





aybe it's because I was born here. Maybe it's because so much of the best of my work life has originated from this city, maybe its because I've had articles from the Chronicle taped to my fridge since I had my own apartment, but the privilege of being the guest editor of The Austin Chronicle is deeply meaningful to me.

This summer I have two very personal films coming out. Blaze is about a singersongwriter, Blaze Foley, who died in the same hospital where I was born. Much of this issue is inspired by my experience directing that film. The other, Paul Schrader's First Reformed, completes a family mission - with me finally wearing a cleric's collar.

When I was born in Austin in 1970 my parents were UT students living in a garage apartment on the grounds of the Episcopal seminary on East 32nd Street. According to family lore, my great-grandmother considered this to be a sign I was going to be a preacher, and the idea gathered momentum as I grew up, without my blessing. I wanted to be an artist. So I matured with a vague foreboding of that mysterious thing my Grandma Dell referred to as "the call." I was greatly relieved when all the evidence indicated (and my family agreed) that the arts were the more appropriate call for me to answer. I can always "play" a priest, I rationalized, but it took 50 movies to happen.

But now at last, in First Reformed, I play Reverend Toller, a religious man consumed by a blistering spiritual crisis. Having lost his son in the war in Afghanistan, and having lost his marriage in the wake of that g grief, his lifelong faith in the church is leaving him, fast. He imagines more dramatic and radical action than prayer and contemplation, and begins to emulate what other religious activists have done. Could he do for our environment what John Brown attempted to do for the abolition of slavery?

I took on this role in the days after Obama left office and Trump was inaugurated. The issues that harrow my character - namely, climate change and our country's relationship to big business - were in the news daily. With my character's views, wounds, and concerns positioned in the forefront of my brain I read the paper and watched the news differently than before. I saw the news through the eyes of a reverend.


Baptized and confirmed in the Christian faith, the teachings of Jesus of Nazareth are deeply ingrained in my psyche: "Do to others as you would have them do to you." "Where your treasure is, there will your heart be also." "You cannot serve both God and money." "Love your enemies, do good to them that hate you, and pray for those who persecute you." "Blessed are the peacemakers." And as Anne Lamott might say, "a general humility before whatever force created redwood trees." Now watching the coverage of the central issues of our day (health care, immigration, environment, terrorism) through my character's eyes, my normal perception was honed.

Why is it we so rarely discuss our political views in the light of a spiritual context? We see politicians citing the name of God incessantly but rarely do we engage with anyone other than those who share our views, in any meaningful, grownup conversation about what prayer and God really mean. Most of us, myself included, still have the same relationship to our spiritual life that we had as youth: automatic rituals, memorized prayers, superstitious habits. Rarely do we ask ourselves, "By what moral ballast am I guiding my everyday actions and political views?"

Most of us, myself included, still have the same relationship to our spiritual life that we had as youth: automatic rituals, memorized prayers, superstitious habits. Rarely do we ask ourselves, "By what moral ballast am I guiding my everyday actions and political views?"

In First Reformed, my character is asking himself these questions. Most critically: How can we be so near sighted as to put personal comfort and short-term financial gain before the preservation of the air we breathe, or before the water our children drink? How did that topic not come up once in four televised national debates among the potential leaders of our own country and the world? Pope Francis, the Dalai Lama, and many other spiritual leaders can be heard to say again and again, "If you care about only one thing, it should be our environment."

People I deeply love voted for Donald Trump, not because they didn't understand he was a disingenuous snake-oil salesman but because, they reckoned, at least he mother, who now lives west of Fort Worth, is a self-proclaimed yellow dog Democrat. My father, who now lives north of Dallas, almost always votes for Republicans. I grew up understanding and respecting both parties' platforms and positions. I was taught that this duality of approach is what made our country strong. In my grandfather's vernacular, "the bedrock of democracy is loyal opposition." He would often say, "You run on your differences, but you govern from where you are united." I grew up believing that, by and large, Republicans were common-sense, practical, moral people. Democrats were progressive, forwardthinking folks. Both parties were full of good Americans.

But this last election, the only thing that mattered to certain members of my family was that Hillary lose. We never really debated the issues. It was more like we were arguing over sports teams. One said, "It's just in the Clintons' faces. They're so smug. Don't you see it? Entitled and supercilious! Obama too!" The way one family member spoke reminded me of the disparaging things I say about the way Steph Curry chews his mouth guard. Yet I realize that if Steph played for the Knicks, I would love his pacifier-gnawing cockiness.

My family and I could disagree heartily over the individuals running for president but rarely did we ever get into the real nitty-gritty social policies that the candidates would champion when elected. It wasn't until Charlottesville that the dinner table erupted. We were unanimous in finding our president's racist behavior nauseating and started talking about what to do about it. I asked my Green Beret brother to watch the New Orleans mayor's speech about why the statues must come down. My brother spoke sensitively and intelligently to my son and me about the difficulties in leading transgender troops into battle. We each heard one another and acknowledged that there were rational arguments on both sides.

Most people, regardless of religious background, can agree that "doing unto others as we would have them do unto us" is a sound principle in which to root our everyday behavior. Most of us want to be good stewards of the land. Most of us want sick children to get the medicine they need. So why do some members of my family seethe over the Affordable Care Act as if Obama was deliberately trying to cause them pain? Why does my mother simply overlook any Democrat's adultery, untruths, or other failings but when Republicans do the same, they are "so hypocritical"? Why did we as a nation have to watch Paul Rvan smirk and sneer at virtually anything Obama had to say? Why is "Resist!" now the left's uniting call to arms? When did our identity as Americans become superseded by our identity as watchers of Fox News or CNN? My brother, whom I otherwise greatly admire, savs he doesn't care if the Russians tampered with the election "as long as Hillary lost!" Why doesn't he see the danger in this way of thinking?

When I was a kid, House Speaker Tip O'Neill fought stridently with President Reagan but also openly admired him as a man of honor and good intentions. In the words of O'Neill's son, "While neither man embraced the other's worldview, each respected the other's right to hold it." I remember hearing prominent Republicans talk about what a fine Christian/husband/ father Jimmy Carter was. I remember all of us cheering George H.W. Bush as he tore off a piece of the Berlin Wall. That was a victory for freedom, democracy, and hope for the whole world - not just for America or just for the Republican Party.

I remember during a break on the set of First Reformed, with my black robes on, a priest's collar and a silver cross around my

neck, I looked at the news and saw Christian evangelicals laying hands on our president and praying with him. I wondered what exactly are they praying for? A wall? Lower taxes for the rich? Have they read the same New Testament I have read? I can still see the sentences printed in red and circled with a lead pencil in my great-grandmother's Bible:

A new command I give you: Love one another... Blessed are the merciful... As you wish that men would do to you, do so to them... For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and everyone who humbles himself will be exalted.

These men surrounding the president seemed to be advocating for laws that were in direct opposition to the teachings of the gospels. It doesn't make any sense to me. What does make sense immediately, is why our forefathers thought the separation of church and state was so essential to the

foundation of lasting freedom. History has proven human beings cannot be trusted not to turn any religious teaching, no matter how benevolent, to suit their own greed and often murderous personal goals. Clearly in governance, we must rely on the law. That way, our faith can be our own.

Before he died, my grandfather asked me, "When did we start calling ourselves 'capitalists'? We are a democracy. We are the great democratic experiment. And that means equality for all under the rule of law, politi-

cal freedom, and the separation of church and state. Those are the radical ideas that make this country special. At our best, we work for the common good, not just our own personal financial interests, and at a minimum, nobody gets to define God for anyone else. That's what freedom is all about. And this is a land of the free."

If what united his generation was World War II, maybe we too need a common enemy today. Sadly, we don't have to look far. Our whole planet is catching on fire. Every other melodrama is going to be surpassed, and then evaporate in the blinding heat. We need educated minds to step forward and start guiding the conversation away from the trivial and into substantive, meaningful goals for ourselves and our children.

Such leaders don't necessarily have to be elected officials. (That would be nice, but perhaps overly optimistic.) What is essential is that WE the people step forward as fathers and mothers, ministers and artists, teachers and soldiers, doctors, businesspeople, community leaders in whatever

BUDGET YOUR TIME It ain't all soccer and land use at City Council. Following Wednesday's amendment review and decision on Major League Soccer at McKalla Place (see p.16), members begin boning up on the FY 2019 budget proposal, along with overflow from the Aug. 9 session. Public comment is invited at the budget meeting Wednesday, Aug. 22 at 1pm; the next regular meeting is Aug. 23.

**EXPEDITE THE ADOPTION** The Planning Commission just can't quit CodeNEXT. During Tuesday's meeting, Vice Chair Fayez Kazi and Commissioner Conor Kenny proposed a resolution urging the city manager to move forward with a land use code overhaul and "expedite the adoption of more manageable portions of code revisions." A vote was postponed to PC's next meeting, Aug. 28.

MAKE RENT AFFORDABLE The Housing Authority will once again accept pre-applications for the Housing Choice Voucher Program waitlist, formerly known as Section 8. It's been four years since the list was last opened - in 2014, the city accepted 2,500 of the 20,000 applications it received. This year, 2,000 applications will be randomly selected. The list reopens at noon, Sept. 17. and closes at midnight on Sept. 25. Applications are free and can be found at www.HACAapply.org.

**GUTTING OUR DAILY** As expected after GateHouse Media purchased the paper earlier this year, the Austin American-Statesman last Friday offered buyouts to its more than 200 employees. The paper will also end production of its award-winning Spanish-language paper Ahora Sí by Oct. 11.

HUTTO'S SECOND LIFE? Immigration advocates are "outraged, but not surprised" that **U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement** has issued a Request for Information for a 500-bed detention facility near Austin, a likely attempt to keep open the **T. Don Hutto** detention center in Taylor. Williamson County Commissioners voted in June to end that county's contract with T. Don Hutto, giving ICE until next January to figure out a Plan B. This may be that plan.

**GO GRADE YOURSELVES** The state of Texas won't adequately fund public schools, but it will grade them like a middle school teacher. The Texas Education Agency posted a "B" overall for Austin ISD, but cited five schools for failing to meet standards, including Mendez Middle School for the fifth time. ## What You Say, and How You Say It

#### BALLOT LANGUAGE ARGUMENT IS A SNAPSHOT OF POLARIZED AUSTIN POLITICS

Last Thursday morning, City Council agreed to adjourn by midnight - and eventually did so Friday morning, at 12:44am. That provides some flavor of the proceedings, and

portends some of the 113 agenda Items that didn't quite get addressed on Thursday night. Although it might seem so, city business is not all soccer and CodeNEVER.

Most of the meeting's latenight conversation concerned November ballot language, specifically of the proposed language for an "efficiency audit" of all city operations, directed to the

ballot by petition. Petition campaigners prefer that language be as simple as possible, e.g., require "a comprehensive, independent, third-party audit of all city operations and budget," while City Hall wants more explanation: that there is already a city auditor and auditing department, that outside audits cost real money, and even that the city's financial information is voluminously available online.

> The final language will land somewhere on that spectrum, although it will take a state Supreme Court ruling to get there. Council adopted language that includes reference to the existing audit system and the potential cost (\$1million-\$5 million), and the campaigners denounced it as "political advertising" and has already

to sue. Attorney Bill Aleshire (on behalf of "relator" Ed English), seeking speed, went directly to the Supremes, and they've accepted an expedited review.

Aleshire called the ballot language "prejudicial and misleading," though he's not above attempting to mislead the court himself, citing the city attorney's "no fiscal note" as evidence the Council is fudging the cost of an audit. Aleshire knows (or should know) that the fiscal note refers to the cost of listing "Proposition K" on an already existing ballot, not to any eventual audit itself.

#### The Deeper Debate

City lawyers must respond to the filing this week, so perhaps by the time you read this, the court will have issued a ruling and sent Council back for a rewrite. As I wrote last week ("Strange Bedfellows, Stranger Politics," Aug. 10), the curious political aspect of this "audit" campaign is the alliance of convenience between hard-right Republicans (some unidentified) and a handful of Austin "progressives" - Fred Lewis, Bill Bunch, Nelson Linder - who have long since decided that since they can't effectively fight our state GOP over-

seers, they'll do what they can to transfer incendiary state politics to City Hall. Some of that polarizing argument was evident at Council Thursday night, when Travis County GOP Chair Matt Mackowiak denounced Council's language as "absurd," while Democratic consultant Dave Butts described the petition campaign as a "spear aimed at the city of Austin by a group of extreme conservatives who are out to undermine this city."

I've written periodically about my distrust of government by petition, because it sidesteps the necessary public policy vetting and relies on street-corner publicity campaigns at least as misleading as the language now under dispute. In the present instance, I was approached like many others by earnest petitioners asking, "Do you want to save the taxpayers' money?," a question that presumably even the GOP's Supreme Court would consider leading.

Buried in Aleshire's exhibits is a standard Republican list of "efficiencies": e.g., "private/public partnership initiatives, and monetization of unused or underutilized city assets." Should the voters be hoodwinked into approving the audit, we'll then be treated to a menu of undemocratic shell games: privatize our publicly owned utilities, undermine employee benefits, run the government "like a business" – i.e., prioritize tax cuts over representative government.

A defiant Butts told Council that whatever the final ballot language - and however much "dark money" is poured into the campaign - "We'll defeat it either way."

#### **Priority Matters**

The audit argument is not the only one that might be decided in court - the anti-CodeNEXT folks didn't like that proposed ballot language either, and Lewis said he'll likely sue for a different version. That's also a mug's game, since it's almost impossible to tell from their actual petition exactly how long they would prefer to wait before a public vote on a comprehensive land use code revision (in the works now since 2012). If being honest about their elastic "waiting period," they would probably choose something along the lines of, "Do not revise the land use code until we elect a mayor and Council that does only what we want them to do."

Although nobody was saying this out loud, one subtext of these arguments is the mayoral campaign, with Laura Morrison's more vocal supporters - prominent among the anti-CodeNEXT crowd - strategizing various ways of wounding incumbent Steve Adler before the campaign gets fully up to speed over the next couple of months. Officially, CodeNEXT is dead until City Manager Spencer Cronk proposes another revision process, but that impasse, now accompanied by the audit issue – and likely the soccer vote - will take their places as contentious matters to fuel November politics.

And while you ponder this electoral kindling - plan to vote for the affordable housing bonds, which could actually help make Austin a more livable city.

### **Major League**

#### PUSHED BY MAYOR. CITY COUNCIL TAKES THE LEAP

It's been a trying week on the local government front, as City Council griped their way through a number of contentious meetings, clearing the decks for next week's budget deliberations. The rancor perhaps peaked last Thursday as Council set a November ballot that's shaping up as far more contentious and muddled than it ought to be, then dove into a series of amendments to the term sheet for the McKalla Place soccer stadium. Council members fought over the ballot language for two citizen referendums and indeed, the wording is now being disputed in court (see "Point Austin," left) - and even over setting charter amendments. These are essentially nonsubstantial and

noncontroversial, but they don't include any of the more substantial proposals recommended by the citizens' Charter Review Commission notably an election finance reform plan, but also an independent Ethics Review Commission and budget officer, limits on referendum and recall petitions, moving the city attorney to directly under City Council instead of the

city manager, and more. Instead, in what seems like a deliberate rejection of the task force, these will now be forestalled for two years – the minimum time allowed between charter election dates.

Then came the soccer stadium debate, and if that seemed every bit as contentious. at least it appears to be settled, for now. What struck me the most about these negotiations all along is how determined Mayor Steve Adler was to get this deal done, sometimes seemingly at all costs. That peaked last Thursday night as well, when hizzoner snapped at his colleagues, as it became clear that the sheer number of amendments

being offered made approval that night impossible: "I'm ready to vote no on all the amendments, too [sight unseen]. That would also get us done." Yes, that is our mayor, saying he'd be willing to leave millions of dollars on the table in this negotiation - concessions that Precourt Sports Ventures had already agreed to – in order to get this discussion over with, and this deal done. And, okay, we all say things we don't really mean in the heat of the moment. But this was a fairly steady refrain from the mayor, who often seemed to be negotiating publicly for Precourt and against the interests of the city, and of Capital Metro. When CM Delia Garza first presented amendments to add additional

payments from Precourt to Cap Metro, for example, the mayor's first reaction was to highlight Precourt spokesman Richard Suttle's claim that his side had already given every bit that it could. But despite those denials, it seemed likely that Precourt still had a lot of room to give and indeed, they had agreed to those amendments, and quite a few more, before Coun-

cil gave the final okay on Wednesday for staff to "negotiate and execute" the agreement.

But perhaps that's all water under the bridge now. And even if we didn't perhaps bargain as hard as we might have been able to, it's exciting to have that step out of the way, and to be on our way toward a Major League Soccer team. Full speed ahead. П

They'll also be doing a live build of a house kit over the course of the weekend, with the completed home to be donated to Community First! Village, an East Austin community providing housing and support for the disabled and chronically homeless. They'll even have a tiny dental office, as **Nomad Dental** brings their dental office on wheels, and will be taking appointments.

The industry part starts Thursday, Aug. 23, with the trade show open Fri., 12:30-6pm; Sat., 10am-6pm; Sun., 10am-5pm, at Travis County Expo Center, 7311 Decker. Tickets are \$25 at www.tinyhousejamboree. com, \$30 at the door.



The controversy spilled over into a recent Hispanic/Latino Quality of Life Resource Advisory Commission meeting when Jill Ramirez, one of Coleman's alleged targets, didn't support a proposal to recommend a new employee at the sparsely staffed Equity Office, saying she has a "problem" with the office right now, in reference to the complaint. City spokesperson David Green tells us the investigation will likely be complete this week. The Equity Office refrained from commenting on the complaint.

On the other end, the NAACP describes the investigation into Oaks and Coleman, both African-American, as tantamount to harassment. "You don't just do an investigation because someone files a complaint," said President Nelson Linder. During an Aug. 9 press conference at City Hall, Linder announced the group would conduct its own investigation into the city's discrimination against black employees, citing the departure of black leaders including previous City Manager Marc Ott and Code's Carl Smart, and CM Spencer Cronk's plan to reconfigure his executive team, which currently only has one black employee, Mark Washington, who's leaving for a city manager position in Grand Rapids, Mich. Linder also said he's heard several complaints from black employees alleging discrimination in departments such as code enforcement and the city manager's office, "We're still getting complaints from people who work here that have not been addressed by anyone with the city of Austin," he said.

#### **PROBATION FAILING YOUNG OFFENDERS**

The **Texas Criminal** Justice Coalition, a research and advocacy organization on CJ reform, has just issued a report on the use of probation for youthful offenders in Texas. "Young Adults and



Community Supervision: The Need for a Developmentally Appropriate Approach to Probation," by Joshua Cuddy, Doug Smith, and Lindsey Linder. reports that "young adults placed on adult probation for felony offenses are far more likely to be revoked and sent to prison than older adults." TCJC's statistical review reflects that in 2017, only 18% of 17-21 year olds successfully completed felony probation, while for older groups (i.e., those over 25), more than 60% emerged from probation without reoffending (or violating parole) and being returned to prison.

The report notes that recent brain research has demonstrated that the brains of young people - specifically, the prefrontal cortex - continue developing into their 20s, and until that happens, they struggle with "judgment, impulse control, and organized planning," and are more readily subject to peer pressure. The authors argue that juvenile probation procedures (currently ended in Texas at 17) should continue as late as age 25, and more specifically that "the most effective approach for reducing criminal justice system involvement among young adults is one that integrates community-based strategies." The report makes a series of recommendations that the authors say would reduce recidivism, improve individual outcomes, save state funding, and "dramatically reduce rates of re-arrest

and revocation and improve outcomes for this important demographic."

The report is the first of four in a series TCJC calls "One Size Fails All," and will be followed by others addressing probation policy recommendations for "people with substance use and mental health issues, the LGBTQ community, and people without stable housing supports." - Michael King

#### **LATINO CIVIL RIGHTS GROUP CUTS TIES WITH SOUTHWEST KEY**

Following continued allegations of abuse and mistreatment at Southwest Key's migrant youth shelters, the nation's largest Latino civil rights and advocacy group has severed ties with the nonprofit. In a statement issued Monday, Aug. 13, UnidosUS (formerly the **National Council of La Raza**) writes that three days prior, its executive committee board of directors voted unanimously to suspend SWKey as a member of the UnidosUS Affiliate Network, which includes nearly 300 member organizations. As a result, SWKey programs are no longer eligible for UnidosUS funding or other affiliate benefits. While the statement did not specify how much the local nonprofit would be losing out on, UnidosUS tells us the group has awarded SWKey some \$250,000 in grants over the past decade for education, workforce development, and housing.

The group says SWKey "failed to convey that it understands the gravity and magnitude of the situation, it has failed to offer any words of apology or condolence to the victims, or give a sense that the organization is taking any new measures to address completely unacceptable behaviors and practices." Locally, an immigrant rights activist coalition has urged businesses, as well as the city and county, to sever ties with the nonprofit.

### Throwin' Shade

#### CITY COUNCIL. HOTTER THAN AN AUGUST SUN

City Council members went into last weekend already in need of a break from one another, even with just one regular meeting under their belt following the fiveweek summer recess. It wasn't the length of Thursday's 10-and-a-half-hour meeting that necessitated the breather but rather the frustration built from two opposing wings of the dais grappling over the question of whether to ink a deal with **Precourt Sports** Ventures to bring Major League Soccer to Austin. The heated nature of the discussion - specifically, whether Council Members Leslie Pool, Alison Alter, and others were trying to drown the deal in "poison pill" amendments, as Mayor Steve Adler had suggested – as well as the sheer number of

amendments being proposed, led to the item's postponement until Wednesday morning (see below).

But members clearly weren't taking respite during the weekend, which happened to coincide with the Austin Pride festival and parade. On Saturday afternoon, Pool took to Facebook to declare, "It's frustrating trying to engage a debate on concrete issues like financial returns when your debate opponent defaults to intangible appeals, e.g., 'doing this will bring people together.' I'm debating costs and he's debating emotions. That's not a recipe for agreement or understanding.'

Pool's words appeared to some a thinly veiled swipe at Adler, who has advocated for MLS in Austin as a matter of public good. The mayor declared on Thursday night that he was ready to vote down all the proposed amendments and scolded his colleagues for what he viewed as attempts to indirectly derail the process rather than simply vote against the final measure. But the posting clearly irked Jimmy Flannigan, one of the mayor's allies on the issue, who stepped aside from his preparations for the parade to respond in kind: "It's frustrating trying to engage a debate on concrete issues like financial returns when your debate opponent defaults to intangible appeals, e.g., 'doing this will change the character of the neighborhood," his post reads. "I'm debating costs and they're debating emotions. That's not a recipe for agreement or understanding."

Pool, who was up in Columbus, Ohio, on Monday and Tuesday looking into "what the actual impacts are on the families who have built their lives around soccer in this town," she told The Columbus Dispatch, declined to comment on the weekend backand-forth, but Flannigan was happy to talk. "It's fair to say that in the middle of the Pride festival and the parade, I was ready to throw some shade," he joked. He said he found it interesting that Pool would make such an argument, because he regularly has disagreements with her when it comes to land use, and in those cases he finds her to be far more focused on qualitative issues like preservation of neighborhood character. "It's very refreshing to see Council Member Pool desire in conversations a focus on financial outcomes," Flannigan said. "It's something I have been asking for when it comes to land use, and I haven't felt she was on the same page when it came to those situations."

The two spent the previous half-year seated next to each other during meetings, which made for some snippy interjections, but now find themselves on opposite ends of the dais. Maybe that's for the best.

#### **CHARTER AMENDMENTS PASS**

With little fanfare, Council last week also approved a pair of charter amendments for voters to consider in November. One has to do with nonsubstantive cleanups of the charter language itself for obsolete language, and the other fixes the hang-up keeping Council from removing Planning commissioners before the end of their two-year terms. That leaves off the table a substantial amount of work from the Charter Review Commission, tasked with recommending these changes to Council, which recommended (among other things) a "democracy dollars" program that would go toward funding candidates who are running in municipal races. It's obviously expensive to run for office, and this could make that dynamic more equitable.

#### **LOOKING AHEAD**

There's no meeting this week, and the final agenda isn't yet set for Council's next regular meeting, Thursday, Aug. 23, but we know at least that the overhaul of the city's 380 Agreements (which govern economic incentive programs) will make an appearance. Members pored over the details last Thursday, but were unable to reach a final decision before the looming soccer testimony drove them away from the topic. Add to that the city manager's recommendations on density bonus programs within adopted small area plans, a hefty slate of zoning cases, and a return of Capital Metro's quarter-cent funding, and we're looking at another fun one. - Nina Hernandez

### "Now, We Play Soccer"

City Council has voted 7-4 to direct City Manager Spencer Cronk to finalize and sign an agreement with Precourt **Sports Ventures** that should result in Austin landing its own Major League Soccer team, to play in a stadium at McKalla **Place**. At a special called meeting on Wednesday, members spent nearly five hours debating many, but not all, of the 28 proposed amendments to the term sheet between the city and PSV. CMs Leslie Pool, Ora Houston, Ellen Troxclair, and Alison Alter voted against the proposal.

An at-times-exasperated Mayor Steve Adler steered the meeting through a few lengthy tangents. At one point, he said, "It's beginning to feel like we're going to try to talk this thing or amendment it to death." Some of the tangents included a change to an agreed-upon amendment from Delia Garza to provide \$3 million in funding to Capital Metro over a 15-year period. Garza wanted to add a financial penalty aimed at ensuring PSV would fulfill the obligation, but she withdrew that effort when her colleagues agreed that failure to pay would put PSV in violation of the lease. As with any breach of the lease, the city would have the power to evict PSV from their \$200 million stadium, a threat that would presumably keep PSV in line. Regardless, Alter pushed the city's negotiating team to establish "clear penalties that happen along the way to eviction" in the final agreement.

Council members also spent about an hour discussing how ancillary development at the McKalla site would be handled. Mayor Pro Tem Kathie Tovo proposed amending the term sheet A stadium much like this, coming to McKalla Place

to give the city sole authority over what kind of ancillary projects could be undertaken on the land not used for stadium purposes, but that was eventually modified to make any future development at McKalla subject to mutual agreement between the city and PSV. A lengthy debate on whether or not the site is a wetland also caused the discussion to drag on. City staff doesn't think any wetland protections are necessary, but the **U.S. Army Corps of Engineers** have indicated they may disagree. If they declare the site a protected wetland, PSV would have to follow federal law by preserving and protecting any sensitive environmental features on the site. An amendment from Tovo to quickly reach a determination on whether or not those protections will be needed passed.

Provisions limiting PSV's ability to brand public infrastructure with signage, and increasing the sustainability standards PSV would be required to meet, failed. Some of the potentially dealbreaking amendments (given PSV's increased financial investment from the original term sheet) also failed: One from Troxclair to raise PSV's rent payments to over \$950,000, along with another from Alter that would cap the amount of environmental remediation costs incurred by the city (should any arise) at \$500,000, were unsuccessful. However, amendments from Tovo pushing PSV to achieve a gold LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) standard, asking PSV to outline a plan for how they would utilize local vendors at the site at least six months before the stadium opens, and preventing PSV from claiming any grandfather rights in the land use code



After the vote, the MLS2ATX crowd burst into applause, and the PSV side was visibly enthused. On the way out of Council chambers, Precourt's Austin-based consultant Richard Suttle summed up the feeling of every MLS fan in the city: "Now, we

But first, PSV must begin the real work of moving the team to Austin: paying architects to flesh out the stadium design and engineers to begin constructing it; identifying a training facility and temporary playing field for the 2019 season; and other particulars that have been put on hold pending a final decision from Council. As one PSV rep put it, now that the city has made a decision, Anthony Precourt can turn on the "financial faucet" that will fund the Columbus Crew's relocation to Austin. - Austin Sanders

#### CENTRAL HEALTH LAYS OUT ITS FY 2019 BUDGET

Raise your hand if you know what **Central** Health is. It's OK; you're not alone. Polling shows that most folks in Travis County are unfamiliar with their voter-created health care district. But if you're a property owner, you may be familiar with the "hospital district" line item on your most recent tax bill. That 10.7385-cent assessment, which generates more than 90% of Central Health's annual budget of around \$200 million, pays for a lot of health care services for our lowerincome neighbors, as well as helping float an insurance plan, bringing the Dell Medical School to life, and catalyzing property development both Downtown and on the far Eastside.

In recent years, particu-**CENTRAL HEALTH** larly last year, the Central DOESN'T HAVE A Health budget process has **HUGE AMOUNT OF** become more newsy. Among other things, the district's MONEY THAT ISN'T funding of Dell Med was BEING SPENT ON challenged (by the omnipresent **Fred Lewis** and his DIRECT SERVICES. posse), although voters in

2012 approved a Central Health tax hike for this express purpose. This begat an audit and performance review and heightened scrutiny by the **Travis** Commissioners Court, which must approve the budget despite Central Health not being a county department.

Between Dell Med, the bumpy road to redevelopment of the old Brackenridge Hospital campus, the signs of fragility at Sendero Health Plans, the loud demand for clinics and services in the Eastern Crescent, and the complicated structure and shortand long-term financial position of the entire Central Health "enterprise," people who hadn't been paying attention now have questions they'd like answered. The district's new 2019 budget proposal may help:

• Where does all that money go? Mostly to pay for health care for more than 101,000 Travis County residents, of whom 75% are below the federal poverty line. Most of that money - about two-thirds of the entire Central Health budget - is basically nondiscretionary; some of it is matching money for federal funds.

Central Health doesn't provide services directly; instead, it's a partner in the Community Care Collaborative (CCC) with Seton, which manages the money, contracts with providers, and pursues efficiency, best


> practices, better patient outcomes, and so forth. The largest of those providers is CommUnityCare (not the same thing), which like the CCC and Sendero is part of the Central Health "enterprise."

For civilians, the important fact is that Central Health doesn't have a huge amount

of money that isn't being spent on direct services. Some would like all the money to be so spent - the crux of Lewis' legal crusade and a tenet of advocates like Central Health board member Cynthia Valadez, who at the board's latest budget presentation last week said that "our primary reason for existing is to serve MAP patients," referring to Central Health's benefit plan for the lowest-income people it serves. "We need to look at aligning our budget to serve that population and its needs. We need to have serious conversations about what we're supposed to be doing."

 What is Dell Med doing with our money? Despite the 2012 public vote enabling it, the CCC's \$35 million annual contribution to

Central Health's anticipated cash flow projection for the next fiscal year. The provider operates on an annual budget of about \$200 million, but expects to fall into the negative this fall before tax revenues kick in.

Dell Med is a flashpoint for Central Health critics. They begrudge the perceived lack of transparency, deviation from Central Health's core mission as expressed by Valadez, and/or the fact that our local taxpayers have to support a marquee program at one of the wealthiest universities in the nation and one that Valadez described as "a historically racist institution."

In response, the medical school has amped up its PR game to tout its progress, brought on a new director of local affairs (Foundation Communities vet Elizabeth Colvin), and highlighted how the \$35 million is being allocated toward services that safety-net patients can use. "This year is a pivot point for Dell Med," Colvin told the Central Health board. "Previously, we'd been focused on creating infrastructure, recruiting, developing models, and now we can use that work to bring innovative services that benefit people in Austin. ... You can see that our

allocation is shifting to focus on clinical services that provide benefits to MAP patients and others in the community."

• Is Sendero going to make it? The decision to meet the needs of more county residents by providing low-cost, nonprofit health insurance, though ambitious and altruistic, was never without risk. Despite seeing 50% growth in the first years of the Obamacare exchange, when its IdealCare plans were the lowest-cost in Travis, Sendero abruptly exited the market for Medicaid managed care and Children's Health Insurance Program plans earlier this year. Sendero required a midyear investment of \$26 million, and the FY 2019 budget calls for an additional \$20 million, which raised eyebrows among board members before they discussed Sendero in executive session.

"That's a lot of money," said Travis County Judge Sarah Eckhardt. "I do have concerns. That's a lot of money. I'm concerned that the

• District 8 candidate Bobby Levinski has come out strong against **Proposition K**, the November ballot item calling for an "efficiency audit" of the city, calling it "nothing more than a fishing expedition linked to radical Austin-bashing organizations, like the [Texas Public Policy Foundation], who oppose local control on many health, safety and environmental issues." In an Aug. 14 statement, Levinski points to ultra-conservative forces connected to audit idea creators the Citizens for an Accountable Austin PAC, including TPPF, who are leading the fight against Council's paid sick leave ordinance. As the Chronicle reported last week, the PAC's treasurer and spokesman. Michael Searle, was formerly chief of staff to outgoing D8 CM Ellen Troxclair, and initial estimates show the city would have to shell out up to \$4 million on the undertaking. "We get it, TPPF. You don't like local government," Levinksi continued. "But, quite frankly, I like having free libraries where our children can learn to read, and I like having a police force that isn't run by Halliburton."



• UT student Isiah Jones has filed to run for Kathie Tovo's District 9 City Council seat. Jones, 21, describes himself as a **Democratic** Socialist, and believes the central district needs the perspective of a young person to represent its sizable student population. Although he intends to focus on student voters, he said that, if elected, he would "obviously" represent the whole district. He said making sure the Austin Police

**Department** is "unable to investigate itself" regarding allegations of officer misconduct would be a top priority, and listed taking a stand against conservative state leaders to protect **LGBTQ rights** ("mostly through legal battles"), and "fixing I-35" as other top goals. Jones was short on specifics for how to achieve those goals. But he is only a junior. Those concepts aren't taught until senior vear. - Austin Sanders



- District 1 may have yet another candidate vying to replace outgoing Council Member Ora Houston. Recent Oxford University graduate Mitrah Avini, an Austin native raised in the University Hills neighborhood, is currently petitioning to get her name onto the ballot, which aspiring candidates can pursue in lieu of the \$500 filing fee. Avini filed a campaign treasurer appointment on Aug. 10, but would prefer to secure enough signatures before speaking about her candidacy, though she does describe herself as "a product of east and central Austin schools," having been a student at Lee Elementary and Kealing. Before earning her master's at Oxford, she graduated from Yale in 2012. - Nina Hernandez
- Austin ISD Trustee **Ted Gordon** has again filed to run for District 1. C.H.

return on investment is not defensible, and that trajectory doesn't seem to show any sign of changing." Eckhardt noted that Sendero's own figures in the budget indicate that "members have saved approximately \$34 million" - that is, less than Central Health has paid in just in the last two years.

"I don't believe there is incompetent money managing," Eckhardt continued. "I can't express enough how well intentioned it was, but it's a pilot that didn't pan out, and the respective boards at Central Health and Sendero are having a hell of a time bringing it to the end of its life."

• What's going to happen to Brackenridge and in the Eastern Crescent? After developing a master plan for Brack's 14.3-acre campus and beginning negotiations with a master developer (Wexford Science & Technology), Central Health's board changed course and agreed to quickly lease out two of the six Brackenridge blocks. The district says the master plan is still in place, but it's feeling the pain of losing the \$32 million annual lease income it got from Seton when it was operating Brackenridge. The FY 2019 proposal assumes \$18.2 million in lease revenue, offsetting the \$6.2 million anticipated cost of demolishing the tower and other buildings on those two blocks.

As for the Eastern Crescent, the new budget proposes issuing \$23 million in debt to pay for the facilities residents have loudly advocated for since the district's founding. Whether that means building new clinics,

repurposing old ones, expanding the successful mobile clinic program, or all of the above remains to be seen. "We're looking at how to get services on the ground as quickly as possible," Central Health CFO Jeff Knobel told the board.

· Does Central Health have enough money to pay for all this? Knobel showed the board eye-opening charts of the district's anticipated cash flow in FY 2019 - going negative this fall, before the tax revenues come in, likely requiring the district to issue the government IOUs called tax anticipation notes - and the parlous state of its reserves going forward. While the budget was developed assuming a 4.5% increase in the effective tax rate (about \$11/month for the average Austin homeowner), the district gave strong signals it would end up at a 6% increase and continue at that rate well into the future to replenish its reserves.

"It does not shock me that they have to go to 6% year over year," said Eckhardt, who along with her colleagues needs to approve that tax rate. "It was probable they were going to have to build their budget around built-in tax increases. We still have a historically low tax rate for a major metropolitan hospital district in Texas." (This is true, by a substantial margin.) "They were going to have to build in tax increases at some point in order to be a real health care district in a major metro area."

### The Champion of Camelback?

#### JONATHAN COON PURSUES A COMPLEX PROJECT NEAR THE PENNYBACKER BRIDGE

get amended.

That's one lesson from the seemingly endless arguments over the Champion tracts, northwest Austin parcels zoned, grandfathered, and rezoned over the last three decades. In February, over bitter opposition from some neighbors, City Council approved the latest rezoning of Champion Tract 3, a triangular, 45-acre piece of land at the intersection of RM 2222 and City Park Road. It now appears the tract will be returning to the dais, at least indirectly - through its potential connection to the Camelback property, a bit south and west of Champion Tract 3. The Camelback land (named after a hill on the property) is a 145-acre tract that fronts on Lake Austin, and owner/developer Jonathan Coon has proposed a planned unit development there that would include his own home, residential home sites, a boutique hotel, commercial office space, a private park open to the public, and a restaurant above the lake.

In February, Coon also purchased an option to buy Champion Tract 3 from its current owners - Houstonbased Slate Real Estate Partners - and initially tied the closing of that purchase to quick city approval of his

plans for the Camelback PUD. The \$1 million option - if not extended - expires Sept. 1, and city staff said last week that the approval process will not be completed by that date. Coon told me that he is seeking an extension until at least Oct. 1, and his representatives reiterated that "time is very short and the city staff will need to complete its review expeditiously in order for the community's preferred outcome for both tracts to occur."

Slate's approved project for the tract is a 325-unit apartment project; Coon says he will instead build a much smaller senior living center, while compensating for the lost value on that land by increasing the amount of commercial office space in the Camelback PUD. But the two projects are

Old zoning cases never die. They just not officially connected - Coon says that if the option expires or otherwise falls through, he will proceed with his Camelback plans as originally conceived. He's done personal outreach to the surrounding neighborhood associations, and thus far has received enthusiastic support from seven surrounding NAs and HOAs - Greenshores, Monte Vista, River Place, Shepherd Mountain, et al. - as well as from the Lake Austin **Collective** (which fiercely opposed the Slate project), and even the Austin Neighborhoods Council executive committee.

The Westminster Glen HOA endorsement letter, for example, praises Coon's community outreach and his Camelback plan to address public, environmental, and traffic considerations - citing the plan's "respect for our environmental and zoning laws" - but it is also one of several letters written under the impression that the tract will be part of the amended PUD. That incorporation is in fact not an aspect of the PUD application to the city.

The strongest opposition to Coon's plan comes from across Lake Austin, along the south shore - most specifically, from longtime landowners Bill and Christie Nalle and the Bunny Run NA. They argue that the proposed

development is "too big and too dense" for the wooded cliffside area, that it will increase traffic on City Park Road even more than the embattled Slate project - in part because the PUD includes an extension of Bridge Point Parkway through Camelback - and that Coon's list of requested variances will result in a development worse than that allowed under the existing 1986 ordinances, which anticipate 64 home sites. BRNA President Lyra Bemis said southside residents would like to see the site remain "mostly residential and natural," and says of the proposed restaurant, "We don't need another Oasis."

Most vividly, the Nalles object to Coon's proposal to build boat docks along the shoreline - they describe it as a "commer-

cial marina" - and his working conception of a 200-foot elevator to lift boat-arriving customers to a clifftop restaurant. Christie Nalle said the increased boat traffic will add danger to a difficult bend in the lake, especially at night - including the prospect of "drunk customers" crashing into the docks - and that despite Coon's assurances of environmental care, "We are all concerned about what his development is going to do to the land. ... Don't turn something beautiful into something that's ugly.'

Forty acres of the southside shoreline are owned by the Hill Country Conservancy the Nalle Bunny Run Wildlife Preserve, on land donated by the Nalles in honor of Bill's mother. The Conservancy does not take positions on proposed projects, but CEO George Cofer said the HCC is monitoring the Camelback process. "We pay close attention to what goes on around us in terms of the impact on habitat," Cofer said - "dark skies, and so on, and in this instance ... lake traffic. The number of boats on Lake Austin has increased so dramatically over the recent years, that we're looking at significant loss of shoreline at the Preserve."

Coon says he has consistently responded to the neighbors' environmental concerns by adjusting the plans (to reduce light and noise pollution, and protect heritage trees), that there is no "marina," and that the additional boat traffic will be negligible. He said the docks, for example, had been moved farther away from the iconic Pennybacker Bridge in part because of residents' concern over their environmental impact - and says he's asked the Nalles for similar constructive collaboration, which they've declined. "It seems they just don't want to see a boat dock opposite their boat dock."

Coon says that he is continuing to amend the plans in response to city Planning and Zoning staff recommendations, still in progress, and the proposal then will need to move through both the Environmental and Zoning and Platting Commissions before it arrives at Council. A spokesperson for Council Member Alison Alter (both tracts are in her District 10) said she is waiting for that staff process to conclude before she adopts a position on the "final proposal."

Coon says he's not certain what the Nalles might mean by a "beautiful" project. "If [their] definition of beautiful is nothing built there," Coon said, "that's just not - Michael King possible."

### Austin ISD: "I Got an 89"

The **Austin Independent School District** received a "B" letter grade from the Texas Education Agency in a report released Wednesday for a new "A-F" school rating system passed by the Legislature last year. Following pushback from school leaders, state lawmakers delayed implementation of letter grades for individual campuses until 2019, although each campus did receive a numerical grade. Five AISD campuses received failing grades, one more than last year.

The letter grade for each district is based on three metrics: "student achievement," which consists of scores on standardized tests, graduation rates, and other post-high school readiness indicators; "school progress," which looks at how a district's students have improved in STAAR results and how economically disadvantaged students perform academically relative to other districts with similar socioeconomic populations; and on a district's ability to "close the gaps," which measures

student performance based on racial and ethnic grouping, economic status, and other factors that could impact a student's learning ability. The metric with a better score underneath the student achievement and school progress categories accounts for 70% of the district's grade, while the "closing the gap" score accounts for 30% of the overall grade.

AISD's overall score was 89%, with an 87% in student achievement, 87% in student progress, and 88% in closing the gaps. Districts that receive "F" ratings (or the equivalent under previous ratings systems) in consecutive years could face intervention or sanction from the state's education agency. TEA Commissioner Mike Morath said the A-F system will not see any major changes over the next five years, so that districts and communities can assess accurately how grades change over that period. I met Beto O'Rourke after hearing him speak at a fundraising event for Texans in Manhattan. The room was hypnotized. Everyone had been instantly impressed. It felt a little like meeting a 2018 Jimmy Stewart. Tall, humble, sincere, and funny, he seems like a person who can do something significant. I asked him for an interview with the Chronicle. He said yes. It turned out to be a hard interview to nail down, as he is a seriously busy congressman currently campaigning for a seat in the U.S. Senate. I finally caught up with him on August 4. It was blazing hot in Brooklyn, but I'm sure it was hotter in Del Rio, Texas. He spoke to me by phone as his kids played in the Holiday Inn pool. – Ethan Hawke

Ethan Hawke: I heard you played with Willie Nelson at his Fourth of July picnic.

Beto O'Rourke: "Played" is an exaggeration. I got onstage with him for a couple songs. Fumbled my way through "Roll Me Up and Smoke Me When I Die."

EH: My first concert was Willie's Fourth of July picnic in 1976. My dad and I drove from Fort Worth to Austin in a Plymouth Barracuda. I was 6 years old.

**BO:** That's how you spent the bicentennial! **EH:** I've been following Willie ever since. I went to a Willie Nelson concert here in New York right during the bombing of Baghdad. Bush was president and the newly past president, Bill Clinton, introduced Willie. It was one of the stranger political experiences of my life because half the audience was cheering wildly, ecstatic to see Clinton, and the other half wanted to take this opportunity to let him know how much they hated him. Seriously, the place practically exploded. Two guys in front of me, grown men, had a full-blown fistfight. But Clinton calmed it down.

what contentious, and during elections to some degree it's zero-sum. This one person is going to win, and the other person is going to lose. But I do think there's a way to be in public service and not push people out and instead welcome everyone in. ...

The way we are running this campaign, at least, we are trying to do that. We've been now to every one of the 254 Texas counties. We go to some of the reddest places on the planet - and this won't surprise you - but

Clinton said, "Look, I know some of you support me and I know some of you hate me, but don't we all love Willie Nelson?" And in that instant, the roof came off the place. And then Clinton said this smart thing, "See, we're all not as different as we think." We can all love "Blue Eyes Crying in the Rain." We are not as different as we are made to feel. I wonder what it would take for an individual in politics to bring us together. **BO:** People like Willie definitely can. People in politics - which by its nature, is somethey are just as kind and warm and welcoming as they are in the bluest places in Texas. In some cases it's clear they're not going to vote for me. I was in Paducah, Texas, and there were some folks out on the courthouse steps protesting my visit, but we invited them in to the town hall and said, "Hey, come in. We want to hear from you. You ask the first question and let's have a conversation."

Same thing in San Antonio, there were some folks who were kind of holding a

counter rally and we just invited them into our town hall, and at first some of the folks at our town hall were kind of booing them, and we said, "Hey, no, no, no. Let's have a conversation." And this one guy who had come to oppose me said, "I'm here because you're trying to take my guns away." And I said, "I'm not. I want universal background checks, which I think are reasonable, and on this issue of assault weapons, I don't think we should be selling more weapons of war, that are just designed to kill people, into our community, and you think differently than I do. And that's OK. We can agree to disagree on this one. But if you have an AR-15, keep it. I don't want to take anyone's guns away from them." So he came up to me after the town hall and he gave me his card and said, "Hey, let's keep the conversation going, because I think I've heard the worst about you but it sounds like you have a pretty reasonable position on this."

So I think if we don't write people off and we don't take them for granted, we're just going to do a whole lot better.

EH: My grandfather was [a] Tarrant County judge and a very serious Democrat, but more than a Democrat, he was a World War II veteran. And he always admired people like George H.W. Bush. And that whole "greatest generation" that's now leaving the planet, I feel like we are missing their leadership. I think as a generation they had their priority as Americans in line, and that what freedom means, what democracy means, is, when you get elected, you also have to represent the people who didn't vote for you.

BO: Yeah, especially in the World War II generation there was such a common understanding of sacrifice and service because every family served in some way. Either you went off to war or someone in your family did. Both JFK and Richard Nixon, who ran against each other in 1961, had served, and neither was going to question either one's patriotism or whether they were "American." Of course they were. There is something very polarizing and divisive [these days]. We are missing the ability to come together and say, "Hey, I really disagree with you on this point but you're not a bad person." ... I don't know how our generation is going to get that back. But if we don't, we'll lose this country.

Because the genius of this place is that, 240 years in, you can still come together in a peaceful way and choose the direction we're going to take. It is just becoming more contentious. It's getting harder to do that. The Congress and the government are as dysfunctional as they've ever been. I worry at some point people are just going to give up on this ... and that's my greatest fear.

EH: Me too. Sometimes it feels like we are witnessing a slow-moving coup.

BO: I told someone I was going to my 254th county visit to Gainesville in Cooke County and they said, Oh, that was Truman's last whistle-stop [on his presidential campaign]. Truman said [that] this country was not founded on fear, it was founded on courage, on imagination, and an unstoppable determination to do the job at hand.

That word "fear" is kind of the word of the hour. We are supposed to be afraid of Mexicans so we'll build this 2,000-mile wall, even though northbound apprehensions are at their lowest since '71, even though those we are apprehending are kids, and if they are lucky, kids with their moms, who are fleeing the most violent countries on the planet. And they are not evading, they are turning themselves in to Border Patrol. And even though immigrants commit crimes at a far lower rate, somehow, some part of this country has been seized by this very irrational fear. It's akin to the fear that would allow someone who promises to ban all Muslims from coming to this country to be elected president. That's crazy. We are not a fearful, small people. We are confident and strong and we understand that much of our strength comes from the fact that we are a people of the planet. ...

Sometimes I like to satisfy myself by thinking, "Oh, it's just this one person who happens to be in the White House," but it's not. There is a lot of America right now that, for whatever reason, is fearful. A wall is just an expression of fear. It doesn't make any sense at all. But I don't want to write anybody off, and if people are afraid, I want to understand what it is, and how we can meet that fear in a way that is in the best traditions of this country.

I do think that with these town halls and traveling all over the state, I've been able to listen and learn from people. Folks have said, "Look, I don't want to deport the Dreamers. And I'm not against immigrants. There just needs to be some order in how we do this!" ...

And I agree with that. I say, "Yeah, I'm with you. Let's figure out how we do this together." Or they say, "you fuckers have been talking about immigration reform for 30 years and nothing has happened. At least this guy has a plan - and a thing that he's going to do and we can get behind it." It could be an expression of fear, but it could also be an expression of frustration. Like, "I've given up on you guys. At least we're gonna build a wall. It's not perfect. It's not what I want, but it's something."

So, I think your anxiety and my anxiety about at some point just slow-rolling the



end of democracy is: If we can't get stuff done, then folks get much more open to proposals like these. They say, "Well, finally somebody is going to take action."

**EH:** The essence of what you are saying is that listening to each other is the start of the healing process. A new collection of Nelson Mandela's letters just came out, and it's amazing. He taught himself Afrikaans in jail so he could better understand where his prison guards were coming from. He never wrote anybody off. These are the guys who wanted his whole race under an apartheid regime. He took the time to read books in their language, to understand the way they were raised, what made them think that it was all right to do that to him. And by doing that, he woke them up and they saw his humanity and they then listened to his ideas. That made it possible. But it's not possible if we don't listen to each other.

BO: Yes, that's right. And it's frustrating, it's a really slow process to have a democracy. But it's the best thing we have going on the planet. We lose that ability to compromise and listen and understand each other at our peril. EH: What I love about Texas is that we have a lot of heavyweights in our history who left their imprint on America. As a fellow Texan, I'm wondering, do you hold any heroes close in your mind?

**BO:** I've got a lot of them! You were telling me about going to see Willie Nelson in '76 with your dad. I was born in '72 and my dad was county judge of El Paso from '82 to '86. He was just as independent as he could be and had an amazing joy in life and in being with people, which from my perspective as a kid was that he was always going to do the right thing and damn the consequences - political or otherwise. He was listening to Willie Nelson and having fun and drinking Coors in the backyard, and I have great memories of growing up and politics just being fun, and not being about who you were against and not being pissed off and angry and paranoid. It was about having fun, so he is for sure my hero.

El Paso has this long line of underdog heroes. There is this African-American doc-

tor, Lawrence Nixon, who couldn't practice medicine in East Texas where he was from, and moved to El Paso. ... Blacks could not vote, so he took this case all the way to the Supreme Court twice, and he won it. And El Paso became this outpost of civil rights over the next 50-60 years.

Thelma White was an 18-year-old woman who graduated from the all-black Douglass High School in El Paso in '54 and tried to enroll at Texas Western College. She was rejected [because of her] race. She hired on Thurgood Marshall and they took the case to the federal bench in Texas and ended up integrating higher education. And all that's related to Don Haskins in '66. He starts an all-black starting five that goes on to win the NCAA men's basketball championship, which is the only time Texas, to this day, has won an NCAA men's championship.

So there were all these great firsts that came out of El Paso regarding civil rights. It may be the fact that we are such a diverse global city. We are where Texas meets the rest of the world. There are 3 million of us

#### REASONS TO VOTE by John Leguizamo

We all can talk politics with friends at a bar and pontificate and wax grandiose political grand schemes, "If I were elected ...," or "If the world were perfect ...," or "All politicians are crooked ...."

But you know what? Your attitude is good but only half baked. Now you gotta do something about it. Run for office and change the status quo. Help someone get elected. Write to your senator and congressman, picket, call them, and bug them. But the most important weapon you have is your vote.

I know a lot of people think, "Oh, what's the use, it's all rigged. The man has it all fixed. They are gonna cheat the people somehow. Russians will just hack and my vote don't count." But it does. Your vote does count. Your vote might be the one they couldn't lose, or the one that couldn't be erased. Your vote might be the one that tips the election. Our last election was won in some places by as little as 100 votes. Your vote does count. Your vote will show up in census data and public polls to prove that you and your people with your ideology voted and need to be taken into account. Because

you and your people vote so you must be respected. Puerto Rico and its 3.5 million American citizens can't vote and don't have senators or congressmen with voting power. Vote because they can't.

Personally, I think the biggest reason you should vote is because the people who think Donald Trump is doing a great job, the people who want to take away our right to choose, the people who believe ordinary citizens should be able to own assault rifles and carry them around in public places, the people who deny climate change, the people who think creationism should be taught instead of evolution - those people do vote. They vote en masse. And they will vote again in November.

Here are some highlights from the 2018 Republican Party of Texas' platform: "We oppose all efforts to classify carbon dioxide as a pollutant. 'Climate change' is a political agenda promoted to control every aspect of our lives. We support the

... abolition of the Environmental Protection Agency, and repeal of the Endangered Species Act. We believe the Minimum Wage Act should be repealed. We oppose ... the federal Gun-Free

> School Zones Act of 1990. We oppose all efforts to validate transgender identity. We oppose the use of women in military combat units. We oppose homosexual marriage, regardless of state of origin. We urge the Legislature to rescind no-fault divorce laws and support covenant marriage." If you don't vote against them, you might as well be voting for them. And in the last presidential election, less than 43% of registered voters in Texas voted. Imagine if the other 57% showed up. Vote because they don't want you to show up. who just happen to be on both sides of an international border. And I think some really incredible things have come from that. ... **EH:** People say, with such a huge Hispanic population in Texas, why hasn't Texas gone the way of California? California is always blue and Texas is always red, and yet their populace is similar. What could get the Latino population out and voting and believing in the power of politics?

BO: OK, so here we are in Del Rio, and later I'll be in McAllen and Brownsville and then in Houston, which is the most diverse city in the country right now. And yet we don't punch our weight. We are 49th in voter turnout in the country. In many ways we have similar demographics to California but Texas also have some of the vestiges of being part of the Confederacy and the reconstruction that followed, and the Jim Crow laws. We are 49th in voter turnout in large part on purpose - [due to] the way that people have been drawn in and drawn out of congressional districts. ... They call it "packing and cracking," [the way they] distribute

African-American and Latino votes. They concentrate white votes enough to tip the scales. It is why ... a Latina has never occupied one of those congressional seats even though we are 41% Mexican-American. It's crazy.

As you know, I'm not running for my seat again and the woman most likely to succeed me in Congress is Veronica Escobar. She'll be the first Hispanic [woman from Texas in the House], along with Sylvia Garcia, who will also be elected this year to represent a congressional district from Texas. So part of it is structural

and institutional and on purpose, but we just have to figure out a way to transcend that and going everywhere and holding town halls in Spanish and going on Spanish shows and answering questions in Spanish. Of course, a lot of people our age and younger who are Hispanic but don't speak Spanish - they still want to know that you understand, just as all of us do, what's going on in their families and communities. ...

I love that story about going to the concert in '76. My dad had a 1974 Toyota Land Cruiser that was new, and in the tape deck he had Waylon and Willie and that just became part of my consciousness. It's what I grew up doing. I remember your telling me that your family was political but I didn't know your grandfather was a county judge too.

**EH:** When my grandfather came back from World War II, he was part-owner and manager of the Abilene Blue Sox and the lead sports writer for The Abilene Reporter-News, so he covered his own games. Like you said about your dad, he was furiously independent. He voted for Carter and then he voted for Reagan and then he didn't vote for Clinton the first time but he did the second time. Before he died his big passion was

Obama and it was very interesting for him because the Blue Sox was a farm team for Brooklyn Dodgers, and he was selected as a scout to seek out the first black major league player, and that's actually what took him into the fights with the Klan and then brought him into politics.

BO: I was just in Abilene yesterday. We had a town hall at the Paramount Theatre. Nearly 800 people came out. Here it is supposed to be this conservative, red community, but what I found is that if you just show up there, people will show up as well. They'll give you a chance to share what you have to say and then they'll share what's on their mind. There are good people out there. I love the story about Branch Rickey and Jackie Robinson. You probably know this, but Kurt Russell played for El Paso's minor league team, the Sun Kings. There's this great photo of him with a big wad of something in his cheek and he's got the El Paso jersey on. EH: I just worked with Kurt's son Wyatt Russell and I asked Wyatt what his father was like, and his face just beamed with pride.

> The world is full of so much negativity; it was so wonderful to see a young man, a remarkable young man, really proud of his father.

> OK, here's my last question for you: Meeting you back in April, what I was really struck by is this natural humility you have. Being an actor, I know you can't fake that. It's very effective and wonderful to be around. But it makes me worry a little about you, in politics. What happens to people? I mean, how can you stay sane and keep that humility if you win?

> **BO:** When [my wife] Amy and I were first talking

about running for Congress in 2011-2012, we decided that we would do term limits, and not serve more than four years. In part it was, "I just don't want you to be an asshole; I haven't met somebody in this line of work who doesn't become one, that doesn't think that they are so important only they can do it."

EH: Sounds a lot like famous actors ...

BO: Well, she's my answer to that. And our kids too. They bring you back down to earth. It's like, hold on a second. They could care less about Ted Cruz or what we are doing in the campaign right now. It's hard to do this with little kids, but it also continuously grounds you and reminds you who you are doing it for. I think we have a really good chance to win this. But if we don't, we're still going to do our best to help in whatever way we can, and we're still going to have each other.

I think, whatever you can do to make sure you never take yourself or your situation too seriously, that's the key. And for me it's Amy and the kids who help me with that. EH: Sounds like you won already.

# = THE MAN, THE MUSIC, THE MOVIE $lue{}$

he jigsaw of geography in filmmaking is such that one day during the making of Blaze we were in Baton Rouge, La., at a venue called the Texas Club, shooting a scene that takes place in the New York City of the Eighties.

Townes Van Zandt, played by Austin's Charlie Sexton, is hearing Blaze Foley, portrayed by Arkansas singer Ben Dickey, perform for the first time. The cavernous bar is dim and bluish, as if the entire place were underwater.

The Texan stands in the back listening. Cigarette smoke eddies around his face like ghostly seaweed as he's absorbed into "Our Little Town." Director Ethan Hawke whispers, "Cut."

I turn to him.

"This is a love story too," I say.

I know because I also fell in love with Blaze Foley the first time I heard him sing.


Blaze and I fell in love before he and Townes met. At that juncture, Blaze was in his mid-20s and just beginning to write songs. He showed up in West Georgia from who-knowswhere, a lanky, bashful, country boy. We fell into a tree house in the woods, gleefully poor and frequently mind-altered, and there he began to dream up the legend of Blaze Foley.

After a time, we moved on to Austin, where stage fright kept him from the limelight, and finally to Chicago, where I broke up with him or he broke up with me, something like that. His memory pursued me nonetheless, popping up as idealized characters in unfinished plays attempted during the decade leading up to his death in 1989. In 2002, Austin's Kevin Triplett, director of the documentary film Blaze Foley: Duct Tape Messiah, asked for an interview.

Floodgates of grief, regret, and longing opened, and in getting reacquainted with Blaze Foley, I made the acquaintance of Townes Van Zandt.

There's an iconic photo of Townes, relaxed and inscrutable, standing between Blaze and another Houston comrade, bass player Rex Bell. They're all wearing noticeable hats. Rex has on sunglasses, Townes gazes steadily into the camera, and Blaze is leaning in, a manly hand clamped on Townes' shoulder, the beaked brim of his cowboy hat dipping over one eye. Townes is said to have called that snapshot "a picture of my three best friends."

New Orleans resident Joe Bucher, a longtime Georgia pal of Blaze and our tree house landlord [revisit "Faded Love," Oct. 31, 2008], spent time with Blaze and Townes in Houston and Austin in the late Seventies, early Eighties. Joe suffered a brain aneurysm but his intellect and memory are astonishingly intact.



## THE BALLAD OF TOWNES & BLAZE

THE TWISTED BUT NOT-SO-TALL TALE OF VAN ZANDT AND FOLEY, LONESOME DOVE MEETS BARFLY

"Townes and Blaze were great guys to have a drink with," he tells me. "They made you feel comfortable and always had something funny or smart to say. It may have worked to their detriment, but even when people knew what their problems were, they were still great guys to have a drink with."

It's more than 20 years since Townes died, nearly 30 years for Blaze. To this day, some people maintain that Townes Van Zandt was the worst thing to happen to Blaze Foley. Some say the opposite. Every tragedy needs a villain, I suppose.

In an article in The Austin Chronicle by Lee Nichols three years after Townes' death ["A Walking Contradiction," Dec. 24, 1999], Lucinda Williams stated that she wrote "Drunken Angel" for Blaze, "although it could have been about Townes as well," she concludes and goes on to include any other

"tortured artist [who was] somewhat selfdestructive."

If their existences were painful and short, their lives were also a given - in the sense that their songs have moved, lifted, and inspired so many for so long. Death expanded their legacies, but by now myth has overtaken history. No one bothers to ask any more if some caper actually occurred.

Most famously, there's the tale of Townes' digging up Blaze's body to retrieve a pawn ticket for a guitar. Charlie Sexton's Townes tells the story within the first 10 minutes of Blaze. It walks the line between fact and fiction irresistibly.

Neither man was known to be loyal to the truth - the larger truths, yes - but not the details. Everything else was just stories, which by necessity includes whoever's telling the tale, and why. An old Yiddish riddle asks, "What is truer than the truth?" The answer is "The story."

My search for Blaze's memory produced a story I'd been trying to tell for almost 30 years. This time it took shape as the memoir of a twentysomething Jewish-American belle enamored of a gifted, endearing hillbilly. Buried tree house memories were unearthed by the need to reclaim the man I had known and make some sort of peace with his legend.

Published by the University of North Texas Press in 2008, Living in the Woods in  $\alpha$ Tree: Remembering Blaze Foley is the second in the series Lives of Musicians [peruse the "Book Review," Oct. 31, 2008]. No. 1 is A Deeper Blue: The Life and Music of Townes Van Zandt, a biography by Robert Earl Hardy. Blaze and Townes, together again.

Ironically, neither Hardy nor I give much space in our books to the relationship. Hardy makes brief mention of the possibility that Blaze may have been a bad influence on Townes. Again, the villain thing. Yet for whatever reason, we both pretty much sidestepped their story.

Was their friendship too small - or too big - to weave into a broader narrative? Too complex and thus its own story waiting to be told? Or was their exchange just that old and by now too-familiar cliche: a couple of charismatic white dudes sittin' around validating each other's demise?

#### **BLAZE'S BLUES**

I got a guitar all my own Got a quarter for the telephone I ain't headed down this highway all alone One, two, three, and maybe four Honey, they're knockin' at my door You know I'm gonna miss you when I'm gone - Townes Van Zandt, "Blaze's Blues," 1990

John Townes Van Zandt was born in Fort Worth in 1944, five years before Michael David Fuller - Blaze Foley - came into the world in Malvern, Ark., outside of Hot Springs. Townes outlives his running buddy by eight years, dying in 1997 at the age of 52.

They first collided in New York City in 1978 or thereabouts. Blaze was 28, Townes 33. Townes had already released six albums and played Carnegie Hall, while Blaze carried around a battered attaché case of mostly unheard lyrics and tried to get used to calling himself Blaze. In an interview on the Townes Van Zandt Documentary CD, produced by late great music historian and Austin deejay Larry Monroe, Townes describes their first encounter at the Bitter End where he was concluding the last night of a gig.

"I finished playin'," says Townes in a soft patter that manages to convey strong affection and mild dismay. "And up walked this strange-lookin' guy."

I try to picture Blaze in the year after we said goodbye. His hair might still be short since he'd cut off his ponytail to give to me. Lyrics to "If I Could Only Fly" would be in his attaché case. He'd be thin, awkward, with a soft belly left over from his teenage fat-boy days, and the rest all sharp elbows, knuckles, and knees held together loosely on a large frame.

Almost always carrying a borrowed guitar, he had a rocking gait from a bout of infant polio. Usually shy, he made the effort to approach other musicians, emboldened by the core conviction that musicians everybody really, but especially artists needed to take care of each other. Townes continues:

"He introduced himself. Said he was Blaze Foley."

Blaze was also a Texan, from Austin he allowed, a place Townes had been absent from for a while, living in Nashville and on the road. Blaze was on the road too.

"He had heard about me," adds Townes.

We'd heard about him the first time together. It was late June 1976 and we were wrapped around each other in the backseat of a blue VW Rabbit carrying us from Texas to Georgia to get hitched or at least jump a broom. Our driver Lindsey Horton, who'd known Blaze as teenage Mike Fuller, pulled out an 8-track cassette of Townes Van Zandt.

"Y'all ever heard of this guy?"

Lindsey was born and raised in Van Zandt County in East Texas, so it could have been a case of local-boy-makes-good. To my mind, the moment unfolded in cinematic perfection: the entirely innocent introduction of Townes and his music coming as a foreshadowing of the seductions that would keep the vows of an equally innocent broom jump from ever being fulfilled. As interviewed by Larry Monroe, Townes recounts the impact of meeting Blaze.

"We became immediate, uh, friends," he declares. "Two Texans. Two West Texans," he emphasizes. "In New York. I'd been there kind of before. He never had."

What West Texans is he talking about? Fort Worth is west of Arkansas maybe, but if you had moved around as much as these CONTINUED ON P.28

two, you might feel like you hailed from nowhere and everywhere all in the same breath. Blaze liked to tell people he was from Marfa. He liked the ring of it, I think, and the thought of tumbleweeds scudding through a dirt-street town under the glare of a metallic sky. Marfa sounded like the sort of harsh dry place a Texas music legend ought to be from.

And Blaze knew the town firsthand. Mike Fuller had lived there for a time, a chunky, acne-prone, gospel-singing tweener. In Marfa, he heard Willie Nelson perform live.

There was just something about Texas. At one point, teenage Mike took to calling himself "Tex." That solitary, hardscrabble, bigsky, Lone Star mystique mirrored an immense sensibility he yearned to belong to.

By birthright and inclination, Townes already belonged. In many ways, he was Texas' most eloquent bard. Listening to Townes songs with new ears - Blaze's ears - I'm reminded of Blaze's conversation with Kathleen Hudson, founder and director of the Texas Heritage Music Foundation, for her compilation of interviews with Texas songwriters, Telling Stories, Writing Songs.

She and Blaze sat on the edge of the bed in Townes' bedroom watching the goingson in a big fish tank. Kathleen asked Blaze what was so important about Townes'

"It's spiritual," he replied. "It's scary at times. 'Cause you just don't sit down and write songs like 'Nothin',' 'Waiting Around to Die.' or 'Sad Cinderella' without really knowing something. He's the best I ever heard. He's a poet. He amazes me."

#### **SPIRITUAL REVOLUTIONARIES**

The voices in Townes' story-songs seep up out of the earth, raw spirits destined to rove a borderless landscape of farmland, moonlight, and railroad tracks. Townes might have been drawn to the very quality in Mike Fuller that the myth of Blaze Foley was seeking to erase - his bone-deep Southern-country Ozark roots.


"I sound like a hillbilly," Blaze said of himself, making his last live recording at the Austin Outhouse in December 1988, just weeks before he was killed. He was still embarrassed by his backwoods twang.

Encountering Blaze for the first time in New York, Townes surely would have noticed that his newfound pal was a greenhorn, road-worn and game, but indelibly naive. Blaze was staying at the Gramercy Park Hotel, a sedate and classy hangout for musicians performing in the city. As Townes tells the story, "Somebody - some wellmeaning record guy - had given Blaze the power to sign his own tab. I mean carte blanche room tab."

Townes moved out of his hotel and in with Blaze.

"We bankrupted the record company," declares the former. "We just drove room service into the ground."

Their orders were "30 tequila sunrises, one hamburger cut in half," with a \$60 or \$70 tip for the elderly black waiter. This went on for three days and nights until the



record producers got wind of it and arranged to have Blaze and company checked out of the hotel.

"It was cheaper to fly us to Nashville than to put up with Blaze," opines Townes, amused and vaguely triumphant. "Wild times."

He pauses.

"Every day with ol' Blaze was some kind of an adventure."

Translated to film in Blaze, the story expands. The Gramercy Park hotel room

That session never happened, but assuming Townes is directionally correct and Blaze did come to New York to record the song, it means a lost recording opportunity for Blaze - a precedent to the debacle at Muscle Shoals, with memorable cameos by Townes in both. Eventually, a single of "If I Could Only Fly" was recorded, pressed, and released in Houston and Austin.

If his songs are any indication, Townes was by nature a stark realist. Blaze by contheir outspoken disregard for ambition and commercial success, though it sometimes feels that they protested too much.

Blaze took pride in the fact that he never held a day job. He preferred to be homeless or sleep in dumpsters so he could devote himself to writing and playing music. Success curtailed the purity of his artistry - not to mention his gypsy feet - while freedom was the holy grail of his and Townes' mutual resistance.

Townes' example of not showing up for gigs or showing up drunk no doubt acted like lighter fluid on Blaze's already combustible refusal to abide by the rules. Fear also fed his self-sabotaging behavior. I'd seen firsthand his reticence to perform. Stage fright made him fragile; fragility made him drink.

Like Townes, Blaze closed his eyes when he sang, as if they needed privacy to reveal their most vulnerable selves. He liked to offer Townes' explanation that "if we close our eyes, the audience won't have to.'

In Austin, some still argue that Blaze's irresponsibility had greater consequences for him than for Townes. Apparently, Blaze got kicked out of the Kerrville Folk Festival for either saying "fuck" onstage, singing the lewdly hilarious "Springtime in Uganda," or crushing a porta-potty he and Townes backed over in Townes' truck. In any event, Townes was allowed to remain at the festival while Blaze had to sneak back in dressed as a woman.

Ejected again, Blaze sat at the gates in a sundress and makeup, wearing a sign that read "Too Weird for Kerrville."

becomes an entire ballroom peopled with the derelicts, addicts, transvestites, and prostitutes Blaze and Townes invite to party with them. Their guests, Townes explains to an irate record producer, are the artists' guide into the human condition and should be worth the expense.

His argument underscores the pair's mutual intention, misguided or not, to bring to their songwriting a hard-won authenticity.

Six years later. Blaze recorded an album in Muscle Shoals, Ala., for which Townes penned the liner notes. He wrote that he met Blaze in New York City "six years ago." (He also says Blaze was born in Marfa.) Townes goes on to state that Blaze had come to the city to record a single of "If I Could Only Fly."

trast was a stark romantic. His allegiance to his friends was absolute, all or nothing - the only way he knew how to give.

Townes was a songwriter's version of a songwriter, an aristocrat of the spirit, and a magnet for women, already mythic if not famous. Friendship with Townes lent Blaze a contagious stature. In Townes' orbit, Blaze could absorb more of that Texas mythology. And by all accounts, Townes loved Blaze's music. That had to strengthen Blaze's growing belief in himself as a songwriter.

Speaking with writer William Hedgepeth in 1972, Townes calls himself a "spiritual revolutionary." In the liner notes for the Muscle Shoals album, he refers to Blaze as "one of the most spiritual cats I've ever met." That spirituality was expressed by

A tribute song is a mirror of its subject. In paying homage to his absent friend, Townes invokes Blaze's darkness musically and psychically as if his fingers allowed Blaze to take over and midwife the melody into being. I've always been struck by the verse about his mother. It breaks my heart for Blaze - and for her.

Louise and I met 14 years after her son Mike, as she still called him, had passed. In her 80s then, the late Louise Underwood Fuller Hacker was an ever-playful, radically innocent, deeply devout Christian lady, her love of gospel music inseparable from her love of the Lord. We shared a deep regret about Blaze, each in our own story. No one escapes a legend without regret.

Joe Bucher described a visit Blaze made to his mother sometime in the mid-Eighties. Blaze may have told the tale to Townes and that's what inspired these lines. It seems Blaze decided to drop in unannounced on Louise, who was then living with her second husband Howard on a farm in Missouri.

They hadn't seen each other in six or seven years. The last time they were together, Mike was thin and clean-shaven, singing

beautiful new songs whose origins were unknown to Louise. When this stout, unrecognizable fellow comes to her kitchen door, ragtag in duct tape, bearded and gruff, she's frightened. Until he says, "It's Mike."

And as Blaze would tell Joe later, his mother's response was, "Will you be staying for supper?'

Louise never told me that story and I never asked her about it, but I

always wondered if that moment - assuming it happened - sliced through her whenever she spoke out her regret. Her grief for her son was very real, as was her pride in the music he had made. I picture that encounter, their last together, facing one another through a barrier like visitors to maximum-security inmates, each in a prison of their own making.

Louise had been unlucky in her choice of a first husband. Mike's father Edwin was a rogue, a gambler, and an addict, fierce-tempered and often mean. When he died in 1981, his son didn't go to his funeral. Louise's inability to deflect her husband's madness shaped her children's tumultuous lives.

By contrast, her second husband was a musician who sang with her in church. Howard Hacker loved Louise, though he proved critical of her more wayward kids. And once again, she couldn't override her

husband's intractable mindset. Mike wasn't welcome in her home.

The mother I came to know questioned her actions with real remorse.

"I don't know what I was thinking," Louise allowed, a hand fluttering nervously at her throat.

She suffered over her lack of affection toward a son now missed beyond almost every other sorrow of her long, loss-filled life. Whereas on the Muscle Shoals album Townes writes, "I've never met his family, but they must be fine people," in the song he paints Blaze's mom as an ogre. She's uncaring and wouldn't think of coughing up the cash for her grown son's ticket home.


Even so, Townes plants a seed of longing in Blaze: "I might just blow on through there anyway." Some read that as defiance.

Could it be Townes understood the nature of Blaze's relationship to memory that was so different from his own? In 1972, Townes explained to William Hedgepeth that he'd lost all recollection of his childhood as a result of the electroshock therapy given him as a young man. Without those imprints that define and root us for better or worse, Townes possessed an unmoored sense of identity. At age 28, he minced no words with Hedgepeth:

"I feel aloneness all the time. Loneliness I hardly ever feel during the day. At night sometimes after a gig, I feel it a bunch. But loneliness is a state of feeling, whereas aloneness is a state of being, like the difference between being broke and being poor."

Blaze, on the other hand, was overrun

with memory, plagued minute, searing with details, doomed to remember ancient grief and sacrificed joys. Rex Bell, that other best friend of Townes', kept Blaze's wallet until Hurricane Ike washed it away in 2008. Folded up in the wallet, Rex found handwritten lyrics to old hvmn "River of Memories," which leads to a "ramshackle cabin" and "a grav-haired moth-

Regret is memory's unwanted stepchild, the offspring of moments we wish we could forget or better yet undo. Full of longing, Blaze remembered not only his mother's love but also the reasons for its disappearance. He was scalded by a childhood that caused him anguish all his life.

er" waiting for him there.

In Giovanni's Room, novelist James Baldwin wrote that "there are madmen who remember and madmen who forget," and heroes are the ones who do both. As Blaze remembered and Townes forgot, the two madmen exchanged notes on suffering. It carved out in them far-flung compassion. Townes wrote about his friend: "Blaze is a lover of things alive, and pleads their cause with every word."

Both gave away money to those less fortunate. They defended the weak against CONTINUED ON P.30

TOWNES & BLAZE CONTINUED FROM P.29 bullies. This quality in Blaze, defiled by alcohol and speed, cost him his life.

Larry Monroe wrote a eulogy for his martyred pal in The Austin Chronicle after Blaze was shot and killed in 1989. In it, he describes the moment he became aware of Blaze's sensitive side. It occurred the same week Townes' "Pancho and Lefty," sung by Willie Nelson and Merle Haggard, hit No. 1 on the country charts. That Tuesday, Townes checked himself into the State Hospital; by Saturday he had checked out to play his end-of-the-month rent gig at Emmajoe's in Austin.

Larry sets the stage:

"Sober and determined but strained and weak, Townes struggled through his set that night. During 'If I Needed You,' he forgot the lyrics and faltered. Blaze glided gracefully to his side and sang the words for him, then harmonized with him as Townes got back on track. After the song, Blaze quietly sat back down near the stage. Townes grew stronger from that point and it almost seemed that a direct energy transfer from Blaze had occurred."

#### **MUSCLE SHOALS**


March 1983: Blaze heads to Muscle Shoals to finally record his first album, an opportunity that had come through Georgia connections. A previous attempt to record, under the auspices of hapless record producers from Houston, had resulted in a set of master tapes that were ultimately stolen from Blaze's station wagon and probably ended up in a dumpster somewhere. Years after Blaze's death, a version of those recordings was released as Cold, Cold World: Blaze Foley & the Beaver Valley Boys, produced by Gurf Morlix.

Talking to Larry Monroe about the Muscle Shoals experience, Townes describes going to Alabama with Blaze days after his second son, Will, was born. He sounds a bit peeved. He says the only reason he went was because Blaze wouldn't stop pestering him. Villain!

The record company bought Townes a plane ticket. Blaze met him at the Atlanta airport and whisked him out to Waller, the old fishing camp on the Chattahoochee River where Blaze and I had partied in our tree house days. He'd returned there almost every summer beginning in 1977. He likely wanted to introduce Townes to the place and to longtime Georgia friends like Waller's host and patriarch, the late Glyn Thomas.

When I spoke to Glyn about that visit, he was already in his 70s, a congenial, perennial hippie. Certain details of Townes' visit had stayed with him over the years.

"The whole time, I never saw Townes eat a thing," he recalled wonderingly. "Blaze may have had a cheeseburger."



They each drank about a half a gallon of vodka a day, claiming to get their nourishment from the cranberry juice mixed with it. Blaze would say, "My liver's shot but my kidneys work great." Glyn went on:

"At one point, Townes was spied stalking Blaze with a butcher knife from the kitchen. A friend grabbed Townes' wrist. He was thin as a matchstick and [my friend] easily took the knife away. A few minutes later, Townes was at it again. The knife was removed from his hand a second time."

Glyn smiled brightly, revealing teeth as tilted as a crowded graveyard.

"We hid all the kitchen knives and that was the end of it!"

A knife shows up in another Townes story Glyn recalled. This was an incident Blaze told him about a few years after Townes' visit to Waller. Blaze had overstayed his welcome at Townes' house in Austin, but by his own admission, he was impossible to evict. One day, he woke to a loud thud on the headboard of the bed where he lay sprawled. Directly above his head, a machete twanged from the impact.

"Go!" Townes yelled from the doorway, his throwing arm still outstretched.

"Blaze got the message," laughed Glyn. "He hightailed it out of there and hit the road for Georgia."

There are certain stories men find funnier than women. This is one of them. Fortunately, Glyn had another Townes story we both found hilarious. He heard it from Townes himself during his stay at Waller.

It concerned an earlier visit Townes had made to nearby Carrollton in the late Sixties. He'd played a Saturday night concert at the University of West Georgia, then West Georgia College. The college was unable to cut him and his band a check for their performance until the following Monday morning.

Unperturbed, they parked their van in front of the college president's home and proceeded to take LSD. To pass the time, they painted their fingernails different colors. Eventually, the president called the police and the musicians were jailed for trespassing. As their fingerprints were being taken, an officer remarked on their variously hued nails. Townes explained they were poor musicians who couldn't read music, so they color-coded their fingers to help navigate the frets of their guitars.

The weekend of storytelling and knife stalking at Waller ended when Townes and Blaze were flown by private plane to Alabama. The record company put them up in a motel, gave them \$300, and told them they'd be back for them the next day. It took no time to figure out how to get across the Tennessee River to a wet county where they could buy vodka, and as Townes described to Larry Monroe, they settled in serenely to watch a football game.

The next day came and no record company, Repeat.

"It started dawning on me," remarked Townes. "Like, 'Blaze, I think I know what kind of guys you're mixed up with. They're not thinking about you sitting in this hotel room. It may be a week before they get back.'

"So Blaze kind of kicked into gear. I maybe shouldn't even have said that.'

Meaning that after four days, a vodkadrenched Blaze kept peeking out from behind the curtains, certain he'd seen Iranians with Uzi submachine guns lurking around the pool. He refused to leave the room, which was already trashed - Blaze's half anyway, according to Townes.

"I was trying to keep him under control," recounts the latter. "And I was, like, no angel this whole time," he admits, chuckling. "It was terrible."

Townes decided he couldn't take any more. He sat down on the bed to call Guy Clark in Nashville for a bus ticket home. Blaze jumped across the bed and ripped the phone out of the wall. The Florence, Ala., police arrived soon thereafter.

"I was put in the unenviable position of being the peacemaker," recalled Townes. "All I managed to do was keep Blaze from being beaten to death or maybe even shot. Blaze was in a rage, which he really could do. I've seen Blaze at his most gentle and his most outrageous. The Alabama police were not amused at being called Nazi pigs by this screaming giant hippie."

Both men were handcuffed and taken to jail. In a remarkably short time, someone from the record company came to bail them out. Townes recalled, "The owners were mad, I mean blazingly angry, at me for throwing a wrench in their record operation."

Townes said all they had to do was give him \$10 for a bus ticket, a pint of vodka and a Coke, and he'd be out of their hair. Blaze felt terrible. He explained to the producers how Townes had left his day-old baby to come to Muscle Shoals, how he had saved Blaze from the wrath of the Florence police.

The producers apologized and even encouraged Townes to stick around, an invitation he didn't take them up on. He left on the next bus to Nashville and Blaze's recording sessions began.

#### IF I COULD ONLY FLY

Blaze's mood remained grim. His antics had cost him artistic control. He'd wanted to call the album Yard Cars, but now it would be titled simply Blaze Foley. And the same Georgia friends swear he had to be threatened with a baseball bat to sing in the studio.

When he did, his voice came off quavery and layered with artifice. The sound itself, as many have noted, was too brassy, too overlaid for the heartfelt simplicity that was Blaze's trademark. Fortunately, Lost Art Records recently remastered the recording [see "The Lost Muscle Shoals Recordings," May 5, 2017]. It's beautifully balanced, and Blaze's voice shines through.

The rest was history, more or less. The original album Blaze Foley was recorded, pressed, and never released in the Eighties. Instead, the executive producer was indict-

ed on drug charges and, according to Blaze, the albums ended up in the hands of the FBI, through no fault of Townes I might add.

"I hope they listen to it," Townes concluded to Larry Monroe.

The records were stored in a warehouse in West Georgia. From time to time. Blaze would get his hands on a stack of them to sell for \$1 out of the back of a friend's truck or give away if you were broke. He used them to barter cab rides and beers. At closing time, a bar would be littered with the albums, left by fans too drunk to remember to take them home, a situation neither sex finds funny.

1987 was a better year for Townes and Blaze. Townes released the album At My Window and Blaze saw "If I Could Only Fly" sung by Willie Nelson and Merle Haggard on their album Seashores of Old Mexico. Royalties gave Blaze a little money, which wasn't necessarily a good thing.

Townes was worried about his friend. He bought him the guitar Blaze eventually pawned (hence the grave-digging story). Townes encouraged Blaze to make another studio album, which he took to heart.

Aided by Lost John Casner, Blaze made a live recording with a borrowed guitar at the Austin Outhouse. This served as a demo tape for the European tour he and Townes

were planning. Townes told his handlers not to worry - he could handle Blaze.

Even so, no one could keep Blaze from showing up for a fate of his own making. At the beginning of February, while Townes was away in Nashville, Blaze was shot in a friend's living room in South Austin. He died in surgery at Brackenridge Hospital.

Austin singer-songwriter Ky Hote, who frequents the Kerrville Folk Festival and can boast that he saw Blaze Foley face to face in a dress, observed Blaze and Townes in tandem throughout much of the Eighties. He's surprised Townes survived as long as he did after Blaze was killed.

"Their friendship was kind of like a marriage. In the sense of partnership," adds Ky. "Of knowing that there's someone out there who always has your back."

Townes immortalized Blaze in a blues song. Glyn Thomas remembered seeing Townes perform "Blaze's Blues" at the Cactus Cafe in Austin some time in the early Nineties.

"Townes was talking about Blaze's death," Glyn recalled. "And he began to cry. 'If I'd only been in town,' he lamented, 'I could have saved him."

They couldn't save themselves, but Townes continued to transform his grief into ravishing art. Blaze's empathy would find its way into his woeful tune "Marie." a finely etched portrait of homelessness and despair.

"I wish Blaze could have heard that

song," Townes told Larry Monroe. "Because he was really interested in, you know, the dispossessed in the world, in America and in the world. I thought about Blaze a lot when I was writing that song. I wasn't writing it about him or anything, but part of the reason I wrote it, you know, was because he had so much to do with turning me on to that problem. I'm convinced he had a lot to do somehow with that song."

Death doesn't end relationships, not even after both participants are long gone. We're still listening to their songs, telling their stories, remaking their histo-

ries into books and films. One of the most memorable moments of our New York City shoot at the Texas Club in Baton Rouge took place after we had wrapped for the day.

As a way of saying thank you to the extras in the bar scenes, Charlie and Ben performed "Blaze's Blues." Sung by the two actor/musicians playing Townes and Blaze, the song had an eerie resonance, as if ghosts had gathered onstage and time had again left the building.

Watching Charlie and Ben sing, I couldn't help think that this is where Blaze Foley would most like to be these days: onstage with his friend Townes Van Zandt, their eyes closed, singing the songs they gave their lives to create.

## BACK TO THE TREE HOUSE

WRITER SYBIL ROSEN AND ACTRESS ALIA SHAWKAT ON FALLING IN LOVE WITH BLAZE FOLEY AGAIN, AND FOR THE FIRST TIME

I sipped on a beer, sloshed some on my shirt. "I'm a mess," I declared. "Maybe you better kiss me now."

Depty sat up. "I been wanting to do that for weeks."

We bumped heads. "I don't know why I'm so shy around you," I confessed.

He stroked my hair. "All wild things are shy." – Excerpt from Living in the Woods in a Tree: Remembering Blaze Foley by Sybil Rosen

In Blaze, the legendary country singer Blaze Foley finally receives his close-up, but the movie doesn't only belong to him. Adapted from playwright and novelist Sybil Rosen's 2008 memoir Living in the Woods in a Tree, the movie takes many of its cues from Rosen's memories of Foley during the earlier stages of his career, when the pair met in rural Georgia and fell in love, launching a multi-year romance that - for much of the time, anyway - reached utopian heights, with the couple residing in a forest tree house as Rosen watched Foley's creativity bloom.

After their breakup, Rosen lost touch with Foley, as well as his career progression. While she heard about his murder in 1989, she was unfamiliar with the music he produced during that time, or the way his fandom had blossomed. Her soulful book chronicles these emotional discoveries, flitting between the past and present as she relives their time together. As a result, the resonance of Blaze extends far beyond the traditional strictures of the biopic format and functions far more effectively as a ten-

For Rosen, unearthing her memories for the book proved challenging enough. The experience grew far thornier once she was forced to come to terms with the existence of writer-director Ethan Hawke's movie, in which her character was played by Alia

Rosen and Shawkat reminisced about their parallel experiences with coming together for Blaze, as well as the impact of resurrecting Foley's art through the prism of Rosen's own relationship to it, using the book as the only guide at their disposal.

Sybil Rosen: A lot of those songs I'd never heard until his return and many of the songs he wrote after we broke up, I didn't hear them. I had no idea that he might have missed me, or that he expressed regret. There was that dilemma of absorbing this music and feeling so heartbroken around a

Alia Shawkat: A friend of mine had given me some of Blaze's music, mainly "Clay Pigeons." My friend played it on the guitar and we learned it together. I even had a party at my house and played the song there, and everyone was like, "What is that song?" I was like, "It's this guy Blaze Foley, who got shot by his friend!" I didn't even know the full story.

SR: Because of this reckoning I had with who Blaze became, I made this vow to myself with the book to be as honest and transparent as I could be in the telling of our story. I felt it was going to be the only way to heal myself. It didn't feel like a choice.

AS: The story itself was so mesmerizing. When I saw the book and looked up what Sybil looked like, I was like, "Oh, yeah, I was meant to play the part." It felt very kismet. SR: I come from a Southern Jewish background. I was more middle class and he came from real poverty. So his experiences and mine were similar but different. I think that was all part of what drew us together. People have this idea of who Southerners are and Blaze's character sort of explodes that idea, because he's so progressive in his thinking and so smart. I think that's a very interesting aspect of the story. It's conveyed through his language.

AS: They were both looking for something in order to find themselves, so they took this risk by living in a tree house.

SR: I feel like everyone has a tree house inside them, whether you actualize or just dream about it, that sort of longing is there. The sense of adventure we felt, we had so much privacy, it was so magical. The first four months we lived in the tree house we didn't have any walls. It was just a shelter in the woods. It was summer. It was a feeling of magic. Whatever was to come after that, we had that, and it was real. Just returning to that, remembering that, getting it back - I'm so lucky. I don't know what if would have become, as I got older, if I hadn't really been pushed to go back and remember it.

"You'd make a good mother, little onion, I know that."

"Well, what about all the other reasons: overpopulation, nuclear war, life sucks?"

The lame response attempted to conceal my terror of repeating my mother's tormented domesticity. I was determined not to end up, as I'd often pictured her, shackled to the kitchen sink.

"Are you ready?" I implored him. "Tell me the truth, are you ready for this?"

He plunked down beside me. "Ain't had much of a role model in the daddy department."

AS: I was really touched by the story. I haven't played a lot of love interest types. I think the film is there to show not just this tale of how they fell for each other, but to show why, after being so in love, you can't always stay together.

**SR:** Talking about the abortion – that was a struggle, just to deal with it, all this frantic reimagining of what could have been. To have this piece be a part of that, with all the questions that arose. What if we had made a different choice?

I felt like part of what I feel is important and instructive about Blaze's story is that it does show the sacrifices that we felt had to be made in order to achieve what we hoped to achieve, to have an artistic life. I'm not saying I agree with that now, but in that moment - in our youth, and in our fear that's the choice that we made.

AS: The thing that struck me the most was her ability to tell this story with enough of a distance to not judge the way she was hurt. Obviously, years have passed and she's older, but the relationship was troubling and hurtful to her. When you watch the movie, you're like, fuck, why'd he do that? Why didn't he just stay? But she has this powerful way of forgiving him and loving him through all that instead of thinking it was great for a second but he was ultimately a selfish alcoholic. She was able to spiritually understand why they met and why he had to move on and why he eventually died.

At this moment I am fifty-two, a writer, single and childless. In the twenty-odd years since my life with Depty Dawg, I've known pleasure, jealousy, affection - though never again did I expect to find a heart in which my own could make a home. Over time I made up my mind: I would learn to long without suffering; I would make peace with being alone. Secretly, I used to dream that if I reached middle age with love still unmet, some man from my past would come back to claim me.

It never occurred to me that he might be dead.

SR: The film didn't really become real to me until there was an actual person cast to play me. I have a sense of disbelief around this entire thing. The whole journey of the film has been quite amazing, very stirring and emotional. I couldn't even quite imagine it until Alia arrived. We emailed a little bit before filming began. It was so osmotic. I wrote her to say she was going to play me and I was going to be there and what that meant to me. She wrote back to say she couldn't wait to play in the tree house. I understood that feeling.

AS: We got along really well. I remember her a few days in, I was talking to her about love and how I'm at a place in my life where I hope to open myself up to love again. She was like, "Well, you get to do it all over again in this movie." I really loved that. The film is about being able to love someone if it's not ending up with someone forever because it's not some fairy tale.

There was no pressure or expectation of how I should play Sybil. It was about being honest and showing this real love between these two people. It's not like we were doing a Winston Churchill story. It has to be about these humans. We created the characters there.

SR: After we'd emailed, when we first saw each other, that experience of watching her come literally into my arms was sort of like having your past come right up to you and into you. I think I didn't understand how lengthy the healing process is. I found out

that there are depths of grief and loss that live at night and also heard his contempoyou keep peeling back.

AS: She had all the letters, she had his ponytail that he cut off and gave to her, and hadn't unearthed them until all these years later. So it felt like a real letting go of something, not to forget it, but to let it live again. It was really moving. It felt like we were all going through something together.

SR: There was just this sense of knowing each other.

AS: I was very nervous because I'd never played someone who was alive and on the set before. I was wary about being uncomfortable. I'm playing her but not doing an impression of her. But I found when she

was on set she brought an energy that bonded everybody. And when she was gone, it felt weird.

"Here were love songs I'd forgotten – how was that possible? Lullabies he'd sung me to sleep with in the tree house."

SR: I hadn't exactly remembered the "Moonlight" song. It wasn't on the surface of my mind. But in the plays that I attempted to write in the Eighties about Depty Dawg, as I thought of him, "Moonlight" was always a big element. When that song came back to me, it

just reinforced this sense of him always being present, even when I wasn't looking at him directly. In some oblique way, his memory and influence was always a part of my creative life, if not always actively a part of my emotional life. What a disconnect that was!

AS: I got to know so much more of the music and its history. During the shoot, I heard it

raries at the time, like Townes and Charlie Sexton, perform. The shoot was in an intimate setting on this cool piece of land, this old studio. At night, after dinner, we'd either watch a movie or someone would play a live show. It felt like summer camp. Getting to hear all that music played live was unbelievable. It was a whole different connection. To a degree, I felt in love with Blaze. I knew where he was coming from. I'll never listen to the music the same after that.

**SR:** I enjoy the movie for how beautiful it is, especially with all the music. But then there's this part of me that's catching up. Every time we get to the hitchhiking scene, I'm like, "Oh

right, we did that."

AS: It's always surreal to watch a final product when time has passed. All of a sudden, that time you spent a few months together turned into something. I was really happy with how the film turned out. I was really touched by it.

SR: Does it feel like me? Well. There's this one shot of Alia from the back and I'm like, "Oh, that's me!" Then I realized it was Alia. I had to jump through all these hoops of self. The other aspect of it is watching that character as a character and feeling that she is just sturdier

than I was at 25. Sometimes, I think of Alia as the millennial Sybil. That is also amazing to see - aspects of myself sort of transformed, because that's what the story needs. Everything changes when you bring a story

ichard Linklater: I usually assume that you've either worked with or are friends with every musician in the world, but I'll start with the most obvious question: How well did you know Blaze?

Charlie Sexton: Irony of many ironies is that I barely knew Blaze. We had all these mutual friends, and he was really, really close to my mother. But I don't think he really cared for me at all. ... When I ran across him, at the time I was trying to stay out of bars. I grew up in bars. My trajectory was something else. Not to diminish anyone that's spent time in that. But when we ran across each other, I was a little punk rocker. RL: And you were this good-looking young man who had a record deal.

CS: You know my personal theory about old Blaze? I think all humans on the planet are in training, trying to get it right. And it gets a little better with our kids, hopefully, when we get lucky, and they get it right quicker. And I think it was just certain things that he just got a bad hand, and he couldn't get done what he wanted to in his lifetime. And that's honestly, Rick, why I have so much admiration for Ethan - even more so than before - because I think he got things across [about Blaze] that Blaze couldn't get across.

**RL:** It's such a complex portrait. What was your first thought when Ethan calls you up asking you to play Townes Van Zandt?

CS: He goes, I'm thinking about making a movie about Blaze. I said, well, Ethan, that's a movie. Period. All you gotta do is put together

### PLAYING TOWNES

#### CHARLIE SEXTON AND RICHARD LINKLATER TALK ABOUT THE ROLE OF A LIFETIME

Richard Linklater cast Charlie Sexton as my roommate in Boyhood. We were a couple of divorced dads sharing an apartment trying to put our lives back together. We fancied ourselves a modern Texan version of the Odd Couple. The good thing about that movie is it took years to make, so we kind of got to know each other. Enough anyway for me to know I loved the way Charlie thinks - the way he thinks about music and acting and the process of trying to put art into the world that won't waste your time. The second I started dreaming of a film about Blaze Foley, I knew I wanted Charlie to play Townes. And since he introduced us, it seemed appropriate to have Rick ask Charlie about how the experience went. – Ethan Hawke

the script. But you know these are some of the hardest movies to make - music movies. RL: Yeah, tough genre - biopic, music.

CS: I know. And he goes, well, that's why I want your help. And I said, okay, of course I'll help. And then he says, but there's one more thing. I ask him, what's that? "I want you to play Townes." And I was like, "Well, that - that's fucking terrifying. That means we're supposed to do this, right?'

**RL:** Something that scares you but that compels you is probably good artistic territory. Now, your relationship with Townes, however, is different, right?

CS: He was much more a family friend. I remember the last time I talked to him on the phone, when he was in Nashville, he was just sweet. And the weirdest thing was, I moved recently and I unpacked a box of books and I was putting them on the shelf and within it was a Townes songbook, which I didn't even remember that I had. I don't think that I had ever opened it up.

**RL:** He had given it to you?

CS: Well, this is what happened. The picture of him on the cover of the songbook is almost exactly the composition of a picture of this record I did with my friend Shannon [McNally], where we're each leaning out of a window of an abandoned building. So I sent her a picture of it and I was on the phone with her and I said, isn't this crazy, it's almost the same picture, and she's like, wow, that's really wild. And as I'm on the phone with her, I open the book for the first time, and there's a message to me from Townes. It was staggering. It kinda made everything okay.

RL: Wow

CS: I had never seen it. And so it was really strange - mystical.

RL: You'd already wrapped the movie? That's a lot of years that letter sat unopened. CS: Now what we wrote to me, I couldn't believe he actually wrote that to me. It was shocking.

RL: What did he say in the letter, if I may ask?

CS: Basically, keep at it, compadre. There ain't a lot of us left.

RL: Whoa. That's pretty beautiful.

CS: That's paraphrasing, which I don't want to do with him.

RL: I love the bookend of that - that you'd already done the movie, following your instincts, and then you get kind of anointed after the fact, many years later from him.

CS: And you know what? That is so Townes. **RL:** I have to say, I visited the set and I saw Townes Van Zandt walk by and I looked up and I went, holy shit, wait, that's Charlie. I got a shiver.

CS: Well, it helps to be lanky and gaunt.

RL: So let's talk about acting. When did the bua hit uou?

CS: We had this family friend that might have had one of the early live theatres in town. It was called the Gaslight Theatre. And I would see plays there, I would see magicians there. I always loved movies, and great actors.

And then I just started getting things thrown at me when I ended up stranded in

L.A. for five years. But they were always the same movie. I called them the Elvis movie - it was like, okay, you're kind of like a rock & roll guy, you got a little Elvis thing going, you ride a motorcycle, you play a gig, you get in a fight, you get the girl, you get on your motorcycle, play another song, the cops chase you - you know, whatever. So I just kept saying, no, no, no, this is not acting.

RL: [Laughs] That's something else.

**CS:** The time that I actually bent on my refusal [on those kinds of parts] was with Ridley Scott when he did Thelma & Louise. The person at Universal who called me said, hey listen, this is what's going on, we want you to do this thing, and also Ridley Scott's doing this film. He wants songs, and he wants you to be in it. And I said, well, what's the part? And she told me and I go, I don't want to do that. She goes, come on, it's Ridley. You should do it. I'm like, no, I don't want to do it. I said, I'll take a meeting with him, but I'll tell him I don't want to do it.

I don't think you tell Ridley no, honestly. [Laughs]

You know what the funniest story about that thing was? The day we shot my scene was really the first day of filming. It was basically just me and my little band I put together for the scene. Ridley comes by the

trailer to talk to me, to say hi. We talk for a minute. And then he steps away, like 50 feet away, and he looks at his producer Mimi and he's looking at me really strangely. I know what it was after the fact - it's that directorial stare. I knew he was talking about me. And finally I called him over and said. what's going on? Why are you looking at me like that? And he goes, well, now that I'm having you stand in front of me I'm realizing that I have this one part we haven't cast yet and you would be perfect for it ... but I

just can't make it work in the film because it's a character down the line and we'd have to explain it that you're here playing now. And the part was the hitchhiker. The Brad Pitt part. Which was pretty funny.

**RL:** Oh, that part! Which ends up being one of the very memorable one-scene parts of all time. CS: Well, there you go, that's the story of my life, Rick.

RL: It's timing. We always get that timing thing wrong. Do you have some kind of philosophy about performing? The disciplines, acting and playing music, are obviously different, but do you feel like you're using similar resources, or is it just a completely different thing for you?

CS: I think you can draw on certain things, from medium to medium. I think also what it comes down to is that, when you refer to the bug, it's when you really feel that thing that happens that you can't explain and you don't know what it is or how it happens -

that's what you want. That's what makes vou suffer through all of it, those moments. RL: Do you love it enough to suffer all the things you'll have to to be able to do it?

**CS**: You gotta be willing to show your ass. You know? You gotta go to that place.

RL: What's an ideal Charlie Sexton role that you wouldn't roll your eyes at? Something not music-related at all?

CS: It's funny, it's basically if you took the music side out of this film and just dealt with the character, it's that. It's someone that may be doing things that you don't really appreciate or care for or maybe think they're inappropriate. There's a certain villain aspect, but for some reason you like 'em, and you've gotta like 'em at least a little bit or else you wouldn't continue to watch.

RL: Movies are very forgiving of behavior none of us would tolerate or appreciate in the real world. In Blaze, you see these guys kind of going down the drain together, but they're so good.

CS: Well, what's worse than actually going down the drain while playing that character, it's the head games that you have to play to go down the drain. The bottom line is, if Ben and I were drunk the whole time we made the movie, well, we could dry out and walk away from it. When it's not something

that tangible, and it's

all stuff that's created that you have to live with for however long you have to live with it - they don't really have a Betty Ford clinic for that. That's the real honest and deep aspect of what that is. To believe it yourself, and you have to, it lingers, you know? It's funny, I can't see the trailer. People started asking me about it, and it was like a sense memory, I started going back. I'll literally never be the same. It was life-changing.



RL: It feels like that for both you and Ben. These are such thorough embodiments of a character that you wonder, how did that affect their lives? How do you think Ben's gonna do? Because he doesn't have the experience that you do.


CS: Ben's and my relationship at this point is quite similar to Townes and Blaze's relationship. Just on a human level and a friend level. We talk all the time. We talked a lot after the film. Just ... where you at?

RL: There's only one other person in the known universe who really knows what you went through, and that's Ben.

CS: And Ethan.

RL: And Ethan, of course.

CS: You know what it was like? It was like I had one tour of duty, Ben had two, and Ethan had three or four. Roughly. And it took a while. It's kind of a band of brothers situation. But I expect to know Ben the rest of my life.

## 4AM WITH A HEAD FULL OF WHISKEY

ETHAN HAWKE AND BEN DICKEY'S LATE-NIGHT DAYDREAM

Ethan Hawke looks across the stage at the Gibson Guitar Showroom at Ben Dickey and smiles. He just bungled the lyrics to Townes Van Zandt's "To Live Is to Fly." He laughs that maybe they should have rehearsed a little, and Dickey grins back.

The pair were warming up and chilling out in the space between interviews and a screening for the Austin debut of Hawke's fourth feature film as a director, Blaze. It's a story born of an intermingling of roots - Austin-born Hawke directing Arkansas musician and first-time actor Dickey in the story of Blaze Foley, the Natural State native who became a fixture of Austin's music scene before his untimely death in 1989.

That night's SXSW screening at the Paramount Theatre wasn't the world premiere, as that had taken place two months prior at Sundance. Dickey – burly, soft-spoken, with all of Foley's legendary charm but fewer of his sharp edges - seems to appreciate the milder Austin March to Park City under a few feet of snow. "It was very exciting, but merciful heavens it was cold, and I've got bad lungs, and there was all these inverted hills. This is much better."

Music has always been a thread in Hawke's work as a director. "It is the purest flame," he said. "You know that Mark Twain line, that all art aspires to be music. It's true north, because it's not intellectual, it doesn't even need words. It's sexual and spiritual at the same time." His passion for the subject was most obvious in 2015's Oscar-winning portrait of composer and teacher Seymour Bernstein, Seymour: An *Introduction*, but it's often presented itself in less overt ways. His first feature as a director, 2001's Chelsea Walls, had a score by Wilco's Jeff Tweedy, and he called those songs "the lead of the movie. That movie doesn't have a story, it's a tone piece, and I challenged Jeff Tweedy with being the voice of the Chelsea Hotel." That score is one of the aspects of the film that he's most proud of, and the same with his follow-up,

2006's quasi-autobiographical *The Hottest State*, where he got his friend Jesse Harris to compose 18 original songs, then called on further friends and musicians he admired to perform them. "We had Willie [Nelson] cover one, and Cat Power, and Norah Jones, and all these amazing other people."

In Blaze, Foley's music is as much a character as Foley himself - sometimes more so, since he died before most people could hear his work. His legacy has been embraced, even canonized, in Austin, but - as is core to the film - he was a loud enigma with a genius for sabotaging his reputa-

tion, and was never as famous outside the city limits as many of his peers thought he should have been. "He made sure of that," said Dickey, who came across Foley by a circuitous route. In the early 2000s, he introduced his father to the work of John Prine. "My dad is someone who should have been on the John Prine shit from the beginning," he said. "My dad was like, 'Have you heard this song "Clay Pigeons"? It's on this album, and this guy Blaze Foley wrote it." At that point, Dickey said, "What I

knew about Blaze was that he was friends with Townes, and that he was eccentric," and it was actually his dad who started doing research, burning tracks to CD, sending him stories and tall tales about the man known as the Duct Tape Messiah. "There were three different accounts of his death, which reminded me of Robert Johnson. People go 'Robert Johnson got his throat slit.' 'No, he got poisoned.' 'No, he got stabbed.' And it was here and it was there, and it was because of this, because of that."

"Mythology for any musician is good," Dickey added. "Living or dead, you want to be mysterious."

But Blaze isn't your standard mythologizing musical biopic. There's no performance glamour shot, where Foley suddenly entrances the audience in some honky-tonk instead, he's more likely to be picking fights with hecklers, or blowing deals that could have made him a household name. It's less a story of self-destructive talent than a portrait of a guy who thought screwing up was funny. Hawke said, "In retrospect, killing yourself on drugs and alcohol, playing dive bars, sounds kind of romantic. In the living of it, it's pathetic. For every moment of grace, there's four and a half years of being hungry and getting syphilis, getting your teeth fixed and not having enough money to finish your root canal. All those details that people like to leave out in memory."

The film's framing mechanism of Van Zandt (played by another musician-turned-actor, Charlie Sexton) telling a deejay about Foley's life and work is brutally honest as only a friend would be. But when Foley's violent, unexpected death - bleeding out in Austin's Travis Heights neighborhood from a bullet to the chest - comes, it's not a dramatic inevitability. It's a senseless tragedy that derailed a brighter future. Hawke compared his subject to the equally ill-fated jazz trumpeter Chet Baker, whom he played in 2015's Born to Be Blue. "You don't sense when you play Chet Baker that he gives a shit whether you play him or not. There's something different happening around Blaze's death."

While the tragedy sounds like a natural movie, when Hawke and Dickey first started, it wasn't going to be a full feature. They'd been friends since 2006, when Hawke became a fan of Curse & Praise, the debut album by Dickey's band Blood Feathers, and came up with an idea about a TV show centering around the country and folk scenes of the Seventies and Eighties. Dickey recalled, "[Ethan] was like, 'You're kind of a big guy, and Blaze would be half an episode.' I thought, yeah, I could handle that." In hindsight, Dickey said, "[Ethan] may have been percolating on it a little bit longer than he let on." Around 4am on New Year's Day of 2016, the pair were walking home "with a head full of whiskey. I watched his eyes get really big, and he went, 'I'm going to make a Blaze Foley movie, and you're going to play him." Initially Dickey thought Hawke was just being nice to him after a few false starts in his musical career, but then he got a 9am call that same day, inviting him for a walk to talk about the film. "When he gets excited, he gets excited, and his vision starts going [and] before I knew it, it was getting real."

For Hawke, there was something organic and indecipherable about how Blaze came to be, and that's how it should be. He said, "Richard Linklater always says this to me, that cinema is its own world, and sometimes doors open and sometimes they close, and you have to pay attention to when doors are closing. You can force your way through, if

you really want to sometimes, but that may not be smart, and that often it's much easier to move with the river. Doors for this project just opened." Like with how Sybil Rosen came on board as a key collaborator. As Foley's partner, and author of the key work on which the script would be based -2008's Living in the Woods in a Tree: Remembering Blaze Foley - Hawke said he needed her to approve of his vision of Blaze, and that took showing her Seymour. He said, "I saw Blaze as

a photo negative of Seymour, that they were just completely brothers, but in separate worlds, and she agreed. [She] said something beautiful - that they were different men, but they were asking the same questions."

There's a sense that Hawke's film is filling in some of the blanks that were left by Foley's unfulfilled potential, and in a way it was Foley pushing those doors open so he didn't have to. "Blaze invited us," he said. "His music, his being, his energy, his life, invited us into a room together."

Ethan Hawke and Ben Dickey on their favorite Blaze Foley and Townes Van Zandt songs

### AN INTRODUCTION TO BLAZE FOLEY

Here 'tis, a list of 10 songs, hand-picked by me (Ben Dickey). I reckon it can serve as an introductory listenin' course to the artist that was/is Blaze Foley aka Deputy (Dep'ty) Dawg aka (born to the world as) Michael David Fuller.

I'd wager that a good amount of folks might have heard his most famous of songs, "If I Could Only Fly" and "Clay Pigeons." If not, them two numbers are the biggin's, the ships with the big sails. Heavy guns. They are both outrageously brilliant songs. Go listen to 'em if'n you haven't heard 'em. They are diamonds. These 10 are gems, too. They represent the heart and soul, curse and praise, and the joy and pain of ol' Blaze. His wit, too.

Blaze was a tenderhearted critter. True, too, he was an angry soul. Human. Bearlike. Protective. In love and in sorrow, for the goings-on of this cold, cold world. - Ben Dickeu

"LIVIN' IN THE WOODS IN A TREE" One of the first songs he ever wrote. Representing the sweet, innocent days/daze of his time in a rural Georgia treehouse with his sweetheart Sybil Rosen. Simple. Fun. Sweet. The song represents Blaze and Sybil's time in Eden. Sounds like a lovely place to be.

"THE MOONLIGHT SONG" Blaze is still in Eden with his babe in his arms. The stars are up and the sky is dark, and the moon shines bright up above. Such a lullaby. This is a fine song to be learning and to be singing to the one

you love. A good song to help us remember taking deep breaths and lazing about with friends and lovers, being still. At ease.

"OVAL ROOM" AND "WWIII" Two songs. But at their heart, they are the same. Blaze had a heavy allergy to jive turkeys. Double allergy to Jive Turkeys in the Political Theatre. Namely Ronald Reagan in his song "Oval Room." It's a sing-along, friends. We ought to be learning this song and singing it loud. Maybe even add some verses. "WWIII" is some insight into the Blaze Foley philosophy of war. He wasn't fond. Nor was he fond of the folks sending young people to die.

### "NO GOODWILL STORES IN WAIKIKI"


"SITTIN' BY THE ROAD" This here is my favorite Blaze song. It feels like a mantra. Something he might'a sung to himself on his travels. Maybe at one time it had 177 verses? I find myself singing it to myself all the time. Sittin' by the road lookin' at the sky

Wondering where do we go? Why do we die? What did I say?

Did I really try? Just sittin' by the rooooad

Gurf Morlix told me he just up and stopped playing this song one day. Not sure why.

I love it so much I recorded it for my next record.



### "BLAZE HAD A HEAVY ALLERGY TO JIVE TURKEYS."

**"BABY CAN I CRAWL** BACK TO YOU" Great fingerpicking song. Tricky, but simple. Something you sing to your sweet darlin' when you are the roaming type and you want to come home. Blaze in his early wandering years. Searching. Great tune.

"PICTURE CARDS" Now, this song is a cannon. Hits you in the heart. I am most fond of the version on Blaze Foley & the Beaver Valley Boys' record. Strong. Sorrowful. Honest. He saw daylight in his lover's eyes. Lit his world up. Time is running on by. Can we trust ourselves or each other? Unsure. But that light. That bright light.

### "COLD, COLD WORLD"

Friends, when I tell you that

this might be one of the finest songs ever written across the mighty expanses of time, eras, countries, mankind, womankind, elves, aliens, talking wolves, wizards, sorceresses, singing gas giants, and gods alike, I mean it. It's as heavy as a collapsed star and weightless at the same time. I love it so much.

"FADED LOVES & MEMORIES" When I was 29 I was the youngest member of a Bob Wills tribute band by 37 years. We played strictly Western swing songs, a few Hank songs, and the occasional Merle Travis or Carter Family traditional. We also played this lovely song called "Faded Loves & Memories." I always thought it was a Bob Wills song. I bet I performed it 40 or 50 times. When I was 39 I learned that Blaze wrote it! I had heard his recording of it, but always assumed it was a cover. Yes, Blaze Foley could write country classics from another time altogether. Blew my mind. I'd been playing Blaze the whole time.



### 10 FROM TOWNES VAN ZANDT

The poet laureate of the South. The unassailable reigning lyrical king of country music. Here is a list introducing TVZ to any to whom he may need introducing. - Ethan Hawke

"PANCHO AND LEFTY" Willie and Merle made this song world-famous, and it is one of the greatest American poems ever written. I know they put Chuck Berry on the Voyager and sent it into outer space ... but this would be my choice. Townes says, "I wrote this song about two Mexican bandits I saw on the TV two weeks after I'd written the song."

"MARIE" This is a song that drives its knife into your heart, "I wish Blaze could have heard that song," Townes said, "because he was really interested in, you know, the dispossessed in the world, in America and in the world. I thought about Blaze a lot when I was writing that song." Willie Nelson covers this song beautifully as well.

"TO LIVE IS TO FLY" This one is one of the rare Townes songs that is sincerely uplifting. I was introduced to the song through the wonderful Cowboy Junkies cover. But I actually love the way Guy Clark did it best.

"NO PLACE TO FALL" Charlie Sexton's version in our film, Blaze, was reason enough to make the movie. My daughter sings this song beautifully. I've heard Norah Jones sing it too. Incredible. It's another rare ray of hope.

"IF I NEEDED YOU" Listening to Townes himself sing this song sometimes hurts so much I don't know if I could call the experience enjoyable. When other people sing it – it's a classic.

"FARE THEE WELL, MISS CAROUSEL" Just another masterpiece. Townes' great hero was Lightnin' Hopkins. I wish I could hear them play this together.

"MR. MUDD AND MR. GOLD" This song gets to Townes' great sense of humor. Which is genius in its own right.

"LORETTA" I love John Prine's cover of this loving portrait of a friend.

"NOTHIN" Apparently written after finishing reading The Last Temptation of Christ. It's like Samuel Beckett if he was best friends with Hank Williams.

"WAITING AROUND TO DIE" Michael Kiwanuka slays this song. This was Townes' first great song and strangely carved a path for the rest of the music.

Blaze's songwriting skills were sharp by the time he wrote this one. It rolls. It's got something about it that reminds me of The Muppet Show. Blaze could be a bit Muppetlike. Blaze roamed. He was poor. He was proud of this he stood with the downtrodden. He sings about woeful experiences to the beat of a jolly melody we can easily imagine the Muppet band swinging out to.

"COSMIC DOO DOO" Blaze Foley was a funny human being. This song is supposed to make you giggle.

Cosmic doo doo, cosmic giggle, cosmic cuties sure can wiggle

### SNAPSHOT BY DAVID BRENDAN HALL

Living with a president for the past 20 months who evidently derives his sense of pride from flagrant bigotry, it often feels like we've been thrust through a time portal back to darker times. Donald Trump and much of his administration embody the antithesis of pro-equality movements that picked up speed the world over after the 1969 Stonewall riots. But no number of haters in power have silenced our LGBTQ communities and their allies, and absolutely not in Austin for Saturday's 100-plus-float Pride Parade, which garnered one of the largest crowds in recent history despite a downpour about an hour before its scheduled start. While documenting the evening's colorful characters and creations, "Snapshot" asked participants for their personal perspectives on Pride's key takeaways.

"For me, this is the main thing," said Jennifer McGinnis, pointing to her sign, "to remember your responsibility and to vote. And if you carry your flag, and if you fly your flag as proud or gay or queer or anything ... remember your responsibility to be active."





"I just feel like this is the time in our lives that we have to get out and we have to show people, just be vocal about what we believe in, what we stand for," said Jeremy Frank, member of the Texas Juggling Society. "Everybody's welcome. That's my big message."



"When Donald Trump took office ... it seemed like the political climate was attempting to tear down the values that the Pride movement has fought to uphold," said Stacy Wheeler (right), co-organizer of the Balloon Collective. "Although we've experienced bad weather - literally and politically - both this year and last, the Pride movement has shot back a strong 'don't rain on my parade' vibe, and we've made the march happen in full force, almost as if we're saying: 'We're out and we're proud, and we can't be shut down - not by weather and not by closed-minded ideas."

# Time to Choose

Ground Floor Theatre's *There and Back* lets us spend a lifetime with an immigrant and all the decisions she makes

"I'm choosing this moment!"

The woman making this declaration does so with a righteous fury, her eyes ablaze, her voice as hard and heated as iron from a forge. And we in the audience understand where her fire is coming from, because by this point in Raul Garza's There and Back, we've lived a lifetime with this woman, watched her from the day John F. Kennedy was inaugurated to the day Donald J. Trump was, from the time when she was a young mujer new to the United States to the time when

she is an elderly abuela still ensconced in the small shack where she first joined her husband in a South Texas farmworkers' camp in 1961. She's remained there for so long - much longer than she truly wanted -

because she believed she had no choice but to stay. Now, though, in the twilight of life, she has resolved to decide her own fate.

Time is key to Garza's drama. The great span of it allows us to see how much the life of this woman, Gloria, develops and changes after the fateful day she enters this country and learns that the bright future she imagined for herself and her husband north of the border is not to be. It lets us witness all the choices Gloria makes and does not make that cause her life to contract from what it might have been, from what she dreamed it would be. All that time lets us follow not only her personal evolution from wife to mother to grandmother, but also her political evolution from submissive spouse bending to her husband's will to ardent advocate for the rights of farmworkers, especially fellow migrants from Mexico. Garza cannily works into this aspect of the tale a brief history - and critique - of recent U.S. policy toward Mexican immigration, including the bracero program of the Forties and Fifties, the expansion of border maguiladoras in the Sixties and Seventies, the Reagan administration's amnesty act for undocumented immigrants, and the current administration's efforts to increase deportations to Mexico and build that big honkin' wall. With each decade that Gloria stays in the U.S. without any official status and as anti-immigrant rhetoric grows more inflammatory, her situation becomes more precarious.

The first incarnation of There and Back was only 10 minutes, as it was generated through ScriptWorks' Out of Ink program for writing 10-minute plays. That version followed the

same storyline with the same characters, but its brevity made Gloria's situation something we accepted intellectually more than felt. Expanding the play by two hours lets us come to know Gloria more fully and feel the passage of six decades in our hearts. It also offers a

profound gift to Karina Dominguez, who played Gloria in the 10-minute play and returns to the role here. For in Ground Floor Theatre's production, Garza and director Patti Neff-Tiven give the actor a wealth of air - space without speaking to just be in the

> character's skin. In the rich silence of the play's opening minutes, Dominguez, with only expression and movement, conveys the young Gloria's propriety, her nervousness at being in a new country, her revulsion

at the living conditions she encounters, the comfort at finding her husband's scent on his shirt. It establishes an intimacy with us, one that Dominguez masterfully deepens in every scene, with every gesture and line. As time passes, her Gloria ages gracefully and convincingly, with every loss and disappointment



carefully packed away inside her. That's why we grasp so readily the ferocity with which she finally chooses to choose. Dominguez has led us to that moment, our hand in hers.

Linked to all of Gloria's losses and disappointments are the men in her world. The three closest to her - husband Victor, son Ray, and grandson Max – are all played by Mical Trejo, who succeeds in creating three distinctive characters, each a man of his time and culture and each appealing in a different way but all possessing the same genes for masculine pride and sense of superiority, believing they know what's best for Gloria.

When the pressure they bring to bear on Gloria gets to her - which is often - she turns to prayer and lights a candle to the Virgen de Guadalupe, who appears as if conjured. With contemporary dress, attitude, and language ("Bitch, please!"), this Virgen is able to speak to Gloria as a friend - her only friend. (Giselle Marie Muñoz is a delight in the part and several other roles.) Like the playwright and director with Dominguez, she creates the space for Gloria to find herself and get her from "there" to "back." It's a journey that is satisfying and thought-provoking, suggesting that it's never too late to choose that moment.

Austin, you have been called out. Called out for your racism, your inequality, your insensitivity, your police brutality, your white privilege, your greed, your ignorance,

Called out for not protecting lifelong residents of historic neighborhoods from developers who drive prices up and drive black and brown people out.

your blindness, your blandness.

Called out for not saving cultural spaces and not treating all artists fairly.

Called out for catering to the wealthy at the expense of the needy.

Called out for forgetting what you are, and the things and people that made you special.

Zell Miller III has been paying attention, Austin, and in his latest theatrical project. Echo of a Refugee ... Me?, this native son let you know that, delivering a state-of-the-city

address from the perspective of the Eastside, from the perspective of black Austinites, from the perspective of a citizen who sees his hometown acting like black lives don't matter.

This was Miller doing what he has done so powerfully for more than 25 years: igniting words

and firing them at audiences, where they blaze and dazzle, casting heat and light. He is a poet of the first order, molding language and rhythm into passion-fueled vehicles for truth able to, as I wrote on Miller's induction into the Austin Arts Hall of Fame in 2017, "crack open any issue, pierce any position, slice through bullshit ... exposing the deceit, hatred, injustice, or the beauty, hope, light." In this case, Miller largely focused on the "deceit, hatred, injustice" side, zeroing in on the policies making life even harder and more unfair for Austin's citizens of color than they have already been for generations and not hesitating to name names of offenders (Mayor Adler, Zach Theatre, the Chronicle). I've never known Miller not to be political in his writing and performance or not to make the political personal, but if there was a difference here, it was that instead of dealing with the effect on himself or his family, he focused on his home, his frustration and outrage over the degradation of this place where he's lived his whole life. Throughout Echo of a Refugee ... Me?, Miller expressed a loss as personal as if looters had broken into his house and stolen everything precious to him.

But it wasn't just Miller talking. Along with spoken-word segments (backed by the propulsive drumming of Thomas Wheeler and mesmerizing bass of Sir Charles), Miller gave voice to five other Austinites with their own views of what's going down in their city now: a barber, a call-in talk-show host, a 10-yearold boy, a theatre company director, and a white ally of the Black Lives Matter movement. Each was called upon to speak - the barber to his customer, the radio host to his listeners, the boy to the City Council, the director to his audience, the ally to a reporter - and through their discourse, each displayed

> personality traits that made them more than mouthpieces: the barber's jocularity that shifted to sternness when instructing some young charges in the strategy of chess; the host's political savvy, which he teasingly undercut with wry references to himself as an uneducated product of public

schools; the boy's weariness in making his soft-spoken appeal for the council members' help so his family won't have to keep moving to find somewhere affordable to live. They were individuals, and it's a tribute to Miller's empathy and acting skills that he imbued even the privileged, presumptuous white ally - who could have easily been just a cartoonish straw man - with some humanity.

The theatre director's address came after his company's final performance in a space that was closing after 22 years, a move he blamed on the city's lack of respect and support for the vital work his company had done. Though the speech was made in character, it was tempting to wonder if Miller was speaking for himself, airing his own grievances over the lack of support for all he's done. I hope the closing of Echo of a Refugee ... Me? was not the end for Miller's work in Austin. His voice is vital, and the city needs to hear his truth, even if it burns. - R.F.



# The Light That Burnt Twice as Bright

Austin's Duct Tape Messiah lives again in the tragic Blaze

In 1999, The Austin Chronicle published a piece in memory of Blaze Foley, an influential singer-songwriter who was shot and killed a decade earlier in Austin at the tooyoung age of 39. That article, which revisited Foley's impact on his fellow folk musicians and explored the addiction issues he shared with his friend Townes Van Zandt, helped introduce a new generation of music fans to Foley's work. It also paved the way for Kevin Triplett's 2011 documentary Blaze Foley: Duct Tape Messiah, which featured rare footage and comprehensive interviews with some of the people who knew Foley best. Seven years later, Foley has finally gotten the biopic treatment his life so clearly deserved, with native son Ethan Hawke adapting biography Living in the Woods in a Tree: Remembering Blaze Foley for the big screen.

In keeping with the fragmented life of its lead character, Blaze (executive produced by Chronicle co-founder Louis Black) breaks down the story of Foley (Dickey) into three unique sections. In one, we watch him play to an empty Austin bar as he finally issues recordings of his original works; in another, we listen to Townes Van Zandt (Sexton) discuss the brilliance of his friend in an interview performed shortly after Foley's death. Connecting these two narratives is an exploration of Foley's relationship with ex-partner and Living in the Woods author Sybil Rosen

(Shawkat), a love story that follows the two from Texas to Chicago to New York City and back again. Each framing device offers a different perspective of the singer's career, and like Foley himself - a man with countless stories to his name, some of which might even be true - each viewpoint only adds to the legend of the man's complicated life.

Despite his unique career path, there are times when Blaze seems cut from the same cloth as countless other musical biopics. Hawke's film may move neatly between several periods in Foley's life, but the progression

of his story is not altogether unfamiliar. We watch Foley and Rosen's relationship flourish until the demands of the music industry pull the two of them apart; Foley also falls in with a crowd of musicians - led by Van Zandt - who openly embrace their self-destructive lifestyle. Those who complain about the predictability of music biopics will find more than a few familiar notes in Blaze, even accounting for its multiple chronological storylines.

What separates Blaze from its peers, however, is the obvious affection the filmmakers have for their assortment of damaged characters. In Ben Dickey, Hawke and company have found a remarkable physical and musical double for Foley. The Arkansan first-time actor is able to capture both sides of the singer-songwriter, including the man's warmth toward his loved ones and anger toward all injustices (actual or perceived). Still, Blaze cannot help but be anchored to Shawkat's performance. The film is adapted from Rosen's book on her own complicated relationship with Foley, making this Shawkat's story to tell. Her relationship with her partner may falter, but Rosen remains a resolute and independent person throughout, and there's a maturity to their love story that feels welcome from a biopic.

And then there's the music. In casting professional musicians to play both Foley and Van Zandt, Blaze has put the two artists' songs front and center, exploring music in the noncommercial venues they frequented throughout their lives. This is as much a love letter to the vibrancy of local music scenes as anything else; we see him perform in family-style restaurants, hotel rooms, and half-empty dive bars, often listening to his gruff voice above the clamor of polite conversation and waitstaff. Even the frequent altercations between Foley and members of his audiences are handled off-camera, keeping the focus on the lo-fi performances he strung together throughout his career. You may not always like the man, but Blaze makes sure you'll damn well love his songs.

### ALPHA

If you, like me, follow an assortment of dogs on Instagram, then there's no shortage of wonderful mutt videos already in your life. For the rest of you, there's Alpha, the 20,000-year-old story of how mankind came about its first canine friend. Keda (Smit-McPhee of Slow West, Let Me In), son of a mighty chieftain, has always failed to live up to the expectations that come with his bloodline. When his tribe sets out on their annual buffalo hunt, Keda decides the time has come to prove his worth, only to be left for dead after a violent stampede. Now Keda must form an unlikely partnership with a wounded wolf if either of them are to survive the long trek back home.

You might reasonably assume that Alpha is a hodgepodge of special effects that caters specifically to dog lovers, and you'd be mostly right. Once boy and dog are united, the movie takes the two across a predictable series of adventures meant to prove their lovalty to each other. Alpha even takes a page from other origin films and overexplains every aspect of dogs' domestication. If you've ever wondered where your pet learned to instinctively hunt for sticks, play tug-of-war, or come to you when you whistle, don't worry, this movie has the answer.

And yet, certain choices in the film feel directly at odds with its family-friendly aspirations. For one, Alpha is presented entirely in subtitles, with the human characters speaking to each other in a pre-English language (when they do bother to speak at all). For another, the action is often framed with the precision of a National Geographic photographer. Silhouettes abound; many of the film's shots use an arresting combination of colors and static compositions to add vibrancy to the narrative. If the film was intended to be as accessible as possible, then nobody bothered to pass this information along to the photography department.

In fact, the two stars of Alpha are not Smit-McPhee and the canine actor but Martin Gschlacht and Sandra Granovsky, the film's cinematographer and editor, respectively. Since the narrative amounts to a series of survival vignettes, the action is often stitched together through a mixture of landscape shots and time-lapse photography. The resulting sequences might as well be lifted directly from Godfrey Reggio's Qatsi trilogy; watching these pockets of pure cinema emerge from a "crowd-pleasing" story of a boy and his dog may just be one of the oddest experiences you have at the movies this summer.

### CRAZY RICH ASIANS

A couple splits dessert at a New York cafe. Both university professors, they've only been dating a year, but they're in love, so he's decided to invite her to attend a wedding back home with him. Someone else at the cafe overhears them - someone nicknamed

"Radio Free Asia" for her ability to move information – and this someone swiftly fires off a few texts. Before the happy couple has even paid their bill, all of Southeast Asia seems to know that Nick Young (Golding), the favorite son of a Singapore family dynasty, is bringing his ABC girlfriend Rachel Chu (Wu) home to meet Mom.

Kevin Kwan used footnotes in his addictive bestseller Crazy Rich Asians to explain the cultural mores, the dizzying social strata, the catty shorthand of this milieu. The script by Peter Chiarelli and Adele Lim isn't as explicitly instructive, but there's ample context clues in the posh set's sniffs at Rachel for being American-born Chinese, and the icy glares of Nick's mom (Yeoh, luminous, and lethal) at this interloper for nabbing her son, Singapore's most coveted bachelor.

Of course Rachel doesn't know any of this going in - Nick has divulged very little about his crazy rich relations - and so as she arrives in Singapore, she moves in a parallel track with the audience in discovering just how crazy rich (like, stupid rich). Crazy Rich Asians may be steeped in Asian cultures, but it satisfies that very American pastime of simultaneously deriding and ogling the conspicuous consumption of the onepercent, and it gets some wickedly funny jabs in at the fabulously wealthy. But it isn't mean-spirited. Rather, Crazy Rich Asians' prevailing mood is one of joyfulness. I got a contact high.

Director Jon M. Chu previously tried his hand at a number of genres in a string of profitable but middling films, most of them sequels (two Step Up movies, G.I. Joe: Retaliation, Now You See Me 2). Romantic comedy, turns out, fits him like a glove. He brings a bouncy energy to the genre's tropes, dispatching "dressing room montage" and "heart-melting declaration of love" like a pro and with distinctly more visual verve than usually attends the genre. As for rom-com's standard-issue mouthy best friend? You couldn't do better than Awkwafina, playing Rachel's old college roommate and hilariously proving that "nouveau riche" translates to every culture.

That Midas touch with casting extends to the rest of Crazy Rich Asians' international mélange of actors, who make lasting impressions in parts inevitably abbreviated from the

book, Gemma Chan, as Nick's placid-surface/ roiling-depths cousin Astrid, is exquisite, and Nico Santos makes for an enjoyably dishy Oliver, a cousin from one of the family tree's droopier branches. Playing the leading man, Golding, a model and travel show host in his first big acting gig, doesn't have a lot to work with, but ably performs his required duties, which are to be devoted, honorable, and swoon-worthy. And Wu quite simply is a stunner. Best known for playing the tough-love matriarch from ABC's Fresh off the Boat, she betters the book version of Rachel by making her earthier, steelier, and more playful. One of Rachel's subplots has been dramatically condensed from the book, part of an overall smart snipping to keep the focus on Rachel's fish-out-of-water story. That means a certain actor doesn't even make an appearance until a twinkling cameo at film's end - a sure sign of the filmmakers' confidence a sequel is coming. To which I say: More, please, yes.

### MCQUEEN

This documentary about the late British clothing designer Alexander McOueen puts the viewer in the right headspace right away, and I mean that literally: The film opens with a camera slowly swirling around a skull. Red droplets splash on the cranium. In Michael Nyman's score, a brass section booms rhythmically like blood in your ears. The effect is brooding and provocative. It's pure drama.

It's perfectly Alexander McQueen.

Returned to throughout to mark chapter breaks, the skull motif serves another purpose: of previewing McOueen's design aesthetic via images projected onto the skull, butterflies alighting on the empty eye sockets, and golden ram horns fused to the bone, all of it at once gorgeous and macabre. These sequences were created by McQueen's nephew, Gary James McQueen, who worked in his uncle's atelier and also sits for the camera, one of many of the designer's intimates who speak lovingly of the so-called bad boy of British fashion, who took his own life in 2010. They include some of the first collaborators who joined up with him after his Savile Row apprenticeship and stint in fashion school, when the self-described "East End yob" launched his eponymous line, and others who came on when Givenchy hired him as chief designer - an uneasy fit. Home videos show McQueen and his team giddy and almost impossibly young, full of laughter. Some of that team dropped away as his star continued its meteoric rise (the estrangement with early patroness Isabella Blow figures prominently) and as wealth, fame. drugs, and the punishing pressure of producing 14 collections a year all contributed to a deepening depression.

A handful of models also speak to their experience with him, but notably not Kate Moss, a close friend, or Shalom Harlow, whose 1999 catwalk moment being sprayed with a paint gun wielded by two giant robotic arms is the stuff of legend. Only in this case, the legend is real and preserved in perpetuity on tape, one of a dozen of his astonishing and transgressive shows featured in the film. They were as much performance art as clothes showcase, and a very public expression of McQueen's private torments and fixations. Even more than the moving testimonials of his friends, it is this access, this front-row seat to the spectacle and staggering genius, that makes the film a must-see. It's as close as most of us will ever get to a McQueen original.

### MINDING THE GAP D: Bing Liu. (NR. 93 min.)

This is a documentary about skateboarders: it is not a documentary about skateboarding. While some of the footage is worthy of a *Thrasher* video, the themes and characters run much deeper than any Jackass antics. The threads of this story are woven to create a picture of the struggling working class and all its woes: shit jobs, shut-offs from the electric company, depression, toxic masculinity, and, most especially, domestic abuse.

Director Bing Liu has been filming his skater friends since they were teenagers in Rockford, III., an area pretty hard hit by the recession. The two main characters in Minding the Gap are charismatic in their own ways: There's Keire, the youngest, an endearing grown child open with his emotions, whether joy, anger, or sorrow; and Zach, the de facto leader of the group, who has a baby on the way with girlfriend Nina, who also has a pretty large role though she is not a skater. While the film focuses on three or so years of their inevitable march toward adulthood, the editors (Liu and Joshua Altman) have intercut old footage so smoothly that it would be nearly impossible to detect the transitions if it weren't for the graininess, the fish-eye lens, and the fresh young (familiar) faces. Liu has served as a camera assistant. and his skills are on display here: There's something inexplicably soothing about the wide shots of the boys rolling along, spiraling down the levels of a parking garage or swerving around city streets at sunset. The narrative meanders in a similar way during the first 30 minutes as Liu clearly struggles with whether or not he wants to insert himself in the movie (his stepfather used to beat him). His proximity to the material makes for some rather questionable directorial decisions (he sometimes frames people's faces too closely), and he's an unassertive presence behind the lens. There's a scene where Zach asks him if he wants to act like Bing is there or isn't, and Bing replies, "Just do whatever you want." The way he speaks to his interview subjects has the calming tone of a therapist or counselor rather than the probing or investigative style we are used to in documentary filmmaking. Bing seems to be searching for answers or healing, but this is very much a beginning - as everyone is

just puncturing the source of pain like a beer about to be shotgunned.

Suitably, the sound design is rather sparse: Some facts about Rockford are relayed through disembodied voices from news reports, and there's a light score by Nathan Halpern and Chris Ruggiero. But the closing epilogue, (a tearjerker - apologies to my office mates) set to the Mountain Goats' "This Year," is a fitting survivors' song if there ever was one.

### THE NIGHT IS SHORT. WALK ON GIRL

Ever had one of those nights out where everything just falls into place, and everyone just seems perfectly friendly or harmless or easily ignored, and it all turns into a big, fun adventure? That's the entirety of the plot of the awkwardly and inaccurately named anime The Night Is Short, Walk on Girl. The night is anything but short, and the protagonist - simply known as the Girl With Black Hair (Hanazawa) – goes everywhere but home. She ditches a boring boozy party to go out for a night in Kyoto's Ponto Town district, and launches into a cheerful, psychotropic, pop art cavalcade of adventure. Many are inspired, or at least cross paths with, her two new drinking buddies, the amiable Higuchi (Nakai) and chirpy Hanuki (Kaida). Meanwhile her fellow student, the clueless Senpai (Hoshino), is nursing a huge crush on her, and is convinced that if he can just accidentally bump into her enough, that they'll end up together. As the night goes on, her adventures get wilder and more joyous, while he ends up in ever more embarrassing situations.

Each has their own vibrant, wild adventure, filled with hot pots, marketplace gods, too much underwear, too little underwear, impromptu guerrilla street theater, semimythical bootleg rum, library police, homemade cold cures, musical numbers, erotic woodblock prints, magical carp tornadoes, inflatable cowboys, and the most unrequited love and cross-dressing you'll find this side of a Shakespeare problem play. Night Is Short doesn't make a lot of sense, but then it's not supposed to. It's a series of

All the while, there's a very affirming message about how romance shouldn't be hard work, and a subtle demolition of what to U.S. audiences will translate as the "nice guy" trope.

Think of it as the drinking-age elder sibling to director Yuasa's provincial teen mermaid fantasy Lu Over the Wall. It has the same fluid, soft animation; the same drifty, loopy logic; and the same sense of wonder, iust soused in a constant flood of alcohol. Everyone is tipsy all the time, and that's how Yuasa can get away with making what would, in lesser hands, just be a boozy bar crawl into something lighthearted and fantastical.

### RYUICHI SAKAMOTO: CODA

D: Stephen Schible. (NR, 102 min., subtitled)

The creative process is an activity that has always presented a presentational challenge to the medium of film, attempting to render that which is intangible into physical terms. A writer sitting at a desk for hours at a time, a sculptor whittling artwork from a mound of clay, an actor studying lines - unless filming an action painter like Jackson Pollock flinging oils onto a blank canvas, the creative process is generally a static and largely unvarying image of an artist's hands responding to and executing instructions from the imaginative mind. The image usually explains little of the source of inspiration or the artist's intervention. Yet when the image succeeds, a powerful perception can be reached, allowing the viewer to better grasp the ontological relationship between the object and its creator. Ryuichi Sakamoto: Coda aspires to such a goal, and, against all odds, even achieves it on a few occasions.

Ryuichi Sakamoto: Coda is a portrait of the great Japanese music composer. Instead of aiming for biographical overview, this film strives to capture a sense of what makes Sakamoto's music tick. (Hint: It's not a metronome, but rather, the sounds of nature.) Sakamoto has composed scores for dozens of movies (The Last Emperor, The Sheltering Sky, The Revenant) and TV projects, and had his songs appear in dozens more (Call Me by Your Name, Black Rain). He has acted in a few films, was a member of the techno-pop band Yellow Magic Orchestra (appearing onstage in neon makeup), and is a dedicated environmentalist and anti-nuclear activist. He's been awarded an Oscar, a couple of Golden Globes, and lots of other honors. But this film is not the place to look for a career assessment. Instead, first-time director Schible, who filmed over a number of years, wants us to appreciate the wellspring of Sakamoto's creativity, which is, quite literally, nature.

We listen along with Sakamoto to the sound of rain falling into a teacup, nod understandingly when we see Sakamoto stand outside in the rain with a bucket over his head while soaking in the resonance, and watch as he pokes a microphone through a hole in the Arctic tundra to exult in the "pure" water

sound. We see him tuning his "tsunami piano" and visiting Fukushima and anti-nuke demonstrations. He was in New York on 9/11 and notices how music stopped for a time afterward; Schible also conducts interviews with Sakamoto during a long period when the composer was battling cancer and not working, coaxing out the composer's thoughts on mortality and creativity.

Those who are interested in how documentarians capture artistry on film will find good examples in Ryuichi Sakamoto: Coda. It helps to come to the film with some foreknowledge of Sakamoto's career, however. The film takes 20 minutes before providing a clear indication of what makes Sakamoto an original subject for a film study. Nevertheless, days later, when you can't get the musical theme of Merry Christmas, Mr. Lawrence out of your head, you'll come to understand Sakamoto's importance.

### SKATE KITCHEN

Similar in some ways to Larry Clark's controversial youth-gone-wild flick Kids, Skate Kitchen revolves around a group of young people, sex, skateboarding, and the joys and perils of hanging out, getting stoned, and partying in New York City's Lower East Side. Unlike Clark's 1995 film, however, the kids presented here are for the most part all right. This is director Moselle's narrative feature debut following her acclaimed debut doc The Wolfpack and it focuses on the real-life, all-female NYC skate crew of the title.

The actual members of Skate Kitchen you can check 'em out on Instagram - play fictionalized versions of themselves, acting within the boundaries of Moselle's script, which more or less obliterates the line between documentary cinema verité and traditional narrative filmmaking. As a result, Skate Kitchen's mild melodrama meanders all over the place, not unlike the many skateboarders who shred the skate parks and streets, carving hypnotic, slo-mo figure-eights or outrageous triple ollies on every available surface and obstacle.

After a gnarly accident involving her deck

and her crotch gets the introverted 18-yearold skate rat Camille (the excellent Vinberg) banned from skating by her overprotective single mother (Rodriguez), she clandestinely hooks up with the Skate Kitchen posse and discovers the joys (and pains) of female solidarity in a sport long dominated by misogynistic Thrasher bros. That's about the extent of the borderline generic coming-of-age plot, but exploring the niche subculture of this interracial, pansexual band of outsiders in all its mundane detail makes for a surprisingly sweet film.

Nina Moran is a standout as the queer Skate Kitchen badass: With her backward b-ball cap, loud surfer shirts, and long blond hair, she could've kickflipped into Moselle's movie directly from Stacy Peralta's fourwheeled, SoCal history lesson Dogtown and Z-Boys. None of the young women in the Skate Kitchen crew are in any way "skate bettys," the old-school term for girls who'd hang out with skaters but rarely if ever mounted a Zorlac double-cut of their own. Instead, they're presented as, to use the current slang, totally valid, dude, living in a hyperreal and (to quote skate rock legends Agent Orange) totally bitchin' summer, bloodstains and all.



Like I love watching hiphop documentaries, and to me hip-hop goes hand-in-hand with punk rock or hardcore."

ry as one of the city's premier punk/

hardcore venues.

Coming from punk rock, a culture where you create with whatever tools are at hand, regardless of qualifications, Blackmore did not see why he couldn't make his own punkumentary. After initially discussing it with his wife as a film about hardcore record collectors, he then hit upon a more compelling tack. "Wouldn't it be cool to talk to musi-

> cians about their record collections, and/or the bands that influenced them?"

> For the first Records Collecting Dust, he worked with a bare-bones

crew, filming West Coast punk heroes in their living rooms, surrounded by their record shelves. He caught gold, including Black Flag/ Circle Jerks/Off! vocalist Keith Morris rhapsodizing over him and his friend Chuck taking a \$50 bill Chuck found in his parents' fruit bowl to buy two copies of Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band. Or former Dead Kennedys frontman Jello Biafra insisting, "I just wanted access to a whole fallout shelter of good songs to protect me from crappy radio."



Records Collecting Dust II could almost be subtitled East Coast Edition. Among the 28 seminal Eighties punk/hc legends interviewed: Ian MacKaye (Minor Threat, Fugazi), Brian Baker (Dag Nasty, Bad Religion), Government Issue's Tom Lyle, Cro-Mags' John Joseph, DYS/Dag Nasty/All/Down by Law singer Dave Smalley, Agnostic Front's Roger Miret, and Suburban Voice editor Al **Quint**. As with *RCD1*, many mosh pit heroes confess to Kiss/Led Zeppelin/Hendrix records igniting their music mania. The comedy money shot's courtesy Last Rights/Negative FX/ Slapshot singer Choke musing about how records were once purchased for cool cover

art. Meat Loaf's Bat out of Hell cured him of that: Blackmore said, "He took it home, put it on, and thought, 'What the fuck?!'"

After breaking to "do whatever my wife wants to do," Blackmore envisions RCD3 being Midwest-bound. But, he added, "A few folks have asked, 'Why isn't this a show on Viceland?' You can travel the world with this concept, talking to these people from the punk/alternative/hardcore/metal underground about the records and bands that got them into music in the first place."

Viceland? How'd vou like to feature Nick Cave or Johnny Marr talking about their formative records? Jason Blackmore awaits your call.

The investigation begins, suitably, with a murder. A man is bludgeoned to death on a path by a river, then his corpse is set on fire. It seems like an open-and-shut case: The audience gets a clear view of the face of the killer, Misumi (Yakusho), and he explains his motivations to his attorney Tomoaki Shigemori (Fukuyama). He's already a two-time loser, having beaten a pair of loan sharks to death 30 years earlier. This third, seemingly motiveless murder means the death penalty, and now he faces the gallows.

So where's the drama? It's not so much in if Misumi committed the murder, but why, and to what end? That is the core dilemma at the heart of Hirokazu Kore-eda's questioning of law and order in Japan. In the legal system he portrays, the underlying drive is not to find the absolute truth, but a resolution that makes sense to all parties, and that's been easily achievable for Shigemori in prior cases. Where Kore-eda finds his languid but captivating pace is in the constant itch that there are no ways to quite make all of the pieces fit. It's in Shigemori's restrained frustration that Misumi confessed too quickly, and with too many details, or the wrong details. He did it, yes, but the why is elusive, and taunts him to

dig deeper every time as he faces the convict through an inch of security glass.

Kore-eda deservedly swept this year's Japan Academy Prizes in his triple role as writer, director, and editor, and that's an important combination in structuring the meandering, melancholic tale of what is ultimately a meditation on crime and punishment as defined within Japanese culture. After all, what it means to be institutionalized - a core question in dissecting Misumi's motivation – is a reflection of the institutions.

Suitably painted in muted blues and grays by cinematographer Mikiya Takimoto (who previously shot Like Father, Like Son and Our Little Sister for Kore-eda), The Third Murder is at its best in its understated moments, like Shigemori's meetings with his client, or when he clashes with his father - the same judge who sent Misumi to jail three decades earlier about rehabilitation and the death penalty. That's why the piano score by Ludovico Einaudi never quite meshes, sometimes teetering over the line into melodramatic.

But Kore-eda knows when to let the drama come from the situation and the characters, rather than hyperbolic "You can't handle the truth," "This whole court's out of order" histrionics. Instead, he uses quiet ambiguity to examine a system built on certainty and unquestioned conventions.

# This Is Not Traditional

"Once, we played at a string band festival and this guy came up and asked, 'Are those traditional tunes?" recalls banjoist Jerry Hagins. "Tim replied, 'Half of it is traditional.'"

The other half of **Up Around the Sun**'s formula, like much of the art and music that Tim Kerr creates, evades definition. The seldom-sighted instrumental duo consists of Hagins frailing old-time fiddle and square dance tunes on banjo, while Kerr plays unusual changes and chords on an opentuned acoustic guitar. Last Friday, as the two jammed on the standard "Old Joe Clark" in the art shed behind Kerr's North Loop home. the voicings coming out of his tiny Martin sixstring sounded more like a dulcimer than a guitar and his rhythms evoked Ireland rather than Appalachia.

"I'm not playing what you're supposed to play with this kind of music – not at all," proudly asserts Kerr, who played the Kerrville Folk Festival as a teen fingerpicking folkie fond of Nick Drake, John Martyn, and David Crosby before making his name in seminal DIY acts the Big Boys, Monkeywrench, and Poison 13. "What we're playing is absolutely not in the tradition, but I think it sounds really cool."

"And I'm the straight man," chuckles Hagins, known for accompanying acts including the Barn Owls, Duck Creek String Band, and Stovetop Rangers.

That contrast, Hagins' faithful foundation of American mountain music and Kerr's joyous disregard for 1-4-5 chord changes and standard tuning, results in a wonderfully meditative combo resembling ambient music.

Both musicians contend Up Around the

Sun isn't a band. The project began in 2013 when Kerr asked Hagins, whom he met though Irish and old-time jams at the Rio Rita coffeehouse, to record some banjo tunes for him to study the clawhammer technique. Kerr laid guitar over the tracks and his friend Morgan Coy surprised him by offering to release them as an LP on his local Monofonus Press imprint. Since then, Up Around the Sun has played just four shows, mostly in nontraditional spaces.

As such, it borders on the remarkable that the pair play the elegant Rollins Studio Theatre at the Long Center on Saturday, 8pm. They're joined by Alaskan fiddler Ken Waldman, a fascinating artist who survived a plane crash, taught writing in Alaskan villages, and published volumes of poetry, includ-

ing the recent Trump Sonnets, to blend together music, poetry, and storytelling in unexpected and spontaneous ways.

The show also spotlights art from Kerr, who creates colorful paintings of athletes, musicians, and civil rights heroes on skateboard decks and canvases

The unconventional approach to Saturday's proceedings echoes the multidisciplinary lens through which Kerr views creativity.

"I don't like to separate self-expression at all," says Kerr. "That's why we wanted to do this show."

### WHO'S YOUR LANDLORD?

In the aftermath of our Aug. 3 report about local music venues ending up on the losing side of World Class Capital Group acquiring Downtown properties, the local real estate giant pulled out of a deal to purchase the land at 606 E. Seventh, where Empire Control Room is located, confirmed the club's owner Stephen Sternschein.

The property has since landed on several sale sites for \$2.5 million. That's reportedly steeper than what WCCG agreed on with owners **BBD Commercial**. An employee of the latter reached out to "Playback" asking to be put in touch with music scene billionaire benefactor/real estate mogul Gary Keller, saying he would like to "talk to him about the club."

In related news, the WCCG-owned building at 720 Red River that housed **Headhunters** before sitting empty for four years has opened as the FOMO Factory, an **Instagram**-able art space. According to its operator, the installation will last two months. Rumor has it a coffee chain will take over the building after that.

Also following our report, Encore Records owner Chuck Lokey acknowledged that WCCG had purchased the building occupied by his record shop back in the spring. They've allowed him to continue paying the discount-

ed lease rate set by his previous landlords due to the shop being engulfed by surrounding development. Renderings posted by WCCG on the real estate site LoopNet show a plan to develop the 809 E. Sixth building into a glass-fronted creative office space with "immediate availability," a development more alarming for Lokey if his record shop weren't already circling the proverbial drain.

A staple of Austin retail since 1984, existing on West Anderson Lane before moving to East Sixth in 2012 (revisit "Five O'Clock Land," Jan. 13, 2012), Encore Records could shutter before year's end. Lokey, who survived a heart attack in April, is down to one employee and has exhausted his credit with many of his distributors. He says the metal-centric shop saw a two-thirds decline in business when the city added parking meters to the Eastside in 2015. An obtrusive construction project next door has caused sales to further dry up.

"I rarely see my regulars anymore," admits Lokey. "Most of my business now comes from tourists."

Thus, these may be the final months of Austin's second-oldest record store and the final chapter of Lokey's lifelong saga as a music retail entrepreneur. Now's the time to pay Encore Records a visit - while you still can.

### HALF NOTES

TY RICHARDS, whose track "Western Chauvinist" was pulled from the rotation on **KUTX** after members of far-right men's group **Proud Boys** demonstrated an affinity to it, appeared on the video podcast of the faction's founder Gavin McInnes, who has repeatedly denigrated Muslims, feminists, and the transgender community. The "apolitical" Austin songwriter accepted praise from a real-life Western chauvinist, who called his track "a good, classic rock kinda jam - reminds me of Dream Machine." the band that was laughed out of town after members Matthew and Doris Melton spouted anti-immigrant views.



# Frederick the Younger

STUBB'S, FRIDAY 17

Honest Men open

Swinging between piercing highs and slurring lows, Frederick the Younger frontwoman Jenni Cochran sings with the virtuosic gusto of a Seventies UK punk. She's actually a Clevelander, who discovered her vocal range during a postgrad stay in Vietnam teaching English.

"It was such a musical culture," offered Cochran by phone from Tupelo, Miss., first stop on FTY's summer-ending tour. "Every school function would always involve a singing component. There'd be close to 1,000 people at these things, so I got up there and realized singing wasn't as terrifying as it seemed."

As she serenaded Vietnamese students with Lady Gaga covers, the duo's other half, Aaron Craker, worked on a solo garage rock project in Louisville called Dr. Vitamin. When Cochran moved there with her parents after Nam, she

stumbled upon a Dr. Vitamin show.

"She was the missing element," says Craker of his former project, adding that they bonded over a shared love for David Bowie and the Beatles, so forging their own sound proved a work in progress. "She'd come up with fully formed songs, but it took me a bit to figure out the right chords to match them."

The two became Frederick the Younger in 2015, and as they became closer. Craker slowly learned to accentuate, echo, and expand upon Cochran's rich, wailing melodies with tremolo guitar sections and rich instrumentation brought to life by a dexterous rhythm section. It all manifests into a rockish, groove-pop iteration of the Yeah Yeahs combined with UK punk standouts Siouxsie & the Banshees.
