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
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

Dripping Springs' mayor says he doesn't want to put treated sewage into Onion Creek - but still seeks permission to dump nearly a million gallons a day directly into the creek!! ["Is Your Water Running ... Pink?" News, Feb. 2.1

The dye test - conducted by scientists affiliated with two groundwater districts, a university research center, and City of Austin - showed how any effluent released into Onion Creek can affect nearby wells. Onion Creek also provides more than a third of the recharge for Barton Springs.

NoDrippingSewage.org seeks a ban on direct discharge to streams on the Edwards Aquifer Contributing Zone. Please visit our website for more on this problem and its solutions.

We remind the mayor of Dripping Springs, our governing officials, and all those that cherish clean Hill Country water: We can do better, we must do better, we will do better. Be part of the solution! #NoDrippingSewage!



AUSTIN FIRE CHIEF Rhoda Mae Kerr

announced Wednesday that she plans to leave Austin and assume a similar position for Fort Lauderdale (Florida) Fire Rescue, where her career began. So that's another role incoming City Manager **Spencer Cronk** will have to fill.

POLICE HAVE IDENTIFIED a suspect in the Jan. 23 mugging of **Florence Ponziano** (of **Florence's Comfort House**) on a Cap Metro bus, describing the suspect as an "emotionally disturbed person" who has had "multiple involvements" with law enforcement. She will be charged with "Injury to an Elderly Person," with the goal of enforcing mental health assistance.

THE UT PHARMACY BUILDING was vandalized with graffiti Monday night as part of a protest of UT's failure to discipline professor **Richard Morrisett**, who last year pleaded guilty to a felony charge of strangling his girlfriend off-campus. "UT harbors abusers" and "Watch your back Richard," as well as a red hammer and sickle, were scrawled on the building before crews came to clean up.

THE NOMINATION OF TEXAN Kathleen Hartnett White to head the **U.S. Council on Environmental Quality** was withdrawn by the Trump administration this week, after her testimony professing ignorance on climate change and elementary science threatened to derail Senate confirmation. Hartnett White is a fellow at the Texas Public Policy Foundation and formerly chaired the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality.

Sick and Tired

COUNCIL MOVES TOWARD COMMONSENSE ORDINANCE, DESPITE BUSINESS RESISTANCE

"An employer shall grant an employee one hour of earned sick time for every 30 hours worked for the employer." That's the fundamental provision of the "paid sick time" ordinance that will come before City

Council next week – what would seem to be an unremarkable (and quite limited) accommodation for the undeniable fact that human beings occasionally fall ill. As the *Chronicle*'s Mary Tuma reported earlier this year, the Texas flu season has been especially harsh, with more cases than usual statewide and in Travis County.

That was early January. Last week, KTBC-TV updated, "The flu has already killed almost 2,900 Texans, 28 of them in Travis County," while noting that those numbers are already out of date. A Feb. 5 report from the Austin Public Health Office adds another local death, and notes that statewide, "the number of patient visits due to influenza-like illness is around 14%."

If you're on the job, do you want those folks coming into the office

folks coming into the office or the restaurant because they can't afford to go a day without a paycheck? If you're feeling the symptoms of "influenza-like illness," should you feel free to visit your doctor for a checkup without paying for it twice – with lost wages as well as a co-pay (if you're lucky enough to have insurance)? The answers to those ques-

tions seem so obvious that it's alarming to learn that more than 200,000 workers in Austin (nearly 40% of the workforce) do not have ready access to paid sick time. As the proposed ordinance summarizes, denying it "is unjust, is detrimental to the health, safety, and welfare of the residents of the City; contributes to employee turnover and unemployment, and harms the local economy."

Without Further Delay

I didn't expect much resistance to such a rational, commonsense policy. Indeed last September, Council easily approved the resolution that directed staff research similar policies and engage local stakeholders on all sides to draft a policy that would fit Austin while following the disparate example of 33 cities, eight states, and 160 countries in providing paid sick time.

Based on a Feb. 6 work session, Council still seems inclined to approve the ordinance, perhaps after some amendments. But last week both the Greater Austin Chamber of Commerce and the mini-chamber that is the Austin Independent Business Alliance announced their opposition. The CONTINUED ON P.10

AIBA said their membership opposes the ordinance "as written" – without suggesting changes, but falling back on sports metaphors: "The health and well being of the team is important. But the team is the best source for business benefits, not local government." (That is, workers should hold their contagious breath until "the team" sees fit to deliver on paid sick time.)

The cagier GACC – which has been involved in the process as a stakeholder since Labor Day – says it just wants more time: at least 90 days for an "independent study" of the economic impact. (Maybe the researchers can also look into whether people really do get sick.) You can translate the Chamber's "unnecessarily rushed" as follows: "If we delay this long enough, we can take it to the 2019 Legislature and kill it in the cradle."

If the Chamber wants to save time, they could read the final statistics line of Dr. William Tierney's (Dell Medical School) letter to Council, which summarizes the relevant research: "Companies that provided paid sick leave ... saved their employers between \$630 million and \$1.88 billion in 2017 in work hours lost to influenza."

An Earned Right

The shadow of the Lege was apparent in Tuesday's Council discussion, with some members suggesting that paid sick time should obviously apply statewide and others anticipating that if Austin moves forward, retribution is certain. Mayor Pro Tem Kathie Tovo said that however the Lege reacts, Austin can set an example. Greg Casar, who's been leading the work on the ordinance, said the city shouldn't let the threat of legislative reaction "keep us from doing good." Certainly plenty of businesses – large and small, Parkside to Stratus – have also expressed support for the measure.

Delia Garza and Ann Kitchen are also sponsors, and the measure will probably pass, although Ora Houston said she expects to move a postponement, and there might be one or two other votes in opposition. A few scheduling, part-time proration, and enforcement details remain to be considered, but the vote comes down to whether council members support a policy that is cost-effective, rational, and just.

In recent years I've been fortunate enough to do the kind of salary work for which "paid sick leave" is essentially reflexive, but early on I worked plenty of factory or retail jobs in which lost time – for any reason, including emergencies – meant lost pay. Bosses (or "team coaches," if you prefer) presume their own incomes keep flowing whether they're on the job or home in bed. Workers who generate that income along with their own deserve the same consideration, by right.

Coming Soon to a Corridor Near You

HOPEFULLY IN FEWER THAN FOUR SCORE YEARS ...

On Wednesday, the city released a proposed **Corridor Construction Program** that would implement the \$482 million authorized in the **2016 Mobility Bond** for corridor projects – major construction on nine different corridors (Lamar North and South, Burnet, Airport, FM 969, Guadalupe, E. Riverside, Wm. Cannon, and Slaughter), plus Preliminary Engineering and Design work on eight more (Lamar/Guadalupe, Rundberg East and West, Colony Loop, E. MLK, S. Congress, Manchaca, and S. Pleasant Valley). See the full plan at data.austintexas.gov/ stories/s/gukj-e8fh.

The construction would include about 30 miles of pavement rehabilitation; 120 traffic signal upgrades; 30 intersection improve-

ments; transit signal priority and better connections to transit; 75 miles of ADAcompliant sidewalks or paths, and 40 miles of bicycle lanes, creating continuous pedestrian and bike routes along the entire length of each corridor; as many as 40 new mid-block signals for pedestrian crossings as well as other improvements.

To that end, the city Transportation Dept. is running a bustle of open houses and community engagement meetings – three within the next week – on specific projects being funded by the bond money. This week's meetings represent three different phases of the bond program:

• Sat., Feb. 10, 10am-noon, **Anderson Mill Road** Regional Mobility Project Open House, *Hope Presbyterian Church,* 11559 Spicewood *Pkwy.* This is one of six projects being funded

Sarah Marloff covers Tuesday's **Zoning & Platting Commission** meeting on p.14. I would just add that the meeting concluded with Vice Chair **Jim Duncan** noting that the Feb. 12 CodeNEXT release date is also **Abraham Lincoln**'s 209th birthday, and reading what he called "*Ode to the Code* ... with apologies to Abe":

"One score and 14 years ago our city fathers brought forth upon this community a new zoning code, conceived in consensus, and dedicated to the proposition that all end uses are not equal. Now we are engaged in a long-overdue revision of that code, testing whether that city can effectively determine its future by regulating its land use. It is altogether fitting and proper that we do this. This community will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what we do here. It is rather for us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us – that this code, aka CodeNEXT 3.0, shall have a proper review, and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall prevail in its adoption."

At 136 words, it's exactly half the length of Lincoln's Gettysburg Address – a tribute to Vice Chair Duncan's continued emphasis on concision and precision.

It's furthermore worth noting that Feb. 12 is also **Charles Darwin**'s 209th birthday; seems like a perfect setup for Evolve Austin.

Favorite press release of the week: "The Biggest cover up ever!" reveals that in or around 1986, "Christ made himself known to the BBC in London" and "spoke to the BBC top brass." And yet: "No announcement or press conference was arranged by the BBC," and the entire matter was dropped. ABBOTT'S FIRST GOOD CRACKDOWN

Following reports of sexual misconduct by Texas legislators and the growing #MeToo movement, Gov. **Greg Abbott** unveiled plans on Tuesday that would allow **sexual assault claims** against lawmakers, state elected officials, agency directors, and Capitol employees to be investigated by Texas Rangers. In revising sexual harassment policies late last year, lawmakers and advocates voiced concern over a lack of a neutral third party in the reporting process. By allowing these cases to be reported to the Rangers, Abbott says "the state can ensure claims are investigated by an impartial law enforcement body that is equipped to hold public servants accountable."


As part of his package proposal, Abbott also calls for tougher enforcement of sex trafficking laws, including mandatory jail time for offenders; allowing those convicted of prostitution to clear their records if they were forced into the underlying crime; and a \$22 million Department of Public Safety boost in order to create human trafficking squads and train law enforcement to recognize and stop trafficking. He's additionally proposing \$14 million to eliminate the backlog of rape kit testing, a troubling problem locally and statewide. Many of Abbott's proposals require the Legislature's approval. – Mary Tuma

TRAVIS COUNTY VS. OPIOID INDUSTRY

Travis County joined the wave of jurisdictions going to the courts for aid in the battle against the nation's **opioid epidemic**. The suit names manufacturers, distributors, and marketers of opioids "for damages and penalties, and for all other relief available by law." In a statement, County Judge **Sarah Eckhardt** said aggressive marketing that led people to overuse and ultimately become addicted to opioids has caused real devastation in the county. "This legal action is necessary to stop the harvesting of profits from human suffering," she said. "As elected officials, it is our responsibility to protect constituents from those who wish to take advantage of their pain to make a quick dollar." Eckhardt called the lawsuit "a first step to recovery." – Nina Hernandez

CANDIDATE HOOKY

The coalition working to stop Austin ISD from merging Norman and Sims elementary schools bristled this weekend when none of the candidates it invited to a Saturday forum on accountability showed up. Billed as a "Politicians Accountability Session," the group had hoped to host several candidates running for office in state House District 46 and City Council District 1 to pin down their positions on Norman's fate. Among those absent were state Rep. Dawnna Dukes, her front-running challengers Shervi Cole and Chito Vela, as well as D1 CM Ora Houston and two of her declared opponents, Mariana Salazar and Lewis Conway Jr. Retired Texas Civil Rights Project founder Jim Harrington, who helped organize the event, said he still hasn't heard back from Houston or Cole, but that Vela and Conway both called to apologize for apparent scheduling snafus, and that Salazar had to cancel due to a family emergency. Harrington sent the missing panelists a list of the citizens who showed up to the meeting at 4pm on Super Bowl Sunday, along with a note: "There was great disappointment, and a number of people expressed their feelings of being disrespected." - N.H.

Ashley Fisher is out as interim publisher of the Austin Monitor, and Mike Clark-Madison is in - permanently. Clark-Madison, readers may remember, used to work here - in the Nineties and early Aughts - where he covered City Hall as both a reporter and city editor, and since 2005 has worked in public relations for what is now Hahn Public. Nevertheless, he has remained active in city issues, in recent years serving at City Hall on the Task Force on Community Engagement, the Central Texas chapter of the Congress for the New Urbanism, and the Urban Renewal Board. (As best we can recall, MCM is the only individual to serve on a city board or commission while working at the Chronicle; as a part of both the Library Commission and Bond Oversight Committee.) In a post to the Monitor's site, he briefly mentioned the merits of "watchdog" journalism before throwing a more extended nod to the online pub's signature "explanatory service journalism," saying: "Engaged citizens need and want info that will help them understand this complicated and constantly changing city. ... As someone who's become a professional Austinite over the decades. I can add some value there." - Chase Hoffberger

ROBOTS "R" US

In the latest in both high-tech wristwear and management oversight of employees, Amazon recently received two patents on wristbands intended to monitor every movement of warehouse workers. According a Feb. 1 report in The New York Times, the wristbands would "emit ultrasonic sound pulses and radio transmissions to track where an employee's hands were in relation to inventory bins, and provide 'haptic feedback' to steer the worker toward the correct bin." Amazon hasn't said whether it will actually deploy the wristbands, but warehouse workers (or former workers) said that the company already enforces strict piecework quotas that seldom allow time for even bathroom breaks. "You had to process the items in seconds and then move on," said one. "If you didn't meet targets, you were fired." No word if cities (like Austin) under consideration for the company's second headquarters ("HQ2") will be likewise monitored for sufficiently abject performance. - Michael King



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
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Your Plan for Pools

FIRST, LET'S ALL CHIP IN \$124 MILLION

More than six years after **City Council** passed a resolution initiating the public process that resulted in the **Aquatic Master Plan**, members voted last week to take the first step toward reviving a pool system that's been neglected for so long that a mechanic recently characterized the whole lot as "on life support." The initial report dropped last November, but Council, nervous about some of its components, asked a task force of Parks and Recreation Board members to comb more than 600 pages, take more public input, and return with recommendations. Despite lingering concerns – namely over fee increases, pool closures, and a \$124.3 million bond proposal to cover capital costs – the motion to approve passed 10-1, with only **Jimmy Flannigan** opposed.

The system boasts 51 facilities, including seven municipal pools, 28 neighborhood pools, three wading pools, and 11 splash pads. Many are plagued by cracks from shifting soil, rusting pipes, and busted decks. Some pump systems are so antiquated that it's hard to retain technicians; many were built in the 1920s and 1930s and are, as the original consultant's report found, "functionally obsolete." They were only built to last 25 to 30 years.

Forget about modern amenities like wi-fi and pool slides; too many of our facilities aren't even in compliance with **Americans With Disabilities Act** standards. And worse, as task force member **Rick Cofer** noted, the city expects 13 pools to fail within the next five years – at a cost of anywhere from \$3 million to \$10 million a pool. That's why the AMP suggests end-of-life replacements for 13 pools including **Big** and **Little Stacy**, **Garrison**, and **Givens**, sooner than later, for \$73.7 million. Going further, the task force recommends adding five new facilities totaling \$50.6 million: four new pools to fulfill the city's equity burden, and a central aquatic maintenance facility. That's where the \$124 million bond comes in. The task force recommends putting it on the November 2018 ballot.

IS THAT AFFORDABLE?

One of the criticisms of the initial consultants' report was that it amounted to a "pool closing plan." While it's true some pools considered for "end of life" treatment are popular, the report argues it's smarter to make tough decisions sooner than later: "We do not consider it appropriate to maintain the status quo – taking pools out of service year after year until the city pool system has fewer, not more, facilities for an ever-growing population." Aside from the 13 replacements, the task force foresees a "long-term reduction in the number of Neighborhood Pools by ten pools," but recommends that any future pool closures go before the full Council. While that sounds like a headache what with Council's already extensive meeting schedule, Mayor Pro Tem **Kathie Tovo** secured an amendment to that effect.


A chorus of stakeholders spoke in favor of the plan, including several members of **Love Austin Pools**, a grassroots group born to pressure the city into action. **Laura Cottam Sajbel**

acknowledged the price tag, but said it was a direct reflection of how the city has neglected maintenance responsibilities over the years. "It's the heart of Austin," she said. "It's time to take care of the residents who built the city into such a crown jewel." **Susana Almanza** commended the equity component, which would place new pools in the southwest and southeast.

The motion to approve recommendations went through after some debate. Staff assured Council that public engagement indicates poolgoers are willing to pay higher fees in exchange for more services. (Either way, Council would get the final say in any theoretical rate increases.) **Greg Casar** ultimately supported the measure, but said he would find it hard to support a full \$124 million ask for a bond, when the city hasn't asked for that much for affordable housing. Flannigan voted no after denouncing the request for new facilities. "I will be in the stark minority on this," he said, "but I cannot vote for a plan that recommends spending 40 percent of new money on new facilities. We have an aquatics system we can't afford to maintain."

THROUGH EQUITY'S LENS

Indeed, it will take a herculean effort to shepherd such a large ask through Council when the time comes to put together the November ballot, as Flannigan's fiscal concerns will be shared by other budget-conscious citizens. Speaking this week, task force member **Rich DePalma** said the 40% Flannigan refers to is part of the equity aspect Council asked the task force to address. The expansion includes East Austin's **Colony Park**, plus pools in the north-



west, southwest, and southeast regions, which have been neglected as the city has grown. "We have a lot of folks that will travel MoPac or they'll travel I-35 in order to go miles and miles and miles to another pool," DePalma said. "Speaking of West Austin, the closest pool to Dick Nichols Park is Garrison, and that's 4.9 miles away. Yet in other areas there's multiple pools less than a mile away, or definitely multiple pools 5 miles away. So it's really creating that equity lens."

DePalma said it would be tough to get a bond passed without addressing the needs of parts of town like Southwest Austin. But he expressed optimism that voters would weigh in positively on a bond, if they are properly educated about the realities. He said he learned as much working on the recent \$1 billion AISD bond voters approved in November. "When the voter has the choice to repair and fix and add additional value, they'll take it – as long as there's logic ... as long as it makes sense." – *Nina Hernandez*

Council: In the Shadow of the Dome

City Council is settling into a biweekly regular schedule for the next couple of months, although that only counts regular meetings, so it's a little misleading. There's no formal meeting today, Feb. 8, but they've already held a special-called work session Tuesday afternoon, and the first of four all-day budget work sessions Wednesday, Feb. 7 (to be followed by Feb. 21, March 7, and April 4). Regular action meetings will be Feb. 15, March 1 and 8 ... and then the annual spring break.

Last Thursday's meeting carried a heavy load ("Council: Because We're Happy!" Feb. 6) with a couple of votes held over until Feb. 15. One of those is the proposed settlement agreement covering the **Champion Tract 3** development on City Park Road. Council postponed the vote until next week – over the objections of the applicant landowner/developer – on the grounds that an updated staff environmental analysis arrived too late for adequate consideration. Aside from the specific vote, the discussion generated some musings from Mayor **Steve Adler** on the external implications – including the potential for another lawsuit from the developer (over a settlement approved in 2016, but derailed in court by an inadequate agenda posting). That quickly shifted toward a larger, more persistent concern: the shadow of the state Legislature obstructing the city's attempts at local control, particularly in land use matters. "This is a hard case," said Adler. "More than anything else in this case I am sick, once again, of what the state does to a community that tries to puts its values in its ordinances and resolutions."

The immediate issue was the historical pattern of the state overriding Austin's attempts to maintain environmental standards in land use matters, for which the Champion case is only one example (the betterknown cases involve protection of **Barton Springs**). Earlier in the day, Council had voted (on consent) to approve a resolution sponsored by **Delia Garza** that would (if eventually confirmed by ordinance) withhold city business from companies choosing to be involved in the "building, maintenance, or financing" of the Trump administration's desired border wall. At a press conference preceding the Council meeting, CMs addressed, among other things, the possibility that the 2019 Legislature would take action against Austin for such impertinence (echoing ongoing legal pressure over Austin's status as a supposed "sanctuary city").

Next week's agenda features a similar flashpoint: **Greg Casar**'s proposal to require local businesses to provide paid "sick time" for all employees. Although Tuesday's work session on the resolution appeared to reflect strong dais support for the proposal – indeed, some CMs wondered why such a policy isn't already in place statewide – one of the considerations for next week's vote will be, "What will the Legislature do?" From the bag ban to gerrymandering, "Austin values" can expect a battering when progressive policy decisions draw Republican attention under the Dome. Some other things to watch next week:

Whither Fútbol? The agenda lists an Office of Real Estate Services item for a "discussion" of potential city-owned sites for a Major League Soccer stadium, but late last week staff asked for three more months of review - so for the moment, it's stoppage time.
About That Contract: Two Items from Council would move to restore certain not-under-dispute "specialized pay" policies for Austin Police officers (e.g., bilingual, mental health) while simultaneously directing staff to resume meet-and-confer negotiations with the Austin Police Association.

• Forensic Backlog: APD continues its effort to reduce the distressing backlog in sexual assault kit analysis; an amendment to the contract with Sorenson Forensics would add \$220,000 and another six months.

And as always, next week will feature plenty more zoning cases – Michael King

PAID SICK LEAVE: A Reproductive Justice Issue

Ahead of next week's City Council vote on an ordinance that would require all employers to pay employees when they miss work due to health reasons, pro-choice advocates are reminding the public that the issue is also relevant to reproductive justice.

Council is expected to vote on the proposed ordinance next Thursday, Feb. 15. Sponsored by Greg Casar, the policy is intended to help level the playing field for low-income and Latino and black workers, who disproportionately lack access to paid sick time compared to workers in other racial and ethnic groups. Workers without access to earned paid sick time are three times more likely to forgo treatment for themselves and nearly two times more likely to forgo care for a family member, according to a study published in Health Affairs. And since up to 70% of workers in jobs that necessitate frequent contact with the public (like

food service and personal care jobs) lack paid sick time, the ordinance also promotes public health. Overall, an estimated 223,000 people (37% of Austin residents) risk losing wages or being fired if they stay home when sick or need to care for an ill child or family member, according to the Institute for Women's Policy Research.

While Work Strong Austin, a coalition of small-business owners and local nonprofits, are championing the measure, a variety of businesses and groups including the Greater Austin Chamber of Commerce, Austin Independent Business Alliance, and Texas Restaurant Association are opposing it, claiming a mandatory rule would burden the bottom line and impede scheduling flexibility (see "Say You're Sick," Dec. 1, 2017). If passed, Austin would join 33 other cities that have enacted paid sick policies.

Pro-choice groups have been organizing for the ordinance as well, widening it from a strictly workers' rights or labor issue to an economic, racial, and reproductive justice issue. With the majority of women facing at least one barrier to family planning and reproductive health care, not being able to take time off work stood as one of the

leading obstacles, according to a 2015 Texas Policy Evaluation Project report. Lowincome women and women of color bear the brunt of those hurdles. Amanda Williams of the Lilith Fund, a nonprofit that helps finance abortion care, says lowincome callers are often forced to delay their procedures out of convenience to their employer, making the medical visit more expensive, if at all possible. She said paid sick days represent "a huge way to improve the lives of our clients and make them have the ability to create the best families and best conditions to thrive."

Paid sick days have also been part of the agenda for Repro Power Austin, an initiative launched last fall that lobbies locally for reproductive justice issues ("'Repro Power' Takes Proactive Path in Reproductive Justice Fight," Sept. 28, 2017). Groups including the Lilith Fund and NARAL Pro-Choice held a Council advocacy training last

The ordinance as written would require employers to grant employees one hour of earned sick time for every 30 hours worked. An employer would not be required to pay for more than 64 hours of sick time to an employee each year, and any unused earned sick time would roll over to the next year. Bosses would not be allowed to ask for proof unless a worker is absent for more than three consecutive days. Sick time includes physical or mental illness or injury, preventive health care, or a health condition; taking care of a family member's illness, health care, or injury; and time taken to seek medical attention or to participate in legal action related to domestic abuse, sexual assault, or stalking. The city's Equal Employment Opportunity and Fair Housing Office will investigate complaints or violations, which include a fine of up to \$500. – Mary Tuma





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CodeMESS

The third and final draft of CodeNEXT is at the printers this week for its Monday, Feb. 12, unveiling, thereby icing any tangible changes to the zoning rewrite's actual language. But the city's land use commissions aren't getting any reprieve - and, in fact, those from the **Zoning and Platting** Commission still request more time. The body's distrust in the schedule stems from concerns that city staff has sought to silence the more trepidatious of the two commissions by naming Planning Commission Chair Stephen Oliver as the de facto lead whenever the two commissions get together, and also over the timeline Oliver proposed in January for discussion and recommendation of the new code.

Tensions between the two commissions have been mounting for some time now, and they remained clear during the ZAP meeting Tuesday night. CodeNEXT staffer **Jerry Rusthoven** requested ZAP consider a single joint public hearing with the PC on the third draft, but commissioners requested two hearings – with one chaired by ZAP and the other by PC. ZAP Vice Chair **Jim Duncan** affirmed that commissioners from both bodies would be in attendance for the public hearings.

Rusthoven recorded ZAP's unanimous motion on public hearings after 45 minutes of discussion – specifically calling for enough time to digest the latest draft and "at least" two meetings, evenly divided between ZAP and PC, to cover both the text and map. Commissioners also requested the meetings be held in different sections of town and with various days and hours.

They then fired off questions to staff and a handful of code consultants in attendance. Topics included PUDs, density bonus programs, localized flooding, and accessory dwelling units. Without unveiling specifics, code writers tried to assuage fears while also dropping some hard truths.



WHAT WE (THINK WE) KNOW

Draft three will reflect changes to PUD regulations, which Duncan has long blasted as being broken in the current code. Rusthoven promised "major changes," but did not get into specifics; doing so would "ruin the surprise." Pressed on why the **density** bonus programs look so different in different places, consultant Ian Carlton explained that this allows developer incentives to match with the base zonings of each neighborhood. "It's designed to be very specialized," he concluded. F-25 zoning (the current code) will still be found in CodeNEXT - though in fewer areas than in draft two due to the city's overuse of conditional overlays. Because today's code has too few zoning restrictions, COs have historically been used to restrict use. Some COs have been "mimicked" in the new LDC, said consultant John Miki, but not all.

Miki said CodeNEXT introduces more zones – responding to what Commissioner **Bruce Evans** dubbed Austin's "stamp collection of zoning" – in order to give the city a "good foundation to move forward" – with-





out creating more overlays and exceptions Miki confirmed the zones have been simplified in draft three, but the number remains the same. "Understand," he told commissioners, "the reason for having this many zones is to give you the tools so you don't fall into bad habits."

As for **localized flooding**, consultants confessed the issue can't be fixed through a code rewrite, but rather should be handled with a set of massive fixes to city infrastructure. With regard to general flooding, the new code will keep the current code's impervious cover limits and require most new and redevelopments to deal with water mitigation through various tools.

THE ROAD AHEAD

Wednesday evening as we go to press, Planning Commissioners are sitting down to a special-called meeting with their mapping working group to learn about the new code's mapping levers (housing variables based on roughly 20 conditions). Departing member Nuria Zaragoza told me on Tuesday that while she couldn't discuss those outcomes in advance of the presentation, she's optimistic they'll show some indications of equity scales. "It's so useful because we don't want to follow the decades-past examples of simply focusing on specific areas," she said, adding that she hopes the new levers will "help commissioners make an informed decision" on CodeNEXT.

Yet Zaragoza learned on Wednesday that her resignation last week meant she was barred from participating as a member in that night's meeting. Her replacement **Todd Shaw** said prior to Wednesday's meeting that he expected to be sworn in at 4pm.

The third draft (henceforth referred to as the "staff policy recommendation") will be released on Monday, Feb. 12. Land use commissioners get a presentation at their joint meeting the next evening; **City Council** will see it earlier in the day during its weekly work session. Consultants from Opticos Design, Lisa Wise Consulting, Fregonese Associates, Peter J. Park LLC, and ECONorthwest will all be in attendance at those sessions. *– Sarah Marloff*

OSHA CITES CORESLAB FOR WORKER DEATH

Six months after a 20-ton slab of concrete fell from a pipe brace and landed on **Amir Bahman Kaman**, killing him instantly, on a construction site off East Riverside, a report from the **Occupational Safety and Health Administration** appears to largely affirm claims made by attorneys for Kaman's widow, Lourdes, that her husband was the victim of operational negligence.

In short, OSHA agrees with Lourdes and attorneys **Scott Hendler** and **Rebecca Webber** of Hendler Lyons Flores that **Coreslab**, the Canadian concrete manufacturer Kaman spent a decade working for as an independent contractor, neglected a number of key safety standards, including using only one brace to hold up the massive concrete panels that it was installing (instead of the two

that are required); not using the pins specified by the manufacturer and inserting the pins not into manufacturer-approved holes in the brace; and, throughout the job site, using "multiple field-modified braces with replacement bolts not approved by the manufacturer" that were "exposing employees to the hazards of being struck by precast concrete structures." OSHA cited Coreslab for two separate violations, each earning the company a penalty of \$12,934, or \$25,868 overall. It's likely the company will end up paying much less via an informal settlement with the agency, as it has in the past. Webber said she was surprised to see OSHA classified the violations as "serious" rather than as

"willful or repeated," which would have led to a fine 10 times as large. She points to citations the company received for similar violations on a job site in Central Texas in 2016, as well as an accident at one of its sites in Fort Lauderdale, Fla., where walls that were not properly braced collapsed, injuring two workers. "\$26,000 is no kind of deterrent to a company this large," she said. "The pen-

alty amount is grossly inadequate because this was a repeat and willful violation that resulted in a fatality."

Lourdes Kaman and her attorneys have turned down a settlement offer from Coreslab that they said was too low, and have spent much of the new year considering civil action against the company, though Webber said no lawsuit has yet been filed. – Jack Craver



COMMUNITY-BUILT, COMMUNITY-DRIVEN OVERSIGHT?

When the city's police union meet-and-confer agreement expired in December, with it expired language that both provided for the Citizen Review Panel and barred the city from experimenting with any parallel mechanism of community oversight. The coalition of activists who advocated for reforming the contract during negotiations has long held that oversight and transparency shouldn't be a bargaining chip in those talks, but rather standardized as a community benefit. But they had no avenue to change that under the terms of the old deal. In a presentation to the Public Safety Commission on Monday, coalition leaders explained that they want the city to re-enter into negotiations (expected to happen soon) with plans to remove oversight from the contract entirely and establish an independent nonprofit to take over the responsibility of handling, investigations, and recommend discipline for citizen complaints - with the chief of police still having final say.

"We would like to see a community-built, community-driven nonprofit be the front end of the complaint system," explained Kathy Mitchell of the Texas Criminal Justice Coalition, who presented alongside Austin Justice Coalition co-founder Chas Moore and attorney Brian McGiverin. Mitchell referenced the blistering 2016 city auditor's report that found APD's problematic complaint process was hindering the Office of the Police Monitor and discouraging people from reporting incidents of misconduct. A nonprofit created with public input, similar to the Austin/Travis County Sobriety Center, could fundamentally change that complaint process, and nothing in the

group's research has suggested moving that part of the complaints process would be in violation of state law.

As for the second half of investigations (traditionally handled by **Internal Affairs**), the coalition proposes the city move that out of APD and into the hands of a more independent custodian, akin to a city auditor. Mitchell said they're "not wedded to a particular structure," but that removing investigations from IA "creates the kind of trust in the outcome that I think we haven't had before."

Austin Police Association attorney **Ron DeLord** said essentially that the city can do what it likes, but that the APA will take things "to the courthouse" if the city tries anything the union considers out of bounds. On the idea of moving the investigatory structure out of IA, he said, "I don't know if you can or can't." The coalition has already conceded in a memo delivered last week to the mayor and City Council that the personnel records found within an officer's "g" file would play no role in investigations; those files would remain protected by state law.

As PSC Chair **Rebecca Webber** noted, there are a lot of legal questions that remain to be answered, and Commissioner **Kim Rossmo** had concerns about how the nonprofit's board would be selected. Mitchell said the coalition would prefer to let community engagement decide whether those positions would be simply appointed by Council or through a vote. "We aren't predisposed to anything," Moore added. "We have this board, they can come up with this yearlong process and what it looks like, and we'll see how it plays out from there." — *Nina Hernandez*

No, *You're* Out of Order!

There was a bit of a payoff Monday at the Public Safety Commission's monthly meeting for us City Hall watchers who also dabble in reality TV. At the end of an objectively mind-numbing presentation on possible changes to the city's Distracted Driving Ordinance, the discussion devolved into a shouting match between safety advocate Scott Johnson and Commissioner Kim Rossmo. Johnson has gone before the commission multiple times now to suggest that the ordinance be altered to, among other things, allow people to be cited for texting at traffic lights and stop signs. Rossmo, known for his prickliness, questioned Johnson's data, saying he had multiple opportunities to present convincing numbers to back his proposal and vet failed to do so. He also reminded his colleagues that the lanquage Johnson sought was intentionally left out of the ordinance, with the support of APD.

In a heated back-and-forth, Johnson defended his data, saying that he had been ready to present the numbers in November but that the commission ran out of time to hear from him. Johnson went on to accuse Rossmo of trying to "shred people," and it escalated from there. "You need to watch your professional conduct," Johnson continued over Rossmo's objections. "You were very disrespectful to me after a meeting last year, and I'm going to take you to task now."

Things cooled down slightly after a decorum call from Commissioner **Carol Lee**. Rossmo capped things off by saying that Johnson had called him "numerous



times" on his personal cell phone and followed him out of the chambers after meetings to continue "the discussion, debate, harangues." Rossmo told Johnson he's "going to respond negatively to that, so please do not contact me outside of the meeting."

Chair **Rebecca Webber** apologized if Johnson felt disrespected. – *N.H.*



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he quadrennial challenge for state Democrats is finding the perfect candidate to unseat - or at least, shake the throne - of the reigning Republican emperor. Someone who's polished, with enough name ID, political goodwill, policy experience, and Democratic bona fides to satisfy progressives without alienating moderates. Dems have spent much of the past four years stinging over 2014's 20-point gubernatorial loss of former state Sen. Wendy Davis to Greg Abbott, and with the rush of political backlash following Trump's election, have the appetite to come back swinging. It seemed as though the Democratic establishment had a golden opportunity to put forth the ideal candidate.

Then last year's legislative session came and went, and summer rolled through without any legitimate prospects. U.S. Rep. Joaquin Castro squashed rumors of a run in September, around the same time as his brother. The horizon started to look hazy. So voters waited. And waited.

With the filing deadline almost up, one name finally surfaced. On Dec. 6, Dallas County Sheriff Lupe Valdez announced she'd run for governor; one day later, Houston entrepreneur Andrew White made his own long-teased bid official. At the tailend of four years, primary voters had only four months to familiarize themselves with the two most prominent candidates (there are nine in total), neither of whom are particularly recognizable political names to the general public. Talk about playing catch-up.

The position they've signed up for is a governorship that doesn't hold as much technical power as its counterparts in other states – or, arguably, its own lieutenant governor. However, the role accumulated more weight during Rick Perry's entirely-toolong tenure, and his hobby of appointing like-minded pals to influential state boards and agencies. (During his own tenure, Abbott has made about 900 appointments, of mostly Anglo men, many of whom were big donors to his campaign.)

The governor can also take advantage (as both Perry and Abbott certainly have) of slashing would-be laws through vetoes; calling special sessions; and pushing legislative priorities. For Abbott, that's meant a sanctuary cities law, anti-choice legislation, and efforts to pass a bigoted bathroom bill. (To say nothing of his war on heritage trees.) And of course, there's the bully pulpit. Abbott has helped foster fear of the LGBTQ and immigrant communities; oppressed women's bodily rights; disregarded environmental protections; the list goes on.

But for Texas progressives it's a struggle to feel hopeful that a Democrat could actually replace him. The party hasn't won a statewide election since 1994, the longest drought of any state. And while we can't escape the near-constant and optimistic refrain that Texas will soon turn blue through Hispanic voters, it'll be a long road ahead: More than 1 million Latinos in Texas are still unregistered to vote.

And let's not forget non-voters, the most troubling faction of the state's political

landscape. During the last gubernatorial election, only 25% of the voting age population bothered to cast a ballot. Less than 3% of eligible Democratic voters showed up for the primary. Those figures are undoubtedly exacerbated by Texas' gerrymandered and racist electoral maps, but you know the adage: "Texas isn't a red state or a blue state, it's a non-voting state." In the end, Republican primary voters, a sliver of typically the most extreme on the right wing, are who decide what's best for the state's nearly 30 million residents.

But the growing dissatisfaction with Trump from moderate Republicans, and pushback against state officials over timewasting culture wars that are bad for business, may be shifting the electorate. We're not saying Texas has turned blue, but there might be enough pissed-off Republicans

THE FIRST QUEER LATINA SHERIFF

Teachers at Lupe Valdez's elementary school in San Antonio used to pull the future Dallas County sheriff aside during recess and slap her on the knuckles for speaking Spanish. She says it happened so often that the pain eventually decreased. "We were made to feel like only secondclass citizens speak Spanish," she says. "It was degrading. It could have made me very bitter, but instead it helped me be a good leader. I feel like we are getting close to that way of thinking" about the anti-immigrant tone of the state's current leadership.

Valdez, 70, spent the past 42 years in law enforcement, resigning from her position in Dallas County just before announcing her candidacy. She's the youngest of eight children in a Mexican-American family, and when she was younger would help her

and motivated Democrats to make a dent during this election cycle. For Dems taking their civic duty seriously – and hopefully the many more who will turn out this March – the primaries serve as an opportunity to highlight political values. It should be about reinforcing principles of inclusion, diversity, equality, accountability, and social justice; representing all of Texas, not merely the business class or cultural crusaders.

So do either of the star candidates exhibit those values? Voters have about one month to decide. migrant worker parents out in the fields. She joined the U.S. Army, rose to captain, and eventually senior agent with the Department of Homeland Security, from 2002 to 2004. That's when she decided to run for sheriff. Considered an underdog in her first election, Valdez ended up ousting two decades of Republican leadership and held her office for four terms. She prides herself on having cleaned up a mismanaged and corrupt department. "It was known for abuse and beating up inmates. I spent the first few years just trying to change the culture." Valdez is against the death penalty and open carry, supports increased background checks on gun purchases, and diverting border security funds to local law enforcement. Her platform seeks to boost the bluecollar worker, by raising minimum wage to \$15 per hour and expanding Medicaid. She's secured the endorsement of Texas AFL-CIO's political arm.

As a queer Latina – and the state's first openly gay and first Latina sheriff - Valdez's run against an anti-LGBTQ, anti-immigrant opponent feels deliciously poetic. Growing up in a strict Mexican-American family, Valdez says her sexual orientation would have been grounds for disownment. She came out in her mid-30s after her parents passed away, not discovering the term "lesbian" until her college years. "I am very spiritual, so it was very difficult for me to accept at first," she says. "I did not come out until I was okay with my spirituality." She says the bigotry and divisiveness over last session's bathroom bill motivated her to run. As for immigration, Valdez's track record speaks for itself. She butted heads with Abbott in 2015 over her refusal to comply with ICE detainers unless inmates were charged with violent crimes. "The way I explain it to the immigrant community is that you came here for a better life, so someone who attacks, rapes, murders, that is not creating a better life. We do not need to have those people here."

And while her main challenger is "personally pro-life," Valdez isn't shy about retelling her story of offering to finance her niece's abortion in the Eighties. (Her niece eventually changed her mind, and Valdez helped with the out-of-wedlock pregnancy.) All women should be allowed to make their own choices, whatever that choice is, she says. She sharply admonished the state's slew of anti-choice laws.

While Valdez has been severely outraised by the GOP incumbent – literally a thousand times over – she remains confident. Asked what her priorities would be if she won the Democratic primary, Valdez cuts in selfassuredly, "What do you mean *if*?"

"Everyone keeps telling me it's going to happen in 2020. I'm saying it's going to happen now," she says. "It's always 'mañana' – I say it's today."

THE CONSERVATIVE DEMOCRAT

Shortly after delivering the eulogy last summer at the funeral for his father (former Texas Gov. Mark White), Andrew White found out the state's current governor was calling a special legislative session to, among other priorities, pass an anti-transgender bathroom bill and regulate tree ordinances. The 45-year-old Houston businessman had never entertained the idea of entering politics, especially growing up with a governor as dad. But hundreds of people at the funeral reminded him that the elder White had made tough decisions during his governorship in the Eighties, like his "no pass, no play" policy, which forced student athletes to pass their courses in order to play sports.

"It just hit me that we don't have leaders like my dad anymore," White relayed to me last week. "He made decisions that could jeopardize his career in politics but made them anyway because they were the right decisions." That realization, coupled with his assistance during Hurricane Harvey, led White to rethink things. "I need to step up and get involved in our state."

An entrepreneur of 20 years, White's businesses included tech and manufactur-

ing. He grew up in Austin, attending Zavala Elementary and O. Henry Middle School, and graduated UT with a master's in business. ("If it weren't for Matt's El Rancho chile con queso, I wouldn't be here today," he added.)

On the campaign trail, White dubs himself a "commonsense" and conservative Democrat who will instill "sanity and reason" to Texas. He's focused heavily on reforming health care and education (his wife is a teacher, as were his mother, grandma, and aunt), pointing to Texas' dismal ratings nationally in both sectors. He supports a Medicaid expansion, saying county hospitals, and as a result, taxpayers, are suffering due to Abbott's obstinance. "If you don't fix education and health care vou are never going to fix property taxes," he says. White promises a \$5,000 pay increase for

teachers without raising taxes through closing a \$5 billion property tax loophole that benefits commercial property owners. He also has plans to redirect the \$800 million in state border security funding to education. "We shouldn't be using Texas tax dollars to protect and defend the United States border."





White caught criticism early in his campaign for his abortion stance; he's "deeply pro-life" due to his Christian beliefs. But he said that he supports *Roe v. Wade* and, if elected governor, would veto "all" bills that limit a woman's right to choose. He attributes the difference between his personal beliefs and campaign policies to his commitment to the separation of church and state. While he's against Senate Bill 4, White's

> centrist colors show with his lament of "our weak" borders, which he said on his website "read like an 'Open for Business' sign to millions of undocumented immigrants and the criminals who take advantage of them." For 20 years, White headed Geovox Security, which sells heartbeart detectors used at prisons, border crossings, and military facilities to track people. And though it's since been removed, that same website caught flak in December when the Texas Observer noted that White had suggested Texas partner with the Israeli Border Police to "learn the most effective ways to manage and protect our borders." Asked about that recently, White wrote it off as a "joke that people didn't guite understand" and said it was a "suggestion to Trump in a funny way." White refrains from nay-

White refrains from naysaying his fellow front-run-

ner, or any of the candidates for that matter. Instead, he points to his larger campaign war chest and stresses that his message will "resonate more" with general election voters. "The main issue to differentiate who to vote for would be who has the best chance of beating Greg Abbott," he said. "And I do." ■

Other Statewide Races

MAYBE MORE OF A RIPPLE by Mary Tuma

With our less than stellar slate of Democratic gubernatorial candidates, most eyes this election season have landed on U.S. Rep. Beto O'Rourke's marquee race to defeat U.S. Sen. Ted Cruz. A string of surprise out-of-state upsets have left Dems newly optimistic about O'Rourke's Goliathan effort to displace the widely disliked incumbent. Down the ballot, determined Democrats are vying for a shot at statewide office in their own ambitious races. Godspeed to them.



U.S. Senate: Beto, the Great Blue Hope

O'Rourke, the F-bomb dropping, social media savvy, progressive congressman with a punk-rock past, has filled up standing-room-only gathering spaces statewide with his message of defeating corporate power and restoring liberal ideals to the state.

The 45-year-old, third-term congressman and former El Paso City Council member could easily bash his Republican opponent, the notoriously loathed Sen. Ted Cruz. but instead spends his time on the stump vouching for universal health care, immigrant rights, marijuana legalization, gun background checks, congressional term limits, an end to our seemingly endless foreign wars, and shutting down any talk of a border wall. (For more, read the Chronicle's one-on-one interview with O'Rourke: "Beto O'Rourke's Punk Rock Politics," Oct. 27, 2017.) He's made good on his anti-corporate values by taking in individual contributions over PAC money, of which he's amassed much more than Cruz. (Last week news broke that O'Rourke outraised Cruz by \$500,000 in 04 2017.) Energetic and engaging, O'Rourke sells his platform as a moral imperative, drawing in progressives with his candor and charm. Those Kennedy-esque features don't hurt, either.

But is O'Rourke running a quixotic campaign, or is dethroning a Republican senator in Texas actually possible, given the current political climate? The answer may lie somewhere in the middle. The fall elections in Alabama, New Jersey, and Virginia, and the tide of anti-Trumpism, have ushered in new hope for Democrats. And it helps that O'Rourke is on the trail rallying Latinos (he speaks fluent Spanish), independents, and college-aged first-time voters. It's conceivable he may pick up enough disaffected post-Trump moderate Republicans to at least lessen the margin with Cruz, who bested his 2012 Democratic opponent Paul Sadler by 16 points. On the other hand, as despised as Cruz may be among Democrats - and even many Republicans – he's still a Tea Party sweetheart in a Republican-led state that sided with Trump by 800,000 votes. With the name "Castro" off the ballot, O'Rourke also doesn't enjoy the benefit of a voter mobilization boost from other high-profile statewide Dem campaigns.

So how can Beto do this? He posed the question rhetorically to me in October. "It's really Texas," he responded. "Texas has decided it's our time, and we're going to win this one."



Lt. Gov.: Anything but Dan Patrick

There is no other state official as vocally bigoted, sexist, and inhumane as Lord Voldemort – er, Lt. Gov. **Dan Patrick** – and trust me, that's a high bar. Patrick transferred his right-wing radio show demagoguery to the Capitol, where he served eight years as a state senator before ousting more moderate incumbent David Dewhurst from the Senate's top job in 2014. He's embraced and fed off of religious-right fearmongering, strongly endorsing the anti-trans bathroom bill, the sanctuary cities bill, barriers to abortion access, open carry, school vouchers – you name it. Patrick has without a doubt further polarized Texas politics by steadily pandering to his fringe

ATTORNEY GENERAL: DON'T BE A POTENTIAL FELON

Sadly, one of the central qualifications of Attorney General **Ken Paxton**'s challenger should be whether he or she has ever been charged with criminal fraud. If the answer is no, they're better suited for the job than the man in office today. With no Republican primary challenger, that question falls on lone Dem contender **Justin Nelson**, who can affirmatively say he has never faced such an indictment.

The 42-year-old Austin resident and Ivy Leagueeducated civil litigation attorney serves as an adjunct professor at UT Law. A former clerk to U.S. Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, he founded One Nation One Vote, a nonprofit that pushes for electing the president by popular vote (something we could have used in 2016). He pointedly assures voters he'll protect Texans against "special interests, corruption, and fraud."

While Nelson was named a Texas Super Lawyer by Thomson Reuters, Paxton has spent the bulk of his first term battling securities fraud charges (a trial date has been pushed for the third time) and wasting taxpayer dollars on frivolous suits, including one lodged – and eventually dismissed for pettiness – against Austin officials last year over the sanctuary cities law. Carrying the legacy of former A.G. Abbott with even more fervor, Paxton and his minions have led an anti-LGBTQ base, more so than even Gov. Greg Abbott. And his opponents – both Republican and Democratic – are calling him out.

In the lead to take the Democratic primary is Mike Collier. former Texas Democratic Party finance chair and retired Houston accountant. Collier ran an unsuccessful campaign for state comptroller against Glenn Hegar in 2014, losing by more than 20 points. His platform proposals include raising the minimum wage and ensuring access to affordable health care, reforming school finance by restructuring the business margins tax, closing corporate loopholes, and returning to a "rational" state highway funding mechanism. Though fairly well-financed (compared to his fellow challengers), it remains an uphill battle; Patrick handily defeated former state Sen. Leticia Van de Putte by nearly 20 points in 2014. Collier's opponent in the Democratic primary is lesser-known and underfinanced Michael Cooper. who is stressing education reform and living wages.

Posing a greater immediate threat to Patrick's power is Republican and Austin native Scott Milder, who has seized on the backlash Patrick faced from the fiscally conservative business community over his zealous support of the bathroom bill. While Milder isn't quite an LGBTQ supporter, he stands firm against the anti-trans legislation based on its potential to hurt the state's bottom line, a step up from the incumbent. He presents an intriguing foil to Patrick, having founded advocacy group Friends of Texas Public Schools to fight against the (Patrickbacked) push for school vouchers and privatization of public schools. While on the campaign trail, the GOP challenger isn't mincing words about his feelings for his competition: He's used such identifying terms as "bully," "fake conservative," and yes, even "jackass." Refreshing honesty from an aspiring politician.



and anti-choice crusade in the courts, battling for expanded religious freedom (read: state-sanctioned discrimination) and the demise of abortion access. Potential convicted felon or Super Lawyer? The choice for voters should be clear.

LAND COMMISSIONER

Republican Jerry Patterson apparently misses his old job. The former land commissioner is out to oust his successor. George P. Bush. who's held the post since 2015. Patterson relinquished the role after a 12-year stint for an unsuccessful attempt at lieutenant governor. Since then, he's criticized Bush for his slow response to housing Hurricane Harvey victims. On the Democratic side, Austin oil and gas lawyer and former U.S. Senate aide Miguel Suazo is in the lead as a "self-made" candidate (perhaps a jab at the Bush dynasty) who promises to bring an expertise in natural resources and energy. The 36-year-old managing partner of Suazo Legal Group will also be the first candidate in Texas to launch his campaign with proceeds from Bitcoin investments, making us glad he's not running for comptroller. The General Land Office manages lands and mineral rights properties owned by the state, as well as the Permanent School Fund.

COMPTROLLER

Unopposed in his primary, the state's tax collector and accountant **Glenn Hegar** faces Democratic opposition in November's general election from either **Tim Mahoney** or **Joi Chevalier**. Mahoney is a longtime activist in Travis County politics, an attorney and former ACC board trustee who made news in 2016 for suing Austin Community College after the school banned a pro-Bernie Sanders student group from leading voter registration events. Meanwhile, Chevalier is founder of the Cook's Nook, a shared commercial kitchen for Austin-area food entrepreneurs. Chevalier would diversify state revenue sources, adopt a more equitable revenue mix with the aim of lessening pressure on residential property owners, and pressure legislators to close tax loopholes.

AGRICULTURE COMMISSIONER

Incumbent **Sid Miller** faces two Republican primary challengers: Austin attorney and lobbyist **Trey Blocker**, and **Jim Hogan**, who previously ran for the spot in 2014 as a Democrat. Retired U.S. Air Force colonel **Kim Olson** is unopposed in the Democratic primary. She's pledged to hit every Texas county to spread her message of regenerative agriculture, farmland preservation, and water policies that protect farmers' rights. And she walks the walk: Olson owns



and operates a bee ranch and family farm where she raises fruits and veggies. The incumbent Miller's tumultuous and controversial time in office – which includes a Texas Rangers-led investigation into taxpayer-funded trips, a Twitter account that referred to Hillary Clinton as a "cunt" days before the 2016 election, and a Facebook post that called for the atomic bombing of the Muslim world – ensures his re-election isn't a cakewalk.

RAILROAD COMMISSIONER

Don't let the office's title mislead you: The Railroad Commission has nothing to do with trains. Rather, the commission is charged with regulating the state's oil and gas industry. Up against incumbent **Christi Craddick** on the GOP side is **Weston Martinez**, a conservative San Antonio oil and gas industry water supplier who proudly touts his endorsements of Ted Cruz and Trump. On the Democratic side, **Chris Spellmon**, a Houstonian who's worked on several Dem campaigns and criticizes fracking and air pollution, competes with **Roman McAllen**, a former Brownsville city planner who calls for eliminating freshwater for fracking; cronyism controls at the RRC; and a commission name change to, you know, actually reflect what the agency does.

THE UNCONSTITUTIONALITY OF IT ALL by Michael King

As we've reported repeatedly, the Texas Republican gerrymanders of the whole state have particularly targeted Travis County. The intended result was both to dilute Democratic voting strength and potentially to eject from Congress longtime Austin Rep. Lloyd Doggett. They have thus far failed in the latter goal, but have been very successful in the former. Austin is the largest city in the country without its own congressional district; of the five that dissect it, Doggett (unopposed in the primary) remains to represent CD 35 (anchored in San Antonio), all the others have GOP incumbents. Two (CD 21 and 25) appear potentially competitive in November; to flip the two others (CD 10 and 17) would require nothing less than a blue tsunami.

What follows are a few notes about the contested congressional races.



CD 21: Who's the Most Dem?

Call it pent-up political demand: No less than 22 primary candidates have filed to run for the District 21 seat held for 16 terms and more than 30 years by Republican Lamar Smith. Most (18) are on the overcrowded GOP side, but an original eight Democratic contenders have steadily whittled down to four. Although CD 21 runs from South Austin. outward into the Hill Country, and down to San Antonio, roughly 50% of anticipated Democratic primary voters live in the Austin area, as do the four Dem candidates, who have spent much of their time pitching to that presumed base.

Despite Smith's long tenure and the GOPgerrymandered district, the seat is now considered enough of a toss-up that the National Democratic Congressional Committee has added it to the party's primary target list. In that context, the increasing heat of the primary battle is understandable.

A former congressional aide (for various Dems), Derrick Crowe has also worked in Austin nonprofits (SAFE and the Center for Public Policy Priorities). He has grounded his campaign on the climate change crisis, not only because of its urgency but because Smith spent much of his congressional career denying and undermining the science behind global warming. IT entrepreneur Joseph Kopser (Grayline consultants) touts that experience as well as his years as an Army Ranger as preparing him for public service. Perhaps best known to Austinites, Elliott McFadden also has a record as an entrepreneur (Austin B-cycle) and public activist (health care and affordable housing). Mary Wilson describes herself as a "mathematician and minister," with longtime work as both a teacher and a pastor.

On the default Democratic issues - health care, climate science, equality, education, gun


control, human rights ... - the candidates' positions and websites could almost be exchanged at will. In recent weeks, Kopser has been attacked by the others as being too "moderate," having "plagiarized" parts of his websites (since updated with citations, he responds), and also as the candidate of monied "establishment" Democrats here and in D.C. Whatever their individual merits, those attacks - as well as Kopser's big-name endorsements, most recently from Austin Sen. Kirk Watson and Rep. Donna Howard have had the secondary effect of designating Kopser as the default front-runner for a party desperate for congressional victories.

Any one of these candidates would be a major improvement on incumbent Smith ("My shoe would be an improvement," quipped one), and the primary may come down to who's most adept at building name recognition by March 6.

CD 25: **Can Anybody Beat the Used Car Dealer?**

Like the other four Austin congressional districts, CD 25 was intentionally anchored elsewhere by Republican gerrymandering. Although CD 25 dips through Travis and even into Hays County, its voting base is anchored in Fort Worth and runs through conservative rural counties before it reaches Central Texas. A former pro baseball player (minors only) and coach (and major GOP donor), incumbent Roger Williams now runs the family auto dealership, and has distinguished himself in Congress for reflexive partisanship and sponsorship of legislation to directly benefit his industry.

There are five solid Democratic primary candidates with at least an outside shot of unseating Williams. They're fairly akin on the issues - emphasizing health care, women's rights, criminal justice reform, campaign



finance reform, etc. - and have been collegial enough on the trail to say that each will support and campaign for whoever is the eventual nominee. The problem for Democratic voters will be picking a first among equals which perhaps may turn on who is most recognizable as a likely choice against Williams in a district drawn to elect Republicans.

The list: West Hansen is a psychologist and businessman (primarily in mental health), but also spent a decade building custom barns, and boasts international experience. Julie Oliver might be familiar to some voters as a Central Health District

Activist attorney Chris Perri directs the

UT-Law Expunction Project (pro bono work for

those wrongly convicted) and has garnered

being pummeled by incumbent Williams in 2016; she boasts a lengthy family Texas heritage and longtime Democratic activism in Hays County. (She ran previously for state Senate, against Jeff Wentworth.)

These candidates are strong as a group, close on all the de facto progressive issues, and CD 25 primary voters will be choosing between youth and experience, name recognition and electability, and frankly, intangibles like the importance of gender or specific political backgrounds. Judging primarily from institutional endorsements, Perri seems the likely frontrunner, with Hansen and Oliver close behind.

encompasses a large swath of rural Texas, and then edges into Travis and Williamson counties. Seven Democrats officially filed for the March 6 primary; five have an online campaign presence, and one (Richie DeGrow) recently posted his withdrawal from the race. The surviving five: Tech entrepreneur

Madeline Eden of Bastrop (currently working on blockchain development) calls herself a

"problem solver" and cites voting technology upgrades as a priority. Matt Harris (Austin) is a data scientist and project manager, with a particular economic interest in "Georgist" economic theories (after Henry George, and based on a "single tax" covering land and resource value). Mike Siegel is an assistant city attorney for the city of Austin (who has sued the state over anti-immigrant SB 4); he has also been a public schoolteacher and a union rep, and appears most ready for a professional campaign. Tami Walker is a Katy business attorney with considerable regulatory experience, emphasizing issues ranging from ethics to the environment. Tawana Walter-Cadien (Cypress) is a registered nurse with a health care emphasis, who ran and lost to McCaul in 2016.

Whoever survives the primary will face an uphill fight against the very deep-pocketed and experienced McCaul.

CD 17: The Votes Are Elsewhere

Only a small finger of the heavily gerrymandered CD 17 reaches Travis County; the district is anchored in Waco and College Station, and is drawn to maintain Republican dominance. Incumbent **Bill Flores**, an oil company millionaire who essentially self-funded his victory over Chet Edwards in 2010, has handily won re-election three times.

Two inexperienced Democrats have filed for the March 6 primary. **Dale Mantey** is a UT doctoral candidate (public health) emphasizing jobs, livable wages, and support for agriculture. **Rick Kennedy** (Round Rock) is a software engineer and consultant, and is focusing on the economy, health care, and support for public schools.

Among those deeply rooted in the local underground music scene, all roads lead to the Electric Church. Quite literally, the DIY outpost sits at the end of East Cesar Chavez, almost precisely at the crossroads of Fifth, Sixth, and Seventh streets, 183 and Airport Boulevard, and over the past year at this location - the former site of legit church Jesus Is Alive Ministries - that's likewise become true proverbially, too.

"I feel like this whole thing is very Field of Dreams - like, 'If you build it, they will come,'" reflects co-owner Jeff Wallace, who became a partner when this space was procured (Electric Church's previous incarnation was as a monthly event in several of the owners' backyard a few blocks away). "Any money that's coming in, we just keep building it bigger."

"Snapshot" was on hand Saturday to document the extent of that growth during EC's first anniversary party at this spot, which showcased elements that make the joint's birthday bash worth evangelizing: open jam sessions throughout the late afternoon, a historic psych music documentary screening, local live music painted with visual projections, free drinks(!) and coolest of all - the high-quality recording of every performance via trailer studio out back.





On performances from groups like the Sun Machine – featuring owners Murray (guitar), Hernandez (drums) and Rendon (vocals, left): "I never feel judged there [and] everyone's just out having a good time," reflects Everett Bergstedt, a member of local bands the Halfways and Millbrook **Estates. "The music lineups** are always stellar, touching on numerous genres, and I can always expect to see multiple friends ... the environment is completely carefree, so it's easy to let loose."

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Engineers Remy David (I) and Tyler Speicher (Austin C.R.O.W. Electric) in their **CROWmobile truck, which moved to EC's** property in November. The pair records each performer immediately to CD – free for artists with the option to have it professionally mixed for a fee. Saturday saw the EC's first compilation release, featuring 90 bands recorded over two months. "We're breaking new ground," says David, "Over a period of time, the CDs from these shows here will be all over Austin, San Marcos, Waco, Dallas - everyone's gonna wonder, 'Where is this coming from?' This [process] will improve the level of Austin musicianship."

Around the turn of the century, *Slacker*era Austin was on its way out. The city saw "yuppies infiltrate the habitat of punk rockers" (according to *The New York Times*), and the tech boom – and the displacement that came with it – started turning its cogs. Out of this soil sprang two bookstores, different yet similar enough in their radical approach for the uninitiated to confuse them.

Monkeywrench Books and Brave New Books are loosely linked by an affiliation to anarchism, a term the layperson may see as shorthand for an absence of government but that falls short of explaining what both stores actually believe. "We're stranger than that," says Ian, a Monkeywrench volunteer using a pseudonym for fear of alt-right doxxing. Both stores are anti-state, placing emphasis on ways of thinking outside the mainstream, wanting to "shake the Etch A Sketch" of the social order (Ian again).

"The only thing that is maybe in common is a sort of, 'Oh yeah, the state sucks,'" says Ian. "You can't really place [anarchy] usefully on the left and right spectrum."

Anarchy as a counterculture ideology underwent a national resurgence in the late Nineties, emerging in a form against war, capitalism, and globalism. At that time, a new era of oppression (which anarchism also rails against) was dawning in Austin as developers began snatching up cheap space in a big land rush, and the switch from hippie hamlet to hipster hype-city was drastic enough for the Gray Lady to comment on. The anarchist scene that arose here in response was never as prominent as, say, the music scene, but it did send delegates to the WTO protests in the Battle of Seattle. And punk, part of Austin's music scene since the 1970s, embraced Nineties anarcho-culture. Two of Monkeywrench's early members were part of Antischism, a crust punk band later known as Initial State.

Before the bookstores' conception, Austin was primed for the democratization of media through local public access TV, microradio stations, and FringeWare, a predecessor to Brave New Books and Monkeywrench and "an embodiment of the lawlessness of the early internet, anarchy both in terms of intellectual chaos but also focusing on the individual and eschewing a sort of content gatekeeping seen in other bookstores," says bibliophile and Odd Things Considered author Anita Dalton.

That free media wasn't unique to Austin then, but it did manifest differently here. Dalton didn't know anyone who tuned in to specific public-access TV shows in other places the way they did in Austin. "The distinction here is that people took such media seriously," she says. "There wasn't an elitist presumption that such media was confined to public access cable/Xerox-published zines/local watering holes because it was inferior or not ready for prime time."



A Tale of Two Bookstores

Getting a deeper read on the anti-state state of Brave New Books and Monkeywrench Books

Enter two bookstores espousing alternative views of culture, politics, and history.

Monkeywrench, the elder of the two, opened in 2002, as a descendant of Wooden Shoe, a similar bookstore in Philadelphia, and Free Radio Austin, a microradio station that was prosecuted for its theft of government-owned air time. The store was also influenced by the era's "infoshop" anarchist, punk, and zine movements. Zines were a fit with the do-it-yourself ethos of punk, which was in turn a fast friend to the autonomous anarchist vision. Then more belief systems that apply a critical lens to dominant ideology. Instead of straightforward feminism, for example, their offerings focus on queer feminism. Instead of race ally literature, they offer Afro-pessimism literature. This creates a living ideology in the store that evolves with new insight and the publication of new zines.

The same year Monkeywrench moved into its North Loop home, John Bush became involved in activism. An Austin native, he'd been watching Alex Jones on public access for "years and years" and was pulled into

than now, punk was a gateway to anarchism, and before going brick-and-mortar, Monkeywrench existed as a table selling zines at local punk shows. In time, it raised money for a space to be a community center, and it's been run by a volunteer collective for the entirety of its 15-year existence, no small feat for an enterprise with a general anti-capitalist view – "general" because the politics of the shop is continuously in flux, dictated by members with different the political sphere when Jones, also an Austin son, began espousing 9/11 truthism on his popular show. Four years later, Bush was among the first to join a community of conspiracy at Brave New Books, opened to provide alternative views of history and current events. The store is upfront about using "conspiracy" to describe its beliefs, which include government-involved false flag terrorism, 9/11 truthism, and efforts to combat global, totalitarian, and dictatorial governments. Libertarianism, the shop's most easily referenced ideology, delves into anarchism as it approaches an embrace of free market and stateless society.

The store has since embraced survivalism, homeschooling, natural health products like CBD and Kratom (which have allowed the store to turn a profit), and family yoga - all things, with the exception of yoga, that embrace autonomy or liberty, if you will. The shop and Bush, who currently runs it, no longer support Jones and, in fact, resent the association that cost the shop a space at Spider House Cafe after its Guadalupe store closed. As Bush now sees, a physical shop helps to engage an activist community in ways an online store cannot. As much as they differ in ideology, both shops share antagonists with centrist thought, which in Austin is a "sort of hippie, peaceful, love-one-another, please-recycle

sort of liberalism," says Dalton. The "anti-establishment establishment" is what Bush calls the contingent here that goes against the grain but only to a point, still toeing the Democratic party line and still looking to the state for solutions. Asa, another Monkeywrench member using a pseudonym, jokes that it is a "militant centrist position" – one that has the privilege to not be radicalized by circumstance.

Where to move from that easily digested liberalism seems to be a point of privilege.

"I think it's in large part due to property and the protection of property," says Bush of the libertarian movement and its whiteness – a whiteness that characterizes Austin liberalism as well. "I do know that it's been easier for Caucasians to succeed in this country than African-Americans, for example, so I think that's why a lot of African-Americans are focused on, 'I don't want to see my neighbors get beat up by the cops'" rather than private property rights. And in the other corner:

"It's also a class divide," says Asa. "I feel there are people who've lived in this world who are against it because of the life they've lived. This world has attacked you from the day that you were born: With displacement in Austin, those folks get pushed out. The people who have lived a life that allows them to operate in this world comfortably haven't been radicalized in any way, in my opinion, and live a life of 'I'm really comfortable and I read Reddit, so I get it."

"Funny story," Bush says. He once went to Monkeywrench to purchase a gag gift – *The Communist Manifesto* – for Brave New Books founder Harlan Dietrich and was told the shop didn't have it. Monkeywrench doesn't carry party line books.

He was tickled and says he chatted with a volunteer instead. "Oh yeah, the state sucks" and all that.

Double Indemnity provides the structure for Deja Noir, ColdTowne Theater's improvised and hilarious take on those dark crime films out of the past

I first moved to Austin the night of my 21st birthday. Barring a few months in Italy and my recent year in Brooklyn, I've been here ever since. I turned 40 last month.

This was my first ColdTowne Theater show. And that's a shame, because I've clearly been missing out.

You may have noticed an uptick in improv coverage lately, as we work to throw a little more ink toward our unscripted pals. I'm happy we're doing this, though it does expose my shameful lack of knowl-ColdTowne Theater,

edge of Austin's improv scene (as I mentioned in my recent review of Golden's Speak No More). I'm discovering that these shows do

not always have programs or much information available online, so I've had to dig a bit to put names to faces. I'm glad though, as it gives me a chance to learn about the many talented improvisers in town (being Facebook friends with Kaci Beeler and Roy Janik isn't quite enough. Is it?).

Deja Noir features plenty of these talents. Directed by Sandra Annell Fountain and produced by Katie Moore, the comedy is structured around the 1944 film noir classic

Double Indemnity, though knowledge of that film isn't necessary to enjoy the fun and games. Going into detail about the movie wouldn't be beneficial to you, as it would rob you of the twists and turns in the show. Although, it's possible those twists and turns are different

> every night, so it might be worth your time to at least head over to Wikipedia.

The unscripted narrative www.colddtownetheater.com form allows for the oftenhilarious exploration of film noir archetypes. It seems

the performers have a basic understanding of what the scenes are, what order they follow, and what objective must be eventually reached; otherwise, it's anything goes. A soft soundtrack of saxophone and bass provides the perfect ambience, along with live piano accompaniment by Natalie Wright.



Joseph Dailey (one of the two performers I recognized) plays the Barton Keyes role. In his tan trenchcoat and fedora, raspy voice, and ever-present cigarette (a convincing e-cig, which, hilariously, all the characters seem to have most of the time), Dailey is the perfect noir character. In fact, every performer is great, committed fully to each other and their oftenover-the-top characters, taking risks and having fun. Jill Bailey, Brian Bonnet, Tyler Tipton, and Christian Huey all display a wide range of talent as they savor every slow, jazzy word and action on their way through the scenes. I must throw a special nod to Betsy Anderson for her wonderful character work in multiple roles. There's even a song later in the show, which I assume

is improvised as well, by the silky-voiced Megan Sherrod (the other performer I recognized).

Fountain believes that when things get dire, it's a good time to laugh, and that's why she was drawn to the idea of a noir comedy. Though I caught the show on preview night and there may be some changes by now, what I saw was as entertaining as it was interesting. I've never been that great at improv myself, so I have a lot of respect for those who are. Deja Noir is certainly an experiment in unscripted genre storytelling, and though the pacing may not always feel spot-on, watching skilled improvisers explore their characters in such a hilarious fashion made for a worthwhile hour of comedy.







Arms encircling the bulb of a standing lamp. An upraised arm at the end of which is a hand spasmodically stiffening and curling into a claw. Arms extended with hands grasping for something that isn't there. Arms outstretched that rise up to reach for the sky.

The name of the program was *Backbone*, but the arms had much to say in this evening of three new dances presented by the indie company Ready|Set|Go! They expressed an attraction to something that they could not possess, a sense of being possessed by something that was out of one's control, a feeling of having had something taken away and trying to get it back, and ultimately, a determination to reclaim one's self.

That isn't to say that a lot wasn't being said by the feet, legs, backs, and faces of the show's four performers – the steps, springs, spins, turns, tilts, and leaps executed with those parts of their bodies spoke volumes – but in my view, the arms appeared most often to be making pivotal comments, expressions that provided clarity about or insight into the movement that was taking place around it.

For instance, "Flicker.Burn.Repeat," choreographed by Emily Rushing and Carissa Topham, featured two dancers, Rushing and Lisa Kobdish, who seemed transfixed by two standing lamps at one end of the studio. They would walk up to the lights, stare at them. then back away from them and dance, but their repeated attention to the lamps left the impression that they might be performing for these sources of light, which would sometimes change color as the dancers interacted with them. Whether the lamps represented ambition or a goal that ambition spurred the dancers to pursue, as suggested by a note in the program, wasn't clear, but when the dancers put their arms out in a circle around the bare bulbs, as if to embrace the light, and then withdrew their arms without doing so, you could feel a yearning for some thing that these women could not possess and vet could not stop trying to get. For much of the piece, Rushing and Kobdish

moved in unison, and the synchronization they achieved was striking, in no small part because they almost never acknowledged each other. Each stayed mesmerized by one of the lamps, which fostered the idea of two people moving on parallel paths without seeming to realize it.

In contrast, Rosalyn Nasky was all alone in "Pod." a dance she also choreographed, and that isolation came to suggest vulnerability to an unseen threat. What began with a strange undulation of her torso took on a more unsettling feeling when Nasky raised her arm and watched with fascination as her hand tensed and her rigid fingers bent over into an animallike claw. You could easily imagine some alien creature nesting under her skin and taking control of her – not much of a reach if you associate the word "pod" with Invasion of the Body Snatchers. And as if that and the atmospheric lighting by Brigette Hutchison wasn't enough to cement the sense of dread, Nasky repeatedly tried to glance over her shoulder only to have a menacing sound jerk her face forward again. Something was there with her, and it might be best left unseen.

Katherine Hodges' "Rework. Rediscover. Rebuild," choreographed in collaboration with Rushing, also began with a dancer alone: On film, Rushing made her way through a wooded area, moving branches aside with her hands and touching parts of her body almost as if swatting at insects. When the film ended, and she appeared onstage, making the same gestures but without the woods around her, her movements suggested absence, loss. Then Hodges danced her own solo to recorded text with lines like, "I let myself become so small, tiny, inconsequential." But her outstretched arms carving through the air spoke to a rejection of that insignificance. She was not on a mission to make herself large again, to make herself matter. And when those arms arced skyward, her recovery, her rebuilding of her self, felt complete. She looked as if she could reach the sun – and not coincidentally, that act required backbone. - Robert Faires get together for the **Trump Wives Club**? 

"FOTOGRAFÍA Y NUEVOS MEDIOS: SELECTIONS FROM THE PERMANENT COLLECTION" Mexic-Arte Museum, 419 Congress, www.mexic-artemuseum.org Through May 27

Ranging from widely known works to local gems, photojournalism to contemporary performance pieces, Mexic-Arte's permanent photography and new media collections are a treasure trove, brought out for display for the first time in "Fotografía y Nuevos Medios: Selections From the Permanent Collection."

The first section of the show is more documentarian, with papers from Austin Latino organizations and photojournalist prints. Most of the photos are portraits, starting with the most commanding at the entrance, Jesse Herrera's *La Reina del Huipil* from his 1988 series "The Queen of the Huipil." This portrait is shown twice, once in a blown-up, square crop and again in a smaller rectangular print arranged alongside other photos from the series. It sets the tone of the show

well. A woman is shown with a traditional hairstyle and head covering, having won the Cuetzalan title of Queen of the Huipil. She wears the role well, a quiet dignity in her straight back and placid face. The huipil is a traditional woven garment, and the competition awards this title to a woman who has exhibited skill in her weaving and her ability to speak on local culture and customs.

Other portraits include large vinyl photographs of modern Mexican women and snapshots of life along the border and Chicano organizers marching against police brutality. Marcela Morán's *Audiencia*, a video celebrating lucha libre or Mexican freestyle wrestling, shows an avid



attendee saying, in Spanish, "The blood is real. It is part show, but it is also part real."

Guillermo Gómez-Peña's 1990 performance piece Border Brujo serves as an intermediary between this first section and the more contemporary to the right. Situated right between the two, a small screen plays a recording of the piece as his words fill the space. Gómez-Peña, playing a shaman, becomes animated with 15 personas, all exploring some boundary in a bilingual speaker's life. The performance works as a sort of new media mystic, an alloy that, here, joins the disparate experiences of the bilingual speaker as well as the more documentarian section of the show with the more contemporary art space.

The second section serves as an extension into various directions of the Latinx roots and resistance presented in the first. Paloma Mayorga's painterly photographs explore wellness and the body; Chuy Benitez's large panorama *Family Chrome Shop, Auto Chrome Plating Co.* shows a shop with all the compositional complexity and narrative interest of a renaissance painting.

I laugh at the absurd juxtapositions, the ones I get at least, in Paul Valadez's *Selections From the Great American Songbook*, a collage series that pastes bits of Spanish clippings and other media onto covers of 60-some American songbooks. To wit: "Serenade for a *pendejo*!" As is true for the show as a whole, the series will be best understood for all its laden humor and significance, of course, by those whose everyday experience resembles such a montage. For the rest, as is true for the show as a whole, it is an opportunity to learn about and take in art that has been hiding out for too long in the collection on Congress Avenue. – *Melany Jean*

THE ALWAYS AND EVER-TIMELY OUTSIDER FESTIVAL RETURNS for its

fourth year on Wednesday riding a pink wave of Valentine's Day hearts. As is tradition for the queer transmedia fest, this year's theme OUT of Time taps into current affairs. Founder and artistic director Curran Nault calls the 2018 programming "especially timely" telling "Gay Place," "Time is tricky – it's a thief, an illusion, an investment. It flies, binds, disappears. 





Chocolates El Rey in **Stonewall** provides a short seminar in the production of chocolate from the bean to the bar with every tasting. The information adds depth to the nuances of the chocolates, and makes it taste even more exotic.

The instruction begins with a **cocoa pod**, which is the shape of a football and the size of a softball. The discovery of making chocolate from the bitter nibs inside the pod is a gift from the gods.

The company in Stonewall imports El Rey chocolates from Venezuela. Since 1929, the South American manufacturer has worked with individual growers to produce creamy delights with distinct characteristics like a fine wine. Most of their business is to cooks and confectionaries. The rest of us get to savor their decadent wares in the tasting room.

On the tasting room shelves are about 10 different chocolates – dark, milk, and white – at different percentages of cocoa. The candy (it seems disrespectful and a gross understatement to call this chocolate "candy") comes in blocks or bags of discos about the size of a quarter, the perfect snack size.

"The genetics of the trees produces the unique profile of the

cocoa beans," says Mary Ellen McKenzie, the tasting room guide. The Venezuelan company identifies its chocolates by the grower, rather than mixing the beans. The result is chocolates with flavors based on their terroir.

Chocolates El Rey is on the eastern edge of Stonewall at the intersection of RR 1623 and Highway 290 in the wine district between Johnson City and Fredericksburg. The tasting room is open Wed.-Fri., 10am-5pm; Sat., 10am-6pm; and Sun., noon-5pm. For more info: 800/357-3999 or www.chocolates-elrey.com.

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
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H Mart and 99 Ranch Market Come to Town

With the arrival of two mega chains, what's at stake for local Asian markets?

Ask Hana World Market or Asahi Imports for their thoughts on Austin's first H Mart and 99 Ranch Market and you'll hear a story far from the online hype surrounding the big-box stores' recent arrival. "My ultimate goal is if I can survive six months, I think I'll be golden," says Yunhui Lee, who owns Hana World, the Asian supermarket on Parmer Lane. Sally Matsumae of Asahi, the Japanese speciality market, feels the pressure of the chain stores as well. She admits, "To be honest, I'm pretty anxious about it."

Likened by some to Walmart, H Mart and 99 Ranch are two of the largest Asian supermarket chains in America. (H Mart claims to be the biggest, with over 60 stores, and both began as small grocery stores in the early Eighties.) Though their arrival brings more diversity to Austin's grocery store scene, the megastores pose a threat to locally owned, independent Asian supermarkets, several of which have been around since the Eighties or earlier. The disappearance of such businesses risks not only the loss of livelihood, but the loss of family legacy and community history as well.

Matsumae says Austin got its first ethnic grocery store when her grandmother, Shigeko Burnie, founded Asahi Imports in 1967. Upon moving here from Okinawa, Burnie grew increasingly frustrated and homesick with the lack of Japanese ingredients and food in grocery stores and restaurants. "Where was she going to get her short grain rice? Where was she going to buy soba and udon noodles? Uncle Ben's rice and supermarket spaghetti just wasn't going to cut it."

In the early Eighties, Matsumae's father moved his family from Tokyo to Austin and took over the family business (then called Shigeko's Imports). Ushering in a name change, the new ownership also marked a shift from an international import store to Austin's only exclusively Japanese market, which Sally Matsumae has carried on. Today's Asahi still considers itself a grocery store first, but the newer addition of their deli section, called the Onigiri Corner –

offering a variety of handmade rice balls – speaks to Matsumae's vision of the store as a konbini, or Japanese convenience store.

Emigrating from South Korea in 1976, Lee and her family are also longtime Austinites. Back then, she remembers the Korean community being almost nonexistent. "We were, like, the second or third Korean family here in Austin." In the late Eighties, her parents opened a Koreancentric supermarket called New Oriental Market, located in the same shopping center as the new 99 Ranch.

After her parents' business closed, Lee saw the opportunity to open up her own

supermarket with Hana World in 2012. Though pan-Asian, Lee's store mainly sells Chinese and Vietnamese products in order to keep up with the surrounding demographics. In addition to groceries, Hana World features a food court with a Japanese restaurant and Korean restaurant. In the past, Lee says

the food court has typically been home to more tenants. Right now, however, the advent

renew their lease 'cause they know that it might be difficult for me to stay."

Lee has been preparing for H Mart's and 99 Ranch's arrival for quite some time. She says both stores have approached her in the past to see if she was interested in selling Hana World, but no agreements were ever reached. Lately, however, Lee claims H Mart has been actively encroaching on her business. In early January, Lee alleges a man associated with H Mart came into her store and handed out job fliers to employees in addition to posting on the store bulletin board. Printed in Spanish, Korean, and English, the fliers – originals of which Lee shared with the *Chronicle* – advertise employment opportunities at H Mart Austin. Within the Asian grocery business, Lee says H Mart harbors a notorious reputation for raiding employees from local competitors.

"I knew H Mart would do it, because the vendors that I've been with a long time, they've warned me," says Lee. "They're like, 'When they come to open, just be wary because they are known to poach employees from existing stores.' But I didn't know they were this blatant about it."

Moreover, Lee says a job flier for 99 Ranch was recently found on the store bulletin board, brought to her attention by a concerned customer. When asked if 99 Ranch actively recruits employees from local Asian grocers, Juliet Chen, marketing manager at 99 Ranch, told the Chronicle she was unable to speak on behalf of their HR department. Neither confirming nor denying 99 Ranch posting job fliers in Hana World, Chen went on to say, "We wouldn't just go inside of a supermarket and say, 'Hey, come work for us.' But, obviously, you know, our hiring posts, our hiring fliers, are everywhere. And if a person sees a hiring post and is interested then we would love to give them the opportunity."

The *Chronicle* reached out to Stacey Kwon, the president of H Mart and all Market Eatery concepts, for comment on the allegations surrounding the fliers. Initially, Kwon said she had no knowledge of this activity. She then reached back out to say she had asked the departments involved with the Austin store opening about the alleged fliers. To that end, she says, "Nobody knows what I was talking about, which I'm very happy about because that means they're not doing it. But it's absolutely against

> company policy. You know, we believe in fair competition, like friendly competition, but absolutely no dirt. We don't play that way." Kwon repeats, "I literally talked to everyone and nobody knows anything about that." Adding, "I wouldn't want anyone to do that to us. I mean, it's so beyond the rule. Like, absolutely not allowed.

That's private property. Absolutely not."

When the *Chronicle* called the number listed on the flier, a man, identifying himself as Federico, confirmed he worked for the HR department for H Mart corporate and H Mart Austin, although he denied H Mart posting job fliers in Hana World.

Still, Lee says H Mart's arrival brings other possible dangers to Hana World's survival, especially when it comes to their CONTINUED ON **P.38**

ASIAN MARKETS CONTINUED FROM P.36 vendor relationships. She claims H Mart approaches vendors and tries to force them to either be the local stores' supplier, or theirs, but never both. "It's like David versus Goliath," says Lee. "Goliath is telling [the vendors], 'Look, if you supply to [local stores], I have 30 stores in the nation. You supply to them, I'm gonna cut you off.'

"If [the vendors] have to make a decision, you know what decision they're going to make," continues Lee. "Because it's supplying one store – because I'm just a small, Austin local business – versus a national chain. They're going to choose the national chain." Lee fears a scenario like this could prevent her from keeping products on her shelves.

Another longtime local favorite, MT Supermarket, also depends on vendor relationships and wholesale partnerships with a retailers across the city. Located in Chinatown Center near Kramer and North Lamar, the store has been family owned and operated since 1984, and as the largest international grocery store in Central Texas, they offer a huge selection of staple items and rare finds from Vietnam, China, Thailand, Indonesia, India, and more. This suggests they will be in direct competition with H Mart and 99 Ranch. MT Supermarket declined requests for an interview.

Matsumae says neither H Mart nor 99 Ranch have contacted Asahi. Nevertheless, she's worried the stores could impact her business. As large corporations, H Mart and 99 Ranch have access to resources that a small business doesn't, such as more employees or marketing means. "Asahi is a small production," stresses Matsumae. "We run on bare bones and a highly, highly dedicated staff."

Even so, Matsumae asserts that locally owned, independent businesses will always offer the unique charm that chain stores lack. "From the products we carry to the instore signs to the store layout to the paint on



the walls, all of that is decided by us here, not by some corporate office in California," she says. Not to mention, Matsumae believes Asahi's smaller size allows for greater interaction with customers, creating a personalized shopping experience she imagines would be hard to find at a megastore. "Someone can just come to the counter and [say], 'I'm looking for this ingredient. Help.' And we can go hold their hand and walk through the store and help them grab everything," explains Matsumae. "We can afford to spend the time with customers like that."

For Matsumae and Lee, local Asian markets are more than just a place to buy groceries: They're cultural landmarks that serve an educational purpose as well. Matsumae says she thinks of Asahi as "being a cultural ambassador from Japan" and views informing customers on Japanese goods as a way to empower those new to ethnic supermarkets. For Asian and non-Asian customers alike, Lee hopes her pan-Asian offerings and international food court provide the experience and taste of Asia. "Coming to the market would be like you experiencing a street market in Asia," explains Lee, about the vision of Hana World she hopes to keep building.

With H Mart officially opening on Feb. 15, and, according to Chen, 99 Ranch most likely opening toward the end of the month or first week of March, the owners of Asahi and Hana World look toward their futures with grit. "I'm up for the challenge," asserts Matsumae. She adds, "I think it's just part of doing business. I'm hoping that we have a loyal enough customer base that will stick with us, and I hope to not disappoint those customers." Lee, a believer in the city's locavore ethos, is counting on residents to say no to big corporations. "Austinites are really good about keeping things unique. They don't like the cookie-cutter stuff," she says. "I'm hoping that [attitude] will prevail and that will allow me to stay in business."


FRENCH BISTRO OFFERS COMFORT, ROMANCE, AND WONDERFUL FOOD



A Murder in Amarillo Bomb City retells the tensions behind the 1997 killing of Texas punk Brian Deneke

Life cut short for no good reason. The story is as old as what's now called Texas, and as relevant today as it ever was. Two mutually antagonistic groups of high school kids from wildly divergent social backgrounds collide in a parking lot and rumble it out with chains, bats, and no small amount of beer. The Outsiders, S.E. Hinton's 1967 classic narrative of teen-on-teen pathos and hormone-fueled class warfare, pitted Tulsa's clean-cut "Socs" against the troubled but deep-down sweetheart greasers Ponyboy Curtis and his pals. Thirty years later, in the parking lot of Amarillo's nowdemolished Western Plaza, 19-year-old punk rocker and artist Brian Deneke was run over and killed by 17-year-old Dustin Camp, driving a 1983 Cadillac during a "jocks versus punks" melee across from mutual teen hangout IHOP. Jason Deneke, Brian's older brother, cradled the fallen boy's head in his hands screaming for help as the snow- and rain-pocked lot ran red with his little brother's blood.

Both stories end with a senseless death of a misfit kid with all the world before him. Hinton's novel didn't have a Caddy, but what happened on Dec. 12, 1997, could serve as a real-life lesson that the more things change, the more they ultimately stay the same.

Now the murder of Brian Deneke has made it to the movie screen with the arrival of *Bomb City*, a fearless and intense, not to mention emotionally supercharged recounting of the events leading up to what everybody who was there simply refers to as "that night." Camp, according to court transcripts, growled "I'm a ninja in my Caddy! I bet he liked that one!" as his car struck the leather-wearing and mohawked Deneke from behind, killing him instantly. A JV footballer for the Tascosa Rebels in the wealthy enclave of the Wolflin neighborhood, Camp was charged with first degree murder, but finally found guilty of voluntary vehicular manslaughter. He shockingly only received 10 years' probation and zero prison time. In 2001, he finally went to jail for five years – not for the murder, but for violating his parole.

The horrific incident and light sentence for Camp cleaved Amarillo – the deeply conservative "buckle of the Bible Belt" – in twain (the film gets its title from Amarillo's other nickname: Bomb City, after the nearby Pantex Plant, America's only nuclear weapons factory). Overnight it garnered not just Texas' attention, but that of the preinternet media landscape. *Oprah, Dateline, 20/20, Texas Monthly*, pretty much all of the big news shows picked up on the story and ran with it. Op-ed pieces painted Amarillo as the town without pity. And then the world moved on.

(Confession time: I attended Amarillo High School in the early Eighties and cooperated one of the city's first punk rock venues, the Web, after being kicked out of UT for attending too many Big Boys and Offenders gigs and far too few classes. I eventually high-tailed it outta Amarillo and permanently moved to Austin in 1990, took a job with *The Austin Chronicle* a year later, and have been a die-hard DIY punk rock writer ever since. That's my story and I'm sticking to it, but buy me a cider and I'll tell you about the time Black Flag actually brought down the ceiling at my old club.)

Bomb City is the feature debut of Dallasbased director Jameson Brooks, who cowrote the screenplay with Sheldon Chick. "Jameson and I were born and raised in Amarillo," Chick said. "The story of what happened to Brian Deneke was a part of our youth, and so when we felt we were ready to make a feature, that kind of crept into our minds again. There's a real lesson of tolerance built into that story."

It's a story whose retelling has gained the support of a true punk icon: C.J. Ramone, former bassist and vocalist with legendary prototype punks the Ramones, who watched the film after producer Major Dodge sent him a copy. He said, "My gauge for how good a serious movie I've just seen is if I feel like I need to have a drink afterwards. And I definitely needed a drink after watching *Bomb City*. ... It's definitely very moving, very powerful, very shocking, but the things that I really liked most about the movie are the things I didn't already know about the story. Brian was an artist, which kinda got lost in the whole story over the years."

Although the murder is at this point two decades past, memorial tags on an untold number of punk and punk-friendly websites have kept Deneke's tragic story alive. In a grim twist of irony, those websites, and indeed the whole of the World Wide Web, were in their infancy when Deneke died. A champion of the small but tireless Amarillo punk and arts communities, and booker of roadshows at venues like the Retina and the Egg, Deneke had to go old-school to lure in bands off of Interstate 40: telephone, talk, badger, repeat. That identification with Deneke as not so much a "punk" as he was a human being is a key strength in how powerful Bomb City plays. Early on in the film, editor Jake Wilganowski employs a minor masterclass in crosscutting between the punks moshing to a band in a dingy club and the Tascosa football players and cheerleaders brilliantly lit on the football field. It's a sequence that ties the two ultimately disparate groups together in a communion that's strikingly similar but still worlds apart.

After its world premiere at the Dallas International Film Festival in February of last year, the film and filmmakers returned

to Amarillo on Jan. 23 for its first hometown screening. The Amarillo Globe-News Center for the Performing Arts is a space usually reserved for the city's symphony and ballet, but on the night of the screening the 1,300seat theatre sold out completely. It had only managed that once before since its opening in 2006 – perhaps too predictably, a Brooks & Dunn concert.

The screening and Q&A went off without a hitch, but the old divides still linger ("I think we're going to double the security," Dodge said before the hometown show). Speaking on the potential for pushback from within the Amarillo community, Chick said, "We knew the story was divisive at the time but we also had the 20-year gap and the support of the Deneke family, which was first and foremost for us in terms of just being able to tell the story. We tried to stick

to the public record as much as we could and place the audience back in the seats of the jury, and let people make their own decisions. We didn't want to be too heavy-handed and we also wanted to ensure that Cody Cates [the character based on

Dustin Camp, played by Luke Shelton] would come across as human. The event was a tragedy all around, and we wanted to be conscientious in the way we were depicting everybody in the film."

Producer Major Dodge backed that up. "First off, if the Denekes hadn't given us permission to tell this story, the film never would have been made. They've become family to us and at this point they've seen the film so many times. Somebody asked how they could sit through it, and they do it as a celebration of their son's life. It's therapeutic for them and it helps to start conversations, it helps people identify with the Deneke family even more."

The center of the story is Dave Davis (Logan, The Walking Dead) in a sympathetic yet highly detailed performance as Brian Deneke. Backed by supporting performances by Austin's own Lorelei Linklater (Boyhood), Dallas native Glenn Morshower (24, Parkland), and Logan Huffman (V), Davis' challenge was to nail a complex character that could have easily sunk the entire film had it felt even a tad off. Your average audience might not know, but a punk can spot a poseur a mile off, and still has the time to form two bands, three fanzines, and solid tolerance for fermented beverages by the time the faux-hawk arrives. "Going in," Davis said, "I had a lot of trepidation, because this was a really raw, true story. And I got the role just three days before filming, although I'd been aware of the story and had done some research and prep work but that was all very, very surface level at that point. ... I was filling in a lot of blanks and using a lot of intuition."

The support of the Denekes for the project was key to taking Davis back to 1997 Amarillo. He said. "What really helped me into the role of Brian, the thing that I drew from personally as an actor, were key photos

> of Brian, talking to his friends and family and in particular listening to the way his parents spoke, and then drawing a connection to how Brian might've spoke, you know, being influenced by movies and TV, how his speech would have shifted." The first

night on set changed everything for Davis. "A friend of Brian's came up to me and said, 'You're freaking me out, you look just like him, you sound just like him,' and I had to break character and say 'Really? Because I'm really concerned on getting it right if you have anything to tell me,' and they said no."

Brian Deneke is gone now, but punk's (still) not dead, in Amarillo or anywhere else for that matter. Given the current ultrapartisan divide in America, the lessons of Bomb City couldn't be more timely or more necessary, as Dodge himself noted. "It's completely relevant now even though it happened 20 years ago. And similar things still happen. Not long ago, up in Fort Worth, there was the story of Ethan Couch. dubbed the Affluenza teen, who ran over a bunch of people while he was drunk and almost got off scot-free. I feel like every high school student needs to see this movie."

R.I.P. Brian Deneke, 1978-1997.

Death of a Punk

Bomb City explodes with grief

First-time director Jameson Brooks' Bomb City reads like a recipe pulled from The Anarchist Cookbook: Everyday items which, when assembled, create a dangerous product capable of wreaking havoc and destruction. On Dec. 12, 1997, 19-year-old Brian Deneke was killed after being run over by a Cadillac driven by 17-year-old Dustin Camp during a rumble between punks vs. preps in a parking lot across the street from an IHOP in Amarillo, Texas (nicknamed Bomb City

for being the only place in America with a plant that assembles & disassembles nuclear weapons). After a trial involving shameless victimblaming, Camp was given 10 years' probation for voluntary manslaughter. (For further context I recommend reading the Texas D: Jameson Brooks; with Dave Davis, Glenn Morshower, Logan Huffman,

Monthly article from 1999.) Bomb City tracks the events leading up to Brian's death, immersing viewers in the smalltown milieu by expertly crosscutting an intimate show at a

punk rock club with scenes from the Friday night football game. What's interesting here is the similarities between the "acceptable" vs. "unacceptable" outlets for teenage male aggression - although the punks are jovial and inclusive while the jocks bully and berate each other - but there's nothing more diametrically opposed than the treatment each group receives from the local law enforcement (I'm sure I don't need to spell it out). The juxtaposition sets the tone for the flash-forward courtroom scenes (in which the defense

attorney [Morshower] ponders whether being sent to prison is a "matter of circumstance" ... um, duh), but the time spent on the cops crashing the punk house feels a bit drawn-out. The filmmakers (all of whom have an Amarillo connection) do well to avoid martyr-izing Brian (Davis), despite heavy crucifixion imagery in the opening scenes (beautifully composed by cinematographer Jake Wilganowski). The role of villain falls heavily on the shoulders of another jock, Ricky (Huffman), rather than

the cherub-faced Cody Cates (Shelton), whose name has been changed presumably because they were unable to obtain Camp's life rights.

The soundtrack is heavy on punk and hardcore, including some of Brian's favorite bands. However, the action preceding the tragedy is fueled by a lurching and melancholy score (credited to Cody and Sheldon Chick) where the simpler, more obvious choice would have been to

blast Filth all the way through (Brian was wearing a leather jacket sporting their Destroy Everything logo the night he died). It contributes a layer of haunting inevitability to this night, these kids, life in general - a funeral march toward the encroaching millennium, toward the final brutal, bloody scene. The film's message, which it wields like a war chain, is a timeless one: Don't be such a dick to people because they look different from you. We all live in Bomb City: One stray match and the whole thing will explode.

2018 OSCAR-NOMINATED SHORT FILMS: ANIMATION D: Various. (NR, 83 min.)

Commandment No. 1 of Academy Awardnominated short film was, is, and always shall remain "expect the unexpected." And in no other category does this fiat hold faster and appear more judiciously than in the field of animation where, as ever, anything goes. That includes a rapturous ode to the sport of "Dear Basketball," written by Kobe Bryant and directed by Disney master animator Glen Keane (The Little Mermaid). Combining traditional animation, both charcoal and pencil, with Bryant's narration, this is a moving, slam-dunk portrait of the 18-time NBA All-Star's passion for and eventual departure from the game.

A sextet of directors helm the French offering "Garden Party," a preposterously detailed CGI comic opera involving a hungry frog, a quick-thinking salamander, a deserted mansion, and more than a touch of Sunset Boulevard. It's my pick for the best out of the five shorts.

It wouldn't be a normal Oscar free-for-all if Pixar didn't show up with something to tug on your heartstrings. This year it's director Dave Mullins' "Lou," which played in front of (and was frankly much better than) Cars 3. The titular schoolyard bully is taught the error of his ways via the usual, emotionally hefty Pixar magic.

France returns with directors Max Porter and Ru Kuwahata's dreamy, Jan Švankmajerinfluenced "Negative Space." Stop-motion animation, papier-mâché, and Wes Andersonian detail add up to a fanciful vet somber musing on the nature of fathers and sons, the past, the present, and the unknowable future. Très Francaise.

Finally there's UK fairy tale foible "Revolting Rhymes" which at 30 minutes is the lengthiest of the nominated shorts. It is in fact one half of a BBC couplet based on original writing by the great Roald Dahl (James and the Giant Peach, etc). Directors Jakob Schuh and Jan Lachauer use soft-edged CGI in a Dahlian mash-up of "Cinderella," "Jack and the Beanstalk." "Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs," "Goldilocks," and of course "Little Red Riding Hood" and multiple lupine agitators. The premise is terrific, but the overstuffed storyline, while reminiscent of The Rocky and Bullwinkle Show's "Fractured Fairy Tales"' often wonderfully nihilistic take on all things Grimm, is too much by half and perhaps better viewed in its entirety on Netflix, where it is currently available.

All five of these Oscar-nominated shorts screen as part of this program, along with three titles not nominated: "Lost Property Office," "Weeds," and "Achoo."

June 15, 2015. Breaion King heads to her teaching job, and ends up being thrown around by an APD cop bouncing her off a truck and the ground, arrested, and left in fear she would become the next Trayvon Martin, or Freddie Gray.

In the Oscar-nominated "Traffic Stop" by Kate Davis, what King went through is as important as how she has dealt with it, and how she personally contends with having every element of her public identity subsumed by what the camera caught, and what was plastered over TV for days. That dash-cam footage creates the backbone of this 30-minute HBO-backed documentary, but Davis' real intent is a broader portrait of King as an African-American woman in modern America. It's a bold ambition, one best executed when King contends with how, even after endless repetition of the footage, she is left to struggle with her life as a political metaphor, when she is so much more than that.

Race seeps into Laura Checkoway's "Edith+Eddie," which tells what should be a highly conventional love story. What threatens the couple's contentment is not that they are an interracial couple, but that Eddie (95) and Edith (96) have found some happiness together in their 90s after splitting the winnings off a lottery ticket. As Edith's daughter Rebecca puts it, they're almost a century old; let them have their joy. But there's nothing as simple as that. Checkoway shows this sweet, happy old pair, who have no clue whether either will make it to the end of the day, caught up in family wrangles, legal wrangles, and ethical questions of when care becomes oppressive.

Checkoway is watching two people who are in love who are dying and whose wishes are being ignored because they are old. Without ever being explicit, or even showing the forces at play, her heartrending and delicate story is about how the aged, and particularly those suffering from dementia or Alzheimer's, are ignored in decisions that affect their own quality of life.

By contrast, "Heaven Is a Traffic Jam on the 405" is about a woman finding a new lease on life and being allowed to keep it. Frank Stiefel's portrait of artist Mindy Alper pulls no punches on her own troubled history of mental health, damaging and inappropriate mental health treatments, her dependence on her mother, and her dysfunctional, possibly violent relationship with her absentee father. It's a solid addition to the "tortured artist" category, and Alper is undoubtedly fascinating in her spikiness. Yet Stiefel's commitment to re-enactments often seems too stylized, much as his unquestioning belief in Alper's own shifting biography lacks a certain incisiveness. *** - Richard Whittaker VIOLET CROWN

While the story centers around kids disappearing from a small town, and time travel across three distinctively different decades, the overall tone and complexities within the characters' dynamics are ... well, dark. A multi-dimensional horror and sci-fi tale that philosophically addresses time and identity, **Dark** is both visually stunning and intellectually stimulating – perfect traits for a cinematic date.

Buffalo '66 (Hulu): If you're looking for a man who can do it all, look no further than Vincent Gallo. This dreamboat serves as writer, director, composer, and star of the 1998 comedy-drama about a man who kidnaps a young tap dancer named Layla (Christina Ricci) and forces her to pretend to be his wife. Gallo creates characters that shine through their insecurities while counterbalancing a tone of romantic longing and acceptance with a subplot of revenge. Shot on 35mm reverse stock, the cinematography alone will make you swoon with its vintage Polaroid aesthetic and dreamy color palettes.

The End of the F**cking World (Netflix): I'm usually not a fan of teen romance, but one can't help but to be intrigued by an atypical love story between a foul-mouthed girl and a self-proclaimed psychopath who is secretly plotting to kill her. The two misfit lovebirds decide to run away together and quickly become entangled in a series of crime-induced antics. Voiceover narrations provide insight into their past traumas and hopes for the rocky relationship while they explore how fleeting the world is through the lens of their newfound rebellion and eccentric adoration.

It's hard to say whether it's a good thing or a bad thing that a short documentary just leaves you craving more of the story. That's the frustration of "Heroin(e)" and its gripping, heartbreaking depiction of the devastating impact of the opioid epidemic on Cabell County, W.V., the overdose capital of the U.S. Three women are on the front lines: Fire Chief Jan Rader, who spends far more time dealing with overdoses than she does dealing with flames; drug court Judge Patricia Keller, who runs her courtroom with jubilation for those staying clean, compassion for those relapsing; and Necia Freeman of Brown Bag Ministry, handing out food to prostitutes in the hope that will keep them off the streets for just one night. But 39 minutes is not enough time to encompass how massive this problem is. It's not director Elaine McMillion Sheldon's fault, but if a fraction of the \$100

million that Rader estimates has been spent on health and law enforcement from the epidemic had gone into a documentary like this, maybe more people would know what's being talked about. It's the difference between Necia dropping a woman off at a shelter, and the beaten-down staff of Rader's Huntington Fire Department picking up a limp body from the floor of a convenience store. This shouldn't be a short documentary. It should be a multipart, mandatory-viewing series.

If the hope in "Heroin(e)" is for potential redemption, then "Knife Skills" is the dream fulfilled. Edwins Leadership & Restaurant in Cleveland, Ohio, is part of the wave of restaurants and catering schools that look to former prison inmates for staff. That just about every face they hire is black is a pointed reminder about the unbalance, bias, and gross unfairness in the prison system. With that context in mind, the sheer joy of seeing them – headed up by screwup turned restaurateur Brandon Edwin Chrostowski – embrace a life and a skill set that most of them never considered, is miraculous. As director Thomas Lennon makes it clear with vibrancy and mouthwatering kitchen photography, every mushroom Napoleon is a life saved. Maybe Cabell County can have an Edwins. **** - *Richard Whittaker*

© 2018 OSCAR-NOMINATED SHORT FILMS: LIVE ACTION D: Various. (NR, 95 min.)

Remember the lull in your Oscar party back in the Stone Age when the room would clear as winners in the short film categories were announced? It was the time when guests would make a beeline for the bathroom, the alcohol, or a second helping of that inedible queso slowly congealing at the bottom of your Crock-Pot. Without the ability to view the nominees beforehand, everyone's interest in the awards show would temporarily flatline. Today, you have no excuse. The nominated short films are available online or in selected theatres prior to broadcast. Check them out, as there are always a few gems in the bunch.

This year, three of the nominated live action short films emphasize the power of human compassion, sometimes for a complete stranger. In the tense "Watu Wote: All of Us," based on an actual event more than two years ago, a distrustful Christian woman is saved by the selfless actions of her fellow Muslim passengers on a bus hijacked by terrorists near the Kenyan/Somali border. In the even more nerve-racking "DeKalb Elementary," inspired by an actual 911 call, a grade school receptionist empathetically convinces a troubled young man entering the premises with a rifle to surrender himself before doing harm. As the unsung hero of the day, Tarra Riggs gives a riveting performance deserving recognition in its own right. On a slightly calmer note, "The Silent Child" earnestly pleads for sign-language support for deaf children in England's educational system, as a young tutor tries to convince the family of an isolated 3-year-old pupil to better prepare the child for a life among the hearing.

On a historical note, the austerely directed "My Nephew Emmett" chronicles the day leading up to the 1955 nocturnal abduction of 14-year-old African-American Emmett Till in rural Mississippi for the offense of whistling at a white woman. While this short film feels somewhat unformed and incomplete, its segue into actual vintage footage of Till's elderly uncle testifying about that tragic night is chilling. Finally, the only comic entry in this year's competition: "The Eleven O'Clock" is a wonderfully absurd confrontation between a psychiatrist and a deluded patient who thinks he's a psychiatrist, playing like the bastard offspring of Mamet and Ionesco. With its nifty twist, it's a pure delight. If Oscar has a sense of humor, this one's the winner. - Steve Davis ***

A CIAMBRA

There's a time in every boy's life when he wants to follow in his father's footsteps. In the case of Pio (Pio Amato), the family business means stealing cars, copper, electricity. *A Ciambra* is a sequel of sorts to direc-

A Clambra is a sequel of sorts to director Jonas Carpignano's 2015 refugee drama *Mediterranea*. Now Burkinabe migrant Ayiva (Seihon), whose hard walk to a better life was the center of the first film, slides into the background, and Pio, the Romani kid with whom he crossed paths, is the protagonist. Or rather, he hopes to be. Playing a somewhat fictionalized version of himself, the 14-yearold is forced into his inheritance prematurely when his father Rocco (the real Rocco Amato) and brother are busted for heisting cars.


As Romani, even though Pio's family lives in Calabria in southern Italy, they see themselves as outsiders. "We're eating like Italians," elder brother Cosimo (Damiano Amato, playing his own real-life twin brother) proclaims when the family has pasta for dinner. But there is a hierarchy, and even though they are near the bottom (well below the Italians, and especially the mob), there are still the African migrants like Ayiva for the family to berate and demean – except for Pio, to whom Ayiva has become a kind of big brother.

Carpignano's first film had an inherent narrative flow, as Ayiva traveled across the sea and tried to build something like a life in the refugee camp in Gioia Tauro. Pio's travails are much more formless, as he hustles small grifts and thefts to keep the family solvent (plus a little bit for himself). He's a teen playing a man, and in this low-key, naturalistic drama Pio's restraint is an extraordinary boon.

Young Pio's ease in front of the camera – in no small part due to Carpignano's dedication to catching the nuances of life in the Ciambra, and his long, immersive research and shooting process – is never quite enough to make the story catch fire. At least, not until the closing act, when the young man is forced to consider his loyalties. Until then, this depiction of a hardscrabble life is intriguing rather than engrossing, and that's a little disappointing. The director avoids turning this into

some form of misery tourism, which would be a real risk in less adept hands: yet the story is told with such a uniform tone that it's hard to remain emotionally engaged. That he's speaking out for a disenfranchised community is laudable enough: But perched somewhere between the stylized grit of a Pedro Costa, and the lo-fi emotion of a Ken Loach, Carpignano is undoubtedly still finding his voice. $\star\star\star$ – *Richard Whittaker*

Who doesn't love the feel of comfortable fabric against their skin? A blouse, a dress, a nicely cut pair of pants: Nice clothes make you feel good. Simon Rumley, the British-born, Austin-residing filmmaker's new film takes that tactile sensation and turns it into an obsession in his new thriller Fashionista. April (Fuller) runs a clothing boutique with her husband Eric (Embry) and they both live in a loft overflowing, hoarder-style, with their overstock of all manner of apparel, filling the edges of every frame. It soon becomes clear that April has a special relationship with clothing (she likes to masturbate in various outfits). She begins to suspect that Eric may be having an affair, a thought that furthers her tenuous grasp on reality. Proven right, she spirals into the arms of slick rich dude Randall (Balfour, who your uncle may recognize as being a bit player on various network TV shows like 24) who's into all manner of kinky sex stuff to which he introduces April. Soon enough, a dead body appears, a homeless musician with a heart of gold shows up, and a series of scenes involving another woman (Starry Eyes' Essoe) being released from some sort of psychiatric hospital adds to the mystery.

It's a film that tries somewhat desperately to walk that fine line of explication vs. obfuscation and it doesn't quite stick the landing. But when you see the closing credit shout-out to director Nicolas Roeg, it all makes sense.

Rumley dedicates the film to the British iconoclast, whose breakout film *Performance*

(and perhaps 1988's Track 29) this film most resembles, in the tradition of narrative beguilement. Fashionista's story is broken into pieces, with a fragmented timeline that seeks to alternatively build and release the tension, but unfortunately rarely succeeds. Fuller's performance is the fulcrum here, and she carries it well, but the film meanders around, too concerned with highlighting Eric's tattoos and Randall's minimalist condo. But it's all of a piece, right? Except these pieces don't really fit in the end. Rumley reaches by telling a story of a woman at odds with her body image, and the subsequent psychosis that entails, and the holes in the narrative that the viewer ends up left with can't be chalked up to the lack of mothballs. Rumley is a talented, distinctive voice, and I can't wait to see what he does next, but Fashionista feels less like haute couture and more like prêt-à-porter (okay, I couldn't resist). **1 Josh Kupecki ALAMO VILLAGE

Angus Sampson, Sarah Snook, Finn Scicluna-O'Prey. (PG-13, 99 min.) The Winchester Mystery House is a real mansion in San Jose, Calif., and when I was younger my parents took me there. I thought it was rather neat but not nearly as cool as *The Addams Family*'s digs on television. For one thing, the looming Victorian Winchester manse is in color and downright radiant under the Southern California sunshine, which to an 11-year-old Vincent Price fanatic somewhat drained the spooky potential out of the sprawling estate.

A similar problem exists within the Gothiclite Winchester, a ghostly tale largely based on the true story of Sarah Winchester (Mirren), heiress to the Winchester Repeating Arms fortune. "The gun that won the West," however, ended many an innocent life, or so supposes the elderly Sarah, who has constructed her (never-completed) mansion as an aid to both trapping evil spirits and assisting others to move on into the hereafter. This sort of out-ofthe-casket thinking didn't go over very well in 1906 despite the continuing interest in spiritualism, and so the Winchester Repeating Arms Company sends physician Eric Price (Clarke) to determine Sarah's mental fitness. There is a \$20 million fortune in the offing, of course, but you'd think the gunslingers at Winchester HQ would've had the sense to procure an alienist who wasn't himself in spousal mourning and overly fond of injecting himself with laudanum.

Price encounters mysterious goings-on from Sarah's niece Marion (Snook) and her young son Henry, whose eyes go white from time to time, but the most disconcerting thing about Winchester is how grindingly tedious it is. Helmed by Aussie filmmaking sibs the Spierig brothers (Ethan Hawke-starring time travel thriller Predestination; Jigsaw), this is a tawdry collection of shock cuts, creaky passageways, and a terribly underused Mirren plastered together over only the thinnest of frameworks. You'd think the sordid history of the Winchester house would have inspired a more evocative or even entertaining haunted house story, but the Spierigs rely far too heavilv on the sort of shock-cut du jour that has become the lazy and boring norm for so many PG-13 "horror" films of the past 15 years. The high-water mark for genuinely unsettling examples of the haunted house genre feels like it came and went - good lord! - a full 16 years ago, with Alejandro Amenábar's The Others. Now that's terrifying.

There's a reason why Afghanistan is called the graveyard of empires - a phrase repeated throughout 12 Strong, a depiction of one of the first and most unequivocal victories of the U.S. war against al Qaeda, as U.S. Special Forces and Afghan horse troops took on a Taliban army. This seems ideal fodder for a "God, guns, and the Star-Spangled Banner" take on the story, but director Fuglsig takes what could have been a flag-waving slog across Afghanistan, interspersed with massive explosions, and inserts the near-impossibility of a long-term, clear-cut victory. That dichotomy is personified with easy, furrowed-browed charm by Hemsworth as team leader Mitch Nelson, but the greatest nuance comes from Negahban as Dostum, the warrior who has been fighting for Afghanistan for four decades, even if the sides are far more fluid than would be comfortable for Western observers. CALL ME BY YOUR NAME

The solidly built, 26-year-old Oliver (Hammer) is confident and bruisingly athletic; 17-year-old Elio (Chalamet), long and lanky, tends to hang on the outskirts of social situations, testing the waters. The first time Oliver touches him - casually, even fraternally - Elio jolts like he's been shocked. It's the first spark. A love affair is inevitable, but Guadagnino doesn't skim over Elio's prolonged longing, which is what makes Call Me by Your Name most potent as a coming-of-age picture, not a mere romance. We observe the process, which is never the same, and also listen in to conversations between Varda and JR about art, life, death. and the power of images, as well as them at their most casual. Faces Places is hardly as aimless as it sounds in description; judicious editing maintains the documentary's thread. The film is an intensely personal record, yet also a universal contemplation. It says a lot about Annette Bening that you can take away one of her signature traits and she still takes your breath away. Here, she re-keys her seductively husky voice higher and breathier to play Gloria Grahame, the one-time Oscar winner whose star dimmed as she aged and scandal tainted her career. Based on Peter Turner's memoir of the same name, *Film Stars Don't Die in Liverpool* confines itself to the May-December romance of Turner (Bell) then a struggling actor in his late 20s, and Grahame, in her 50s and working the boards in London theatre. That limited focus will disappoint classic Hollywood fans, and given the film's self-imposed narrow focus, one wishes it probed more deeply Peter and Gloria's romance and its presumed complications. So the lion's share of the work then is on Bening and Bell's shoulders to flesh out dramatically thin characters. That they do, and fittingly, the film's best scene needs no words. (02/02/2018)

This is a bloodstained Old West, that feels timeless yet contemporary, diving headlong into the ongoing and often horrific impact of the United States' policies and attitudes toward indigenous culture. If there's a shortcoming, it's that Yellow Hawk and his family seem underwritten, but that's sometimes a hidden strength. 

Tony (Karam) is a Lebanese Christian in Beirut, whose drainpipe protrudes illegally into the street. Yasser (El Basha) is a Palestinian refugee fixing minor code violations. Yasser begins repairing the drain spout but Tony demolishes his work with a hammer. Subsequently, they take their grievances to court. Past histories and religious beliefs are dredged up for a nation's delectation, while the individuals and their spouses become pawns in a bigger national debate. Like most conflicts in the Middle East, the parties' intransigence is palpable and the countries' court dockets are backed up with several millennia of affronts. Transforming the Screen NEW FILM FEST EMPHASIZES DIVERSITY IN WOMEN

In mainstream media, women filmmakers are often found behind the cameras of documentaries, but that limit will not apply at Saturday's Transform Film Fest. The inaugural festival, which organizers hope will become an annual event, will showcase 16 short films and two trailers created by women filmmakers of Texas, ranging from live action narrative to animation, experimental, and yes – documentary.

Texas as a whole does not suffer from a lack of film festivals, but historically there have been few outposts for local women filmmakers to be honored, and that's

just what Transform is looking to do. Faiza Kracheni, program director at Motion Media Arts Center (the organization behind Austin School of Film), explains that previous women film festivals focused more on international work rather than looking locally. She said, "I think we really need that in Austin and Texas."

Kracheni was approached about starting an all-inclusive women's film fest in the fall by Larissa Stephens, a facilitator with Hive Arts Collective, and Danea Johnson, communications and events coordinator for the Women's Community Center of Central Texas (Motion Media Arts Center, Hive, and the WCC are funding the event, with additional aid from the City of Austin). The idea for a festival stems back to Stephens, who first broached the subject with Johnson in September. The pair worked together at WCC a few years back



ed together at WCC a few years back to start Alt Girl Cinema, a local film series focusing on women storytellers. For Johnson, founding a film festival was the logical next step. What sets screenings and festivals apart, according to the women behind Transform, is

the awards system. "We're not just showing the work, but honoring it," explained Johnson.

The idea of starting Transform excited Kracheni because it was more legit than a film screening series. "It was, 'Let's make a real festival for real women,'" she said.

Moving at an impressive speed, their call for submissions opened on Dec. 10. Within a month, Transform received more than 30 shorts. Whittling those down to 16 was the hardest part, said Stephens, adding she was



grateful to have the judges – four women filmmakers from across the state – take over from there. The prizes – including a day pass to Originator Studios, several \$1,000 scholarships to Austin School of Film, and a certificate to equipment rental house Austin Movie Gear – are intended to help ensure filmmakers in the competition have a future.

The stories and their creators cover a wide range of subjects and come from various backgrounds. That's unsurprising though, considering the founders' commitment to make Transform a diverse festival that's accepting to all women. Kracheni put it bluntly: "Women doesn't mean just cis white women – it's inclusive of all women. I don't need to preference trans because transwomen are women, but also people of color, women with disabilities – all these people have been pushed to the back. We're pushing them to the front and making a space for all of them."



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Will Johnson's Eternal Newness

Friday, Feb. 2, 10:30am: I've challenged **Will Johnson** to a home run derby.

An appropriate gauntlet given that the Austin songwriter, best known in the Lone Star State for fronting beloved indie rock outfit **Centro-matic**, moonlights as a painter whose primary muses are historical pitchers and sluggers from Major League Baseball, Negro League, and semipro teams. Word is he was once a ringer on the **Waterloo Records** softball team.

"I accept," smiles the singer/guitarist/drummer, sipping coffee in the chill morning air outside some batting cages in Pflugerville.

In a few days, Johnson leaves on tour with his latest project, **Marie/Lepanto**, a collaboration with **Justin Peter Kinkel-Schuster**, Arkansas-based frontman for **Water Liars**. The duo's late-January debut, versatile and challenging full-length *Tenkiller*, feels like a song swap in which two distinct voices recount the gravity of life and love through melancholy folk ballads and raw, ruminative pop. It's also a guitar album laced with fuzzed-out anti-solos and knobtwisting sonic uprisings.

First, Johnson has to beat "Playback."

He has two distinct advantages in today's match: his opponent is running on four hours of sleep and retired from baseball at age 13. Said "athlete" holds the edge of making up the rules, however: Each participant gets 15 pitches from a machine and tallies a run for each ball that makes it to the back netting before touching the ground.

"I'll be representing the **Lansing Lugnuts**," declares yours truly. Without hesitation, Johnson counters: "I'm representing the **Montgomery Biscuits**."

Stuffing my cranium inside a blue plastic helmet, I step into the batter's box. The pitching machine gives me some high cheese and I ding a couple backward before finding my sweet spot and lift five balls to the back net. My turn ends with a

Mighty Casey-like whiff. Johnson follows and, with professional form, smacks a series of pitches to the back wall. I'm only saved by two balls hit so hard and high that they bounce off the overhead netting and come down inches short of scoring. We tie at five runs apiece.

Sitting on the bleachers, Johnson touches on his relentlessly collaborative career. He made an album with late **Songs: Ohia/Magnolia Electric Co.** balladeer **Jason Molina**, partook in the **Conor Oberst/Mike Mogis/M. Ward/Jim James** collab **Monsters of Folk**, formed **Overseas** with **Pedro the Lion's David Bazan** and members of **Bedhead**, anchored the **Woody Guthrie** tribute **New Multitudes** with Jim James and **Jay Farrar**, played in the **Undertow Orchestra**, and expanded Centro-matic into bonus band **South San Gabriel**. As such, he's one of Austin's most willing teammates.

"I love newness," he shrugs. "I have to keep the landscape changing. If I did one band all of the time, I'd get restless.



"Each collaboration teaches me something new," he continues. "It gives me a glimpse into some of my favorite musicians' approaches, work ethics, and ways of writing and that inspires me to become better."

As for what he gleaned from working with Kinkel-Schuster, Johnson notes the broad-yet-intimate quality of the lyrics: "He explores a lot of detail without zooming in too much and making it too diary-entry-like."

When it's pointed out that the constant spawning of new projects – especially ones with difficult-to-memorize names like Marie/Lepanto – is a terrible way to build commercial momentum, Johnson laughs.

"I'm sure from a marketing standpoint it's a nightmare, but that's what it's about for me. It's about creating and staying happy, and staying turned on to making stuff. That's the life I'm trying to lead. The rest of it, in my opinion, has to take care of itself."

Marie/Lepanto plays in-store at Waterloo Records before opening for reunited indie giants Pedro the Lion Tuesday at **Mohawk**.

SEVEN FASCINATING FACTS ABOUT A GIANT DOG

After a sold-out debut performance, **A Giant Dog** continues barnstorming **Beerland** every Thursday in February. Here are some intimate details about Austin's explosive harmony-punk quintet that even their most fanatic followers don't know:

• When the band formed in 2008, they wanted to call it **Atreyu**, after the character from **The NeverEnding Story**. A popular metalcore band already had that name, so they chose A Giant Dog in reference to the film's **Falkor**, who's actually a **Luckdragon**, not a dog.

• Bassist **Graham Low** is a musketowning **Civil War** re-enactor – Union, of course – and has guided his bandmates through battlefields while on tour.

• Singer/guitarist **Andrew Cashen** trained for ballet as a child. In high school, he founded a social club called the **North Hampton Ballers Society** that wore vintage leisure suits and ate **KFC** together on Fridays. It became pervasive throughout two schools and administrators worried it was a gang.



• While attending high school in Spring, A Giant Dog singers Andrew Cashen and **Sabrina Ellis** were in a band called **Youth in Asia** with future **OBN IIIs** members **Orville Neely** and **Jason Smith**. AGD guitarist **Andy Bauer**, then an Afro'd

upperclassman known as **Andy Vandal**, assembled the group and served as their manager. They played a high school dance, covering **Kiss**' "Rock and Roll All Nite" and **Green Day**'s "When I Come Around," and have never officially broken up.

• Drummer **Danny Lion** is actually AGD's best vocalist. He pays tribute to ultimate drummer/singer combo **Phil Collins** with a jean jacket back patch.

• Singer Sabrina Ellis claims half Mexican-American ancestry and is related to **Toribio Romo**, the Catholic priest who was murdered during a religious uprising in 1928 and made a saint by **Pope John Paul II** in 2000.

Charlie Martin and Will Taylor work on the same wavelength.

Passing through Denver on separate tours, the two drummers first met at a baseball game where they realized they shared Sparklehorse and Smashing Pumpkins.

Dallas origins, sports-centric youths, and recent forays into songwriting. "I had a batch of songs

I was working on, and he had a similar batch," recalls Martin. "I was wanting to record a solo thing to learn the process, but then it turned into a band."

The beginning guitarists also found a common penchant for the emerging East Coast DIY scene, strumming out a rendition of Philly cult phenom (Sandy) Alex G's

"Sorry" during their first hangout back home in Austin. For Martin and Taylor, the new gen of scaled-back rock bands revived the sounds of lo-fi Nineties heroes like

"We felt like we were trying to be part of something happening in the Northeast," says Martin. "The bands we loved had a lot of life on the internet and on Bandcamp, and they were all based elsewhere."

United under the moniker Hovvdy ("howdy," made Google-able), the duo circulated their 2016 full-length, Taster, on previously local Sports Day Records, a small setup with consistent savvy for qui-

etly unearthing gems. The debut cohered an inventive collection of tugging melodies and precarious riffs, the principals seamlessly trading off vocals between breezy tracks. The songs introduced Hovvdy's singular knack for muffled, downtempo melancholy - half-jokingly self-referenced as "pillowcore."

"Taster was really kind of raw," says Taylor. "There wasn't anybody listening but our friends.'

"We realized it would work because we could not really know each other, but have songs that mesh well," agrees Martin. "[Writing] now, we can copy each other and it's okay, because it's one band. We can rip off each other and it's a good thing."

A year after Taster's release, the collection enjoyed the full reissue treatment from tastemaking Brooklyn label Double Double Whammy. As the first Southern artist signed to the indie presser, Hovvdy had successfully carved out their own snug, distinctive space in the Northeastern scene. Latest capture Cranberry documents the pair's eccentric methods of self-recording, the sophomore LP gleaned from individually crafted demos and iPhone voice memos.

"I recorded pretty much the whole song 'Colorful' in my grandma's living room in Mississippi," reveals Martin of the subdued penultimate track. "That's why recording on a phone is nice, because you just do it anywhere you are."

The intimacy of Hovvdy's solitary recordings comes through in a dusty, bedroom comfort. In opposition to earlier work, when Martin says the duo drew on "a whole life's worth of more heavy emotions and experiences," Cranberry's songwriting shifts to a more optimistic angle. Added layers of instrumentals, working in keyboards, steel guitar, and a piano played in Martin's childhood abode, set a tone that's recognizably homey.

Taylor-penned fuzzy hum "In the Sun" celebrates staying in, while the title track's video samples Martin's home movies.

"The way we play and the way the choruses ring has this kind of nostalgia," offers Taylor. "I think it's more traceable in the music, rather than the songwriting."

Martin attributes the title *Cranberry* to "all the sensory elements, the color and then the taste and the sound of the word. Sort of like the bittersweetness."



HOVVDY

Cranberry (Double Double Whammy) Charlie Martin and Will Taylor are masters of micromoments, of capturing the ennui of the familiar. Follow up to Taster, Hovvdy's 2016 debut, Cranberry traverses much of the same narrative and musical territory as its lo-fi, slowcore predecessor, but more ambitiously. Taylor's voice is sharper here, the plainspoken poetry of his lyrics brought to the forefront of nostalgic fuzziness. That gentle melancholy often conjures Elliott Smith, particularly "Petal," with Taylor's wistful refrain, "I had a feeling for who you used to be." From the quiet pedal steel on "Truck" to the intricate, quivering guitars opening "Swing," the material plays out longer and varied, allowing the muted instrumentation to breathe. Cranberry delivers pointed observations through soft focus.

Perfect summation of the twosome, supplemented live by labelmate Hannah Read of Lomelda and sometimes a drummer, who weave downtrodden rhythms through a soft, hopeful wash. Reflecting on who wrote what across the album's 12 blissful tracks, the autonomously drafted songs are all nicked and shined with inputs from one or the other and unified under a single attribution.

"It's a pretty even split," says Martin. "It's enough to say all songs by Hovvdy," adds Taylor.

Hovvdy's release party with Molly Burch and Ama assembles Friday, Feb. 9, at Barracuda.

T YOUR DAY JOB

When I was 22 and living in Dallas, I got fired from Starbucks and needed some money. My friend's girlfriend's grandparents owned the Mindy Lu's Pies factory in Fort Worth, so they helped me out.

Basically, I would show up at about 6am and stand at the end of the conveyor belt. This wonderful woman named Maria would feed the unwrapped pies down the conveyor belt and they'd come out on my side wrapped up. My job was to load them all into crates, and they would be coming very quickly. We would wrap and pack up 15,000 pies a day. We didn't leave until the job was done, and then come back the next morning and do it again.

It was just standing there for eight or nine hours on your feet, catching pies and going home smelling like a bakery. No one else there really spoke English, and unfortunately, despite my last name, I didn't speak Spanish, so it was very quiet and pretty mindless. For the first couple of weeks, I listened to music, but your ears would just get tired, so I stood there in the quiet and caught pies and made boxes. It was terrible. I was very thankful to that family for giving me a lastminute gig when I needed it, but it was rough.

I was there about three months before I found another coffee shop job and then about a year later headed to Nashville. – As told to Doug Freeman



URANIUM SAVAGES Clown Juice (SteadyBoy)

Some boys were born to be dirty old men. Launched in 1974, these prurient-minded wielders of sophomoric good humor and fake genitalia have evolved into cackling graybeard groovers whose vintage lends a twisted respectability to their blue-lit loutishness. Produced by Shawn Sahm, who met the Uranium Savages at the Soap Creek Saloon when he was 12, Clown Juice sloshes squirrelly, out-of-step carnal musings including "Robbin' the Cradle" and "Low T." Ringleader Kerry Awn channels Wanda Jackson's "Fujiyama Mama" with too-soon tsu-



nami corrido "Fukishimmy Shake," while Charles Ray's "Make Austin Great Again" upends Trumpist nativism by imagining a wall around Austin to keep out Californians. The title track employs a swaggering interpolation of Julius Fucik's "Entrance of the Gladiators" to approximate abject inebriation. Though clearly the product of a local era long gone, these tasteless trucker tunes for retiring minds still have the power to offend all the right people. - Greg Beets ***

WILD CHILD Expectations (Dualtone)

Since Wild Child's 2011 debut Pillow Talk, the bittersweet vocal interplay of Kelsey Wilson and Alexander

Beggins has built ever more exuberant pop. Three full-lengths later, Expectations subtly modifies that formula. Opening with the ukulele charm of "Alex" and soft sway to "Eggshells," the album begins in familiar territory before Wilson takes control with the punchy, Sara Bareilles-styled "Back & Forth." She emerges as the local septet's driving force behind a vocal range that stretches alongside her maturing explorations of heartbreak and revival. Her latter-half highlight "Sinking Ship" drifts lightly with a Joni Mitchell touch against the torching "My Town," even as "The One" and "Goodbye Goodnight" duet coyly. Without sacrificing Wild Child's signature pop swell, Expectations emerges soulful and serious. (CD release: Saturday, Feb.

TRÈS OUI Poised to Flourish (Shrimper)

Très Oui's 10 tracks of jangle are determined to fill Austin's deficit of Eighties sophistipop. The fourpiece's

Spiraling drums on "Get It Now" become slinky blues in "You Got Me Right." The Austin fivepiece reflects truly guileless growth mentality for its currently unelaborate musical and lyrical complexity.

Mammoth Grinder

SIDEWINDER, SATURDAY 10

SWASS 7 builds to Mammoth Grinder with Fat Tony, Women in Prison, Skourge, Mujeres Podridas, and a DJ set by Lil Dippa

Last elevated locally on the drum riser in Power Trip during a November Sound on Sound Fest make-up show headlined by tour mates Cannibal Corpse, Chris Ulsh drives the Dallas thrash unit at peak ramming speed 200 shows a year. Somewhat miraculously, then, between their breakout 2013 bow Manifest Decimation and 2017's Nightmare Logic, the local Houston native eked out enough studio time to cut a fourth full-length with Austin metalcore trio Mammoth Grinder, which he leads from the front microphone. Cosmic Crypt boosts the hardcore punk tempos and death metal riffs of its three predecessors.

"I learned a little more about production this time, or how to get the sounds out of a studio that I hear in my head," offers Ulsh. "The other two records [for Relapse Records], we'd have a tour coming up and I'd be pressured to make sure it was ready.

Especially with Extinction, we didn't have enough money for another day in the studio, and the day I had to record vocals my voice was pretty much shot."

Punk kid or a metalhead?

"I had a separate punk and metal journey when I was young, but if I had to pick one, I'd say I was a punk kid, because that was the music that made me realize I could play

this song if I picked up a guitar. I didn't think that when I listened to Slaver." Ulsh laughs - amiable, self-effacing, 24/7 singer, guitarist, bassist, drummer for Hatred Surge, the

Impalers, you name it. "[Mammoth Grinder] was always personal, because this was my high school band," he told Decibel this year. "There were so

many times I should've put it down, but picked it back up because I was so critical of our old material. I wanted to outdo the last – Raoul Hernandez thing we did."

ANDERSON EAST, J.S. ONDARA Parish, Friday 9

When trendsetting Nashville producer Dave Cobb started his own label, Anderson East was the first artist signed with good reason. The Alabama native drives Southern soul sweating a seductive and intoxicating power, with enough vocal grit to stick and R&B rhythm to swagger. Fresh third LP Encore stakes East's rising star alongside swooning songwriters like Ray Lamontagne. Minneapolisvia-Nairobi songwriter J.S. Ondara acts as must-catch opener.


