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
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

MAGIC CARPETS AND GONDOLAS

Dear Editor

Thank you for your eve-opening report "Mapping Our Transitions" ["Public Notice," News, Aug. 30] on the new land development code, due to be adopted in an alarmingly short time. It is something that the city will live with for decades. The code aims to fill the gaps on affordability and public transport and replace private motor vehicle commuting.

But there is a cookie-cutter approach that does not seem to examine if and where "missing middle" housing is really missing. Instead, it appears to assume that all "mobility corridors" lack this. It plans the conversion of entire strips of the city into high-density multifamily units. These mile-long blocks of middle-rise, high-density housing without on-site parking will line the transport corridors.

This is irrational. Transport corridors will (realistically speaking) be serviced by buses. Buses stop frequently. They must pull out safely without cars and bicycles blocking them. In the urban core, several bus routes also overlap for considerable distances.

If all residents of the new units dutifully ditch their cars, there will assuredly be delivery vans for various goods illegally parked. Not to speak of construction traffic while this densification is constructed ...

So unless corridors are serviced by a procession of magic carpets, the new plan will pretty certainly generate massive gridlock along the so-called mobility corridors. If they are to really work, then rather than densify without parking, the plan should freeze densification along corridors except where little-used strip malls with vast parking lots offer real opportunities for clusters of mixed residential and commercial development with bus stops.

Finally, strange but true, water will not run uphill. Increasing permeable cover on Mount Bonnell (say) will not alleviate flooding on Onion Creek. Waller and Shoal creeks converge Downtown. Are the planners considering public gondola transit during rainy months? They should. Sincerely, Sumit Guha

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




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

HEADLINES

BAD BACKGROUND The shooter who killed seven people in Midland and Odessa on Aug. 31 reportedly purchased his military-style rifle via a private sale, evading a federal background check that would have prevented the sale. Seth Ator (eventually killed by police) had previously failed a background check.

PIPELINE BLUES On Aug. 28. City Council received a city memo on the potential risks created by the Permian Highway Pipeline, proposed to transport natural gas across the Hill Country, south of Austin, and on to Houston. The Watershed Protection memo reported that pipeline easements would damage endangered species habitats, potentially pollute the Edwards Aquifer - and that there is little the city can do to stop or regulate it.

REST IN PEACE Imam Mohamed-Umer Esmail, better known as "Sheikh Umer," passed away this week (his funeral was held Tuesday). Sheikh Umer was known for his interfaith efforts and served as an Imam at three Austinarea mosques.

NEXT STOP AUSTIN Massachusetts Sen. Elizabeth Warren returns to Austin for a town hall to discuss her campaign for the Democratic presidential nomination on Sept. 10 (likely en route to the Houston debate stage next Thursday). Warren was a law professor at UT from 1983-87.

GET THERE ATX As one of many steps toward achieving Austin Strategic Mobility Plan's goal of 50/50 mode share by 2039 - that's getting 50% of Austinites out of their cars and onto public transit, bikes, scooters, etc. - Austin Transportation launched GetThereATX.com. a website tapped to be the "ultimate" resource on sustainable transport to help residents learn about their other transportation options.

SUMMER CLEANING Pool fans will have to swim elsewhere for a few days while Deep Eddy closes for its biannual cleaning from Sept. 9-11. (The deep end will open Sept. 9 and 11.)

PARTISAN GERRYMANDER On Tuesday, a panel of North Carolina state judges ruled the maps drawn for legislative districts unconstitutional, saying "The effect of these carefully crafted partisan maps is that, in all but the most unusual election scenarios, the Republican Party will control a majority of both chambers of the General Assembly." New maps must be drawn - in public - by Sept. 18.

The City Council's long, hot summer of homelessness continued Tuesday night (Sept. 3) as South Austin neighbors turned out at St. Edward's University for a not-always-friendly dialogue with Mayor Steve Adler, Mayor Pro Tem Delia Garza, and Council Members Kathie Tovo, Ann Kitchen, and Pio Renteria (whose three districts meet at St. Ed's). Digital Spills in the Silicon Hills

ON THE CITY'S - AND OUR OWN - AWKWARD RELATIONSHIP WITH TECH

journalist brought to mind a familiar, old, sad, refrain: Why is the city of Austin's website so bad?

A few years back, when I chaired the city's Task Force on Community Engagement, we heard this question a lot: varia-

tions on the theme accounted for at least a third of the input we received, digested, and reported back to the City Council. It might be more succinct here to point to a few things people *did* like about the city's digital presence - some cool stuff made possible

A week or so ago, a tweet from a fellow by the city's open data portals and some social initiatives that, as is true elsewhere, rose and fell with the talent and attention

level of the folks at the controls.

But on the whole, the city's tech offerings got one-star reviews across the board - buggy, ugly,

hard to navigate, hard to actually read, with search functions that are worse than useless. Doing business with the city online, or within the organization, was a crapshoot given the city's fragile tech capacity, despite broad interest and repeated promises to

make government more efficient and responsive. (To illustrate, digital time sheets for city workers, first proposed ages ago and likely a fact of life in your workplace, are included in this year's budget as an "efficiency improvement" to help save money and get under the new state revenue cap.)

DON'T YOU KNOW WHERE YOU ARE?

The TFCE itself was charged to explore. and was presented with by the community, options for digital outreach - virtual town halls, real-time polling, crowdsourced data gathering, maps and visualizations, etc. that the city could not even begin to devel-CONTINUED ON P.12

op or support, even though they weren't exactly futuristic. (The add-on engagement platform, branded as Speak Up Austin, was at that point a legacy product no longer supported by its third-party developer.)

The relevant city staffers made no pretense to the contrary; they gladly conceded these flaws, promised a reboot was in the offing, and looked the other way as departments threw up sites on Wix, created their own social media accounts, and asked for forgiveness later. The TFCE was formed in 2015, when this was already old news; as a journalist and a consultant, I'd heard (and made!) complaints about the city's online sloppiness since the 1990s.

From then to now, those complaints were followed promptly by an observation you may have made in your head reading this: This is Austin! This is our brand! How hard can this be? Even if you concede that in earlier days, Austin had to grapple with a bona fide digital divide, at this point even children and grandmothers, Eastside and Westside, have not just higher expectations as users but better skills as creators, coders, developers, and community managers. On any given weekend night Downtown (maybe just on Rainey or West Sixth) we could lasso enough talent to rebuild the city website the following weekend, once everyone sobered up. (On the margins, some city projects have taken the hackathon route and already done so.)

OUR CULTURE AND OUR EXPECTATIONS

Sure, after a week punctuated by yet another Second Amendment rampage on Texas soil (say it with me: r-e-df-l-a-g-l-a-w), yet another Worst Hurricane on Record, and what-the-hell-*ever* is going on in London, whining about the city of Austin's website is petty even if everyone else is doing it. (And sure, when you approach the civic-minded and ask, as the TFCE did, "Tell us how you really feel about the government!" you're going to get more salt than sugar.)

I know enough of the backstory to answer the initial question of *why*, or at least how, City Hall landed where it has technologically – big bureaucracy, silos, nobody talks to each other, public contracting is hard, key personnel have jumped ship, the usual. The more important question is: Why do we put up with this? Especially given that "we" the people of Austin include some of the best tech minds in the world? It's not like *none* of that talent has ever found its way into the city organization, or its cadre of consultants, or into the spaces (like the TFCE) where the city comes face-to-face with what is possible and what people want.

Why has so little changed for so long? I suppose it reflects the chronic, culturally reinforced low expectations we've been encouraged, particularly in Texas, to have for our government. Perhaps these are particularly low among the savvier demographics who would otherwise have higher standards – younger, richer in financial and human capital, less rooted in Austin, less engaged with civic life until they feel some urgency or necessity to demand change to systems (not just technological ones) they've become accustomed to working around instead.

And I also suppose it reflects a still palpable psychic distance between Austin's tech community and others in town. Even after 30-plus years of digitally driven growth, we haven't yet fully integrated innovation and tech fluency into our identity and civic DNA, into what it truly, obviously means to be an Austinite. Perhaps the deficits in the city's digital presence are the same ones we all need to fill as we continue to learn how best to use the assets we have to make this town work.

But that will no doubt change, with just four weeks left until the debate starts in earnest.

DEMS: SPECIAL SESSION ON GUNS

On Wednesday morning, Democratic legislators in Houston, Dallas, San Antonio, Austin, and El Paso issued reverberating public calls on Gov. **Greg Abbott** to convene an "emergency session on gun violence" (as only the governor can do) in response to recent gun massacres in Texas and the ongoing toll of gun violence. "But it is not only mass shootings we must respond to," they wrote in a letter to the governor, signed by 61 Democrats. "More than 3,000 people lose their lives to gun violence in Texas each year. That horrifying statistic alone should prompt us to take action."

On the south steps of the Capitol, 11 Central Texas legislators, joined by state Sen. **Royce West** of Dallas, reiterated a call to action. "Thoughts and prayers have their place," said Rep. **Celia Israel**, but said public officials have been elected to "write laws, to take action, and to lead in the face of tragedy." She and the others insisted that Abbott has a responsibility to call a special session to respond to the ongoing gun violence, and that such a session could focus on five priority actions: • enabling **extreme risk protective orders** (aka "**red flag**" **laws**) to remove guns from people in crisis;

- closing background check loopholes on all gun sales;
- banning the sale of high-capacity magazines;
- limiting **open carry** of some semiautomatic long guns;
 requiring the reporting of **stolen guns** to law
- enforcement.

A spokesman for Abbott's office responded that the governor (as well as House Speaker **Dennis Bonnen** and Lt. Gov. **Dan Patrick**) has appointed committees and task forces to consider the issues, and that Democrats should talk to their colleagues and develop consensus. "Legislating on tough issues is hard and takes time," said Abbott spokesman John Wittman.

Given that the 86th Texas Legislature in its regular session only enacted legislation to make it *easier* to own and carry guns, why would a special session be different? According to Rep. **Donna Howard**, "It depends on Gov. Abbott. If he decides to lead on this

AISD COPS TAKE UNION HEAD'S PHONE

Austin ISD police are investigating an incident that occurred at the board of trustees meeting on Aug. 26, according to a district spokesperson. As the Chronicle reported last week, anti-LGBTQ groups rallied at the meeting to decry proposed changes to the district's sex education curriculum for grades 3-8; eventually, trans activist Naomi Wilson stood up and called out their dehumanizing rhetoric. While Wilson left the room voluntarily without incident, it appears someone on the other side could be looking to press charges against her. According to a Facebook post from anti-LGBTQ provocateurs MassResistance Texas. "LGBT activists are now emboldened to physically assault objectors who are simply stating the facts in board meetings." The post provided no evidence that such an assault occurred, but AISD police acknowledged in a statement they are investigating an "incident" at the meeting, without providing more details.

Education Austin president Ken Zarifis told us that AISD police approached him on Aug. 30, to obtain a video he recorded of Wilson's protest on his phone, which he refused to provide until the detectives obtained a warrant Friday evening. According to Zarifis, though he offered to send investigators the video via email, they instead seized his phone, returning it about 48 hours later. AISD would not confirm what its officers were seeking with the warrant.

Wilson told us on Sept. 3 that she hired a lawyer but has not been contacted by AISD police or by Concerned Parents members. "I hired an attorney to be proactive in my defense," Wilson told us. "But I was surprised when I learned of [the allegation], because the night of the incident, [AISD Superintendent] **Paul Cruz** appeared to be on my side. He invited me back to the meeting and said he wanted to meet with me in the future, so it's all really surprising." – *Austin Sanders*



A TRIBUTE TO BILL WITTLIFF A STORYTELLER IN FILM, PHOTOGRAPHS, AND BOOKS

Bill Wittliff died on June 9, 2019 of a heart attack at his home in Austin, Texas. Bill Wittliff's career was too various, and his influence too widespread and powerful, to be corralled into any one category. He was a scattershot genius: filmmaker, photographer, storyteller, impresario of statues and public monuments, publisher, and collector of books, paintings, sculptures, and arrowheads. Among all his achievements in film, photography and books, it may be the Wittliff Collections at Texas State University (dedicated to preserving the culture of Texas and the Southwest) that will stand as his most resonant legacy. Bill wanted the Collections to be exactly the opposite of a stuffy archive. He wanted it to be a place of inspiration for young writers, photographers, musicians, and filmmakers. The Wittliff Collections is a seamless continuation of the inspiration that Bill supplied during his lifetime to generations of fellow writers and filmmakers and photographers.

On Friday, Aug. 30, city staff released its third and final memo offering recommendations to Council on how to move forward with Austin's strategy to **end homelessness**. The four-page memo responds to Council's request that staff investigate potential sites where public **camping**, **sitting**, **or lying** could be restricted or outright prohibited; it identifies potential "non-criminal remedies" the city could deploy to address such behaviors without involving the police.

The memo does not identify specific streets or intersections where camping could be limited; instead, it suggests

Council look at "high pedestrian traffic areas, high vehicular traffic areas," and "high flood risk areas" as it considers public camping restrictions. Staff directs Council's attention to the rules established in May for scooters: "In the same manner that parking micro-mobility devices can obstruct pedestrian traffic "the period.

trian traffic," the memo reads, "the objects belonging to individuals experiencing homelessness could also obstruct pedestrian traffic." The memo also highlights a policy out of Berkeley, Calif., that places restrictions on structures erected in the public right of way as a model for addressing the tents and cardboard shelters that have become more prevalent since Austin's camping restrictions were eased on July 1.

Even in its current form, the camping ordinance already prohibits people or structures from obstructing the right of way, and at a Friday afternoon press conference following the memo's release, Mayor **Steve Adler** told reporters, "It would have been nice to have some greater specificity" from staff. He said Council will flesh out next steps in coming weeks, ahead of their first post-budget meeting on Sept. 19, when he expects some action to be taken. Adler also reiterated that ticketing or arresting people with nowhere else to go was not the way out of the problem, calling each instance "a loss for our city."

Instead, he urged Austinites to be "tolerant of the whole spectrum" of homelessness

by providing different types of housing for people in different situations: from lowbarrier shelters for people who just need a bed for the night or a place to store their belongings, upward to permanent supportive housing that helps people address the underlying issues that result in long-term homelessness.

However, until the city can provide those options for those who need them, some council members are interested in acting on the staff recommendation to limit camping in some areas. CMs **Ann Kitchen** and **Kathie Tovo** are working on a proposal they intend to bring to Council on Sept. 19 that would restrict camping in areas that pose a health or safety risk – such as along creeks or riverbeds or on traffic islands and medians near busy roadways. Tovo told the *Chronicle* that her initial thinking about banning camping on some streets has shifted, and she is



unsure of the best approach to making life on the streets safer. "We have to consider what to do with parts of Guadalupe and Congress," she told us, "which have lots of pedestrian and vehicular traffic. A targeted approach identifying parts of those streets might work best."

Regarding enforcement of existing laws against people experiencing homelessness, the memo suggests "non-criminal" approaches such as those used by the **Downtown Austin Community Court** (DACC) and the **Homeless Outreach Street Team** (HOST), rather than bringing criminal charges (at no small cost to the city) that often make it more difficult for people to exit homelessness. When "vulnerable defendants" are sent to the DACC for offenses, says the memo, the first step is to address

the "quality of life" circumstances in the individual's life that may have contributed to the offense and to respond with deferred prosecutions, negotiated dispositions, or expunctions. Meanwhile, the multiagency HOST acts as the vanguard that can help people living on the streets connect to services before they interact with the criminal justice system. CM Greg Casar told the Chronicle Tuesday that both options would be critical in not only helping to lift people out of chronic homelessness, but also in helping save the city money. "We spend so much money responding to 911 calls," he said. "We need to do more to prevent those situations in the first place by getting people the services and housing they need so we don't wind up spending money on jail and hospital beds." -Austin Sanders

AS THE BLOOD DRIPS, TEXAS' LATEST PRO-GUN LAWS KICK IN

Never let it be said that Texas lawmakers have done nothing to respond to increasingly frequent **massacres by gun** like those that occurred in August in **El Paso** and **Midland/ Odessa**. They have certainly responded – they've made it easier to acquire guns, easier to keep them, and less likely for gun owners to incur legal consequences.

Here are a (selected) few of the gun laws enacted by 2019's **86th Texas Legislature**; all of the gun laws signed by Gov. **Greg Abbott** *loosened* existing restrictions on ownership and possession:

• **HB 121**: Provides a defense of licensed gun owners for entering a "no guns allowed" establishment

• **HB 302**: Prohibits landlords from restricting gun possession by tenants

• **SB 741**: Prohibits property owners associations from imposing regulations on gun possession and storage, or "lawful discharge"

• **HB 1143**: Prohibits school districts from regulating gun storage in parking areas

• **HB 1177**: Allows unlicensed gun owners to carry during disaster evacuations

You might remember that in 2015, Abbott lamented the news that Californians were buying firearms in greater numbers than Texans. "I'm EMBARRASSED," Abbott tweeted. "Let's pick up the pace Texans." Of the 2019 response, Kris Brown of gun control organization **Brady** told CNN: "Texas lawmakers ... doubled down on an NRA-led agenda to encourage guns everywhere, no matter the risks and costs to safety." Abbott is now suggesting "expedited executions" as a response to gun violence. Since Texas already executes many more people than any other state, it's unclear how this is supposed to be effective.

One proposal that didn't make it through the legislative gauntlet this spring – covered in identical **House Bill 131**

and **Senate Bill 157**, respectively authored by Rep. Joe Moody and Sen. José Rodriguez, both El Paso Democrats – would have created **extreme risk protective orders**, better known as a **red flag law**, allowing prosecutors and family members to petition the courts to temporarily remove firearms from people in crisis. As authorities have pieced together a narrative for the chaotic bloodshed in the Permian Basin, reports indicate that the shooter, killed by police, was in a deteriorating psychological state and perhaps could have been disarmed under a red flag law; neither bill so much as received a hearing this past session.

Although the current attention to gun violence in Texas stems from the recent headline massacres, the **Gun Violence Archive** (www.gunviolencearchive.org) reports that there have been 20 "mass shootings" in Texas in 2019 (four or more people killed or wounded, not including the shooter). Across the country this year, the GVA reports that as of Tuesday, Sept. 3, there have been 289 mass shootings and 10,018 deaths by gun homicide overall. – *Michael King*

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Council, Community Urge APD to Halt Marijuana Arrests

On Tuesday afternoon (Sept. 3), Austin Police Department Assistant Chief Troy Gay had the displeasure of being the guy who had to tell everyone in a room packed with citizens, community leaders, and members of City Council's Judicial Committee exactly what they didn't want to hear: "Marijuana is still illegal under both state and federal law."

The veteran cop plainly and courteously laid out the department's stance: "APD has not increased our enforcement efforts, but we continue to cite-and-release and/or arrest as deemed necessary." The discussion of an item first outlined two weeks ago by Mayor Pro Tem **Delia Garza** and Council Member **Greg Casar** waded deeply into the muddy waters of discretionary enforcement for misdemeanor pot charges.

Since July 3, when Travis County Attorney **David Escamilla** and District Attorney **Margaret Moore** announced that they'd reject all possession charges until law enforcement agencies could use accredited testing to discern whether confiscated cannabis is illicit marijuana or newly legal hemp, APD has continued to cite offenders and – to some degree – make arrests. Casar takes issue with that practice. "It doesn't make any sense to me to arrest someone [if] they're not going to get prosecuted," he told the *Chronicle* last week, emphasizing that arrests can result in serious life complications – interrupted income, getting your vehicle impounded, and potentially losing your job.

Several citizen speakers at Tuesday's meeting brought up how these impacts are not spread equally among Austin's cannabis users. "When APD makes these arrests, who are they arresting? What does the data show?" asked **Annette Price**, statewide director for **Grassroots Leadership**'s Texas Advocates for Justice. "The data shows that the majority of these arrests are still people of color."

The *Chronicle* has filed an open records request to determine the number of possession arrests made by APD since July 3, specifying the ethnicity and age of each person arrested. Casar says he's been made aware of several cases involving minority residents, and defense attorney **Jessica Burns** told us she represented a 25-yearold African American male who was pulled over twice for having expired registration in recent weeks and was first cited for having a THC oil pen, then arrested for a minuscule 0.01 ounces of marijuana. She says the case was tossed out by prosecutors the next day.



Nick Hudson of ACLU Texas advised the committee against both continued arrests and investing in testing equipment allowing APD to differentiate weed from hemp based on THC concentration. "We shouldn't use our valuable resources to double down on a failed war on marijuana that targets communities of color," he said. "More than one-third of the people who were arrested for marijuana possession by APD in 2017 were black, despite the fact that about 8% of the people in our city are black, while study after study shows similar marijuana usage rates amongst different ethnic groups."

Austin police officers continue to have discretion on whether to arrest or cite-andrelease for nonviolent misdemeanor offenses. A quarterly report authored by Police Chief **Brian Manley** and delivered to Council in May showed that APD made 57%

WILL ONE STAY LEAD TO ANOTHER? SOLIZ HOPES SO

Two weeks after the **5th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals** stayed the execution of mentally disabled **Dexter Johnson**, another Texas death row inmate is hoping for the same outcome. **Mark Soliz** filed several documents with the same court on Friday, Aug. 30, in hopes of staving off his upcoming execution on Sept. 10.

Soliz was sentenced to death in 2012 for the murder of **Nancy Weatherly** during a botched robbery of her home following a weeklong crime spree. Since the trial, Soliz's counsel has argued that **fetal alcohol spectrum disorder** renders him mentally unfit for execution under the U.S. Supreme Court's holding in *Atkins v. Virginia*. Soliz now argues, as did Johnson, that recent changes to the American Psychiatric Association's **Diagnostic and Statistical Manual of Mental Disorders (DSM-5)** make his diagnosis the "'functional equivalent' of conditions already recognized as disqualifying exemptions to the death penalty."

During his initial state appeals, Soliz's *Atkins* claim was dismissed on the basis of his IQ score, but the APA's changes mean "higher IQ scores no longer bar a diagnosis of an intellectual disability," according to Soliz's filing, which continues: "Expansion of the Supreme Court's holding in *Atkins* to

protect offenders suffering from FASD is a constantly evolving doctrine that merits further consideration." Soliz seeks permission from 5CA to file a second appeal for relief in the U.S. District Court in Dallas.


The filing credits the 5CA's ruling in another Texas case -

that of **Eric Dewayne Cathey**, who also filed an *Atkins* claim – for paving the way for Johnson's stay by considering "changes in the standards for psychiatric evaluation." Soliz's recent evaluation, paid for by his counsel, found he has an IQ of 75, squarely in the 70-84 range considered "borderline intellectual functioning."

Soliz's current requests ask the 5CA simply to decide if he can file additional appeals, not whether his claims entitle him to relief. On Sept. 4, Texas Attorney General **Ken Paxton** filed a 71-page response, arguing that Soliz is asking for a do-over; while Johnson did not

actually raise an *Atkins* claim until the *DSM-5* changes suggested he deserved one, Soliz "seeks an extension of *Atkins*" to include FASD.

Soliz's attorney **Seth Kretzer** told the *Chronicle* that his client's execution "should certainly be stayed. ... Mr. Soliz is a victim of his mother's ingestion of harmful substances in



the womb. Supreme Court doctrine will not permit the execution of people who are functionally developmentally impaired."

The 5CA appeals were filed shortly after the **Texas Court** of **Criminal Appeals** in August denied Soliz's requests for a stay and to appeal his sentence, ruling he failed to "satisfy the requirements" of state law and thus ignoring the specifics of his claim. In April, the **U.S. Supreme Court** denied Soliz's previous round of appeals.

Without intervention from the courts, Soliz will be the sixth man executed by the state in 2019. As we went to print Wednesday night, **Billy Crutsinger** was killed after SCOTUS denied his stay request filed earlier in the day. Another nine men are slated to die by lethal injection before the end of the year. – Sarah Marloff

fewer custodial arrests in the first quarter of 2019 than a year earlier, when Council adopted **Freedom Cities** policies that established more specific guidelines for discretionary arrests. However, statistics posted by Casar on his Medium page show much higher discretionary arrest rates for African Americans than white or Latinx Austinites. "The unfortunate truth is that it's been disproportionately the African American community that gets arrested for possession of marijuana," Casar told the *Chronicle*.

Despite the seeming futility of arresting people for what even in Texas is barely a crime anymore, Gay aimed to highlight what APD sees as the risks involved. "We believe that if there are no enforcement efforts, this would increase consumption, which would increase demand, and increase supply. This could potentially increase violent offenses, home invasions, and robber-

ies." He added that so far in 2019, seven of the city's 18 murders have involved drug deals.

CM Jimmy Flannigan, chair of the Judicial Committee, later remarked that it wasn't clear marijuana had anything do with those homicides. Garza pressed Gay on whether they involved felony or misdemeanor amounts of pot, which he was not prepared to answer at the time.

If there was any levity at Tuesday's meeting, it came from committee members trying to pronounce "liquid chromatography mass spectrometry," the process used to test THC content in cannabis. Gay told the committee it'll take another six to 12 months to establish the equipment, protocol, and procedures for this testing - which Hudson and others feel is a waste of resources. Latreese Cooke, executive director and founder of the MELJ Justice Center, which provides services for previously incarcerated individuals and their families, explained: "For people who've been incarcerated or even people who have not, the stress of having a warrant over your head can lead to a new offense, which APD loves to give, for evading arrest. People ... have a sense of paranoia that puts them in harm's way of committing a new offense. I understand APD's position, but many people who are in professional positions smoke weed on a regular and consistent basis. They're not violent and I don't feel like black men, who are very much targeted for this particular crime, are either. These warrants should be abolished, and people should be allowed to start with a clean slate."

Before the meeting, Casar expressed concern that APD acquiring new THC testing equipment would "trigger a process of rearresting and going back and charging old cases," which Gay didn't deny is a possibility, noting the statute of limitations for possession charges is two years. Casar said he'd like to see Escamilla clear pending marijuana cases, and questions how THC testing compares to other budgetary concerns for the city. "Right now we're right in the mid-

dle of the city budget, talking to folks about how to truly address homelessness in the community. We're running out of money in our domestic violence prevention fund," he said. "Dedicating our police resources to testing doesn't make sense to me, but that is currently the path that the police department is on."

On Tuesday, Garza – who

herself may enter the race to succeed the retiring Escamilla, whose term ends next year - echoed Casar's argument. "It's concerning that we have our police officers enforcing something and writing probable cause affidavits for an issue that many states have decriminalized and reversed their policies on what was considered a crime," she told Gay. "I hope that if data comes to us that this is not creating any more violent crimes, then we can revisit this." Gay pointed out APD will need the same equipment to test evidence for felony marijuana cases that will continue to be prosecuted; in case he was actively shopping, Cree Crawford of Ionization Lab used his speaking time to hawk his product as an affordable option for APD, eliciting groans from the audience.

Staying Out of Danger

CENTRAL HEALTH ON SOLID FISCAL GROUND - FOR NOW


With past years' political fevers behind them and having been spared the lashings of an ill-tempered Legislature, **Central Health** rolls into its budget season with a proposed \$291 million spending plan to pay for, in various ways, health care for nearly 200,000 Travis County residents. That's backed by a small wedge – around 4.5% – of the typical local homeowner's property tax bill (accounting for exemptions), or a little more than \$300, or just over \$23 more than last year, or a precise rate of **10.5573 cents** per \$100 valuation, or 6.9% higher than what the state now calls the "no new revenue rate."

Like Travis County and the city of Austin, Central Health could have built its fiscal year 2020 budget on a higher 8% tax rate; unlike them, the health care district was exempted from the Legislature's tax "reform" resetting that **revenue cap** at 3.5% in future years (or at least until the next session in 2021). As such, while Central Health is not exactly overflowing with cash, this year's budget is less stretched than it could be. (Before returning to the *Chronicle*, this reporter's consulting clients included the health care district.)

That's less likely to be so going forward, cautions Central Health President and CEO

Mike Geeslin. "The [board of managers] asked our staff to look seven years down the road" in preparing the budget, he says. "Our patient population will continue to grow as it has almost every year, we will continue to expand health care services in underserved communities, and we'll receive fewer federal dollars to pay for local health care" due to the eventual – though already delayed – elimination of incentive programs that predate the Affordable Care Act, as well as the cloudy future of the ACA itself. "We have to look beyond next year and try to plan for the unexpected and make sure we maintain adequate reserves."

Last year at this time, the fiscal ground beneath Geeslin's feet trembled with uncertainty about **Sendero Health Plans**, the nonprofit insurer Central Health formed in 2011, which has required multiple capital infusions – \$20 million last year – to stay in business offering plans on the ACA exchanges. Last year's politically freighted and ultimately successful push by community advocates to #SaveSendero rather than wind it down and cut Central Health's losses involved (ironically) moving some of the sickest people whose care is funded by the health care district onto Sendero plans so it could access more federal dollars. That



strategy is working, Central Health says; the FY 2020 budget, as in previous years, includes funds (\$7 million) to defray Sendero premium costs for those patients as well as others, such as Austin musicians.

Another point of contention for advocates, who have taken advantage of the fact that Central Health must get its budget and tax rate approved by the **Travis County Commissioners Court**, has been the scarcity of accessible health care on the ground in **eastern Travis County**. To help remedy that, the FY 2020 budget anticipates a \$7.7 million capital investment in new clinic capacity for the Eastern Crescent, including developing the fiveacre site in the Austin's Colony community in **Hornsby Bend**, which the district acquired over the summer.

This is on top of other initiatives – a new mobile clinic (operated by **CommUnityCare**, the safety-net clinic system that's also part

\$20M State Grant Comes Through for Indigent Defense



It's fair to say stakeholders on all sides are celebrating last week's **Texas Indigent Defense Commission** grant award to Travis County. "I'm super excited about the grant," said Travis County Judge **Sarah Eckhardt**. "I've been working on this for a long time." **Amanda Woog**, executive director of the **Texas Fair Defense Project**, said, "The grant approval is a really big deal. It's the largest grant that TIDC has ever approved, in their history." And **Betty Blackwell**, board chair of the **Capital Area Private Defender Service**, said, "I'm absolutely thrilled and really excited about it."

The euphoric occasion? On Aug. 29, the TIDC approved a four-year grant of matching funds to support creation of a **Travis County public defender's office**, along with additional support for the existing CAPDS. This week, the **Commissioners Court** heard an update, and is expected to vote to officially accept the grant later this month, with funding arriving in April 2020. Travis County had originally requested a five-year grant totaling \$27 million, then revised it in late July to \$24.6 million. TIDC chose to instead award a fouryear grant, as is the agency's standard, to conclude in April 2024 with a total of \$20.1 million in state funds, a dollar-for-dollar match of the county's investment.

Of the \$40.2 million in total funding, \$21.6 million will be directed to the PDO, and \$18.6 million to CAPDS. Once the PDO is established, Austin will no longer be the largest city in the country without a public defender's office, whose full-time focus is representing indigent defendants. This, combined with more resources for CAPDS, should lead to better representation in criminal cases. As envisioned by the planning groups, public defenders will eventually represent 30% of indigent felony and misdemeanor cases, with the remaining 70% represented by CAPDS attorneys.

Eckhardt recalled the long months of collaboration required among the agencies and advocacy groups to get to this point. "It was quite a task, building a coalition and holding that coalition together – holding hands and working together really paid off." When the commissioners initially submitted the grant proposal, they left undetermined the makeup of the PDO's oversight committee. After weeks of discussion, the court eventually settled on a nine-member committee chaired by county Justice Planning Executive **Roger Jefferies** and including a range of members – defense attorneys, judicial representatives, and community advocates. That committee's first task will be to search for a head public defender.

"My hope is that the oversight committee undertakes a national search to get a strong, experienced, client-centered leader," said Woog, one of the reform advocates who worked for months on developing the PDO proposal. "That's the next thing we'll be watching." Community advocates were concerned that criminal court judges would have too strong an influence on the PDO, a potential conflict of interest. In the current version, only a single, retired judge will serve on the committee.

The county's criminal judges had pressed commissioners not to skimp on additional resources for CAPDS, which Blackwell welcomed. "They've given a substantial amount of money to CAPDS," she said, "for us to hire

of the Central Health "enterprise") that operates in Colony Park and Creedmoor: public services that are for now co-located with the Travis County Employee Health Clinic in Del Valle; nonclinical services at school campuses; medical transportation to existing clinics; even a pilot home-visit program in Austin's Colony - that Central Health has sponsored or planned or paid for out of its

operating budget. The district expects to bite the bullet and issue debt to finance a Hornsby Bend clinic this fiscal year.

Geeslin notes that while the Hornsby plans represent a milestone for the district. Central Health simply writing a big check to build big clinics in the Eastern Crescent - the sort of statement asked of it by activists

in past budget cycles - is not the only option. "When you look at providing services, there's often not just a single solution that will work," he says. "We have begun looking at property [for clinic sites] in a much more forward-looking fashion ... where the growth [is] going to be, but we're always going to be working with communities and advisers and listening to patients. Central Health is a funder, but it's also a convener."

some new people, and for us to be able to pay in a better, more appropriate fashion, in conjunction with the public defender." She said there are plenty of local attorneys for the assignments, but that the addition of attorney managers, immigration specialists, subject-area experts, and other administrative staff will allow the CAPDS office to function much more effectively. She added that the move from a "flat fee" payment per case to an hourly system will finally begin to better reward those lawyers "who are doing most of the work. ... And I'm hopeful that the public defender's office can be a model office in the state, one of the best in the country - a resource for all our attorneys."

Criminal Courts Presiding Judge Brenda Kennedy said she's cautiously optimistic that the infusion of new resources will steadily improve representation in county courts. "The operational changes will take some time," Kennedy said. "We all expect there will be improvements in the delivery of indigent defense from CAPDS. ... There are measures in place for accountability and evaluation, as well,"

Kennedy and Eckhardt both noted that the question of long-term funding past 2024

remains open, particularly after the 86th Texas Legislature imposed its 3.5% annual revenue cap, which would prompt a public referendum should the county's costs - in this case, mandated by the state - require a higher property tax rate. "We are charged with the state's responsibility for providing indigent defense," said Eckhardt, "but the state only pays for about 11% of that the rest falls on the property taxpayer." An attempt to exempt indigent defense costs from the revenue cap was proposed but rejected in the waning days of the session.

Whatever changes before 2024, the TIDC grant expiration will leave the county with growing criminal justice expenses. The staff summary reports: "The total county contribution for the grant match, plus non-grant eligible expenses, including the increase for civil attorney hourly rates, totals \$32.3 million." Once the grant expires, the county will be expected to continue underwriting the new system on its own. Nevertheless, said Eckhardt, "This is going to be a really great improvement, a great evolution in how we handle indigent defense. I think it's going to have a lasting, really positive effect." - Michael King



fter two decades in the driver's seat at one of Austin's most iconic local businesses, last month Dan Gillotte resigned as Wheatsville Co-op's longtime general manager amid fallout from his song and video "Condoms Over Combs: White Girl Showing Black Dude Around the Grocery Store." While many who have viewed the video feel the song is stupid, not everyone sees it as racist – the lyrics apparently narrate a real experience at a co-op in another state – and even former employees critical of Gillotte have vouched for his non-racist views.

Nevertheless, after growing media attention to the video, a petition calling for his ousting and complaints brought to the co-op's board of directors, Gillotte's career at Wheatsville – already marked through the years by persistent complaints from employees – is over. Yet current and former Wheatsville staffers have shared their frustrations with the *Chronicle* recently about what they see as significant mismanagement and toxic working conditions that remain entrenched in Wheatsville culture. Most requested anonymity due to fear of retaliation.

The issues they raise are similar to those covered by the *Chronicle* in 2015, and indeed shared with the paper before that – an ongoing theme in the 40-plus-year history of the co-op, whose stated mission is to promote a society based on "cooperation, justice, and non-exploitation." In addition to a toxic workplace culture, they express concerns about Wheatsville's commitment to the core elements of its vision – both as a cooperative enterprise and as a locally anchored business with Austin values. During this time of transition, they question whether Wheatsville is ready to truly move forward.

FRUSTRATIONS ABOUND

Just a few days after Gillotte resigned, this reporter met with a group of two former and four current Wheatsville employees, averaging five years' tenure in a variety of roles. They, along with another former employee of 11 years who we interviewed, agreed Gillotte should be gone for reasons that have little to do with his dumb video. They allege he enabled a culture of retaliation and ignored rampant staff dissatisfaction to protect himself and an inner circle of managers. However, the group also told me they expect many problems to continue under these same managers - now the interim leadership of the co-op – and the Wheatsville board of directors. They reached out to the Chronicle beginning earlier this year, saving they have tried internal solutions to no avail.

I also spoke with Bryan Butler, a former Wheatsville employee and board member who is now an owner of Salt & Time and Salumeria, and Johnny Livesay, a former Wheatsville employee and board member who helped found Black Star Co-op. Butler said that while he learned a lot during his years at the store, he saw many of these same issues and hopes Wheatsville can turn things around. Livesay said he had a mostly positive though "mixed" experience from 2002 to 2010, but never witnessed intentional retaliation. The culture of retaliation at Wheatsville, as told by the employees, manifests itself throughout the workplace. Hiring and compensation decisions, staffing assignments, relationships with suppliers, and steps taken (or not) to protect workers from harassment by colleagues or customers are all influenced by managers' favoritism,

Uncooperative

Wheatsville's frustrated employees call for change

"What Wheatsville is supposed to be about," Butler said, "is that we're smart enough and educated enough to work our way through issues and transform societies – as our root mission. But that was all just smoke and mirrors."

All other current and former employees I spoke with described a tense and difficult working environment with high turnover. They say that despite the co-op having an internal "go direct" policy, management often refuses to meet with staff – while also reprimanding employees for *not* "going direct" to discuss unclear or contradictory communications and policy changes. They recount being told to stop complaining and "choose your attitude," and being unable to meet with management on important customer-facing issues so as to avoid "a bitch-fest."

resistance to feedback, and unprofessionalism. According to the group, one employee was fired a week after he offered to pay the co-op membership fees for co-workers so they could attend the board meeting focused on Gillotte's fate. Butler said he saw coworkers assigned bad shifts and given responsibilities that they weren't trained for once they got on a manager's bad side.

None of this, of course, is unique to Wheatsville, but employees, customers, and owners alike have reason to have higher expectations of the co-op. "What Wheatsville is supposed to be about," Butler said, "is that we're smart enough and educated enough to work our way through issues and transform societies – as our root mission. But that was all just smoke and mirrors." Livesay describes Wheatsville's management team as "not compassionate" and found most of the allegations raised by the employees unsurprising.

When I reached out to interim management, they declined a phone interview and agreed to only a "store tour and chat" and to respond to questions via email. Shortly after I emailed them, they canceled my tour, saying their initial offer "was made in the spirit of helping you tell a professional and factual story." They then declined to answer any of my questions, address any of the accusations, or respond to any factchecks. They later emailed to say the co-op has a written process that encourages employees to report discrimination, harassment and retaliation, and other concerns, and that staff surveys indicate satisfaction with this process. They also said they wouldn't participate in an interview in order to "not violate employee trust or the legal necessity of confidentiality."

THE WORKFORCE AND THE BOARD

A few years ago, Wheatsville implemented a living wage policy for its workers. According to the group, this has resulted in fewer people being hired, leading to overworked employees unable to take scheduled breaks and some being reprimanded for requesting overtime. Merit raises have gone away, and wage caps at certain hourly rates preclude some employees from receiving across-the-board cost-of-living raises. Wheatsville's new auto-ordering system, implemented "chaotically" with many technical issues according to the employee group, replaced higher-paid "buyer" positions. The group said because the system is so glitchy, workers are still fulfilling buyer duties at lower wages. "They continually try to find ways to squeeze more labor out of people without paying more, all while disrespecting the work they do by refusing to call it what it is," said a former worker.

In June 2019, Wheatsville unveiled a new attendance policy in which an employee is fired for missing four days in a quarter – even if those days are scheduled and approved paid time off. Being 10-120 minutes tardy, for whatever reason, counts as half a day; the only time this policy is waived is if workers can find colleagues on their own to cover their shifts. The group said this makes employees scared to call out sick and suspects the policy is a tool "to clean house."

agement would eventually get handled by the owners - which, in Wheatsville's case, are 22,000 strong and include many reading this – who elect a board of directors to represent them. Board members did not respond to the Chronicle's repeated interview requests. Employees say they have gone to board members directly with issues for years, attempting to circumvent Gillotte and his control of information presented to the governing body, which Butler says may have contributed to the board's complacency. The employee group that contacted the Chronicle said they have received only a template response after reaching out to the board.

According to one board member's 2015 resignation letter, she was reprimanded by her colleagues for meeting with staff. "The board has received numerous private communications from staff displaying evidence of cronyism, negligence, incompetent or retaliatory management practices, and more," reads the letter. "Despite the relevance to our core business, the board has consistently ignored requests to come to a deeper understanding of staff dissatisfaction."



CORPORATIZING THE CO-OP?

The employee group that contacted the *Chronicle* criticized Wheatsville's extensive involvement with the National Co-op Grocers Association, a co-op of 145 retail food co-ops across the country. NCG, whose board Gillotte chaired until his resignation, receives

annual dues and a percentage of sales from Wheatsville (about \$36,000 in 2017-18). The group, as well as an NCG business partner, describe it as a "virtual chain," and it is thus developing a bad reputation among those who yearn for that grassroots and unique local co-op feel of the earlier days. Being an NCG member gives Wheatsville access to group discounts and national purchasing and promotional programs, which means the Austin stores have come to rely on NCG branding, trainings, and staff resources shared with many other co-ops. Butler says that while NCG's involvement helped increase Wheatsville's sales during his time there, it created an "extremely corporate" operations environment, from the way meetings were run to managers' terminology and strategies, reminding him of his stint at a Walmart Supercenter.

One controversial aspect of NCG is its lucrative deal with United Natural Foods Inc., a publicly traded corporation with \$10.2 billion in annual revenue that has bought out many smaller distributors. The contract makes UNFI the main wholesale distributor for all NCG member co-ops, allowing them to get UNFI products at lower prices, which can be beneficial. But a current Wheatsville employee said that management is trying to make local vendors switch to using UNFI as their distributor. "Some of these vendors were then dropped because they couldn't make the change," the employee said. (Livesay and Butler said the store still carries a good amount of local products.)

A group based in Santa Fe called Take Back the Co-op, formed to oppose what it

saw as "corporate takeover" of its local food co-op, says a related group called CDS Consulting, now called Columinate, also pushes co-ops to sell UNFI products over local goods. The Take Back the Co-op website (www.takebackthecoop.com) details how CDS/Columinate allegedly encourages boards and general managers to depend NCG, meanwhile, owns a subsidiary that advises and encourages co-op development and expansions – sometimes for failing stores that NCG then purchases – as well as a bank that offers loans to these co-ops. Though management also wouldn't respond to questions about Wheatsville's financial situation, and its annual reports

upon it for hiring decisions as well as governing advice and materials. While Wheatsville management wouldn't respond to questions about its current relationship with the consultancy, CDS played a major role in revising the co-op's bylaws and articles of incorporation in 2007 and 2008. Rose Marie Klee, who has been Wheatsville's board president for 12 of the last 14 years, is a paid consultant for CDS/Columinate, according to its website. omit much of the information that helps one assess a company's financial health, a review of past annual reports shows that Wheatsville received millions of dollars in loans from NCG's bank for its "refresh" of the Guadalupe store and its second location on South Lamar.

Though the interest rate on these loans wasn't disclosed, according to Wheatsville's most recent annual report the co-op refinanced the NCG bank loan in 2016 with another lender "at much better terms." The South Lamar location, which opened in 2013, seems to be successful, but the Guadalupe location is continuing "to have negative year over year growth." Though the report states that the co-op's finances are in "fine condition," interim management recently told staff it has "much work ahead ... to move the co-op toward critically needed improved financial performance."

LOOKING FOR THE WAY FORWARD

A few days after meeting with the employee group, I asked a close friend about her time at Wheatsville about six years ago to see how her experiences compared to the others, who she doesn't know. "Employees buy into the idea of a co-op – it aligns with so many good-hearted people's values," said Olivia Radke, now a senior customer service manager for Under Armour. "But then on the inside, it's extremely demoralizing." Livesay suspects that some co-ops, like Wheatsville, run into problems because they hold themselves to such high ideals while recruiting and attracting workers who value that ethos. But then the reality of running a retail business can be harsh.

The group says that moving forward, they'd like to see the co-op hire a new general manager who is local, an owner, and knows the community. Butler, meanwhile, thinks hiring somebody with extensive grocery experience could be a good route. They also stressed the importance of having significant changes with management and the board, as well as owners. "I really want to have a wake-up call to our owners to be more engaged," said one current employee and co-op owner, "Whenever we have our board elections - we have 22,000 owners - and apparently less than a thousand end up voting. I want to see our owners paying attention, asking questions, showing up to our board meetings."

I couldn't help but ask the group's current employees: Why stay at the store if it's so bad? Though some are considering leaving, they also said the imperfect benefits are better than some other service industry jobs in Austin and spoke of strong friendships with many customers and co-workers and the importance of supporting Wheatsville's community mission to "be at the forefront of a transformed society that has a thriving community centered on hospitality, kindness, and generosity."

ou have your mother's brown eyes, your father's strong chin. But do you also have her capacity for love, his fear of heights? Have traumas experienced by your parents' parents, or *their* parents' parents, also been passed down to you, encoded in your DNA? Biologists have found physical evidence of this - genetic memory - in people who lived through traumatic events and their offspring. Holocaust survivors, for example, have lower levels of the stress hormone cortisol, and so do their descendants. Other studies have shown similar results: experiences causing physical alterations that have then been passed down the line genetically.

For years, artist Alyssa Taylor Wendt has been drawn to the idea "that we inherit not simply DNA but potentially trauma, habits, magic, triumphs, love, failures, and knowledge. The idea that all of our actions affect a larger pool of cultural expression is important to consider in regard to our daily behaviors and future legacy. Are we temporary caretakers of a longer lineage of archetypal behavior? A unique living combination of elements from different aspects of our ancestors? How does this affect our cultural consciousness?"

Wendt has long sought answers to those questions in her own works, such as the three-channel videos H A I N T, shown at the University of Texas Visual Arts Center earlier this year and at the International Istanbul Experimental Film Festival, where it was an award winner. Now the artist has invited others to join in her search in the group show "Sanctum," opening Sept. 6 at Big Medium. Though small, Wendt's crew is diverse in cultural backgrounds and artistic mediums: Scott Vincent Campbell (Detroit), Cordula Ditz (Hamburg, Germany), Birthe Piontek (Vancouver), Beili Liu (Austin, born in China), Jaime Zuverza (Austin, born in El Paso), and Wendt (Austin, born in New York City), showing work in video, installation, photography, sculpture, and painting. We talked to Wendt to learn more about her interest in genetic memory and "Sanctum."

Austin Chronicle: When did your fascination with inherited memory begin?

Alyssa Taylor Wendt: I believe a specific influence was an interview with the great cult filmmaker Alejandro Jodorowsky in *The Paris Review*. He discusses a book he wrote called *Where the Bird Sings Best*, a retelling of his ancestry where he transforms the pain of his familial history into

mythic legacy. From there I discovered books like *The Memory Palace* by Edward Hollis and *It Didn't Start With You* by Mark Wolynn. I did not know about the tradition of memory palaces, where orators use the interior architecture of a known famous building as a mnemonic device for retelling a long saga of histo-

ry, where each room would trigger a different aspect of the story. The basis for my new video project has uncanny parallels with this concept, which had been previously unknown to me.

AC: How did you start exploring it in art? ATW: The first experiment with inherited memory was a photographic series I made called Altertagsgeschichte that was part of a two-person show with Erin Cunningham called "these, our precious scars" at the original ICOSA Gallery. Inspired by the Japanese practice of kintsugi, I took large photographic prints of places that have a complicated and problematic history and tore them according to a buried layer of information usually in the form of a map or boundary lines. I subsequently glued them back together and gilded the repairs, as gestures of both recognition and healing.

AC: Has your approach to visualizing inherited memory changed since then?

ATW: In a sense, inherited memory has always been part of my research and explorations. *HAINT* was the result of six years of production,

research, and editing about layers of history, truth, memory, architecture, and song. In this process, I realized that architecture, specifically interior spaces, are triggers for memory. Carl Jung talked about buildings as symbols for the soul in his writings on dream analysis. My new video *TMI* (*The Memory Inheritance*) uses abandoned com-

mercial public spaces to represent genetic memory and to create an abstract ritual for exploring that potential. I filmed in empty malls, basements, hospitals, nightclubs, retail stores, and office buildings to create an environment to trigger an act of cultural remembering with a variety of performances and mediums that personally move me. Spoken word, gospel singing, rock & roll, tap and modern dance, whistling, piano playing, and torch song became vehicles for collaborative conversations, places where disparate backgrounds can overlap and celebrate our collective subconscious. I specifically asked the performers to bring their own elements of historical memory to the table, through pieces of clothing, songs, and gestures. I'm showing the work-in-progress at "Sanctum."

AC: It's a fascinating collection of artists in "Sanctum." Was the international/cultural diversity important to you?

ATW: Thank you! I am really excited about this group of artists. The element of diversity was extremely important to me in order to explore a wide range of backgrounds, histories, and mediums alike.

I love introducing the people of Austin to artists that have previously not shown in Texas; that is a huge perk of curating such exhibitions. In 2017, I co-curated a show called "Good Mourning Tis of Thee" with Sean Gaulager of Co-Lab Projects at DEMO Gallery Downtown, where we had over 60 artists and performers making work about death and transformation, both as it related to rituals of mourning and gentrification.

I like to think of art as a conversation, a visual dialogue. In that sense, much of the discussion in contemporary art circles revolves around things that exist in a different realm from my line of thinking - nostalgia, palette, violence, and minimalism, to name a few. Here, I am creating my own conversation by surrounding my new work with artists who explore similar arenas. Being a working artist can become quite myopic and solitary. The beauty of curating shows is the privilege to elevate the work of others and create platforms for discourse. I look forward to the conversation that the works will have with each other and will inspire in the people who come out to see the exhibition. I welcome the dialogue and look forward to how these conversations will affect the production of the end of my film in the coming year.

Blood Test

Theatre en Bloc's Dance Nation invokes the experience of puberty for girls, in all its allure and terror

Blood.

You see a lot of it in Dance Nation - blood on arms, on legs, on faces, blood that never goes away. Indeed, you see so much that it's like some fiend is stalking the girls on the Liverpool, Ohio, competitive dance team. And in a sense, one is. You know how in those old horror films, the babysitter gets the police to trace the phone calls she's getting from some threatening creep only to be told, "The calls are coming from inside the house!"? In Clare Barron's bold, darkly comic, disturbing play, the threat to the girls is coming from inside their bodies. It's puberty.

At the very time these preteens are fighting their way to Tampa Bay for the Boogie Down Grand Prix national championships, they're also

wrestling with encroaching adolescence - what it will mean for them, what it'll do to them. They've heard about periods, about sex and how it supposedly works (really, he puts that in there?!), but right now it's still rumors and the girls have no idea how all that will truly feel or what feelings will wash over them then. Right now, they still have the desires and confidence of girlhood, when they believe they can do anything – be a famous dancer or an astrophysicist or even, as one girl puts it when she imagines fully embracing her power, "the motherfucking KING of your motherfucking WORLD." And they believe they can take their dance about Gandhi - social justice-themed dances seem all the rage this year - all the way to the big trophy.

You may think you've seen the "youth with identity issues through the lens of competition" thing before, what with The 25th Annual Putnam County Spelling Bee or The Wolves, but you haven't seen it treated like this. Barron's freed herself - imaginatively, emotionally, theatrically, thematically - to take the topic in wilder, darker, deeper directions. Her girls are played by adults, in what seems less a casting gimmick than a doorway into memory, as if we're seeing these figures recall this time in their pasts. That's especially true when characters break out of a scene and speak as their older selves, sharing some glimpse of their futures. The language frequently explodes into a kind of poetry that's rich and raw, articulating the pain and fear and fury in the hearts of middle school girls that they might not have words for. Then there's the blood, along with a handful of other horrorfilm elements - fangs that sprout in the girls' mouths, a full moon looming over the set - that play on the idea of transformation and, oh ves, a curse, all the better to revive the terror of that age, that simultaneously alluring and frightening hingepoint of change, and make it visceral for us grownups who may have forgotten the intensity with

which puberty stalked us. Under Jenny Lavery's direction. Theatre en Bloc's production embraces the ferocity of Barron's script. When those fangs are bared, the ensemble takes on the character of a wolf pack, primed to tear through flesh. (Susan Myburgh's Sofia actually does, biting into her arm like it's prey she's just brought down.) They mouth every "motherfucker" with a fury that would send David Mamet's alpha males whimpering away - Katy Atkinson's Ashlee, the would-be MF-ing king of the MF-ing world, taking this to the most ass-kicking heights - and their chant of "the power of the pussy" is a primal battle cry.

And yet, in the midst of all this aggression and ownership of power are doubts and anxieties that chip away at the fangs and fierceness. Ashlee ends her ode to her badass self asking, "What am I going to do with all this power?" and hoping she doesn't "pussy out." Perennial runner-up Zuzu knows she's not that good, and Sarah Danko's admission of that pulls up the shattered self-esteem every child has felt. Even the team's anointed star. Amina, worries about how others see her, and in her dressing down by Dance Teacher Pat – with Dennis Bailey channeling every guilt-inducing coach ever – Amy Downing's embarrassed look and downcast eyes make Amina's shame heart-wrenching. There's vulnerability in these young lives, and if Sofia getting her period at the worst possible moment is any sign, the changes to come could well make things worse.

What lies ahead? Womanhood? Success? Losing your virginity? The uncertainty is scary, Dance Nation tells us. And when the laughter is quieted, it reveals little more for these dancers than depression and loss. Oh, and there will be blood.

CYRANO DE

BERGERAC

Through Sept. 29

Classic scripts today are often modernized in one of two ways. There's the time-tested approach of placing the play in a new context (e.g., Julius Caesar in 1980s Wall Street). The other: preserving the spirit of the original but with a fresh. less overt timeliness (e.g., the recent gender-inclusive production of The Three Musketeers at St. Edward's University). Given the Archive Theater Company's stated mission of staging classic stories for a contemporary audience, I was curious how the company would approach its first production, Edmond Rostand's epic 19th century comedy, Cyrano de Bergerac.

Archive Managing Director Jennifer Rose Davis (who serves as Cyrano's director, costume designer, and singer in the show's live band) has taken the second approach. She's also penned the

translation used here, and in doing so has created an experience that's not only accessible to modern viewers, but also blurs the line between actor and audience.

Archive's Cyrano is, more than anything, an experience, one that begins the moment you enter Scottish Rite Theater. Pick up your ticket in the form of a metallic golden ducat, buy flowers from an actor wandering the lobby, and enter the auditorium to find ensemble men lazing about – in character – on the stage's steps. As principal actors casually begin filling every corner of the space, out steps Cyrano from the house's back, loudly announcing his presence.

Thus, Archive brings this Cvrano to life, but I don't mean only with actors vending flowers. Principally, it's Davis' lively translation that provides the vitality. The language, jaunty and playful in both its humor and poetic verse,

allows for snappy banter, keeping a purposeful pace through a nearly three-hour run time.

The text is supported by a dedicated cast. Actor Patrick David Wheeler gives the demanding lead role all he can, capturing the hero's celebrated panache well enough – but it's where Cyrano displays vulnerability that he shines brightest. Wheeler's Cyrano is constantly at odds with leading lady Liz Waters' devilishly headstrong Roxane. A staple of the Austin improv scene, Waters is able to hold her own against Cyrano as he suddenly jumps from flamboyance to tenderness, creating an electric

consistently create believable depth.

While her knack for the big picture is most apparent, Davis' eye for detail deserves equal mention. Where the first act is vibrant and humorous, Cyrano's end is raw. What began extravagantly ends intimately on our hero's deathbed. As Cyrano rages against the dying of the light, we're forced to face the terror of death alongside him.

By virtue of many interlocking elements, Davis' Cyrano is equally humorous and heartfelt. But what Davis has staged here is not so much a play as an hours-long journey. And while it's my job to capture a show in writing, I believe that this journey ought to be experienced for oneself. Here is an authentically classical production that doesn't feel old and dusty but, rather, familiar – something that bodes well for Archive Theater going forward. - Trey Gutierrez

A NEW STUDY confirms: Genetics can't predict sexuality. Funded by the **National Institutes of Health**, the study, released Aug. 29, looked at roughly half a million people to determine there's no one "**gay gene**." They



did find, however, that many genes "each with a tiny effect" can help determine gayness. According to The New York Times, genetics is "responsible for perhaps a third of the influence" on gueerness. The rest comes from social and environmental factors. As someone who doesn't feel seen by the "born this way" argument, I appreciate the confirmation of other factors, but that's because I believe queerness - in all its forms, wherever, and however it takes root - is valid. In 2012, sparking contention in the LGBTQmmunity, Sex and the City actress and 2018 New York gubernatorial candidate Cynthia Nixon said something that stuck with me: "I say it doesn't matter if we flew here or we swam here, it matters that we are here." I understand and respect anyone who says they were born gay, but to insist that's the only way we can be queer is to imply no one would choose to be "this way." I think that's untrue and unfair. Queer life isn't always viewed as valid; many of us have been disowned, had slurs flung at us, some have been victims of violence - but the hatred of outsiders doesn't make me value, love, or want my gueerness and my gmmunity any less. I would not choose to be straight. Yet I'm not unaware, of course, of the concern that people who'd erase us might try to use this information to strengthen their arguments for conversion therapy or other methods to eradicate queerness - as if that's possible. As one (gay) MIT geneticist who worked on the study told the Times, queerness is "written into our genes and it's part of our environment. This is part of our species and it's part of who we are." We're complicated beings; there's no one answer or neat conclusion for queerness - but here we are.

Sing a song of light and shadow, the complex melodies of particle and wave caught in chemicals upon a single page of paper. Or – never mind the paper, dear friend. How about the occasional square of finest silk instead?

Kate Breakey has taken so many photographs over the years, mainly – at least, the Australia-born artist has become renowned, mainly, for – photographs of dead things: delicate, wee creatures of feather or fur, deceased

by mortal or maybe what some would call divine machination, arranged just so in final stasis, the staged images embellished colorwise by pigments wielded with subtle hand. Now, in "Ornithology," Breakey turns her life-hungry lens to those that fly.

Or, rather, to where the winged ones come from before flight and where they rest between dismissals of gravity: eggs and nests, nests and eggs, fixed and framed and faintly enhanced with pastels or thread, bringing a sense of origin and domesticity to the walls of Stephen L. Clark's elegant gallery on West Sixth.

We could rhapsodize about the artist's technique and its marvelous results – we could if we were more versed

in the minutiae of the photographic process, anyway – for what Breakey's wrought is nothing short of light-ensnaring wizardry in service of bringing her series of nests and the dappled eggs of quails secondhand to viewers' eyes. But we can only stand enraptured in our mild ignorance, soaking in the sublime rendition of these human artifacts of nonhuman artifice, realizing that considering all these nests and eggs without their birds instills a welcome sense

of aloneness, of serenity.

That whole thing of being far from the madding crowd, as limned in Thomas Gray's old "Elegy Written in a Country Churchyard" and subverted by that other Thomas, Hardy, in his famous novel ... the madding

crowd, these days, often tends to reside inside our heads like a frenzy of diseased grackles, insinuated there mainly by the internet and its ceaseless flood of social noise and signal. How rewarding a calm it is to retreat to the silent beauty of "Ornithology" within the Clark Gallery on an Austin afternoon; how restorative a respite it is while the crazed world cackles and flaps and eggs itself on toward collapse outside. – Wayne Alan Brenner





DAY TRIPS BY GERALD E. MCLEOD

Pictographs left on the walls of rock shelters by prehistoric and historic people are some of the greatest treasures in Texas. The state has a large and diverse collection of rock art scattered around West Texas.

The artwork can be found from **Paint Rock** near San Angelo to the Rio Grande, but most of it is hidden away on private property. That is why it is such a special treat when the **Witte Museum** opens to guided tours its **White Shaman Preserve** outside of Comstock.

In the ancient societies (5,000 to 10,000 years ago) that occupied the **Lower Pecos Canyonlands**, the shaman was an important deity or medicine man who could possibly influence the weather and hunting. The meaning of the symbols is lost to modern eyes.

While shamans appear in cave drawings at multiple locations, the white, red, black, and yellow White Shaman is one of the more distinctive. It gets its name from the rare use of white paint.

The 30-minute hike to the White Shaman mural climbs over a rough trail. From the vantage point of the rock shelter, the **Pecos River** winds below and the Highway 90 bridge is in the distance.

White Shaman Preserve tours happen every Saturday, weather permitting, September to May. Tour groups are limited to 20 hikers and are not appropriate for children under 12 years old. Participants must preregister at www.wittemuseum.org/rock-arttour-calendar. Rangers at **Seminole Canyon State Park**, also lead tours to their collection of rock art, Wednesdays through

The **Austin Bold** put in a pretty complete performance Sunday night, blanking Rio Grande Valley 3-0 to clinch the first annual Copa Tejas trophy and hang on to fourth place in the USL West. **Only three more home games** left in this inaugural regular season, and they come in a 12-day period, starting 7:30pm Wed., Sept. 11, against perennial USL power Sacramento Republic. Then comes Reno at 6pm Sun., Sept. 15, and Las Vegas at 6pm Sun., Sept. 22. They'll really need to pile up points here, because they end with four games on the road, where they've struggled all year. The **Texas Longhorns** bombed out of the national rankings with a pair of road losses over the weekend – 3-0 to Denver and 2-1 to Colorado as **Haley Berg** clanked a penalty off the crossbar with one second to go. Bizarrely, that's how the Horns won their

home opener last week, with the roles reversed, saving a would-be game-tying PK with five seconds to go. They'll try to get back on track as they start a five-game homestand this Sun., Sept. 8, at 5pm against Texas A&M-Corpus Christi.

Starting Over With SASS

A story of twin sisters, Austin real estate, and salad dressing

At 10:30am on a Wednesday morning, the new SASS Dressing and Sauces kitchen was quiet – and hot. The air conditioning in the new building was broken, the latest thing to go wrong in the nine long months since the business lost its lease, halted production, and moved into a new space. In that time, twin sisters and co-owners Lauri and Carol Raymond have had to renovate, negotiate with landlords, and rebuild relationships with buyers and vendors from scratch. This July, they received their first order since October 2018: 600 cases of dressing for H-E-B. "It's not like starting over," Carol said. "It *is* starting over."

SASS (Season All Stuff Sauce) was born in Austin 31 years ago, the same year as Lauri's son Zane, who now works at the business. The sisters started with one salad dressing flavor, sesame garlic, which remains a favorite today. "I think food was kind of in our DNA," Lauri said. "Mom was a great cook, and she cooked three meals a day for seven people for decades."

As the sisters built their business – and now, as they fight to keep it – their own mother's ingenuity is an ongoing source of inspiration. "You know how they say necessity is the mother of invention? We always say the mother of invention is a mother," Lauri said. "Because it is necessity. But it's also women. Women figure things out. Moms figure things out. Because we have to."

Over the years, the sisters went from hand-mixing and hand-filling every bottle themselves to running a company with a dozen employees. Then a new landlord bought their building, with plans to convert the space into an upscale office complex, and everything changed. "It did feel like it was eventually going to happen," Lauri said. "I was prepared somewhat because it was happening to a lot of businesses in town, and I knew that we had been getting a great deal for many years on our rent."

It's a familiar story in Austin by now, but the sisters were still shocked when it finally happened to them: Their rent went up 350%. On Halloween, they vacated their previous kitchen and moved to a new location on Todd Lane, where they now sublease from Independence Brewery. Leaving Austin, they said, was never an option. "It was either start up again here or, I don't know, get it bought or something by somebody else," Lauri said. "My mom lives next door to me, and I'm on the board of my church. I didn't want to move out of town or spend my life driving back and forth."

The sisters didn't expect to be out of production for long, but the complications of moving stacked up, and the kitchen stayed quiet for nine months. "People don't even know what happened to us," Lauri said. "We've gotten a lot of calls and letters and phone calls and emails and everything like, "What the heck's going on?""

This is what's going on: Real estate development in Austin is turning decades-old family businesses into cash-strapped startups. When they lost their lease, the Raymond sisters were transitioning to GMO-free products and estimate they spent \$30,000 getting four dressing flavors certified before production ground to a halt. And they had just invested almost \$100,000 in a new filler to update their aging machinery. The filler has been sitting in pieces in the back corner of their new location for months, and the sisters aren't sure when they'll be able to install it.

Those investments, compounded with the costs of moving and the loss of production, left SASS sunk in debt. They laid off their employees – most of whom had been with the company for more than a decade – and missed payments to ingredient vendors. "For us it's really day-to-day and moment-to-moment, and it can be terrifying, really terrifying," Lauri said. "Both of us have experienced the fear and anxiety that comes from trying to do this thing. Full body shakes – wake up in the middle of the night and your whole body starts to shake."

The sisters turned to their community for support: A GoFundMe page, titled "Help SASS Stay in Austin," has raised about \$14,700 since March, and an appeal video they posted on Vimeo has been viewed more than 100 times. They've also been working with the city to get a smallbusiness loan. Xavier Zarate, the Raymonds' primary contact in the city of Austin's Economic Development Department, told the Chronicle in an email that affordability for local businesses is a major concern for the city: "Displacement and gentrification are functions of a larger and more complex issue of affordability. A sustainable community and healthy economy should include diversity of real estate, while providing resources to assist small businesses." Zarate also noted that "Economic Affordability and Opportunity" is one of six priorities listed in the city manager's Strategic Direction 2023 plan.

"Businesses, like people, are unique in their respective needs," Zarate said. "Some need loans to expand operations and some need training to shore up basic business practices. Because affordability is a function of many variables, I think the possible solution will be developing a mix of approaches that meets the individual need of the business."

Carol has also been learning about how to acquire venture capital funding for SASS, which is a first for the company. "It's a learning curve for us," Carol said. "We've never ever thought that we would go outside and expand ownership until now." But, she said, it's necessary not only to get the company back on its feet, but to help it grow.

For now, every dollar is keeping SASS afloat day to day. The check from that very first sale to H-E-B since the move allowed them to pay their old employees again and buy ingredients for the next order. It's the nerve-racking, precarious work of building a company from scratch, made all the more frustrating by the fact that a year ago, SASS was well-established and thriving. "Here's what makes it hard," Lauri said, tapping her temple. "My voice that says it shouldn't be like this."

That's a familiar feeling in Austin, as more and more beloved local businesses are forced to move or shut down entirely – the nagging discomfort that it shouldn't be like this. For the SASS sisters, the answer will always be about building relationships. Even though they're barely back on their feet and still have a long road to recovery ahead, they plan to partner with new up-and-coming businesses that need a leg up.

"The food community needs to have a sense of teamwork and working together to try and make sure that Austin stays a good place for [food businesses]," Lauri said. "If you want to make that leap between the farmers' market and the next level of business you

need some help, and ideally that's what we would be able to provide."

They also hope that future public-private partnerships could prevent more stories like theirs. Carol is already thinking about innovative solutions, like founding business co-ops or leasing land from the city. After all, SASS is a family business with a family ethos, and the twins are confident that the key to strength is building and growing a tightly knit community. And it comes back to the first word on every bottle: sisters. "I've had many times when I've wanted to just be sisters and not be business partners; to be able to just have Thanksgiving together and not have this whole thing of the business," Lauri said. "But then, in my more rational moments and in my more faithful moments, I can see that everything that has transpired is just right for unfolding our relationship and for the business as well."

By the end of the interview, the air conditioning was working again.





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Review: Arlo Grey at the Line Hotel

DECADENT ATTENTION TO DETAIL CLASHES WITH PRICE AT THE LAKESIDE RESTAURANT by Jessi Cape

It's been just over a year since *Top Chef* season 10 winner Kristen Kish opened her first restaurant, Arlo Grey at the Line Hotel (formerly Radisson Austin), and with so many options in our fluctuating, hotel-booming city, it feels odd to now dedicate space to this review. The restaurant is particularly inaccessible in venue and price, but nonetheless delightfully enveloping and creative, and seemingly immune to failure in the court of public opinion. And that's just part of the intrigue.

Housed in the heart of prime retail real estate on the corner of Cesar Chavez and Congress, it's both a tourist's dream and local's pipe dream. Step inside the Line Austin, the Sydell Group's third installation of the chic boutique hotel chain (L.A. is the flagship), and the outside hustle and bustle instantly evaporates. The restaurant's design – a collaboration between Michael Hsu's team and L.A.-based designer Sean Knibb – melds seamlessly with the spacious, low-ceiling lobby. Each step toward the host stand encourages the eye to take in the clash of stark black walls and plush gray high-back chaise lounges. The ambience strikes a nice balance between eclectic edge, hotel chic, and K-pop punk, with royal blue chandeliers, mismatched furniture, and walls of windows adorned with brass planters filled with draping ivy (some copper-bottomed, resembling unspent bullets). To the south, a foliage-dense view of Lady Bird Lake (an ideal tableside view of the Congress bats, incidentally); to the west, a view of the pool.

"Why do so many people sit around outside being hot with drinks instead of swimming?" inquired my 10-year-old at brunch. "To be seen, my love."

And on first pass, it *is* all for show. The experience here only slowly reveals itself as an intimate, deeply personal one, as evidenced by a side wall of Kish's framed kitchen notes, but it's not guaranteed that every guest will notice. On a Thursday evening (reservations highly recommended), my favorite dinner date and I had the good fortune of a highly seasoned server who knew well not only the menu, but how to comfort, how to course, and how to give enough space so that diners may at once feel taken care of and free to embrace the (very, very pricey) affair. Without her, the end result would have likely not been so favorable.

Kish developed the Arlo Grev menu to reflect her culinary style - a meld of French classic, Italian influence, her Korean heritage, and her Michigan upbringing - while utilizing seasonal Central Texas flavors. It's intended for small, shared plates and broken into three tiers based on course and size mind-blowing, considering the price point. I'm well aware that hotel restaurants are their own unique beast/racket, but we have a bounty of local restaurants strictly using ingredients grown and raised a stone's throw from the kitchen, so I struggle with paying to eat the surcharge of trucked-in components, especially when none of the dishes bring that wow factor. With a cocktail apiece for each two-dish course (three in total) plus one dessert, our tab was well over two bills. And while everything was executed on par with fine dining, neither of us tasted a single dish or drink we'd return for. Dinner was, well, just fine.

The highly popular sweet corn and baby carrot dish (one I only agreed to on the server's suggestion) was brought back for the anniversary and turned out to be a pleasant, textural surprise: The

creamy, smoked yogurt base and crumbles of feta and puffed barley made a creative pairing with the crunch of fresh veggies. A tomato junkie, I enjoyed the Texas tomato salad with its variety: smokiness from charred sweet peppers, crunch from macadamias, and whispers of black garlic. The tuna crudo and rye noodles (with Castelvetrano olives, paddlefish caviar, summer bean, and chilled bonito brodo) was shockingly bland, though seared perfectly; the crispy rice boasted a wonderfully golden thin crust and sat atop haricots verts. bits of thick-cut bacon.

and mini chunks of crab. Prawn agnolotti, with its paper-thin folded noodles, almost-chartreuse artichoke filling, and shellfish broth, was a flavor combination I just couldn't quite understand. The braised rabbit terrine was delicate, balancing the Parisian gnocchi (fried) on its bed of sauce gribiche and Gruyere. I regret not tasting the malfadini, which Kish has explained is an ode to her mother's pre-packaged beef stroganoff, though this version is served meatless with house-made noodles and champignon sauce. (There are several veggie-friendly dishes.) We had tickets to a Hideout Theatre show and thus enjoyed the small dome of vanilla-creme-filled lunch box chocolate cake, complete with housemade potato chips and a warm coffee sauce drizzle, to go.

Brunch was not as smooth-sailing, to the degree that I'd rather not even rehash it, but here we are. Despite having no reservation, we were seated immediately, only to wait a solid five minutes before being addressed and watered, another seven to order drinks and an appetizer (chickpea fries with ricotta, green relish, tomatoes, and fried garlic), and a whopping 25 more for a burger and bread pudding. My Bloody Mary was undrinkable, but my replacement, a graciously offered "Him and Her" - Pimm's and strawberry lemonade with cucumber - was delicious. At one point, we saw four staffers struggle to open a bottle for a table of self-proclaimed wine experts (one claimed to own a wine boutique in L.A.), who just watched - perhaps an in-summary of the meal. The infamously pricey burger (\$18) was, I'll admit, absolutely delicious - due largely in part to the not-so-subtle caramelized onions and incredibly velvety aligot whipped pota-

Spring for the golden, egg-shaped hash browns if only to admire them, as well as the luxuriously decadent croissant and bread pudding with tiny bursts of pomegranate seeds and candied orange rinds.

A few asides: The valet is \$10 with validation, and the restaurant is boldly LGBTQ-friendly and trans-inclusive, which is something every traveler - queer and ally alike - should look for when booking. Make a stop to the restroom, where a female voice loops the Korean Cinderella story, which Kish's mother read to her as a child, and the

English text is black spray-painted across the walls. It's those kinds of details that help remind the diner of the restaurant's intentions. And while it's extremely apparent that Kish and her talented culinary team embrace the "food is love" ethos, it's still, after all, a hotel restaurant. I can only hope that Austin visitors will venture past these gorgeous walls and try a dish or two from some restaurants with less celebrity, less L.A., and even more heart.

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Running, Gunning, Taking a page from and Rhythm

Three Austin games, but which has infinite playability?

MORE THAN A REMNANT

Gunfire Games' latest came out of nowhere. Maybe it was the bland name or that people slept on their last title, Darksiders III. Perhaps it was the increasingly interchangeable post-apocalyptic setting. Whatever the reason, it didn't take long for players to see the quality of the genre mishmash of Remnant: From the Ashes.

Like so many others, the most popular comparison is to the Souls series, with its lack of jumping, brutally difficult enemies, and even teleporting "bonfires" (in this case big red crystals). Add various guns to the mix and you have the core of an unassuming action RPG.

The story begins simply enough: A rundown planet, not unlike our own, has been ravaged by the mysterious "root." Begrudgingly, you join the fight, and just when you're ready to write off the plot, a giant obelisk lands in the middle of town and things only pick up from there as your travels bring you to alien lands, deserts, and beyond as the story progresses. If the story doesn't grab you, there are few ramifications to skipping through it and focusing on the action. It's an option that becomes indispensable for repeat playthroughs, which are recommended to discov-


er the world's many secrets - and maybe even kick up the difficulty setting and cross your fingers.

Each playthrough will be somewhat different, with enemies and bosses randomized with each trek through the world. Bosses give players traits to level up, so what traits you receive early on can change the strategies from one round to another. Regardless of a character's strengths or weaknesses, the combat feels terrific. Shooting, dodging, and melee-ing are easy to grasp but reveal depth as the number and caliber of baddies increase.

Go forth as a lone wolf, or better yet, enlist friends. The latter is definitely recommended, if not for the usual reasons (it's more fun to succeed and fail with company) then because the game is significantly easier with additional helping hands. Solitary players will find themselves felled with ease early on, but can be assisted and revived by compatriots.

The leveling and story fall a bit short, but the gameplay makes up for it. The varied world, interesting (and often very challenging) bosses, and quality co-op play make *Remnant* significantly more than a sum of its influences.

streamer-friendly shooters like Overwatch and Fortnite, Rooster Teeth adds its trademark humor (and some familiar voices) to the genre with "uncooperative shooter" Vicious Circle.

The objective is simple: Collect nuggets and get the hell out. Standing between you and freedom is a player controlling a massive alien chicken named Peggy Sue. Don't worry, death isn't the end. Pecked players come back as Lil' Dippers and go on the hunt to find a still-living mercenary to possess, assuming they don't get shot in the process. Rounds last a few minutes, but players' roles and fortunes can change repeatedly during that time.

Rooster Teeth's attempt to add party game elements to the shooter genre is largely successful. However, as the game stands (four characters and the same number of maps), tedium sets in quickly unless you're playing with friends, which makes the game's mechanics delightfully personal. I found myself competing against the same players, which isn't a good sign for a newly released online game, but hopefully the additions scheduled before the end of the year will be the shot in the arm this promising title needs.

GET IN THE GROOVE WITH OVERPASS

Taking inspiration from Michel Gondry's video for the Chemical Brothers' "Star Guitar," the hypnotic Overpass by local developer Michael Molinari transforms patterns seen from a moving vehicle into a rhythm game. Perhaps the more impressive feat is the childlike wonder of watching overhead power lines or stars or building remains despite the desire to progress or beat the game.

Overpass doesn't reinvent the rhythmgame wheel. Oncoming beats are depicted visually, and players tap keys in time with the music. As the beats-per-minute and complexity of the rhythms increase from level to level, the difficulty follows. The journey takes us through deserts, cities, forests, and caverns as all manner of objects soar above to indicate a beat. Trees, windmills, planes, and the titular overpasses make up the early levels but are replaced by more exotic and kinetic flying objects as the journey continues. Despite the



changes of scenery, the perspective and palate are consistent and hang together as a whole. This consistency is accentuated by the electro-boogie of Makeup and Vanity Set, the composer who created the musical framework to assist you on your beat-matching endeavors.

Instead of the usual easy-to-hard difficulty settings, Overpass gives players options to simplify inputs. Want to make the window for hitting each beat more forgiving? Want the beat-indicators to be larger? Those are a tiny portion of the options available to let you breeze to the finish line. Meanwhile, challenge junkies will be busy perfecting each track and trying to hit every optional "street light." It's hard to undersell how refreshing it is for a game that, instead of trying to keep you busy, respects your time.

If the sights and sounds inspire you, there's a level creator that lets you add your own music and use the game's assets to visualize it. The tools are simple to grasp, but don't

> think you'll create a brilliant overhead orchestra on your first try. It's harder than it looks. If you need more inspiration, test your rhythm against levels created by others. Don't be surprised when those community creations make you appreciate the core game that much more.

Here Be Monsters

Tigers Are Not Afraid is a modern fairy-tale masterpiece

Once upon a time, a girl was given three wishes. It's a simple, classic setup, the perfect fairy tale beginning. Yet that's where the fairy tale ends in Tigers Are Not Afraid, a sublime mixture of dark social realism and magical fantasy - social magical realism, if such a subgenre exists.

Estrella (Lara) is a young teen doing everything right. She pays attention in class, she works hard, she loves her mother: Yet none of that is enough to protect her from the random terrors of the gang-related violence that constantly shreds her small hometown, somewhere in Northern Mexico. When an outbreak of aggression shuts her school and causes her mother to disappear, suddenly Estrella is just another street kid, hanging out with Shine (López) and his lost boys. She's quiet and desperate; he is scarred inside and out.

He has street smarts and the same dangerous instincts that drive the cruel grownups that lurk at the edges of their hiding places: she has nothing save for the three pieces of chalk - each representing a wish - that her

teacher gave her to calm her as stray rounds from a gunfight ripped through the classroom.

Two years after a rapturous world premiere reception at Fantastic Fest 2017, writer-director Issa López's debut feature finally reaches wider audiences without losing an iota of its power. It's no surprise that Guillermo del Toro has become such an advocate for this film, as it's evocative of the melding of fantasy, childhood, and realworld darkness that he forged in two of his most meaningful works, The Devil's Backbone and Pan's Labyrinth. Yet, unlike those period

films, López does not grant herself or the audience the mercy of the softening lens of history. This is Mexico right now, and she depicts the grueling brutality of her young protagonists' lives with the same earnest honesty as Capernaum or Bicycle Thieves or (possibly most pertinently) Buñuel's Los Olvidados. At the same time, she seamlessly injects uncanny elements - most especially a trail of blood that flows in a precise line toward the future victims of the incessant violence that threatens to swallow everyone. Yet there is also a sense of the spirits warn-

ing and guarding Estrella and the boys, in forms mundane, gruesome, terrifying, and sweet.

What ensures that this is not del Toro-lite is that López doesn't have the characters walk into the uncan-

ny as an escape from their **TIGERS ARE** nightmarish reality. Instead, NOT AFRAID the shadow realms intrude in D: Issa López; with Paola Lara, Juan ambiguous ways that never feel Ramón López, Hanssel Casillas, forced, that the fey and the Rodrigo Cortes, Ianis Guerrero, Tenoch Huerta. (NR, 83 min., subtitled) dead could all be in Estrella's ****

imagination but could equally be the otherworldly taking pity on these waifs. The broken childhoods of the characters (most especially López as Shine, the boy forced to grow up too fast), shattered by poverty and gangs and adults who are either absent, evil, or ground down themselves, are the victims; so even if their only salvation comes from the supernatural, maybe

But then, we're talking about the same academy that ignored the groundbreaking Koyaanisqatsi in favor of the completely forgettable and forgotten He Makes Me Feel Like Dancin' (in fact, none of Godfrey Reggio's Qatsi trilogy even scored an Oscar nomination) and that only this year picked the stomach-churning thrills of Free Solo over the lyrical insight of *Mountain*. But the latest film from landmark documentarian Victor Kossakovsky is not simply in the same mold as those enigmatic, emotional masterpieces: It is arguably the equal of any of them.

Aquarela is a song of water. Shot at 96 frames per second (although in most cinemas it will be shown at the less technically demanding 48 fps) and filmed across seven nations and an entire ocean, the film is an almost wordless examination of its mutability and its unstoppable power, of its contradictions and terrors. Most of all, it is a song of scale. Water is what defines Earth, and vet - like anything ubiquitous - humans have a bad habit of forgetting that fact. Kossakovsky puts us back in our place, a species at the whim of wave and storm and ice.

At every stage, Aquarela is a voyage on the edges of elemental wrath. The opening scenes – an almost Keystone Kops sequence of locals in Greenland trying to rescue submerged cars that drunkards drove onto the



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thick winter ice – suddenly becomes a quiet tragedy. The spring melt expands to become glaciers breaking off, floating, submerging, cracking. Shots are held for seeming lifetimes because Kossakovsky is not working around human pace. This is water at its own speed, and when you are under a massive wave as its collapses upon you, and you watch in awe as the surface of the sea becomes your new sky, he is putting you in your place.

It's the astounding score by Eicca Toppinen and his bandmates in cello-metal innovators Apocalyptica that gives the film its structure. Sudden crescendos of guitar-driven chamber music crash and whirl, the only sound imaginable to match the slow cracking of ice floes melting, or the persistent roar of waterfalls, or the drowning static of a mid-Atlantic storm. or the wild howls of a hurricane. Kossakovsky isn't interested in its passive states, like ponds or streams, but in the grandeur of water, how it can be perilous even when seemingly inert. As the U.S. weathers another drought and braces itself for a devastating hurricane season (another defining contradiction of the element, perilous in both its presence and absence), this is one song of water we need to sing together.

BEFORE YOU KNOW IT D: Hannah Pearl Utt; with Utt, Jen Tullock, Mandy Patinkin, Oona Yaffe, Judith Light, Mike Colter. (NR, 98 min.)

It takes a particular kind of pointed passivity to be a stage manager, to be prepared to deal with the demands of artistic types. Those pressures are multiplied for Rachel (writer, director, and star Utt), who is also dealing with a fairly dysfunctional family – which happens to be that very same theatre troupe. Daddy Mel (Patinkin) is a jaded old playwright, a onetime enfant terrible who's still writing and still performing and still acting out. All the while, her sister Jackie (Tullock) is a hyperkinetic, self-obsessed heir to his legacy. Meanwhile, Rachel is trying to keep their New York neighborhood theatre open while flailing through her own personal life. She gets dates with nice women, she's putting herself out there, but she always pulls back, never able to find a way to put herself first. The roles in her family are set, and she knows what her part is. That is, right up until a bombshell drops, and everything they thought was set in stone ripples and changes forever.

Before You Know It feels like it fell out of the mid-Eighties – and that's not a bad thing. In the tradition of Mystic Pizza or Moscow on the Hudson, it finds its humor in the light and shade of its characters, with the odd broader gag (especially from Tullock, who is unafraid to go big with Jackie's theatrical habits). There's something a little quaint and charmingly antiquated about a dramedy about a theatrical family on the brink of bankruptcy who finds out that supposedly deceased mommy dearest works in soaps - especially when the family theatre is so off-off-off-Broadway that there's plenty of space for long tracking shot conversations down Brooklyn sidewalks and past Manhattan brownstones, chatting about everything and nothing. Rachel plays hard into that period feel, dressed like Ally Sheedy in The Breakfast Club and so out of contact with everyday modern life that a date has to explain negging to her.

Yet, like a lot of Eighties indie films, there's an odd unwieldiness due to shambling subplots – none of which aren't fun, but none of which add anything overall to the rest of the story. Potshots at the absurd and misogynistic world of TV are well-placed, but feel like they fell in from another, less heartfelt film. Similarly, Yaffe excels as Dodge, Jackie's daughter, as she tries to make her own way with an emotionally absent parent. However, her storylines – therapy sessions with an awkward shrink (Baldwin in an unnecessary cameo) or getting babysat by the family accountant (Colter) – feel like they should be their own film, not bolted on like a sitcom B-plot. That never stops the core, bittersweet story from tugging on the heartstrings at all the right moments. Utt's script raises all-too-recognizable questions about what family means and when it's OK to change your closest relationships, but knows the audience is too canny for pat answers. Its emotional resolution feels natural and earned, even if it takes a few too many stops and changes on the subway to get there. $\star\star\star$ – *Richard Whittaker*

You've got to hand it to director Andy Muschietti. Adapting any Stephen King novel – or, for that matter, shorter material – is always a hit-or-miss gig, but *It Chapter Two* manages to pull out all the stops and in several areas actually tops the first film. No mean feat, that, as *It* was absolutely the creepshow that King fans have been slavering for for decades, chock-full of genuinely dream-snatching horror imagery bound together within a latticework of unrelenting dread and the everlasting kidhood bond of its young protagonists.

And then there was Pennywise (played again here by Skarsgård), Barnum & Bailey's worst nightmare and then some. An apropos analogy: If *It* was *The Evil Dead* of soul-and-psycheraping harlequin horror shows, then *It Chapter Two* is comparable to Raimi's *Evil Dead* 2 in terms of sheer lunatic inventiveness and stupefying scenes of hallucinatory, visceral viciousness. As one of the now grownup Losers Club puts it (in a droll homage to John Carpenter's *The Thing*), "You gotta be fucking kidding me."



Set 27 years after the events of the first film, Chapter Two reunites (mostly) the nolonger-Losers Club characters as they make good on their childhood promise to return to the well and truly cursed Maine hamlet of Derry. With the lone exception of Mike Hanlon (Mustafa), who has stuck around as the town librarian for the intervening two-decades-plus in order to keep an eye out for the potential return of the soul-sucking, child-gnawing Bozo from beyond, the gang has scattered into their adult lives, their memories of that long-ago nightmare summer oddly forgotten. Smartass Richie (Hader) is now a stand-up comic, "Stuttering" Bill (McAvoy) has turned out to be a successful novelist, Bev (Chastain) is a Chicago fashion designer, the once-overweight Ben (Rvan) is now a buff architect, and asthmatic Eddie (Ransone) pilots a limo. Only Stanley (Bean) seems to still be haunted by the ghosts of Derry past.

It's no spoiler to say that the Losers are quickly reunited in that strange little town, called from afar by Mike, who reminds them of the oath they took after vanguishing (heh, heh, hur) Pennywise back in 1989. Apart from that, I'll say little about Chapter Two's serpentine plotting, except to note that returning screenwriter Gary Dauberman (working without It co-scribes Cary Fukunaga and Chase Palmer this time out) infuses the proceedings with somewhat more adult terrors, as befits the storyline. That said, Chapter Two frequently switches timelines, revisiting the more vouthful Losers Club in order to underscore or, occasionally, explicate the actions of their older and presumably - but not always - wiser selves.

Incoming director of photography Checco Varese's eye makes for a notably different shade of ghastliness, too. Whereas *It* DP (and Park Chan-wook stalwart) Chung Chung-hoon kept the first film visually disconcerting and tonally queasy (appropriately so, given the kid'seye view of the brutal goings-on), Varese goes for the gut punch, making *Chapter Two* a more sustained cavalcade of ghoulish grue. At times, VFX house Method Studios' freaky creations appear to be informed by a seriously warped combination of *Beetlejuice*-era Burton-esque practical effects and just the right amount of bad-trip magic mushrooms. (I could've sworn I caught some stop-motion work in there, too.)

All of which would have been for naught if the cast weren't up to it - badass horror effects only go so far, after all – but they are. completely, with Hader and Chastain being the most memorable, and often the most relatable. All are game, and fair game for the demonic Pennywise's increasingly bat-shit crazy flimflammery. Sure, It Chapter Two runs nearly three hours long (a full half-hour longer than its predecessor), but unless you suffer from sciatica or, God help you, coulrophobia, it's a helluva ride and a fitting capstone (headstone?) to the best cinematic Stephen King adaptation in recent memory. In the political lexicon of the 21st century, the whistleblower is either a patriot or a traitor. The act of divulging classified governmental information for a purpose other than espionage is a polarizing topic without any shades of gray. Mention the name of the exiled Edward Snowden or the recently (again) incarcerated Chelsea Manning in a conversation with a random group of people and observe. Blood pressures will elevate: decibels will rise. It seems everyone has a strong opinion, one way or another.

While most Americans are familiar with Snowden and Manning's heroic acts/criminal transgressions (you choose), few know the story of Katharine Gun (Knightley), a low-level intelligence specialist employed by Britain's **Government Communications Headquarters** at the time George W. Bush and Tony Blair were shamelessly using scare tactics in 2003 to rally support for another invasion of Iraq, unequivocally alleging Iraq's murderous madman Saddam Hussein possessed weapons of mass destruction without any credible proof. As chronicled in the informative Official Secrets, when a United States National Security Agency memo requests the GCHO's assistance in gathering information on the members of the United Nations Security Council who may hesitate to support W's bid for a seemingly baseless war, an anguished Gun leaks the email in an effort to expose the subterfuge and prevent the loss of

innocent lives. Add the threat of her Muslim husband's deportation and the British government's prosecution of Gun for treason. and you have the template for a compelling movie, or at least a provocative one. But while Official Secrets clearly falls in the hero camp in relating Gun's little-known story this side of the Atlantic, it lacks contagious passion. Credit director Hood for eschewing sensational melodramatics, but the movie has all the excitement of a Wikipedia page.

Based on a 2008 nonfiction British bestseller, the screenplay (co-written by the husband-and-wife team of Gregory and Sara Bernstein, along with Hood) is a linear narrative without an arc. The relatively short lead-up to Gun's surreptitious disclosure of the damning memo throws you off from the beginning. Aside from witnessing her vell at the telly every time Bush or Blair appear onscreen, you know little about her principles or politics before she takes that fateful step (after all, she spies on people for a living). Once the repercussions of Gun's actions begin to domino, Official Secrets picks up some momentum. Unfortunately, the middle of the film also clumsily begins to pursue a finger-wagging agenda, occasionally giving Knightley a soapbox upon which to express her indignation and allowing others the opportunity to comment on her character's courage, as if you might have overlooked it. By this time, the rumbling score by Paul Hepker and Mark Kilian has gone from annoving to irritating. Though the third act ends surprisingly, if not anticlimactically - truth is indeed stranger than fiction – the film can't resist one final finger wag, this time from the esteemed barrister (a likable Fiennes) who brilliantly mounts Gun's legal defense by barely raising that finger. It's an off-putting and gratuitous

gesture to a movie that should have proceeded from the beginning with a raised fist.

SUNDANCE FILM FESTIVAL SHORT FILM TOUR 2019 D: Various, (NR. 96 min.)

One of the most recognized film festivals in the country has curated a showcase of seven short films from their 2019 roster and is taking them on the road, and Austin is, thankfully, one of the stops. Short films often get the short shrift (no pun intended) at film festivals, as attendees often see stars in their eyes and jockey for those hot tickets. But veterans of the film trenches know that more often than not, shorts programs can be some of the most rewarding cinema. Whether it's a hard-hitting documentary, an astute and poignant narrative, or an ebulliently expressive animated film, there are, as they used to say, much gold in them that hills. The programmers at Sundance have put together a wonderfully eclectic program that highlights new and talented voices in the film community.

In her second short, Stefanie Abel Horowitz's "sometimes, i think about dying" concerns a suicidal woman who might just have a spark of hope in the world in the form of a potential office romance. It's a sharply written and edited grenade of ennui and mental health that turns mildly sweet. "Fast Horse" is a unique look into Native American horse relay racing that is both illuminating and heart-stopping. "Suicide by Sunlight" mixes vampirism and dystopian (read: contemporary) social issues, while "Muteum" is a wondrous tonic that sees children on a field trip to an art museum wreak havoc on the history of art by magically being put in classic artworks (Judith Slaving Holofernes never looked cuter).

"Crude Oil" is a personal highlight for me in its tale of a friendship falling apart (but with superpowers). It's a kinetically inventive film that should put Christopher Good on the map as someone to watch. (But who keeps those maps of cultural currency? And are they trustworthy?) Which brings us to the last short, "Brotherhood," which is being expanded into a feature. The story of a Tunisian shepherd's son returning home with a wife of a different culture and the familial and racial tensions that arise is both poetic and trenchant.

Look, although I can only spill so many words about these films due to column space, I could go on about them. But the great part about that is these films will provoke so many wonderful post-screening conversations that will transcend all of my filmic prattle. And that, folks, is what cinema is about: community. Josh Kupecki



Lied Into War JOURNALIST MARTIN BRIGHT WAS RINGSIDE FOR THE DECEPTIONS IN OFFICIAL SECRETS by Richard Whittaker



When the U.S. and its Coalition of the Willing invaded Iraq in 2002, the simple, bloody fact was that most experts on the region knew that there were no weapons of mass destruction there. **Martin Bright**, then home affairs editor for Britain's *The Observer* newspaper, knew it, and even when whistleblower **Katharine Gun** leaked emails proving it, the world still went to war. Now the story of that lie comes to theatres as political drama *Official Secrets*, with **Keira Knightley** as Gun and **Matt Smith** as Bright.

Looking back, Bright referred to the deliberate attempt to deceive the public as "an exercise in authoritarian psychology. If you talk to people now, they say, 'Well, we knew there wasn't anything there.' And yet, within each institution you look at, there was a small cabal that managed to push through the agenda that brought us to war." That applied to the intelligence community, governments, and, Bright said with a note of sad-

ODN'T LET GO

The core of any time travel movie is always "What if?" What if you see that event, or what if you could change that pivotal moment? That's what happens to Detective Jack Radcliff (Oyelowo) when he gets a surprise call from his niece, Ashley (Reid). It's a shock because she died two weeks earlier, gunned down with her entire family in a mysterious home invasion. Can he rewrite the past through a cell phone? Writer/director Jacob Estes evokes some of the moral quandaries of Rian Johnson's twisting masterpiece Looper, as timelines unfurl and collapse, breaking each other and setting up some new sense of hope. Don't Let Go is smaller, grittier, and never reaches the same metaphysical heights, but its earnest melding of crime drama and backwardforward storytelling still touches the heart. "It was extremely tense," he said. I can't overemphasize how painful and difficult it was to work through those times. It's difficult enough when you're trying to break stories on the brink of war and you're trying to understand what's going on, but it's all the more difficult when you don't quite know where you stand with your colleagues or your editors."

That's part of why he was prepared to work with the filmmakers on *Official* Secrets. There are no narrative short cuts, no courtroom antics for dramatic effect, no composite characters. In fact, there was only one major change. A key document drop did not take place, as shown in the film, in a shadowy underground garage. Instead, it was in that most suitably British of settings: a tea shop.

Home-schooled in the jungle by her explorer/professor parents (Longoria and Peña), Dora is shipped off at film's beginning to the big city and her cousin Diego's family, while Mom and Dad go off in search of a lost Incan kingdom. The funny, fleet script mines some quick - but never cheap - laughs out of Dora's fish-out-ofwater status before wisely getting her back to the jungle on a new adventure. (08/16/2019) ***

Although *The Farewell* is, at its core, a film about cultural differences, Wang has no interest in turning Billi's journey into just a fish-out-of-water story. It's about the way that one family can construct unique experiences across three countries. What makes *The Farewell* one of the best movies of the year is the way she surfaces these differences, and how Billi's path to acceptance of them makes *The Farewell* one of the most heartfelt homecoming films in years. 

Blue-Collar Moviemaking

AUSTIN REVOLUTION FILM FESTIVAL CELEBRATES THE TRUE INDIES by Matthew Monagle

Before there was an **Austin Revolution Film Festival**, there was a group of no-budget filmmakers wanting to screen their work for friends and family. "It was literally an inflated screen in my backyard," recalled festival founder and director **James Christopher**. Now in its eighth year, ARFF is celebrating with an Eighties-themed slate, assembling a lineup of films, television pilots, music videos, and web series from all around the world that adhere to the same DIY ethos that drove Christopher's own filmmaking career.

Christopher said he and his team describe ARFF as a "blue-collar" film festival, implying a degree of resourcefulness that even so-called

indie productions lack. "For us, it's when you're having to outwork a problem because you can't outspend it," Christopher explains. In his own work as a

blue-collar filmmaker – his team at **Twitchy Dolphin Flix** has produced dozens of features and short films of their own – Christopher developed an affinity for filmmakers who worry as much about catering and transportation as shot composition and production design. "This is, as much as anything, a home for the people who also have to worry about where the tacos are coming from for lunch." Part of this blue-collar approach is teaching filmmakers how to maximize their festival experience – much of it drawn from lessons the Twitchy Dolphin team learned from their own submissions to other festivals. "We have two panels on 'how to film fest,'" Christopher explained. "I don't think most filmmakers go to a festival wanting to learn a new editing software. They've already made a film, they know how to do it. It's how to get traction on their film afterwards."

ARFF is also unique in its choice of setting, as almost every screening takes place at the **Crowne Plaza** in North Austin. Christopher is the first to admit how uncon-

been a sheet on the wall and computer speakers and my movie squashed to 4:3," he said, but ARFF is not in the business of shortchanging filmmakers or audiences. "Good sound, good projection, good speakers. We hire a company that comes in and does it for us."

So why the hotel setting? It boils down to community. ARFF's singular location makes it easy for creators and fans to network long



after the screenings are over. At previous festivals, Christopher's even had filmmakers – ones skeptical about having their movies projected in a hotel – lobby him to cancel other screenings around town. "When you screen in a multiplex, what happens after the movie is people leave," he explained. "Doing it where we're doing it, you stay and hang out, you end up becoming, in some cases, collaborators."

While film festivals have undergone changes as an industry both in Austin and across the country, there is no mission creep with regard to ARFF. Christopher and his team remain as focused as ever on promoting the work of talented and hardworking independent filmmakers. "I spent seven years in the army. I was in a war zone for a year and a half," he said with a sigh. "I've seen how bad the world can be. I'm not interested in competing with people for festival stuff. I'm interested in celebrating independent film and learning what I can from the good ones and what I can't from the bad ones and just trying to do my best for the filmmakers that show up to ours every year."


SCARY STORIES TO TELL IN THE DARK

Punk's Not White at Black & Brown Fest

After years of DIY events, **Daisy Salinas** is no stranger to pushback. Her first festival effort, an all-women event benefiting survivors of sexual assault, attracted accusations of man-hating in the Nashville scene. Now based in San Antonio, Salinas blocks online trolls daily from the pages of her punk collective, **Xingonas in the Pit**. Any messaging along the lines of "punk's not white" brings the angry commenters running.

"People think punk is just about the music, but it's about a political act of resistance," counters Salinas. "People of color have always been doing it ourselves – before DIY culture was ever a thing. We played a huge part in the formation of punk, and we're just not given credit."

Amid online threats, San Antonio's second annual **Black & Brown Punk Fest** went off without a hitch, hosting 10 acts at LGBTQ venue/vegan eatery **La Botanica** last Saturday. Based on similar concepts in Chicago and Oakland, the all-ages evening proved genuinely positive, never preachy, and unabashedly radical. (The flier featured a purple-haired punk tossing a Molotov cocktail at the **Alamo**.) The gathering of around 200 attendees followed the collective's recent face-off with a big name arts machine.

In March, Xingonas in the Pit put together a lineup to accompany a screening of **James Spooner**'s 2003 documentary, *Afro-Punk*, at the visiting director's request. They called the day-fest "Afropunk in the Pit!" Afterward, they received a cease and desist letter from Brooklyn-based festival **Afropunk**, an event initially inspired by Spooner's film.

"It was so ironic because Afropunk, the corporation, wouldn't exist if it wasn't for the documentary," says Salinas. "How is that reflective of your mission – to try to sue working class punks of color?"

Spooner broke off from Afropunk in 2008, now a major multi-

city event with corporate sponsorship. Afropunk criticisms echoed in the viral support for Xingonas in the Pit following coverage of the legal threat in *The Guardian*. Influential poet **Hanif Abdurraqib** and **Garbage** lead **Shirley Manson** have also supported the group's crowdfunding efforts.

Even before the international attention, La Botanica received phone calls threatening violence. On Saturday, the **Autonomous Brown Berets De San Anto** offered security assistance to the collective's own newly formed **Safer Space Crew**. Based on **War On Women** singer **Shawna Potter**'s new book, *Making Spaces Safer*, the organizers wore pins to show availability in cases of harassment or discrimination.

Austin native **Monica Skinner**, who works locally in fest production and audio, drove down to San Antonio for meetings and eventually joined the crew. Currently on hiatus from local bookings as **Hex in the City**, Skinner says the collective's politics aren't necessarily Austin-centric.

"At one of the Austin venues I stopped working with, the owner was like, 'Yeah, any kind of, like, trans shows you can bring in, the more the merrier,'" recalls Skinner. "It sounded like dollar signs, not actually caring about the cause."

Austin projects accounted for half of the Black & Brown Punk Fest lineup. Rising local trio **Dirt Pile** set a nighttime vibe with minimal punk verse over brooding doom moods, while homegrown hardcore troupe **Black Mercy** opened the pit with hyperspeed riffs from two guitarists. Austin director/**Blxpltn** player **Jonathan Horstmann** screened his short doc covering the displacement of East Cesar Chavez bookstore **Casa de Resistencia**.

Horstmann also starred in the first in-state screening of "I Am TX," a narrative short following a black Austin punk band's last night on tour, as conceived by director **Ryan Darbonne**.

MUTUAL FEELINGS CLOSES RETAIL LOCATION ON MUTUAL TERMS

On March 8, 2018, **Julia Dixon** and **Amberlin Leonard** were pleasantly surprised by the packed turnout for their vintage store's grand opening. Ever since, progressive fashion boutique **Mutual Feelings** has offered a multi-use DIY space to musical events, art installations, and more. An island of campy, futuristic fashion in Austin's denim-obsessed Western scene, the physical space on Rosewood Avenue closed last week following a final party on Aug. 24.

"It's only been a year and a half, but the amount of people we've brought together is pretty insane," says Dixon.

"It feels really big," adds Leonard. "We didn't like to charge people. It was like, if you can throw the event, you can have [the space]."

Dixon and Leonard will continue sales on shopping app **Depop** alongside plans to launch a website. In its mall-gothmeets-Y2K-raver style, including rare pieces from designers like **Comme des Garçons** and **Issey Miyake**, the shop brought together a previously untapped subset of fashioninterested Austin artists and musicians. On Instagram, local rapper **Ladi Earth** called it her favorite local shop, joining a flurry of fan tribute posts in their Mutual Feelings wares.

The founding duo says they're looking for more flexibility after running the retail shop without any other employees and added hours for nighttime events. Highlights included collaborations with local collective **Brown State of Mind**, which put on an undersea-themed show around **Christelle Bofale**'s *Swim Team* album release, plus DJ sets and the first-ever comedy show from **The Gay Agenda**.

"We're both Scorpios, so we're very particular," recalls Dixon. "Now that we've built this brand, we have some space to ask: 'What do we really want?'"

Dixon and Leonard will continue under the Mutual Feelings moniker via pop-up sales, events, and styling. Follow along on Instagram **@shopmutual**.

In a post-fest interview with Salinas, the founder conveyed a message from Black Mercy vocalist **Noble Brown**, who said he'd never played to so many people of color throughout decades of punk participation. Near the end of the night, before unleashing back-bends and crowd crawls, vocalist **Evan Jones** of ATX garage crew **Dregs** thanked Xingonas in the Pit.

"I've had tears in my eyes multiple times tonight," Jones said. "I've never felt so represented as I do in San Antonio, in this space."

CROSSTALK

MORE ALLEY DELAYS: On Friday, Aug. 30, **Austin Public Works** announced further delays to yearlong efforts to fence off the alley between now-shuttered **Sidewinder** and **Beerland**. The email updated the timeline, resetting the clock on a 12-week projection announced at a City Council meeting last month (see "The Alley Again," Aug. 16). The then-hopeful Council conversation claimed biohazard cleanup of the problematic corridor would begin within three weeks. That was three weeks ago.

THERESA JENKINS, senior executive director of the **Recording Academy Texas Chapter**, died Aug. 27, at the age of 54. Her diagnosis of esophageal cancer was announced at the Chapter's 25th anniversary gala at **ACL Live** last month, where stars like **Yolanda Adams** celebrated Jenkins' support of their careers. **Texas Music Office** Director **Brendon Anthony** highlighted her work on student outreach programs, writing: "Theresa's legacy will carry on ... in the statewide music community that she helped grow into a world-renowned, Grammy Award-winning industry."

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The Conscience of Corey Baum

Two-stepping into class consciousness with Croy & the Boys

"The original album title I was stuck on for a long time was *Art of Talking Shit*," laughs Corey Baum as he slides a vinyl copy of the new Croy & the Boys LP across his kitchen table.

Howdy High-Rise, the local quartet's sophomore outing, isn't talking trash though. Instead, it lays bare a barrage of inconvenient truths readily recognizable to any Austinite: the increasing wealth gap within the city, gentrification, the criminalization of poverty. Behind indelible, unas-

suming melodies, Baum delivers social critiques with a warm smile and two-step rhythms like a honky-tonk Howard Zinn.

"That's more effective than an angry call-out, although to be honest, I am usually writing it from a place of anger," admits the songwriter. "But I'm just trying to be effective, and if I have goals for social change and class consciousness – which I d

Sitting in his East Austin house just off of Springdale Road, Baum's 18-month-old son Johnny wanders around the living room before his wife Amitiss sweeps in to take him for a walk around the 'hood. The home exudes the kind of comfortable chaos familiar to any working family with a toddler.

Baum's new domesticity at 34 years old also partly explains the evolution of his music from 2016 debut *Hey Come Back*. Whereas the inaugural Croy & the Boys effort reveled in a distinctly Austin slacker vibe ("Good Enough"), *Howdy High-Rise* considers the city skyline and neighborhood turnover and realizes "It Seems Like You Can't Just Be Poor Anymore."

"That class consciousness, that's what Americans struggle with," says Baum. "We're all embarrassed if we're not rich, when it's really like, man, we're not rich by design. People are making sure we're not, and there's no shame in that. We need to

acknowledge that and address that."

Although Baum doesn't shy away from calling out the obscenities of wealth and privilege with a biting candor, he's most effective simply pulling back the curtain on the hypocrisies of a city like Austin that's torn between liberal ideals and rapid growth. Therein surfaces an orchestrated tension between the band's upbeat country stylings and the underlying boil of Baum's lyrics.

"I don't necessarily enjoy a lot of protest music," he admits. "It's not enjoyable to me when it takes that self-seriousness of singer-songwriter stuff and then adds even more crushing political elements. So part of it, I think, is just that I want to make music enjoyable.

"But also, too, I want to present these opinions as common sense, because I think they are common sense," he continues. "I don't need to beat you over the head with this because it's true and you already know it's true."

LEAVING'S THE LAST THING

Although Baum's silky low croon pitches perfectly to trad C&W, it wasn't until moving to Austin a decade ago that he found his voice for it. Growing up in Bowling Green, Ohio, he played in the punk band Bullet Teeth – which helped launch Hovercraft Records – and studied ethnomusicology at Bowling Green State on a bass scholarship. First hearing Waylon Jennings and Willie Nelson finally turned his ear to country, and eventually drew him to Austin.

"It was the first time I'd heard country music produced and arranged in a way that really spoke to me, just really raw and stripped down," says Baum. "I was already connecting the dots between punk, hip-hop, and folk, all this music with a very direct lyrical approach, so hearing the outlaw stuff was an epiphany. I'd been playing all this folky stuff, but I love electric instruments and the power of an electric guitar."

In Austin, Baum's voracious musical curiosity expanded into Tex-Mex and conjunto. Teaming with Amy Hawthorne, a scene veteran who played bass with Speedy Sparks and Koolerators, melded a Texas Tornados groove with the Cornell Hurd Band's wit in filling dance floors. Although their debut touched into Tex-Mex territory behind Adrian Quesada's production, *Howdy High-Rise* explicitly draws in Juanito Castillo and Esteban Jordan III for accordion, bajo sexto, and flute. It's a sound rising directly from the bandleader's familial surroundings.

"East Austin completely changed my life," he says. "This album would have never happened if I hadn't moved to East Austin. These sounds and the music, like conjunto or norteño, have totally changed how I think about music. And even just the lifestyle over here changed everything for me, and I champion the diversity and want to be around it."

"My suburban model growing up was you go inside and close the door and don't see anybody," he continues. "I'm a front porch guy. I don't want to hide in my backyard. So everything about living over here has helped guide me to become the person I am right now, especially as I settle down and get more domestic with my son."

As Baum's witnessed rapid gentrification across the Eastside over the past decade, the erosion of cultural diversity and established communities increasingly compels his songwriting.

"All this loss, all these communities that took 60-plus years to coalesce have been ripped apart for no reason, just so a few assholes can make some money," he says. "And it's been completely preventable. That's what makes it so sad.

"Everyone's going through it; it's happening in every single city," he notes. "A lot of times people will come up and say, 'Man, your songs really spoke to me,' and I just have to go: 'I'm sorry.""

collection of topical tunes that could easily be assailed as overly preachy if it weren't accurate and cleverly penned. "I'm Broke" characterizes the stylistic vein of *Howdy High-Rise*: proletariat Roger Miller honky-tonk. On choice cut "It Seems Like You Can't Just Be Poor Anymore," frontman Corey

Baum's buttery voice laments a world with no room for the working class. He interrogates a condo building via the titular waltz, ultimately accusing it of driving his friends out of town. If you don't like moralizing, rush to skip "Gentrification," in which the onetime Dumb member spells out terms like "cultural elitism" and "hegemony," before comparing new Austin to "A Wes Anderson film ... with about as much cultural depth." In articulating the frustration of being a woke mid-30s white guy watching rich folks drain a unique city's culture, Baum effectively taps the zeitgeist of Austin 2019.

Eight of the 12 songs on Croy & the Boys' sophomore platter plainly rail against Austin's bougie

urbanity, exploitative property development, and widespread affordability issues. It's a righteous

Jimmie Vaughan endures. Blues royalty beginning in Seventies Austin, the master guitarist co-founded the Fabulous Thunderbirds and set himself up for a Grammy-winning career now six solid solo LPs in with latest entry Baby, Please Come Home. Brimming with material that inspired a teenage Vaughan in the Dallas suburb of Oak Cliff, the LP wheelbarrows through the Lloyd Price-penned title track with a flurry of brass honks grounded by corporeal six-string shuffles. First studio release in eight years, the 13-track disc lives and breathes the longtime local's


mastery of blues, country, even samba rock. On Lefty Frizell's "No One to Talk To (But the Blues)." Vaughan's softly weathered timbre shifts the original's crushing lamentation into weary-eyed heartache. Etta James' "Be My Lovey Dovey" loosens up with a greasy horn section and subs out its original interpreter's purple-dress cool for blue-eyed longing. On song of contrasts "Hold It," Mike Flanigin's Hammond organ suspends in air, buoyed by George Rains' pocket percussion, and Vaughan's coiled Stratocaster. "I'm Still in Love With You," the rhythmic "So Glad," and chicken-pickin' "Baby What's Wrong" serve up their guitarist's tasty trademark blues - elegant, minimalist, alive. No need to reinvent the wheel when it rides so smooth.

TEXAS FLOOD: THE INSIDE STORY OF STEVIE RAY VAUGHAN by Alan Paul & Andy Aledort St. Martin's Press, 368 pp., \$29.99

Almost 30 years after his untimely death in a helicopter crash, Stevie Ray Vaughan comes gloriously back to life in this all-out biography. Co-authors Alan Paul and Andy Aledort conducted over 100 interviews with the guitarist's inner circle, and draw from several with the artist himself, to provide a first-person insight that hadn't previously been given to the Texas blues icon. Like Paul's Allman Brothers chronicle One Way *Out*, the authors lean heavily on that oral history, but control the myriad voices into a tight focus that propels the narrative. Most valuable are extensive contributions from SRV's Double Trouble bandmates Chris Lavton and Tommy Shannon, who provide inside context for the band's rise to stardom and the shift as addictions spun out of control, plus the ultimate journey by Vaughan to sobriety. In those voices, we hear the heartbreak of Vaughan's drug abuse devastating his music and rela-



tionships, especially as the warm, open soul that defined his personality recedes. The authors likewise excel in describing the uniqueness of Vaughan's playing, with Guitar World editor Aledort elucidating the technical and stylistic genius of the blues shredder. Texas Flood unleashes that which made Vaughan a master musician and person. – Doug Freeman

SPOON Everything Hits at Once: The Best of Spoon (Matador)

A tight 13 tracks culled from 23 years of swaggering indie rock, Spoon's

first comp reaches as far back as 2001's Girls Can Tell for the title track to Everything Hits at Once. Bookended by excellence, the LP opens with the sleepy-sultry hypnotics of "I Turn My Camera On," frontman Britt Daniel's voice slipping from falsetto to soulful rasp, and closes with sharp new track "No Bullets Spent." Two of Spoon's most beloved earworms anchor the middle - "The Way We Get By," with its runaway piano, and "The Underdog," cruising atop frenetic acoustic guitar, horns, and the hopefulness of a mid-Aughts indie anthem – but recent hit wannabe "Hot Thoughts" follows immediately and nearly neutralizes them. In that sense, The Best of Spoon feels like a misnomer title. Daniel recently told the Chronicle he intended the band's new compilation for folks with a "passing familiarity" of the band, and that's where it hits its mark. Here's your gateway LP to Spoon, not a comprehensive overview. ****

JORDAN MOSER Long Night (Keeled Scales) Following a

decade of ballet performance and recording music, Jordan Moser turns

a fresh leaf on his local Keeled Scales debut. The carefully curated collection of country folk slides open softly on the steel guitar-shaped "Down With Me." Rich hums separate Moser's literary lines, echoed by the smoky tone of Austin's Molly Burch on all eight tracks, including a feature for final Western duet "Road to Trouble." Pointed instrumentation and Dailey Toliver's swooping guitar curves make the album agreeable for Burch fans, darkened with a dense tangle of lovesick reflections. "The Devil" prays wearily to the eternal challenge of romance ("Oh Devil, let us sleep like we used to"), followed by the title track's warning: "It's gonna be a long, long night." That sentiment comes to a head on "Love Is Gonna Test You," foiling bright beats over placement in "a wilderness of the soul." The writings of a witty, well-traveled skeptic, Moser's songs slip out like sighs. Sometimes the breaths are resigned, but others mark entrance of a new beginning. **** - Rachel Rascoe



JACOB WISE QUARTET Paseo

Before he's played a note, Jacob Wise finds himself in that rarest of categories: native



Austin jazz artist. As evidenced by his second album, the ATX-born/University of North Texas-educated guitarist and instructor manages to keep his cool despite being in the same bucket as late local heroes Kenny Dorham and Martin Banks. As such, Paseo is no fusion-soaked display of blazing chops with an intrinsic need to prove instrumental bona fides. Instead, Wise picks up the ball from post-bop legends Grant Green and Kenny Burrell, riffing a refined sense of melody and dedication to taste. The axeman and his backing trio, including scene-stealing pianist Damian Garcia, infuse the bopping "Panther Burn" and Latin-laced title track with a musicality that beckons rather than burns. Using his enhanced chops for tuneful accessibility as often as for hot breaks. Wise entices listeners to enter his world rather than intimidating them. $\star \star \star$

CHURCH ON MONDAY For Being There (Cherrywood)

When longtime Austin jazz man Elias Haslanger and his band took up residence in the Continental



Club Gallery back in 2012, no one knew Church On Monday would become one of the city's longest-running weekly showcases. Yet here we are, and in celebration of the show's seventh anniversary, the saxophonist and his crew – bassist Daniel Durham, guitarist Tommy Howard, drummer Scott Laningham, and veteran keyboardist Dr. James Polk - jam a live state of the union address with third LP For Being There. The quintet alternates between swinging Sixties soul jazz, as on Harold Vicks' "Our Miss Brooks" and Polk's "Black Door Jeannye," and bristling hard bop, à la Cedar Walton's "Bolivia" and the standard "I'll Remember April." Haslanger and Howard flourish when unleashed, but they're masters of comping as well. The rhythm section concentrates on its mission, though Durham also turns in some fine solos. The backbone, however, is Polk: His Hammond provides the bed on which every other instrument lies, and his lead breaks almost casually show off the tasteful artistry inherent in 60-plus years of musical service. With one foot in groove and the other in improvisational brio, Church on Monday gives a master class in balancing accessibility and self-expression. $\star\star\star\star$

The laser beam was rather ingeniously (diabolically?) reflected via pieces of strategically placed broken mirror into a matrix that blanketed nearly the entire house.

I remember being both impressed and a little bit terrified – mainly that he had either found a way to recycle a shattered mirror or that he had shattered a mirror in service of what could very generously be described as mild insanity. As you can imagine, I side-shuffled the fuck out of there as quickly as possible – which is why I can't confirm the fire marshal theory.

My guess is that currently you're not in the same immediate peril I imagined myself to be. If your girlfriend starts smashing mirrors and snorting meth, we can talk. Until then, maybe try getting her to agree to binge-watch Marie Kondo with you. 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
