murders and the first to walk back in after the attacks, he was not the killer. But his lone alibi witness - a California drug dealer named Alex Gutierrez, with whom Perez says he spent the day - has never been located. Perez's defense attorneys were never able to verify Perez was with Gutierrez.

According to Perez's friend Minerva Hall, the first person to speak with him after the murders occurred, Perez showed up on the doorstep of her apartment at around 9:15pm that Wednesday night. He was barefoot, his hair "messed up." Hall saw scratches on his neck. Perez said that he got into a fight with his father, and Hall thought nothing of it. She offered him her bed, and went to sleep in another room with her son.

On Thursday, after resting at Hall's apartment, Perez caught a ride to Texas Discount Furniture on the Eastside, where he met his friend Tony Recio. He spent Thursday night at Recio's. During Perez's trial, Recio would say his friend wasn't acting at all unusual that evening. Recio said he noticed the scratches on Perez's neck and asked about them. Perez told him he had gotten into a fight with his ex-wife.

When Recio got to work that Friday, his boss showed him a newspaper story naming Perez as the murder suspect. Recio called his attorney, who made a call to APD. Two detectives showed up to the furniture store within the hour. Together, Recio and detectives went back to his apartment to look for Perez, who'd already taken off with a pair of Recio's boots.

Perez said he had seen a news report that day identifying him as a suspect, and left Recio's house so as not to implicate him in the murders. He eventually ended up at a pay phone outside a 7-Eleven off Bluff Springs. He called his family and his attorney, who advised that he turn himself in. While he was on the phone, a squad of officers pulled up.

Police had been looking for Perez since the night after the murders. Lead investigator Brian Manley, APD's current chief of staff, who at the time was a few months in to a yearlong stint in homicide, received a page from a scene technician saying that a bloody palm print found next to Barz's body was Perez's. The technician said that Barz's blood must have been spilled within five minutes of Perez making the print.

When officers went to Perez's parents' house looking for him, they said they hadn't seen him; Perez was also a no-show for two different jobs. Manley caught a break on Friday morning when he received a call from Hall, who'd seen the news.

The presence of the palm print left no doubt that Perez had been in the house after the murders. What remains unclear, despite his death sentence, is whether he's guilty of anything more than that.

### AN UNCORROBORATED ALIBI

Perez waited a year to give his account of how he came to be in the house, not confiding in anyone except for his defense attorneys before taking the stand at trial.

Perez testified at trial that he left Fulwiler's that morning to meet up with Gutierrez at a nearby 7-Eleven. (He had met the Californian a week and a half earlier in a restaurant bathroom.) Perez and Gutierrez drove around Austin selling coke to various friends and acquaintances before getting lunch at a drive-through. The two then went to Zilker Park, where they whiled the day away drinking beer, snorting coke, and watching people play volleyball. They left around 5pm, and Gutierrez gave Perez

a ride back to the 7-Eleven. He walked through Barton Hills to Fulwiler's. Overheated, he unbuttoned his shirt and took off his shoes so that he could take a shower when he got inside.

Perez rang the doorbell a few times, walking in after getting no response. The door was unlocked.

"As soon as I get – to get my shirt off right

here, I walk around the corner and I see Cinda on the ground," he testified. He saw the comal on her face and "[threw] it out of the way." Barz - who was still alive but badly beaten - reached for him, grabbing his neck and scratching it.

Perez was spooked. He grabbed his shirt and got out of the house. He didn't call the police. He just split, not even bothering to take his boots. He sat on a rock wall down the street and tried to comprehend what happened. He stopped in to an Italian bistro for water, then wandered through Barton Hills. He eventually ended up at Hall's apartment complex, sitting outside a while before knocking on her door.

#### **INCONCLUSIVE EVIDENCE**

Prior to Perez's testimony, Assistant D.A. Claire Dawson-Brown, trying her first – and last – capital case, had presented eight days of evidence tying Perez to the crime scene. She exhibited photographs of Perez's fingerprints lifted from beer bottles and door handles in the house. She reminded the jury that Perez left the scene without calling for help. She questioned the disappearance of Perez's Nike boots, and got both Perez's father and ex-wife to testify that Perez had lied about the provenance of his

Dawson-Brown presented Perez and Fulwiler's cocaine use as a motive, suggesting that Perez killed Fulwiler - then waited

> around the house all day to kill Mitchell and Barz – because she had snorted all of his dime bags. She said Perez went on the killing spree because he thought Steve Jackson a local pusher who testified at trial to being Perez's "best friend" expected Perez to sell the bags and give him a cut of the profits.

Integral to Dawson-Brown's case was an

emphasis on circumstantial DNA analysis. Perez's DNA was on the piece of the comal that had covered Barz's face, and both parts of the ripped towel. Dawson-Brown's argument also benefited from cherry-picked probability statistics. DNA analysis concluded there was a one in 14 chance that the foreign DNA found under Staci Mitchell's fingernails came from a Hispanic person not specifically Perez. (The odds measured at one in 11 blacks and one in 20 whites.) DNA stripped from Barz's nail clippings showed that one in 38,600 Hispanics would make a match. (With her, one in 181,000 whites and one in 321,000 blacks.)

### **UP THE HILLS** DOWN THE BEERS!

It was an advantageous association, but - like much of the prosecution's argument - it relied on inconclusive evidence. A thorough read through the court record reveals a long list of investigative oversights.

Three hairs found on Mitchell's body weren't tested before the trial. Neither was the handle of the comal used on Barz, or the two ends of the phone cord used to strangle Fulwiler. Same goes for the pantyhose; investigators only tested the two pairs in the areas known to have come into contact with Mitchell. A DNA specialist testified that she chose not to amplify test results from an inconclusive DNA scan for blood found on the knife.

Robert Bux, a deputy medical examiner in Bexar County who testified for the defense, alleged that the Travis County Medical Examiner took too long removing the bodies from the home. Dave Harding, an investigator with the TCMEO, said he performed a liver punch on the left side of the bodies so as to avoid altering the crime scene (failing to consider that liver punches should land on a body's right, where the liver is actually located). Smoked cigarettes found outside the house were not immediately collected, tested, and analyzed. Officers handled a house key from the mailbox without protective gloves. Blood found in the bathroom wasn't tested. A fingerprint examiner for APD found 43 instances in which fingerprints lifted from the scene "represent[ed] a person other than the victim of the crime, the police officers, all other persons given to you as suspects in this case - or Mr. Perez" - yet nobody else was investigated as a suspect after police arrested Perez.

No blood from any of the three women was ever found on Perez's clothes. No physical evidence connected Perez to Fulwiler's murder. In fact, aside from the palm print and DNA left on the comal, there was little that suggested Perez touched any of the suspected weapons. The Department of Public Safety's crime lab "didn't even know until this summer [1999], June, with his trial beginning Aug. 23, that they had foreign alleles in the towels," argued Joe James Sawyer, one of the attorneys who represented Perez at his trial. (Alleles are variant forms of genes that show up in DNA.) "Since September of last year they hadn't so much as bothered to run DNA to see what was there.

"They didn't care. ... They had that skid mark, they had that palm print, and that was enough."

### THE SERIAL KILLER

On Oct. 4, 1998, one month after the murders, 81-year-old Leafie Mason was bludgeoned to death with an antique flat iron at her home in Hughes Springs, Texas. Her house sat 50 yards from the Kansas City Southern Railway tracks. On Dec. 17, 39-year-old Claudia Benton was raped, stabbed, and beaten to death with a statue at her house in West University Place, a Houston neighborhood with the St. Louis Southwestern Railway as its western border.

Similar murders continued through 1999 killings near railroad tracks involving household objects as weapons. On May 2, Norman Sirnic and his wife Karen were found dead at Weimar's United Church, where Norman was a pastor. The church was located adjacent to Union Pacific tracks. Two more bodies - Josephine Konvicka, in Fayette County, and Noemi Dominguez, in Houston - were discovered near railroad lines on June 4. Both women had been beaten to death with a pickaxe.

Each of those killings, most of them never tried, is now believed to have been committed by Ángel Maturino Reséndiz, a Mexican national who was convicted for

### **REVISITING THE DNA**

Still, suspicions that Perez was innocent grew in Oct. 2001, when Calhoun solicited post-conviction DNA testing to be conducted by Dr. Robert Benjamin, a professor of biological sciences at the University of North Texas. The professor wrote that Perez's trial counsel and their DNA expert "did not receive a complete list of electropherograms for all of the DNA analyses performed on the evidence." (Electropherograms are DNA test results.)

"Many samples were analyzed multiple times and only select examples of the results were provided," Dr. Benjamin wrote. "This is of particular concern because of the nature

**DNA testing excluded Perez from one item in** particular: the skillet's handle. The major contributor for that piece of evidence was logged as "an unknown male individual."

Benton's murder in 2000 and executed in 2006. Reséndiz is also thought to be responsible for a number of other killings in Florida, Kentucky, Illinois, and Mexico.

Perez's defense knew that the Missouri-Pacific Railroad ran through South Austin within a mile of Rock Terrace, and suggested during the trial that Reséndiz was the real killer, although it wasn't a theory they attempted to flesh out. In 2002, Reséndiz confessed to the murders, telling a private investigator hired by Alex Calhoun, Perez's attorney at that time, that he killed two women in Austin: "one fat one and one skinny one." However, Reséndiz never confessed to murdering a child, and his mental state made it impossible for Calhoun to secure an affidavit. While on death row, Resendiz confessed to several murders that he could not have committed, which further calls into question the veracity of his claims concerning Barz and Fulwiler.

of the samples and results obtained with several pieces of evidence central to the prosecution's case. Results obtained indicated that the samples represented mixtures of DNA from multiple individuals with very weak and incomplete profiles of minor contributors (some never identified). If other analyses of these samples failed to show some or all of these alleles it could be considered highly significant since it could, for example, raise a question of contamination as an explanation for the inconsistency."

Benjamin also questioned certain conclusions concerning the DNA matches. He said the state chose to look at the fingernail samples as a mixture of two unknown people, when in reality the mixture would always include one known quantity: each victim. "Since the victim's profile will always be present, using their alleles in a probability calculation artificially increases the calculated probability of exclusion/ inclusion," he wrote. "In this case, the evidence samples from AU1 left and right were calculated to have ranges from about one in three to one in millions. This was presented to the jury and no effort was made to explain the particular significance/appropriateness of either with respect to the other."

In 2006, during state habeas proceedings, the Travis County D.A.'s Office agreed to have DPS compare a portion of the unidentified DNA found at the scene with Reséndiz's profile in CODIS, a DNA database of convicted felons that opened in 1996. In April 2006, DPS received pieces of the skillet, the blue towel found outside the house, the telephone cord, two pairs of pantyhose, cigarette butts found outside the house, a piece of the stained carpet from the master bedroom, one beer can, and the hairs from Mitchell's back. None of the results were a match for Reséndiz. Additionally, many of the results did not conclusively exclude Perez as a contributor.

Certain pieces of evidence could not be analyzed, however. Lab documents show that the blue towel had a "complexity" that disallowed interpretations for a DNA profile. The hairs could not be read. But according to Jani Maselli, the Houston habeas attorney who represented Perez before U.S. Magistrate Judge Andrew Austin on Aug. 19, 2010, "numerous" DNA samples tested during the state process matched neither Perez nor Reséndiz. Perez was excluded from one item in particular: the comal's handle. At the time the report was written, the major contributor for that piece of evidence was logged as "an unknown male individual." Maselli learned at the Aug. 2010 hearing that the handle had been contaminated by Leon Justice, the court reporter at Perez's trial. His handling of the comal made it such that the mixture showed two people: Justice and what looked to DPS forensic expert Emma Becker, at the time, to be Cinda Barz. (Testing did show that Perez's DNA was consistent with the DNA found on the piece of the comal he testified to having touched when he lifted it off of Barz's face.) Becker also said that the piece of the towel that was wrapped around the knife showed a DNA mixture of three people: Fulwiler, Perez, "and then there were additional alleles that can essentially be attributed to someone else.

"Based on this profile, this is something we wouldn't do the additional testing on. just because when we have more than two people on the mixture, the technology, it gets overloaded and it's - the results aren't accurate," Becker testified. "So we have a rule where if it's more than two people, we do not perform the additional testing on it."

### **ANOTHER SUSPECT?**

On Aug. 28, 2012, Perez's sister Delia Perez Meyer submitted a declaration to the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Texas, stating that earlier that year she received a call from a woman who would only identify herself as having worked for DPS. According to Meyer's statement, the woman told Meyer she knew who the real murderer was, and gave her a name (that name has been redacted from court records).

Meyer said the woman had "called her repeatedly over the course of this case, asking her about Louis' case and the Railroad Killer." The woman told her the killer had been arrested for molesting a child and assault, and that his information could be found in the CODIS database.

Meyer wrote that after she got the call, she contacted Perez's new counsel, Sadaf Khan, who had replaced Maselli. Khan told her that they should hire a private investigator, which would cost Perez's family \$10,000. Meyer found a source for the money, but by then the family had lost touch with her brother's attorney. Nobody – including Perez – would hear from Khan again.

Perez didn't know that he was being abandoned by his attorney until it nearly was too late. His petition for relief had fallen short in federal court on March 27, 2012. He had 180 days to appeal the decision to the 5th Circuit – had he known a decision

had been made. However, shortly after U.S. Federal Judge Lee Yeakel issued his final judgment, Perez received word in his cell that his attorney had come to see him.

The attorney there to see him was not his, but rather Richard Burr, a Houston lawyer whose focus is death penalty cases. Burr told Perez that Khan had fallen absent and said he could receive an execution date at any point. He asked Perez how long it had been since he'd seen or heard from Khan. Perez said it had been two years. Burr said a conflict of interest (he served as a fact witness on the court's questioning of Khan's abandonment) prevented him from picking up as Perez's attorney, but that he might be able to find an attorney who could.

#### **ON DEATH ROW**



Early this April, Perez recounts this conversation in the same visitation room in which it happened, at the Polunsky Unit in Livingston, Texas, where he lives with 262 other inmates on death row. (Polunsky also houses 2,600 other prisoners.) He sits on a stool inside a steel-bound cell, his brown skin and graying hair a stark contrast to the white scrubs and walls found all around him. He wears black plastic-framed glasses with red tape around one screw. He smiles and laughs often, revealing a gap where the upper-right side of his teeth are missing. When he sits upright, he takes up much of the small cage.

"I think about [the case] every day," he says through a telephone on the other side of a Plexiglas pane. "It's something that will never leave me ever again. My failure to render aid is my crime, not a murder – not a triple homicide. That's what's difficult for me. I believe

in God, very much. I pray every day. And I beg Cinda to forgive me every day for leaving her to die like that."

He spends his days reading, researching his case, and painting. He's 54, now having been housed at Polunsky for 16-and-a-half years. He's well-accustomed to life inside the unit. "You have to figure things out." he says. "You hear stories, and a lot of them are true. Don't get me wrong: This place is bad. But when you carry yourself in a respectful manner, and you keep your word - that's all you have back here: your balls and your word. Once you lose either of those, it's like free game. People come at you. But my size and my attitude have saved me from trouble a lot, because I don't pick fights. I'm not a bully. I'm not nothing like that. People see that and respect that."





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Perez keeps up on his case and uses the library at Polunsky to maintain an understanding of any developments that could affect his fate. "People ask me if I still believe in the justice system," he says. "I have to, because it's the only thing that's going to save my life. Nothing else is going to help me but the justice system."

### **REVISITING THE DNA, ONCE MORE**

The latest attorney to take on Perez's case is Marcy Greer. The Austin civil appellate attorney received a request from the District Court in the summer of 2012, asking that

she look into allegations that Khan had abandoned Perez. She took over in early August and by Aug. 29 had filed a motion urging Yeakel to vacate his March judgment and issue a new ruling - one that could be appealed by an attorney who hadn't abandoned their client. Yeakel complied, and on Dec. 12 issued a new judgment, which Greer and her team contested within the month.

The filings opened the case again, and gave Greer and her team time to sort through the seven boxes of case files that have accumu-

lated since the murders. She's fought off perilous deadlines. In Nov. 2012, Hon. Karen Sage, the presiding judge over the 299th District Court (where Perez was tried and convicted) hadn't yet learned of Greer's Aug. 2012 motion to reopen the case, and signed a death warrant for his execution, effective March 21, 2013. (The order was quickly withdrawn.) The case has since failed at both the 5th Circuit Court of Appeals and U.S. Supreme Court.

Shortly after appealing Yeakel's ruling and delaying the impending death date, Greer filed four unopposed motions in Sage's district court that would change the course of Perez's effort. The motions, filed July 19, 2013, called for the Travis County District Attorney's Office to provide Perez with a series of previously unreleased documents from his case, including the transcripts from his grand jury trial and

any bench notes, data, or electropherograms taken or previously held by the District Attorney.


The filings also included a motion requesting that the Tarrant County Medical Examiner run additional postconviction DNA testing on six items - the two pairs of pantyhose used to strangle and bind Mitchell, fingernail scrapings from both of Mitchell's hands, the comal's handle, and the full length of the telephone cord - and that the Tarrant County crime lab test three other items that have yet to be analyzed by any lab - Mitchell's

> shirt, the Nike shoe sole, and a broken, bloody plant stand, which investigators concluded shattered during Barz's struggle before her death. (Since 2001, the Texas Code of Criminal Procedure has granted defendants the right to submit motions for additional DNA testing to their convicting courts so long as any revelation of DNA evidence could cast doubt on a convict's guilt. It also grants defendants the right to obtain grand jury transcripts from their case if it's believed the prosecution committed a Brady

violation - that is, hid evidence favorable to the defense.)


"Several of these items of physical evidence were analyzed multiple times, but only the final report and selected excerpts of the underlying testing data were available to the defense team for analysis," wrote Greer, citing Dr. Benjamin's letter from Oct. 2001. "Having access to all of the underlying data - not just the reports prepared for the trial and the habeas hearing - will allow a thorough and complete review of the evidence that was used to convict Perez and may also potentially inform the results of the new testing that Perez is seeking in order to draw out a profile of the real killer from the various incomplete and mixed DNA contributions on these items."

Greer listed the significant number of fingerprints lifted "from highly sensitive CONTINUED ON P.28

locations" around the house, including the "blood-covered bathrooms and bedrooms where two of the bodies were found" that were never matched to Perez or any of the victims. She noted "other leads that may have identified the real killer in this case, including information about witness interviews and background investigations," as well as information about any attempts the prosecution made to verify Perez's whereabouts during the murders.

Buddy Meyer, who assisted Dawson-Brown at trial, denies Greer's accusations that "Perez became the focal point of the case early and to the exclusion of evidence suggesting his innocence or another possible perpetrator." However, he told the Chronicle that the D.A.'s Office has no reason to oppose new testing. "You're talking about a death penalty case here," he said. "Why would we not agree to postconviction testing? We're talking about a man's life."

### "THIS IS STILL TEXAS"

In March of this year, Greer told the Chronicle that two of the nine items delivered to the Tarrant County Medical Examiner have already been tested: the plant stand and comal handle. The handle produced no new matches; the blood on the plant stand was proven to be Barz's. Greer declined to comment on efforts to find Gutierrez, saying that any discussion of Perez's alibi is privileged information. She believes she knows who the actual killer is, but declined to go into any detail.

"We have to undermine confidence in the verdict," she says, rather than point to a new killer. "It's better [to implicate someone elsel, but not necessary."

Members of Barz and Mitchell's families declined to be inter-

viewed for this story. Through a friend, Fulwiler's family also declined comment, saying that the memory drums up too much sadness. Asked whether new discoveries could sway his opinion of whether Perez is the murderer, the friend reiterated that Perez's fingerprints were found all over the house.

Back in Livingston, Perez maintains his focus, and his confidence in Greer and her team. "She's saved my life twice already," he says. "They're that efficient, that smart. They care. They have compassion. They're not with the state [like indigent defense attorneys]. And they're not afraid to speak up. Marcy is a bulldog. She gets in."

In October, Perez received a letter from District Attorney Rosemary Lehmberg informing him that his case "may be impacted by recent scientific concerns involving the historical interpretation of DNA results." Lehmberg attached to her letter a notice from Texas Forensic Science Commission presiding officer Vincent Di Maio, which was sent to state and local law enforcement agencies on Aug. 21, 2015. Di Maio said there are "concerns [involving] the interpretation of DNA results where multiple contributors may be present." Included in his letter is an explanation of the FBI's May 2015 announcement that it had found "minor discrepancies" in its population database. (In May 2015, The Washington Post reported that 3% of DNA profiles the FBI had examined since 1999 were potentially affected.)

On Jan. 28, the developments prompted Sage to issue a stay on Perez's execution. She sent a letter to Sian Schilhab,

general counsel for Texas' Court of Criminal Appeals, indicating that the state has discovered "some potential Brady material in this case and has disclosed that evidence to defense."

Greer stresses

that Sage hasn't found anything definitive yet, but that the three parties are working together "to try to identify where the holes are" in Perez's case. "I don't have all the documents necessary to complete the assessment," she said. "But there is a lot that does not add up about [Perez's] conviction: the evidence in the case, the way the crime scene was processed, and the

Medical Examiner's reports.'

Perez says that he's "optimistic" about any potential revelations but refuses to get his hopes up. "I don't allow myself to get excited," he says. "I could.

"This is still Texas. They don't give a damn about who you have or nothing. They want you dead, and they're going to do everything to kill me. I understand that. That's already there. The reality is that I will die. Our hope is that something happens and I walk out of here a free man. That's my reality, and I have to

### ON THE OUTSIDE: DELIA PEREZ MEYER FIGHTS TO PROVE HER BROTHER'S INNOCENCE



Many times over the last 18 years, Delia Perez Mever has tried to imagine what it's like to live the way her brother Louis Perez does on death row. Sometimes anti-death-penalty groups tape off 6-by-9-foot rectangles - the size of a prison cell - for people to huddle inside. Other times, she's closed herself off in a tiny room - a closet or a bathroom - and tried to put herself in her brother's shoes. "It's just such a feeling of isolation and sadness," she said. "I know that I would probably not survive back there."

Eighteen years ago, a phone call woke Meyer from a deep sleep. A friend was calling to ask about Perez, whose face and name were plastered across local news outlets. As Meyer soon realized, he was wanted for murder. That night, Sept. 10, 1998, was essentially the beginning of a new life for Meyer.

Proving her brother's innocence became "99 percent" of her focus. Two years after Perez was arrested, their mother died of a heart attack on their kitchen floor. Her last words, Meyer said, were a plea that Perez's family continue to visit him. Meyer, who had both a teaching job at AISD and a teenage son, began making the weekly trips to Livingston to make good on that promise. During that time, she also found a listing in the Chronicle for an anti-death-penalty meetup, which led to nearly two decades of activism in the movement. "It became my job," she said. "My brother was helpless. And I chose that. I didn't realize it was going to be this hard or take so long for him to be free."

It wasn't without sacrifice. Meetings of the Campaign to End the Death Penalty led to involvement with the Texas Moratorium Network. Later on, she did work with Amnesty International. The World Coalition Against the Death Penalty took her on trips to Europe. She's fasted, rallied, and spoken countless times in her brother's name.

"My aunt has given up her whole life for my dad," said Perez's daughter Jade. "She really is a blessing. She's fought so hard for my dad. I don't think I've ever met someone so dedicated and loyal. ... She hasn't stopped for 16 years."

My mother, a childhood friend of Mever, knows that well. Their parents ran in the same social circles in Austin back in the Sixties. Growing up they'd been close, but the stress and schedule associated with Meyer's second life made it so they lost contact for nearly a decade, even though they lived in the same part of town. As Meyer was getting acclimated to a life of travel and protests. Jade and I were in the same third grade class at Zilker Elementary. I remember other kids talking about Jade's dad being in prison, but I didn't know until I was a teenager the sweat Meyer was putting into getting him freed. Really, until I was a teenager, I didn't know Meyer much at all.

Jade, Perez's youngest of four kids, was 7 years old when he went to prison. She cherishes memories of camping trips with her dad from before, but admits there have been times when she nearly lost hope. "I feel like now that I'm older, it's hitting me harder because I have a family of my own and he's not here."

Meyer remembers taking Jade as a little girl to the prison to visit Perez. They'd try to distract her until the guards removed all of the chains and shackles. But once father and daughter picked up the phones and began talking to each other through the Plexiglas, nothing but the Texas Department of Criminal Justice could separate them.

"You've met him." she said to me, referring to the time I took the trip with her as a 16-year-old junior reporter, taking notes for my high school paper. "He's just a wonderful, happy-go-lucky person. He's always been that way." Meeting Perez is meeting an instant friend, and his big personality means he's not letting you go until the prison calls time.

"It was especially hard on Jade because she was so close to her daddy," said Meyer. "And that was one of the hardest things for us to see: The kids suffer without a dad. ... He's missed so much. You look around this house and you see all these pictures of weddings and birthdays and graduations and kids moving on. All of our cousins and nieces and nephews, and all his grandchildren. Everyone's growing up, going to school, getting married and going to college. And he's missed all of that. He's missed all of that. It's not fair. He should have a place at this table. And he does. He never leaves this table. He's the heart and soul."

"I wonder a lot about what I would do if and when [my dad] gets out," said Jade. "My whole world would flip upside down. I really think I would faint. I would be overwhelmed with happiness. And I think that's what helps me keep my - Nina Hernandez





### The Internet's Promise Fulfilled (for Men, Anyway)

Japan's Tenga toy company appears to be first on the market with a virtual reality bodysuit (for use with the Oculus Rift Sexy Beach Premium Resort 3-D game) containing a genital stimulator and the sensation of "groping" breasts - sending "impulses all over the wearer's body to make it feel like another human being is touching them," according to one reviewer (who expressed dismay that the bodysuit might put sex workers out of business). Said Tenga's CEO, "In the future, the virtual real will become more real than actual real sex." Because of societal pressures, women are expected to be a less-robust market for the device than men.

### **Grownups**

In March, one District of Columbia government administrative law judge was charged with misdemeanor assault on another. Judge Sharon Goodie said she wanted to give Judge Joan Davenport some files, but Davenport, in her office, would not answer the door. Goodie said once the door finally opened, an enraged Davenport allegedly "lunged" at her, "aiming" her thrust at Goodie's neck.

A 55-year-old man was killed in Memphis, Tenn., on March 23 when a 15-foot trailer came loose and crashed into him on a sidewalk. The deceased, who had a lengthy criminal record for sexual assault, might have avoided the trailer if he had not been distracted by watching pornography on his phone as he walked.

Tennessee state Rep. Jeremy Durham has such a reputation as a "dog" around women working at the capitol that the house speaker issued a directive in April relocating Durham's office to a less-populated building across the street. Further, Durham is allowed access only to certain legislative meetings and to certain staff (i.e., no free-ranging among female staff members). After interviewing 34 people, the state attorney general said he believed that Rep. Durham's unwanted sexual approaches and commentaries were impeding legislative business.

### **Awesome Governments!**

1) Chinese courts (according to figures reported by Amnesty International in March) dispense justice so skillfully that more than 99.9% of cases result in convictions (1,039 acquittals in 1.2 million cases last year). 2) During its first 33 years (through 2012), the U.S. government's applications for secret search warrants to the Foreign Intelligence Surveillance Court have been approved all but 11 times out of 33.900 cases. (FISC defenders say that is because all requests are finely honed by guidance from the judges, but of course, both the Chinese and U.S. numbers, and reasoning, are, by designation, unverifiable.)

### **Leading Economic Indicators**

"Who's a Good Dog?"/"Yes, You Are": Some are just blessed with doggy charisma, say owners who showcase their pet's charm on "personal" social media accounts, and now specialized marketers scour those sources to match the most popular pooches with advertisers seeking just the right fourlegged companion for their image. As The Wall Street Journal reported in April, entrepreneurial dog owners have rushed to create popular Instagram accounts and Facebook posts (and now, even to put their photogenic pups on a live-streaming app called Waggle) to catch agents' eyes (and, they hope, lead to four- and five-figure paydays from such advertisers as Nikon, PetSmart, Residence Inn, and Heinz).

New Jersey is a big state, but when just one man decided to move away, the state Legislature's budget office director warned that the loss of that man's taxes might lead to state revenue problems. Billionaire hedgefund manager David Tepper evidently pays a bundle, and the budget office director pointed out that the state's reliance on personal income taxes means that even a 1% drop in anticipated tax could create a gap of \$140 million under forecasts.

Among the names chosen for Internet start-up ventures (although - face it - the more sensible names are already taken): Houzz (home design and remodeling), Kabam (online interactive game company, formerly "Watercooler Inc."), Klarna (e-commerce company that pays the store for your purchases and then collects from you), MuleSoft (makes software to integrate applications), and Kabbage (makes small-business loans online). Wired magazine reported in February that those ventures, and two dozen other inexplicably named start-ups, are all "unicorns" - with investors pledging at least \$1 billion to each one.

### The Job of the Researcher

Researchers already knew that masked birch caterpillars "rub hairs on their rear ends against a leaf to create vibrations," according to an April National Geographic report, but a forthcoming article by Carleton University biologists describes that "drumming" as actually part of their "sophisticated signaling repertoire" to attract others - not for mating, but for assistance in spinning their protective silk cocoons. The researchers' "laser vibrometer" detects sound likely inaudible to humans, but when the caterpillars feed, it's clearly, said one researcher, "Chomp, chomp, anal scrape. Chomp, chomp, chomp, anal scrape."

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





### How We Are Played

CATHERINE DAVIS AND MICHELLE THOMPSON'S ILLUSORY IMPRESSIONS WILL MOVE YOU IN WAYS YOU WON'T EXPECT

The room is grand, with little furniture, but it is not empty because it holds a piano, a piano with a body of wood and metal, felt and plastic, and with a history of being played. Via the piano, over the piano, under the piano, and within the music itself, people with bodies, complicated bodies of carbon and water, tension and release, and with histories and potentials collide. Composermusician Catherine Davis, seated at the piano bench, leans into a resonating note, and dancer Oliver Greene-Cramer, leans into her, pressing against her shoulder.

"That's me. I'm not playing a character," says Davis, a musician and composer who. with dancer-choreographer Michelle Thompson, co-created Illusory Impressions, an installation of music and dance at the Texas Federation of Women's Clubs Mansion (often known simply as "the Mansion," at 24th and San Gabriel streets). The work consists of five vignettes of contemporary music and movement, each performed simultaneously in a different room of the mansion by various groupings of 16 dancers, three pianists, two cellists, and a vocalist. The order in which the audience encounters the vignettes is choose-your-own-adventure - to a point. While audiences can determine whether they want to visit the parlor before the tea room or save the balcony for last, the performers are free to vary the tone of the

ships, which means that a thing you think you're returning to may not, in fact, be that thing anymore at all.

It's precisely this kind of subtle shift that

Davis and Thompson want to bring attention to. Our judgments, they suggest, are not always based on the solid ground we think they are. The intimacy of the work, they hope, offers a setting for mindful awareness of how we are impressed upon.

"Oliver's character is some force within my life," says Davis of her duet with Greene-Cramer, which takes place in the parlor of the mansion.

Thompson and Davis began their process nearly two years ago, with intimate conversations about the forces in their lives. "Shit was happening to me - good or bad," says Davis. "I was like, what do I do with it?" Thompson had used Davis' music for her choreography before, but while Davis was moved by the dancers, she yearned for an

even deeper connection. For the duet, Thompson asked Davis, "Can [Oliver] put his hand on your hand? Can he cover your eyes? Can he be down by the pedals?" Davis was game. "Yes." "Yes." "Yes."

In that duet, Thompson says, "The piano is really what ties them together. The piano is their home." Audience members become intruders into that private space, becoming witness to unspoken parts of a relationship and aware of their own presence and reactions. What do you do with it? How do you filter or reflect it and project it back out?

Thompson admits she gets teary watching the duet. And while Davis acknowledges that "only 50 percent of people get chills from listening to music," she's always going for that gold. "Until I'm getting that visceral response. I scrap it." Being a trained composer, she could call on theory to try to evoke such a response, but she's also been in rock bands (most notably, Zykos), and she prefers the goose bumps method. Thompson and Davis agree that the cello and piano foster particularly deep connections with body and soul, viscera and nostalgia. (Early in the process, they edited out a viola, which, they felt, didn't serve this purpose.) For Thompson, who spent 14 years dancing with Ballet Austin before moving on to New York City last year, those instruments are key when she's exploring new movement as a choreographer. "Piano and strings put me in that place and open me up."

Both collaborators are eager to evoke similar vulnerability in the audience. During a preview performance last year. Thompson was fascinated by the effects of a particularly eerie duet, performed by dancer Elise Pekarek, who wore a negligee and moved in and

> out of a clawfoot bathtub, and vocalist Karla Mazur, who augmented her unnerving notes with live electronic looping. The audience's anxiety influenced the performers, who distilled that anxiety and projected it back out - an emotive loop. ### **Pride of Texas**

Holland Taylor captures every nuance of Ann Richards in Zach Theatre's magnificent production of *Ann*

I was born on Fort Hood in the late Seventies. The son of a soldier, I spent the next 16 years hopping the globe, spending no more than a couple of years in any particular time zone - a nomadic tradition I'd gleefully continue for seven years after Dad retired. Central Texas was always "home base," though; a month or two was always spent at Grandma's while preparing for the next move, and nearly every summer was a vacation to the 190 corridor. I've now called Austin my home for 15 years, but I have two distinct sets of memories: Texas and not Texas.

"Golly, Shanon, thanks for the insight into your childhood ... you maybe wanna start talking about the play?"

Pipe down, you. I'm building to something here: I'm a Texan, through and through.

More importantly, I'm an Ann Richards Texan, though I was only here for the tail end of her term as governor (and that time was spent more concerned with girls, skateboards, and how big my JNCO jeans were than with politics). Not many understand what that means outside of Austin, the Blue Island in the Red Sea of Texas, but as Holland Taylor took the stage in the title role of Ann, which she wrote as well as stars in, I swelled with pride and memory of what it means to be a citizen of the Lone Star State.

Taylor's performance as Richards is a master class, capturing every nuance of the governor: her drawl, cadence, courage, and stubborn power all on display. The work put into

> discovering every tiny mannerism is evident, down to a moment when Taylor gently removes her shoe to stretch her toes while on a call. It is this attention to detail that impresses the most, more channeling Richards than acting. The show begins at the com-

mencement of an imaginary college in Texas, for which Richards is the speaker. Taylor nails Richards' brash charm as she talks about her childhood, marriage, and beginnings in politics. Even a

dirty joke is thrown in, showing Richards could be just as comfortable chatting on a porch with a warm beer as handling matters of state. Once firmly planted in the world Taylor's script so deeply creates, scenic designer Michael Fagin's seamless automation transforms the set from an auditorium stage to Richards' office in the Capitol. We then get to see this legendary woman in action as she



and the disembodied voice of her assistant Nancy (Julie White) spend an evening handling the various affairs of Texas politics and trying to wrangle all her children together to decide who's cooking what during an upcoming beach vacation ... peppered with an occasional innocently flirtatious call from President Clinton.

With director Benjamin Endsley Klein, Taylor brings us back to the Texas of the early Nineties. What is felt during the show is as important as what is said: As Richards talks about abortion rights, gun control, women's rights, and many other ideals for which we still struggle, memories of that era flood the senses. For me, it was a flannel-clad utopia - Manic Panic-colored hair, Doc Martens on riot grrrls, and the general badassery of the

fact that this steel-forged dynamo of a woman was making her mark in American politics. The blowback from that era was George W. Bush, but this magnificent production entrenches us in a time of greatness, if only for the evening. The final image is a giant projection of the woman herself (provided, along with many other gorgeous projections, by projection designer Zachary G. Borovay), to which Taylor bows and blows an appreciative kiss.

Richards showed the world that there are two kinds of Texans, and hers was a Texan with which the world wasn't familiar. I felt like I spent an evening with a woman who made it okay to be the Texan I am, and Taylor's pitchperfect portrayal left me hopeful that a leader like her will come around again.



### McKean-Eilers Building, 323 Congress April 21

The seeds for Lumen were planted when choreographer Andrea Ariel was invited to propose a site-specific work for the Dan Flavin fluorescent light installation at the Menil Collection in Houston. When the Menil project was postponed, Ariel kept going. She commissioned original music from line upon line percussion - the group's first composition together - and, with three dancers, crafted movement recalling that gallery setting: sculptural, three-dimensional, tolerant of daylight. She secured the historic McKean-Filers building, which is currently vacant, and designated a rectangle for the performance space, with seating along two sides. In a distillation of the Flavin installation, lighting designer Stephen Pruitt fitted the space with a smattering of fluorescent tubes that slashed light across the walls and in the cavernous space between our heads and the ceiling.

The three members of line upon line - Matt Teodori, Adam Bedell, and Cullen Faulk - performed around and among the dancers, making use of drums and bells as well as sand, which poured from paper cones into buckets, and bamboo wind chimes and weather vanes set in motion by electric fans. Dancers Alyson Dolan, Lisa del Rosario, and Nathan Brumbaugh didn't meet with them until the performance week, and the show had a spontaneous, fresh vibe on opening night. Although the work wasn't improvised, it was invigorated and invigorating, having an aura of equal parts midcentury jazz club and digitalage maker studio. (The dancers' stretchy

jumpsuits, designed by Tanya McCown, were the main nod to the Nineties, the era of the Flavin installation.) And yet the working parts were strikingly precise: The sand stopped rushing, the fans ceased blowing, and all six reached their mapped points in space at what seemed like the perfect time.

In the immediate, the work evoked pure wonder, but in rearview, the two trios, along with an architectural aesthetic energized by three structural columns across the performance space and the exploring of vertices and the space within shapes, the work appeared as a study of three. Embraceable and objectifiable, three, the work reminded us, is less a number than a shape (we can subitize three without counting). Carrying three glasses to the table uses all of our dexterity and caution; two is too easy, obvious, pedestrian; and four destroys structural integrity. At times, the dancers were each a point of a triangle morphing from acute to obtuse but retaining the integrity of its essential shape. At others, they were tripods, in elbow-braced headstands and controlled forward rolls. In sound, three was rendered as close and focused when the musicians bowed their heads close over a table, rattling small objects in metal cans, and then as a landscape, with far-flung sounds initiating from points across and beyond the performance floor.

Three was human, too, if theoretical: The trios generally appeared sans hierarchies. Could they have been triplets, or that family you choose? Perhaps three was really one, an individual epic, manipulating and stretching its shape and listening to the ricochets within. - Jonelle Seitz



When Kurt Cobain killed himself, I had no idea why I was supposed to care. Nirvana wasn't on my radar, so when kids showed up at school wearing blue because, I don't know, it was the color of his eyes, I didn't understand. Eventually, I would find real appreciation for the music, but that was a cultural moment I simply missed. So while I get why the Blanton Museum of Art named its new exhibition "Come as You Are: Art of the 1990s" after a Nirvana song, it doesn't really represent my Nineties. I'm okay with that because, as the exhibition demonstrates, there are many Nineties. There's the identity-politics Nineties, the AIDS-awareness Nineties, the digital Nineties, and more. This higgledy-piggledy speaks to a reality, which is that we can name an era after a decade, but attempts to strictly categorize history are arbitrary. (Example: "Come as You Are" represents work from 1989-2001, and even steps outside of these parameters here and there.) Alex Bag's installation, Untitled Fall '95, is a hilarious reminder of this. A screen is set up against a multicolored wall faced with two beanbag chairs, presumably to give a hallucinogenic living-room feel, though it reminded me of a Chuck E. Cheese. In the video, Bag rambles about her late-20s life in a way that should be dull ("Blah blah I worked at a hair

salon"), but combined with eye rolls and turns of phrase, the video is funny, a novelty in most museums where typically people's faces are perpetually tightened in grim contemplation. We're told the piece is referencing the then-new MTV series The Real World. In terms of reflecting the mishmash of that era, The Real World makes rich source material, as it tried to portray "reality" by forcing stereotyped individuals to live together, then filming it. It made for great TV. Remember when the militant black guy and the naive white girl argued about racism? Classic.

Please don't mind my blathering nostalgic. I just saw an art show that romanticizes a period I am old enough to remember. That said, I don't look at art to feel nostalgic. If the work isn't immediate, it's nothing.

On walking into the exhibition, I was met with a piece I had never seen in person by an artist I have always returned to, Félix González-Torres. González-Torres died in 1996, only five years after "Untitled" (Placebo) was completed. "Untitled" (Placebo) may be the most powerful piece in the show, though it would be the most powerful piece in almost any show. Over 1,000 pounds of candies wrapped in silver cellophane are spread atop a section of floor, making a shining, textured carpet. Viewers are invited to take one. As the candy melted on my tongue, I considered the rock music echoing through the galleries from a nearby video piece. "I'm being immersed," I thought. This was so, but after all, what is art for?

I also considered González-Torres. Earlier in 1991, his partner, Ross Laycock, died from AIDS-related complications, as the artist himself later would. The shrinking weight of the candies as people take them mimics Laycock's shrinking body mass as he neared death. As I sucked on my candy, I thought of the artist and his loss. "I'm eating Laycock's body," I thought. I was moved. But what is - Sam Anderson-Ramos



Lt. Henry O. Flipper knew the frontier forts strung across Texas as well as anyone at the time. The former slave reported to Fort Sill in 1878 and then served at a series of Texas forts before being railroaded out of the service.

Born on a plantation in Georgia, Flipper was the first African-American cadet to graduate from West Point. He later became the first nonwhite officer to lead the **Buffalo Soldiers** of the 10th Cavalry and served at forts Elliott, Concho, Ouitman, and Davis in Texas where he was involved in campaigns against the Comanche and Apache.

As an engineer, Flipper built roads and installed telegraph lines between forts. A ditch he designed to drain malarial swamps at Fort Sill, Okla., is still referred to as "Flipper's Ditch."

In 1880, his skills garnered him a promotion to quartermaster and commissary at the new fort in the Davis Mountains. The following year Flipper was court-martialed when post funds went missing.

Following his dismissal, Flipper went on to a distinguished career in surveying

and mining engineering. He passed away in 1940 at age 84 and is buried in his hometown of Thomasville, Ga.

After a review of his case by the Army and Department of Justice, President Bill Clinton pardoned Lt. Flipper in 1999. Soon afterward a bronze bust of Flipper was placed in the theatre lobby at  ${\bf Fort\ Davis\ National\ Historic\ Site}.$

The long arm of justice: 27 years after the fact, an English jury found Tuesday that the **96 Liverpool fans** who were crushed to death on April 15, 1989, during a match at Hillsborough Stadium in Sheffield. England, had been "unlawfully killed" and were victims of what proved to be **fatal** police errors in security planning and execution. Faced with 14 yes-or-no questions in deciding how the 96 people died, the jury said no to only one: whether the fans themselves were responsible for the deaths, as officials had long claimed. There's no actual consequence to the decision - it's strictly a finding of fact - but it's still an emotional victory for the victims' families and the Liverpool fan base, who've been fighting the "hooligan" narrative for decades.

Fatigue is clearly setting in for the top teams, as the **European season** winds toward its conclusion. Real Madrid and Manchester City slogged through a dull

scoreless draw in the first leg of the Champions League semifinals on Tuesday, and Atlético Madrid edged Bavern Munich, 1-0, on Wednesday. The two-time NCAA indoor champion told TexasSports.com that she could've run faster, citing that "the last 100, it was rough." The excellent jump-start on her season sets her up for promising run-up to the Olympic season, including the trials in July and August's Games in Rio de Janeiro.

#### **DBU Once Again?**

Using some unique methodology, which included position appearances, draft selections, and first-round picks, Texas reclaimed the DBU (Defensive Back University) title, according to CBS Sports. Evaluating players coming into the NFL from 2006 to 2015, Texas outpaced standouts South Carolina. Ohio State, LSU, Miami, and Florida. Of course, helping the Longhorns' cause is the current dominant play of two Pro Bowl talents: Seahawks' Earl Thomas III and the Vikings' Michael Griffin

# Review: L'Estelle House & the Drafting Room

CHARMING SPACE STILL HAS A FEW KINKS

I know I wasn't responsible for the setup, but still I feel like I should apologize to Nashville-based musician Suzy Oleson, who recently performed at Rainey Street newcomer L'Estelle. To get to the Drafting Room, the bar portion of the space, I had to walk through the middle of her setup and attempt to muffle my voice as I ordered Prosecco just

a few feet away – not that the roar of the Parlor Room next door wasn't already making her inaudible. Too bad. As far as I can tell from a listen online, Oleson's roots rock has a backyard feel that could have fit L'Estelle like well-worn denim.

I can't damn L'Estelle on acoustics – after all, it's not a music venue – but the awkwardness of the performance is indicative of a concept that tries to do too much. I'm not sure if owners Craig and Holly Nasso have any previous hospitality experience, but there does still seem to be some trial and error at play – the most notable of which is the estrangement between the two anchors

of the business. Although L'Estelle and the Drafting Room are owned and operated by the Nassos, they are operated completely separately, down to the receipts on Square. Food is ordered at the front house, drinks (beer and wine) are ordered at the back house, and never the twain shall meet. I'm sure there's a very good reason for the separation of

kitchen and bar, but it flips customer expectation. Even if you want a glass of water, you have to make the trek to the back. It's good they serve comfort food because the experience is disjointing. Relaxation is helped along by the elegant

but homey grounds. The mostly white accents and the tall plants provide a lovely oasis. It's no wonder that there are lines at brunch; the space practically demands a mimosa.

But if L'Estelle does live up to the comfort part of its stated concept, it all but abandons its other part. It's true that one doesn't necessarily have to have a culinary hook to run a successful (and good) restaurant. That's why bland terms like "new American" and "global contemporary" continue to have currency. But if you do state that you serve French-inspired comfort food, it's best if the menu reflects that. Sure, L'Estelle calls fries frites, but that's really where the illusion ends. I'll give the benefit of the doubt and say the Parisian burger (\$13, not including the \$3 added egg) was named after the elder Hilton sister, because there is really no trace of the City of Light. Why not throw out the food-service telera rolls and replace with a locally baked brioche? Or use a French cheese instead of queso, even something as trite as Brie? Piled high with arugula and fries, the burger was rich and punchy. It's the signature of the late-night menu, but every signature deserves some flourish.

There's opportunity there. I'm not saying that L'Estelle should convert itself into a La Madeleine, but classic bistro fare works well with booze (just ask the Yellow Jacket Social

Club), and, for better or worse, Rainey Street is primarily about just that. Well-sourced charcuterie, a tartine or two, and a good Niçoise would keep everything in theme (at least the French part; the website also tells a Southern story) and still be heavy enough for the buzzing hordes. The brunch offerings wouldn't even have to change. Everything about brunch is vaguely French anyway.

It would also be nice if the space offered some sort of dessert. I have seen Instagram shots of cobblers and beignet bites, but we saw no sweets on the menu during our visits. Consistency makes for a more successful restaurant.

But setting aside those terms, the limited menu does have some pleasures. Neither the frites (\$6) served with a tangy aïoli nor the sweet/salty brussels sprouts (\$7) sprinkled with Parmesan were revolutionary, but solid snacks don't need to be. I'm not sure why the fries were cut in two distinctly different sizes, but hey, L'Estelle, you do you. The simple kale salad (served with crisp green apple and walnuts - \$8) and the sourdough grilled cheese (with added arugula and roasted tomatoes - \$13) weren't anything a good home cook couldn't make on a Wednesday, but for those who spend more time Favoring than sautéing (I suspect a lot of Rainey habitués qualify), the hominess is welcome. The mustard-yellow hummus (served in a cup with green beans and carrots piled in), however, was off-putting, oddly sweet and suffocating from tahini. And the gazpacho (\$5) needed texture and a more assured hand with seasoning. As is, it was like a bland salsa.

All of those problems seem to be the stumbles of folks new to running a restaurant. Despite them, I suspect L'Estelle and the Drafting Room will ultimately wind up a winner, if only as a welcome respite from Rainey's lurk. Craig, an architect, once lived and worked on the property, and his affection for the space shows. But the kitchen has to find more solid footing, and the offerings have to match the brand. L'Estelle has considerable youthful charm, that much is sure. It just needs to figure out what it wants to be when it grows up.





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# **Pushing Past La Periferia**

Cine Las Americas Film Festival aims for a wider reach

The 19th annual Cine Las Americas International Film Festival is fast approaching, and hardly two weeks before its May 4 opening night, its director, Jean Anne Lauer, was bushed. She and her programming team had whittled down their official selections from a multitude of Ibero-American countries – the fest includes films from Portugal and Spain, as well as the U.S. and Canada, and Latin America. The previous month had been particularly challenging, with Lauer's team negotiating a tight schedule while also searching for projects that "are not just entertaining, which is not to say that entertainment is not important," says Lauer. "When we look for films, they have to be quality first."

Since joining Cine Las Americas in 2009 as a programmer, Lauer has seen the annual fest grow with the city: "Austin is always changing, so the audience here also continues to change." This year's fest speaks to that evolution in that, as she notes, the films are so diverse that no real overall social, psychological, or aesthetic themes exist between them. Lauer points out that, when working with her programming team, Elena Bessire and Rebecca Morelo Jackson, "we sometimes tried to think of trends in the films that were coming in, but there weren't any, really." Perennial subjects - like the drug trade, genocide, or indigenous peoples' voices – have their places in the lineup. "When



you're dealing with Latin American and Latino issues in your festival," Lauer notes, "such themes are basic inevitabilities."

What differentiates this event from its Ibero-, Latino-, and Latina-friendly counterparts all over the country is its prioritization of learned curation over ostentation: from a critical perspective, the official selections, from the award-winning international dramas to new releases, are some of the most internationally scattered of any festival in America. As Lauer explains, "Cine straddles all of it: from the entertainment to - I hate to say this - 'the tearjerker' ... we have everything in the middle." She points to movies like We Are Pregnant, a romantic-comedy in the This Is 40 vein from Spain's Juana Macias, and the InnuCanadian thriller Le Dep, as two of many that blend elements of the crowd-pleaser with acclaim. Macias' last feature, for example, was a multiple nominee for the Goya, Spain's Academy Award.

Then there are the "international buzz titles," of which Lauer herself picks and programs for the festival each year. Attendees can expect some of the films to reflect the programmers' affinities for hybrid genres, independent production, and top-tier aesthetic quality. Of her own tastes, Lauer laughs, "I tend to go for the more experimental films ... when one is really good, I go after it." One of the more intriguing films she described, The Project of the Century, is a Cuban film about the country's attempt to build a nuclear power plant. Then there is the documentary on Salvador Allende, Beyond My Grandfather Allende, directed by his granddaughter, Marcia Tambutti Allende - a film that seems both emotionally vivid and psychologically complex. It's an impressive selection, and one to make cinephiles' mouths water.

Yet by occupying such a wide swath of genres, national origins, and budgets, the films of Cine Las Americas can be hard sells to the ever-growing Austin community. "We're still striving, like other niche festivals, to get butts in the seats for these films," says Lauer. As with the previous 18 years, the festival is hoping to tap into new audiences while maintaining what Lauer calls "its core: the folks who have gone from casual viewers to members of Cine Las Americas, all the while attending events throughout the year." Through them and other relationships with organizations like OUTsider and the Austin Film Society, Lauer says, "I would like to see us grow more and have wider reach."

## **LETTING VOICES BE HEARD**

#### CLA PROGRAMMING IS ALL ABOUT ACCESS by Jessi Cape

From intern to film program associate, Elena Bessire's 10-year tenure at Cine Las Americas has been a labor of love. of both film and community. With 11 different categories, the programming is no small feat, but she's particularly proud of the Official Selection Panorama and the festival's co-curating partnerships because of the doors that open for everyone involved. "We give an outlet to these filmmakers who, in many cases, might not get to screen at another fest. They've got a great film and a great story, and we want to support it."

Accessibility is a huge point of pride for the fest, which is why roughly one-third of the entire program is offered as free and open to the public at the Mexican American Cultural Center. The Panorama schedule includes five documentary features and 14 shorts, sourced from a cornucopia of Ibero-American cultures. "It's pretty cool to see each country's cinematic landscape expand and grow, and spread a little further across the world," she says.

A Mexican doc, Ayotzinapa: Chronicle of a State Crime, examines the infamous disappearance of 43 students

in Mexico, with witness testimony and details surrounding the event. In the doc Indivisible, director Hilary Linder focuses on Dreamers activists: Three undocumented young adults remain stateside after their families' deportation and rise to immigration activism in Washington, D.C. Make No Noise: The Story of a Skatepark, follows a group of Minnesotan teens who fight city council and bureaucratic red tape to earn their coveted skatepark. Bessire says, "It's super uplifting and inspiring that teenagers can battle through something that a lot of us older people might give up on."

The Peruvian doc Daughter of the Lake tells of the fight against the gold mining industry, with a sharp eye on environmental devastation, communication with the natural and spiritual world, a desperately needed job market, and the effects on the indigenous Andean peoples. Several shorts offer lighter fare: "Oscar" is a Mexican animated art bio; "Your Fucking

Bank" is a Spanish dramedy mixing soccer finals with a bank robbery; and an entry from Belize, "Manna," looks at solitude and mysterious island mail.

"We see these similar stories and topics that come up each year - lots of immigration and political and environmental issues throughout the Americas - but they come at it from different angles. They keep evolving, so there's definitely still a lot of education that can be done about these issues," says Bessire.

Expanding the coverage is why the CLA team works hard to co-present and co-curate with other organizations. For the first time, they're working with Houston's Senorita Cinema, which programs films directed by Latina women, to screen a retrospective roadshow of 10 shorts from the past five editions of their fest. "We're excited to bring that to Austin as a kind of outlet for filmmakers in our region to let them know that there's this option." They've also joined up with the Austin Music Video Festival to offer a bigger-than-ever Latino music video selection this year, and "grow that scene and get those artists and directors in here." Bessire adds. "We always want to provide something new for our audiences. We really like to expand people's minds."

## **METHOD DIRECTING**

#### DIRECTOR STERLIN HARJO HITS THE STREETS FOR MEKKO

Most auditions take place in an office or studio. When Sterlin Harjo started looking for actors for Mekko. his drama about homelessness among Oklahoma's Native American population, he headed to the soup kitchen.

For Harjo, the tale of Creek Nation member Mekko (respected stunt rider Rod Rondeaux) returning to Tulsa after 19 years in jail, is about "the oxymoron of people being indigenous to the land and being homeless." However, he wasn't interested in misery tourism of life on the street. Whenever such stories are told, he said, "It's always focused on the fact that people are stuck there, or that it's dire. People are survivors, and we make the best of what we can."

It's a connection to his Seminole roots, and how everything is faced with humor and resilience. That stretches back to the hope songs sung on the Trail of Tears, which he tackled in his 2014 documentary, This May Be the Last Time. "They're super sad," he said. "If you hear them, they sound like you're mourning. But they're not meant to be. They're meant to lift you up and keep you going."



The roots of the story go back to when he moved from tiny Holdenville, Okla. (pop. 5,771), to Tulsa, away from his close-knit family. "I missed that familial camaraderie that native people normally have," he said, and with no close connection to the city's large Cherokee, Creek, and Osage populations, he soon realized that the native people he saw most were the homeless he drove past. "I'd see them joking with each other and laughing, but they were like a family, and it reminded me of home."

The first time he broached the subject on film was when he interviewed Jimmy Washington, a homeless Cherokee man: It was through Jimmy that he heard about Tulsa's Iron Gate soup kitchen, and when he started casting Mekko, that's where he went. That was a nod to Werner Herzog's 1977 black comedy Stroszek, which placed its cast in real locations among non-actors. "They embraced the fact that they had a low budget, and they embraced that they didn't have a large crew, and you could tell that Herzog created space in scenes. The production would go into a diner, and they created a scene around what they had. So I thought the only way to make a film about the homeless community is to do it like that."

Mekko screens Saturday, May 7, 8pm, at the Marchesa Hall & Theatre as part of the Cine Las Americas International Film Festival.



# **Reeling in** the Hill Country

**ESCAPE FROM THE CITY** WITH THE HILL COUNTRY FILM FESTIVAL

It's the height of spring in Central Texas, the pastoral Hill Country lush from the recent heavy rains, the roadside bursting with vibrant colors. It's the perfect time for a weekend getaway, and the Hill Country Film Festival in Fredericksburg is shaping up to be a promising excuse to do just that, so long as the way there isn't underwater.

The festival, back for its seventh year, will be held from Thursday, April 28, through Sunday, May 1, with screenings, panels, and parties. It all culminates in an awards ceremony on Saturday night, with cash prizes given to winners of Best of the Fest and Best Texas Film.

A total of 13 feature films and over 70 shorts will be featured, with entries from Texas, the U.S., and around the world, with countries such as Russia. Iceland, Israel, and Sweden making their presence felt. Several of the most prominent entries in the lineup are films that made a big splash at SXSW this year, including two feature documentaries from director Keith Maitland. His film Tower, which uses animation. archival footage, and interviews with survivors to bring to life the story of the 1966 UT Tower massacre. won both the Jury and Audience awards for Best Documentary Feature. Also showing is Maitland's A Song for You: The Austin City Limits Story, a documentary detailing the history and impact of television's longest-running music series. Another SXSW favorite and winner of the Audience Award for Best Narrative Feature, the thriller *Transpecos* will screen, starring former Austinite Gabriel Luna, about border patrol agents uncovering a plot within their own ranks.

Other feature-length entries of note this year include Bear With Us, a dark comedy about a marriage proposal in the woods that gets interrupted by a rampaging bear, and Rwanda & Juliet, a documentary about an Ivy League professor traveling to Rwanda to help stage a performance of Romeo & Juliet with young Hutu and Tutsi actors. If you're more interested in the shorter side of things, you might want to keep an eve out for Oscar-nominated "Ave Maria," Palestinian-British director Basil Khalil's narrative about a group of nuns living under a vow of silence in Palestine who must deal with an Israeli family whose car has broken down outside their remote convent. Meanwhile, in French short "Skål," a young YouTube celebrity must contend with a slightly less mundane situation - the sudden evaporation of all water on Earth.

The festival is produced by the Hill Country Film Society, which also holds independent film screenings year-round and provides film education in the Texas Hill Country.

#### **Broadcast News (1987)**

You could say that William Hurt's airhead newscaster is dumb as a fencepost, but a fencepost was never so pretty. And therein lies the rub of James L. Brooks' underrated romantic comedy, which deserves the same reverence as Eighties stablemate When Harry Met Sally..., and earns bonus points for anticipating broadcast news' sad slide into infotainment. Holly Hunter's savvy career woman knows sardonic reporter Albert Brooks is intellectually her true match, but the heart can't help but pine for the fencepost with a floppy lock of golden hair. Doesn't love just make fools of us all?

#### It's a Mad, Mad, Mad, Mad World (1963) COMEDY (NORTH)

DIRECTOR'S WALL - KRAMER (SOUTH)

Stanley Kramer's comic masterpiece features virtually all of cinema's greatest professional fools, ranging from the silent era (Buster Keaton) to golden-age icons Milton Berle, Sid Caesar, Buddy Hackett, and Ethel Merman. Seemingly the only comic missing is Ernie Kovacs and that's only because he died before production began. A 3-hour and 25-minute snapshot of its own time, the film is an endlessly watchable tale of human avarice, as a gaggle of strangers literally race across California

in search of a dead gangster's hidden treasure. Dick Shawn as the frugging Sylvester is pure genius, but so is pretty much everything else about this brilliant fool's paradise. - Marc Saylov

#### Henry Fool (1997)

**DIRECTOR'S WALL - HARTLEY** 

Henry Fool (Thomas Jay Ryan) plays the mysterious, commanding, bombastic life teacher to Simon Grim's (James Urbaniak) reticent, bullied, and unassuming garbage man in Hal Hartley's 1997 dramedy. A talentless novelist, Henry gives Simon a notebook into which Simon pens words that outshine his mentor's. Though Hartley's ironic stance toward the world is firmly in place, Henry Fool has a darkly comic tone as questions of art, commerce, and talent are deftly explored. - Marjorie Baumgarten

#### Bad Boy Bubby (1993) **AUSTRALIA**

If David Lynch had directed Room, it might resemble this cult masterpiece from criminally underrated filmmaker Rolf de Heer. The titular Bubby has been locked in a room by his mother for 35 years. Once he finally gets his freedom, he falls into various social clases, joins a punk band, and generally causes chaos wherever he goes. Perhaps more feral than foolish, Bad Boy Bubby is nevertheless one of the - Josh Kupecki strangest films you will ever see.

# **Chicks and Ducks and Geese Better Scurry**

Danish comedy is a nimble tone-shifter

Danish writer/director Anders Thomas Jensen came up on the heels of the Dogme 95 movement, whose "vow of chastity" was equal parts a call for the eschewing of special effects and technology and a big "Hey, look at me!" bolster for the Danish film industry. Jensen has been writing scripts consistently over

the years, and his frequent collaborations with director Susanne Bier have borne some indelible fruit (After the Wedding, the Oscarwinning In a Better World). But of his own films, Jensen has been more sporadic.

He has returned after a 10-year directing hiatus with Men & Chicken, a dysfunctionalfamily comedy combining elements of so

many genres and themes that together, on paper, you'd think the film was a dare by fellow countryman Lars von Trier (see The Five

> Obstructions). But in Jensen's extremely capable hands, everything (mostly)

Gabriel (Dencik) is a philosophy professor whose dead father has one

> last secret to share with him and his estranged brother Elias (Mikkelsen, amazing here, and forever my screen crush). In a hilariously awkward deathbed videotape, their father reveals that he is not actually their father,

and that Gabriel and Elias were adopted, sharing the same father, but different mothers. Their real father is Evelio Thanatos. a reclusive scientist living on the sparsely populated island of Ork. Gabriel and Elias travel



to the island to find a dilapidated former sanitarium housing three more half-brothers, Franz (Malling), Gregor (Kaas), and Josef (Bro), along with a menagerie of geese, rabbits, turkeys, and of course, chickens, Gabriel and Elias fall in with their brethren, a trio of emotionally stunted brothers who behave like backwoods 5-year-olds, oblivious to the outside world.

Combining elements of slapstick, horror, and psychodrama (not to mention Darwinism, bestiality, and harelips), Men & Chicken is a

film - nay, a world - into which you just dive, and unlike most of the stuff out there, from one moment to the next, you have no idea what is going to happen. It is a black comedy that nimbly switches tones so often it can feel like whiplash. These things are all to its benefit, my only critique being the sentimental, fairy-tale bookends that frame the narrative. Still, if you are looking for something completely different, something strange, smart, and vulgar, Jensen's film more than qualifies.

#### KEANU

Attention all ailurophiles! For years, the canine-centric movie industry has unjustly hounded film felines, vilifying them as lazy and conniving animals unworthy of human affection. Love a cat too much and risk your life: Witness Ripley's frantic rescue of Jonesy on the alien-doomed Nostromo, or Prim Everdeen's perilous devotion to Buttercup in spite of the Mockingjay's taunts. This pussybashing ends with the gangsta kitty movie Keanu, an off-the-chain comedy about two relatively law-abiding average Joes (former Comedy Central duo Key & Peele in their first feature film together) who pose as murderous drug dealers to rescue the kidnapped titular tabby from a life of crime. (The kitten's mascot accessories - a cholo-style black bandanna atop his head, gold medallions collared around his neck - are no doubt lifted from some Internet meme gone viral.) The running joke here is that no one can resist this adorable little furball, not even the most vicious of criminal kingpins and cold-blooded killers. Awwww. No hissing or spitting from this sweet baby tom, just one big purr occasionally drowned out by a volley of bullets from semi-automatic weaponry or the N-word peppered in everyday thug jargon. Lassie Come Home, this ain't.

With its unconventional take on pet sounds, Keanu is refreshingly silly, an

unabashed mix of humor and violence topped off by a big dollop of cuteness. Even when it drags, the movie keeps your attention: How much crazier can this get? (A cameo appearance by Faris as a crazed, substance-snorting version of herself wielding a samurai sword is fucked-up funny.) The small-screen chemistry of the two comic leads translates seamlessly to the big screen - these guys not only complete each other's sentences, they cross each other's T's and dot each other's I's - even when the movie begins to feel like an extended skit from their television show. Key and Peele appear to have a great time playing ruthless hit men modeled on multiple viewings of New Jack City; they not only relish the film's sense of the absurd, they thrive on it. (Listening to George Michael's "Father Figure" will never be the same again.) When the plot takes a more orthodox turn (yes, a love interest), its implausibility peaks, but no worries. The movie never settles into complacency for very long. Even if it did, one look at its furry fella running and leaping in slo-mo as gunfire explodes around him, escaping to safety with all nine lives intact, and you won't care about irrelevant things like narrative credibility or consistency. No, you'll be focused on one thing and one thing only. You're gonna be smitten kittens over Keanu. - Steve Davis

Mom might say, "Well, it's the thought that counts, dear." But take her to this holiday omnibus, and you'll run the risk of having her think you're as lazy as the movie. You'll make a better impression with the old standbys of Hallmark and flowers. At the very least, they'll smell better than this stinker.

Garry Marshall used to be considered a comedy titan, having birthed Happy Days, Laverne & Shirley, and Mork & Mindy on TV and directed such movie hits as Pretty Woman and The Princess Diaries. Lately. however, Marshall has fixated on holiday anthologies: Mother's Day is the third one he's directed this decade, after New Year's Eve and Valentine's Day. They are the easiest of vehicles to put together. Lots of discrete stories can be told, with little need for them to intersect coherently or logically. The more characters the better, it seems. If one turns tedious, it'll only be a matter of seconds before the film moves on to something else. Logic and continuity become unnecessary impediments to forward progression and punch lines.

The always reliable Jennifer Aniston plays Sandy, a divorced mother of two boys, whose ex (Olyphant) has just married a younger, shinier wife. Marshall's former Raising Helen star Kate Hudson plays Jesse, who hasn't

So when something is dubbed the Best New Show. we have a limited window before it's either crap (Showtime curse) or "rediscovered" by the people who are paid to play these games (The Americans). While there's a case for the weird way Showtime executive producers in particular eventually

let their writers go so wild the episodes are mini-movies with minimal connective tissue (late Weeds, e.g.), that's an economic and industry-wide problem.

Penny Dreadful's third season commences this weekend (Sun., May 1, 9pm), as beautifully and skillfully as the two operettas that came before. And, like House of Lies (not Cards) and a couple of other shows throughout its life, Penny Dreadful's success lies in never being part of that cycle in the first place: By cutting right to the point in a show that "nobody watches," it means a lot more space to move around. When you never had a True Detective season 1 pregame, you'll never have to see the finale freak-out, much less that painfully earnest, weak sauce season 2 attempt for viewers to prove them-

selves right for loving it in the first place. You can just make art.

I hate to talk about "cult" due to the inside/outside implications, and I don't think that's the show's explicit goal, but it's written in the DNA: a story you either love or run from, with a radical high concept that's burned us before: a show about family, faith, identity, and mental illness in a Victorian setting that puts classic monsters - Hammer and literary combined, in often surprising or invisibly subtle ways - through their emotional paces.

Remove the self-erasing irony and "camp" that always undercuts Ryan Murphy's attempts at Grand Guignol in Nip/Tuck and the increasingly meaningless American Horror Story, add the most confidently stylized visuals since True Detective joined

> those shows as a directorial tour de force, drop them all in 1890s London, and add some unpleasant truths and one hell of a female protagonist. Heck, answer the question we've been asking since the Nineties ("Why is Josh Hartnett a thing?") by giving him the role he was born to play: the kind-hearted cowboy/werewolf foil to Eva Green's hypnotic and uncanny

twist on Lucy Westenra, Vanessa Ives.

I think of it like this: Alan Moore creates genres, not works. He builds the garden and it can take decades for anything to grow there. When Moore reinvented DC Comics' Saga of the Swamp Thing in 1984, he created an entire industry of postmodern dark fantasy comics that led to the establishment of the Vertigo imprint in 1993. Moore wrote Watchmen in 1986, but "gritty superhero realism" didn't reach its final literary form until Warren Ellis introduced The Authority in 1999 And here we have it: While 1999's League of Extraordinary Gentlemen was not the first kitchen-sink Victoriana remix, it did what Moore always does best, establish the garden. Fifteen years later, that garden's finally given us a thorny, luxurious, screaming rose.

Sudeikis is a widower with two daughters, whose wife, a Marine, died while in service, leaving him morose on Mother's Day. Julia Roberts, another Marshall alum, plays a Home Shopping Network purveyor of moodring necklaces and other fine pieces of jewelry. It takes a while to discover how this Type A character in a bad wig dovetails with the rest of the story. While waiting, you can while away the time counting up how many Pretty Woman references you can spot in the exchanges between Roberts and Hector Flizondo.

Sloppily made, shots often look as though the editor should have substituted a better take, if only one existed. (Oh, wait: They used the alternate takes in the blooper reel at the end of the film.) The sitcom-like pace crams a couple jokes into every scene before moving along to the next setup. Mother's Day, the movie, feels as contrived and inauthentic as the holiday itself.

#### SING STREET

There seems to be only one tune in writer/ director John Carney's canon, but that tune has an endearing melody and each film's varied cadences make it seem if not exactly fresh, then at least danceable. Carney's films celebrate the ecstasy of musical collaboration and the age-old tradition of using music as a lure for the opposite sex. In 2007, the Irish filmmaker won wide attention for his Oscar-winning musical romance Once, which captured the on- and offscreen love affair of Dublin busker Glen Hansard and immigrant Markéta Irglová. With Begin Again in 2013,

the action moved to Manhattan, where a fallen executive in the music business becomes smitten with the sound of an amateur singer/songwriter and produces her album, a collaboration that restores them both. Even though the action returns to Dublin and backward in time to 1985 in Carney's new film Sing Street, it's still a movie about music as a collaborative and seductive force.

At the start of the film, 15-year-old Conor (newcomer Ferdia Walsh-Peelo, who makes a remarkable film debut) is taken out of his private Jesuit school and sent to a lesser one run by the Christian Brothers on Synge Street. There, he is subjected to the indignities of bullies and petty-minded priests, but he makes a friend (Carolan) and is bewitched by a girl (Boynton) hanging on a front stoop across from the school. Her name is Raphina, and although she's only 16, she seems so much older, with her teased-out hair and makeup and sophisticated attitude. Conor impulsively approaches her, and after she tells him she's a model, Conor blurts out that he's in a band that is shooting a music video and they happen to be in need of a model. When he scores her digits, he's compelled to form a band. The rest of the movie follows from there: putting a band together, writing songs, booking gigs, sparring with the bullies and the priests, navigating safe passage through his family's financial and emotional woes, and the swoons and sorrows of first love. It sounds like a lot, but there's nothing that can't be fixed with a good song.

As long as Sing Street stays on this sweet, sentimental path, the film is an agreeable toe-tapper. Scratch the surface too deeply and you'll find some historical inconsistencies, idealized events, and a depressing environment roiling in Conor's familial home and nation. Yet there's also a joyful glance back at the Eighties, with its big hair and Back to the Future vibe, and a nod to that Irish-band classic, The Commitments. But as long as the focus stays on the boys and their newfound self-agency through music, the kids, as they say, "are alright."

A dead CIA agent is the only person who knew the Dutchman's whereabouts, so in a Hail-Mary experimental-procedure pass, the agent's memories are transferred to the brain of a bad motherfucker named Jericho Stewart (Costner). Soon, this nice, dead CIA agent gets his feelings-cooties all up in Jericho's emotionless, rape-inclined noggin - and that's not the only confusion on display here. Well, we can at least set the stage, as it were, Hardcore punk band the Ain't Rights - singer Tiger (Turner), guitarist Sam (Shawkat), bassist Pat (Yelchin), and drummer Reece (Cole) - are making their way across the Pacific Northwest, barely, when a wrong-place, wrong-time incident at a rural neo-Nazi club plants them in the middle of a seriously scary situation. One of the most brutal, visceral films to come along in quite some time, the gleefully merciless Green Room may not be for everyone, but should you be up for it, it is a tense, lovely, right kick in the teeth. A Hologram for the King is a seriocomic movie about lost American dreams and its wavlaid. middleaged dreamers. Once a great success, Hanks' divorced salesman Alan Clay can no longer afford to pay his daughter's college tuition, and he grabs on to his new assignment - selling holographic teleconferencing technology to King Abdullah of Saudi Arabia - as though it were a life preserver. A Hologram for the King is two-thirds of a good movie - Hanks is perfect in the central role, drawing on both his dramatic and comic acting skills - but the film's final act disappointingly shifts gears to mire itself in a redemptive love story. Based on British playwright Alan Bennett's comedy/drama performed on the West End in 1999, the film (also scripted by Bennett) episodically recounts the odd relationship between the persnickety dramatist (Jennings) and the titular eccentric, Miss Shepherd (Smith), a cantankerous old homeless woman who lived in a broken-down van outside his Camden home for 15 years. Sure, he's mentally formulating a memoir about this most unforgettable character from day one, but her presence in his insular life also tugs at him to become a better person. Of course, the film's showpiece is another incomparable lady, the always amazing Maggie Smith, who inhabits the character's less-than-stately surroundings with remarkable physicality and uncompromising truth. 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

It may be one of the best performances of Cheadle's career, but the fabricated story that propels the movie, though tenable as events that might have occurred, is still insufficient to seize our attention. #### THE REVENANT

Set during the 1820s in the unsettled American West, Iñárritu's film (based on the novel by Michael Punke) finds Glass on a slow death crawl toward recovery and revenge, after being left for dead by two trappers, John Fitzgerald (Hardy) and Jim Bridger (Poulter), without provisions, weapons - or his mixed-heritage son Hawk (Goodluck). DiCaprio is always fully engaging to watch, but at 156 minutes, Iñárritu's film seems like there could have been room for thematic flourishes more provocative than basic survival and revenge. Initially something of a detective film, circa 33CE, Clavius soon goes rogue and follows Yeshua's 12 apostles into the desert, where he witnesses all sorts of soul-shaking events. But most of all, he reins in this subgenre's tendency to paint its newspaper people as heroic crusaders with beautiful faces. #### WHISKEY TANGO FOXTROT

more creative distance between the book and the movie) finds purpose, adventure, and a good time in Kabul. A must-see for fear fans, The Witch is, put simply, a near-masterpiece of creeping dread and hallucinatory imagery. The less you know going in, the better - it's that kind of movie, but the surface story follows a Puritan family cast out of their village for vague, superstitious reasons. Relocating to a barren little farmhouse on the edge of a great and ghastly forest, father William (Ineson), wife Katherine (Dickie), and their five children face not only the privations of the wilderness (both geographic and spiritual), but an apparent supernatural threat. Steeped in bleak, ominous atmosphere and period-perfect costumes and design, this is one of those rare genre films that gets under your skin and stays there. (02/19/2016)\*\*\*

Easily one of Disney's more imaginative CGI offerings in a while, Zootopia uses the classic tropes of anthropomorphized animals and comic references to pop-culture touchstones to slyly puzzle out what it means to be "civilized." After a mass disappearance of citizenry in the titular city - wherein bipedal, clothes-wearing predators and prey alike have evolved to a state where they can live and work together in relative harmony - can-do rabbit cop Judy Hopps (Goodwin) gets her shot at the big time, teaming up with ne'er-do-well hustler fox Nick Wilde (Bateman) to unravel the mystery of the missing meat-eaters. The lessons to be drawn from Zootopia's un-animalistic and civil society are many - some will sail right over younger viewers' heads - but in this age of rampant xenophobia it certainly can't hurt to reaffirm what should be obvious to all: We have to get along to go along, or all is lost. ## **SLOWDIVE**

FRI., 11:25PM. REVERBERATION STAGE

"If someone said three years ago that Slowdive would re-form, I wouldn't believe it." says the band's singer/guitarist Rachel Goswell. "You just couldn't write what's happened over the last couple years."

In their early-Nineties prime, the Reading, UK, quintet dropped three swirling dream-pop albums. As grunge and Britpop superseded an ambient English ilk termed "shoegaze," Slowdive flatlined along with the genre's esteem.

"Bands then saw that term as derogatory," recalls Goswell. "It grouped us all together."

The label itself was born of the genre's guitarists and their sprawling, effects-laden pedal boards, which pulled players' eyes downward to operate. The guitarist pinpoints "North American Internet users" for shoegaze's steady resurgence.

"I counted once," awes the Devon-dweller. "We use over 40 pedals! The term wasn't derided in the States like it was in the UK. Years ago, I remember seeing 'shoegaze' listed on Myspace's drop-down menu as an actual genre and thought, 'How weird!""

For fans, the sight of Slowdive onstage again moves them beyond composure.

"There's so much emotion in the audience," says Goswell. "People crying .... It's beautiful. But it can be quite hard singing when I've got people feeling that overwhelmed in front of me. Sometimes I have to wander off to my amp to compose myself."

A new LP on deck for 2017, Slowdive's relishing their rebirth.

"We're at that age now where we all have families," says the mother of one. "An amount of sacrifice comes with this re-formation, in terms of time spent away from home, but, if we weren't enjoying every minute, we wouldn't be doing this. That's been my caveat since day one. So far, it's definitely worth the punt." - Neph Basedow

## COURTNEY BARNETT SAT., 6:05PM, REVERBERATION STAGE

Recently, back at her parents' house in Australia, Courtney Barnett stumbled upon a historic relic: a demo CD from when she first started performing music. Noting the aural revisit as "cringe-worthy, but also nice," the singer can't pin down the specific moment of courage a decade ago that pushed the shy 18-year-old to perform onstage after years of writing songs for herself.

"Every now and then, I have this burst of really optimistic, 'Go for it, or you'll never get anything done if you don't try,' kind of attitude. It happens, like, once every three years," she says. "I just found my own normal, kind of shitty voice, and went with that."

A reformed introvert, Barnett has remained humble despite her ascension to adored indie deity. The past year left her doused in critical acclaim for full-length debut Sometimes I Sit and Think, and Sometimes I Just Sit, found her booked at big-name fests, and included a Grammy nomination for Best New Artist. A sharp mind, unusual observations, and wicked sense of humor spill over into brainy lyrics that traverse personal roadways rather than fictional, all backed by unfussy, skuzzy, Nineties alt-rock guitar riffs.

While there's no concrete information about a follow-up to Sometimes I Sit -Barnett admits she isn't a planner - she has new material in the works. Sort of. Maybe.

"I think every day I'm of a different opinion," admits Barnett. "I've been writing a lot, but not proper writing. I've been writ-



ing on tour and on the go, and I don't think it's very focused. Sometimes, when I do have time, I look back through it and think it's great, and the next day I think it's terrible and I've got no songs, so it's kind of hard to tell.

"That's what I did with the last album as well. It got to be a week before recording and I wanted to scrap every song and start again, so it's hard to trust myself."

"These days, I suspend my guitar from a rope, so that it swings freely," says former Sonic Youth mainstay Lee Ranaldo. "That way, I can play it with a bow, or a drumstick."

2012 solo LP Between the Times and the Tides unwittingly readied the Manhattandweller for his current career path. The previous year, Sonic Youth bandleader Thurston Moore and bassist Kim Gordon announced their separation after 27 years of marriage. The art-rock act's dissolution swiftly trailed.

"The timing of my record was a saving grace," says Ranaldo, 60. "It was finished before I even knew the band was stopping. So, when it was revealed that Kim and Thurston were splitting, that transition from being Sonic Youth's third singer to suddenly singing the whole set - was already underway."

Another solo disc due this fall, the singer/guitarist still employs the unique alternate tuning his former group favored. Unlike Lou Reed or the Stooges' James Williamson, Ranaldo says that No Wave sixstringers happened upon that unorthodox m.o. out of necessity.

"When we first started, in the early Eighties, we had some crappy guitars -Japanese knockoffs that wouldn't hold standard tuning. Later, we'd shove drumsticks or screwdrivers under strings to scheme new noises, sure," he laughs. "But initially, open tuning was a technique used to make our cheap guitars sound better. It wasn't academic or conceptual."

For Saturday's Levitation set, the avid cyclist recruited Royal Trux drummer Tim Barnes.

"My solo shows require a sit-down, indoor space," he explains. "So, we'll cater to the 'festival atmosphere' with an electric, exploratory, psych-like improv duo. Levitation likes noisy and weird, right?"

The kings of avant-garde drone metal, Sunn (1))) overwhelms Austin for the first time in 14 years for a doom-heavy bill at Levitation. The gig comes in support of Kannon, the Seattle band's first non-collaborative album since 2009 and one that hearkens back to its ambient grunge roots.

"It was like, 'Let's make some music together again," explains guitarist/bassist Greg Anderson. "It was about going back to how we started with the knowledge that we have now. If you listen to the first two records versus this new one, there's a lot of similarities and common threads, but I think the songwriting, playing, and production are beyond those initial recordings."

A quote from critical theorist/performance artist Aliza Shvarts in Kannon's liner notes summarizes the band's mission: "It does not simply enter the body, but surrounds it."

"That correctly sums it up for me when playing live," says Anderson. "And I feel that way for the audience, too, It's that sound that's gonna envelop you and potentially take over. It's very strange and can be very comforting.

"Sometimes traditional metal or rock music can sort of be distracting - one particular instrument or vocal is making you focus your attention. Whereas with this, I think there's a lot more space you can sort of fall into. It's almost like you can be your own guide within the music, whereas traditional rock music is guiding you, taking you somewhere." - Michael Toland



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

# The Bo-Keys

ANTONE'S, THURSDAY 28 - SATURDAY 30

Forged in the late Nineties as an instrumental soul band in the mold of hyphenated acts like the Mar-Keys and Bar-Kays, the Bo-Keys embody the classic Memphis sound that backed Al Green, Ann Peebles, and William Bell.

"We don't have to try too hard for it to come out the way it comes out," assures bandleader bassist Scott Bomar. "We're blessed to have guvs like [drummer] Howard Grimes and Archie Turner in the band who played on a lot of the original recordings people associate with Memphis and know and love. Howard played on just about the entire Hi Records catalog and on a lot of Stax cuts."

Like the bands that cut most Memphis R&B burners, the Bo-Keys are multiracial in addition to multigenerational.

"That's the Memphis sound: the collision of gospel, blues, jazz, country. When you get integrated bands, I think you get a mix of sounds that you wouldn't get any other way. In the Sixties, you had this amazing thing happening where everyone was influencing each other, and it didn't matter if somebody

was black or white. If they could play, that's what mattered."

The band's third full-length, Heartaches by the Number, drops during their three-day stint in Austin. Both the LP and live show feature Percy Wiggins and Don Bryant, vocalists who cut deep Memphis soul tunes nearly 50 vears ago.

"Everything we've done up to this point has been pure Memphis soul heavily influenced by the Hi Records sound and the

Stax sound," explains Bomar. "For this new album, I've gotten more into the Muscle Shoals sound and what was going on at Fame Studios in the Sixties. Also, what Chips Moman was doing at American Studios here in Memphis.

"The core of that material is this amazing songwriting and guys who were writing country songs, but recorded them with a soul band. It came out as this really cool soulcountry hybrid, and that's what I wanted to do with this record." - Thomas Fawcett
